## Ike, Governors Talk Drouth Aid

### Crowds Pack Amarillo For Crucial Meets

AMARILLO—(AP)—Governors and cattlemen scurried around Amarillo Friday, waiting to talk to President Eisenhower about their drouth woes.

The President arrived here at 12:49 p.m. after a five and one-half-hour flight from Washington.

Governor Shivers, who called seven governors to come see what their states can do to lessen the burden on

stockmen and farmers, arrived at 11:15 a.m. in a private plane. Ten minutes later, Gov. Johnson Murray of Oklahoma arrived, also in a private plane.

Gov. Edward Arn of Kansas got here Thursday night. The governors of Colorado, New Mexico, Arkansas and Arizona were due at noon.

Shivers said the governors would meet with the President in a closed session at 2 p.m.

Secret service men arrived here Thursday night and Friday banded all cars within a block of the hotel where the President will be.

There was no indication whether the President would appear at the public meeting in the Amarillo Municipal Auditorium at 3 p.m.

That's when cattlemen demanding federal price supports intend to speak their piece. Other cattlemen have avowed they don't want that.

Eight officials and legislators accompanied the President. They included Senator Lyndon Johnson (D-Texas); Secretary of Agriculture Benson; Civil Defense Administrator Val Peterson; Sherman Adams, assistant to the President; Presidential Secretaries Thomas Stephens and James Hagerly; Robert Farrington, acting director of the Department of Agriculture's credit service aid chief of the department's drouth relief work; and former Rep. Ben Gull, Texas Republican who now is counsel for the Post Office Department.

**Jewelry Window Damaged By Fire**

A fire in a display window of Kruger's Jewelry, 104 North Main Street, broke out at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, causing considerable damage to merchandise in the window and smoke damage to the interior of the store, which is managed by Ted Kruger.

**ONE DEAD IN COLLISION**—One life was claimed Thursday night when two automobiles collided on the Andrews Highway three miles northwest of Midland. Mrs. Tom Rice, 22-year-old Midland woman, who was riding in the overturned vehicle at the left, died less than three hours later in a Midland hospital from injuries received in the wreck. Her husband and three other persons were injured although her small daughter was not hurt.

### Mrs. Tom Rice Dies In Crash; Four Are Hurt

A 22-year-old Midland housewife was killed and four other persons were injured, none of them seriously, in a two-automobile collision Thursday night three miles northwest of Midland on the Andrews Highway.

Mrs. Tom Rice, 606 Spraberry Drive, died in a Midland hospital at 10:30 p.m., about two and a half hours after the accident.

Her husband was treated for minor injuries but their daughter, one-year-old Barbara Elaine, escaped injury.

Others treated for minor injuries and released from Midland Memorial Hospital, included Zackie Norman Monroe, 25, 911 North Weatherford, driver of the other vehicle; Marie Monroe, 25, his wife, and their four-year-old son.

Another passenger in their car, Borman D. Groves, Odessa, escaped injury.

State Highway Patrolman Jack Whitson said Rice, who was driving, was attempting to turn into Holiday Hill when his car collided with Monroe's automobile.

Mrs. Rice's father, Eulan O'Donnell, collapsed at his home a short time after the accident and was rushed to Midland Memorial Hospital. He was released, however, Friday morning.

Funeral services for Mrs. Rice have been set tentative for 4 p.m. Sunday at the Bellview Baptist Church with the Rev. J. H. Goin and the Rev. Wayne Tucker officiating. Burial will be in the Newell W. Ellis Chapel in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Rice moved to Midland three years ago from Slaton with her family. Prior to that she had lived in Clarksville.

Surviving are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. O'Donnell of Midland; her husband and daughter; three brothers, O. A. O'Donnell, E. J. O'Donnell and Robert O'Donnell, all of Midland, and three sisters, Mrs. Mary Ritchey of Green Valley, Ill., and Mrs. James R. Holley and Billie Ruth O'Donnell, both of Midland.

### Profits Tax Cohorts Win Initial Test

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Administration forces won a first test of strength Friday as the House drove toward a vote on President Eisenhower's proposal to extend the excess profits tax.

Democratic members of the House Rules Committee made a fight against barring any amendments to the Administration bill, a straight renewal of the tax for six months to January 1. The procedure was approved by the full House.

With debate restricted to five hours, a vote on the bill was in prospect late in the day.

Republican Leader Halleck (Ind.) chiding critics of the bill, said they were throwing "more heat than light" and predicted "his approval by a three-to-one margin when the smoke clears."

Chairman Daniel A. Reed (R-N.Y.) of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, fighting the Administration proposal all the way, conceded he didn't expect to win. "All the logic is on our side," Reed said—"but not the votes."

### Norway Air Crash Kills 10 Americans

STAVANGER, NORWAY—(AP)—A U. S. military plane and a Norwegian Thunderjet fighter collided Friday over Sola Air Field, just outside Stavanger.

Ten Americans were killed and two persons were missing, police said.

### Timid Clouds Let Reluctant Showers Whisk Across City

Midlanders tasted a brief relief from the heat late Thursday as fleeting showers fell in scattered parts of the city. Heaviest rain was in the downtown area, where an approximate .02-inch fall caused water to flow in gutters.

CAA weathermen at Midland Air Terminal said there was a possibility for more thundershowers and light rains Friday afternoon with most of the day expected to remain hot.

Midland's high temperature was 98 degrees again Thursday with Dallas' 106 degrees the highest in the state.

A few light rains dotted Texas Thursday, the heaviest .59 inch at Texarkana. The hot, dry weather was expected to hang on through the state Friday.

In the Panhandle, Dalhart received .19 inch of rain, scarcely enough to settle the dust stirred up by 500 cattlemen who met there to ask for beef price supports as a measure of drouth aid.

### Midland Executive Charged In Fatal Shooting Of Wife

A 45-year-old oil company superintendent was being held under murder charges Friday in the fatal shooting Thursday afternoon of his wife following a family quarrel.

The charges were filed Friday against J. R. Watson, 3122 Delano Street, district superintendent here for Lloyd H. Smith, Houston independent oil operator.

His wife, Mrs. Ruby Lorraine Watson, died in a Midland hospital about three hours after she was shot in the head in a bedroom of the home into which they had moved only two weeks ago.

A two-year-old son was the only witness to the shooting, officers said.

Watson, who told authorities the shooting was accidental as he and his wife struggled for possession of a .38 caliber revolver, was being held in the Midland County jail.

He was scheduled to be arraigned later in the day before Justice of the Peace L. C. Stephenson.

Mrs. Watson, an attractive brunette, died shortly after 7 p.m., about three hours after she was wounded.

"We had been quarrelling," the sobbing Watson related as he was brought to police headquarters for questioning.

Watson's aged mother was in the house at the time, along with the Watson's two-year-old son, Mack, but they were unable to furnish any information about the shooting.

County Attorney Resgan Legg termed the filing of the murder charge as "routine" so the case would be presented at the next session of the grand jury.

Paraffin Tests Made  
Sheriff's officers Thursday night took paraffin impressions of the hands of both Mr. and Mrs. Watson and Friday sent them to the identification bureau of the State Department of Public Safety for analysis.

Funeral arrangements for Mrs. Watson had not been completed Friday noon at the Newell W. Ellis Chapel.

The Watsons came to Midland three years ago from Throckmorton.

House Panel Votes To Kill Movie Tax

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The House Ways and Means Committee Friday approved a bill to take the 20 per cent federal tax off tickets to movie theaters.

The bill does not remove the tax from admissions to sports events, legitimate theaters and other places of amusement.

The Treasury had opposed the bill. It would cost the government \$200,000,000 a year through lost revenues.

**Names Of Midland Streets Due Study**

The City Council started a move Thursday afternoon to straighten out the city's street names.

At its regular meeting, the council formally called on the City Zoning Commission to make a study of the street names and recommend changes.

City Manager W. H. Oswalt pointed out there were instances of duplications and conflicts in some of the street names.

By the time a doctor arrived, however, the ambulance was taking Mrs. Watson to the hospital.

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## Purge Of Beria Seen As Cue For Malenkov-Molotov Fight

LONDON—(AP)—European diplomats viewed Friday the purging of Lavrenty Beria as the beginning of an all-out struggle for power inside the Kremlin with prospects of a showdown next between Premier Georgi Malenkov and Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov.

Beria, 54, the gimlet-eyed boss of the secret police, was fired from his job, booted out of the Communist Party and condemned as a traitor. He was slayed as a "malignant enemy of the Soviet people" and his case turned over to the Soviet Supreme Court.

His successor in title but probably not in power, is Sergei Kruglov, a veteran police officer who has been given high Soviet recognition for his administration of the many camps holding millions of slave laborers.

British sources said Sir Alvary Gascoigne, the British ambassador to Moscow, has been giving the nod

to Molotov as the eventual big boss in the Kremlin. U. S. officials said Beria's purging meant Malenkov was acting swiftly and ruthlessly to consolidate his position as Stalin's successor.

A general tendency was against speculation that Beria's removal meant the Soviet regime was weakening—or that it would lead to any immediate change in policy at home or abroad.

Communists were grim. A spokesman of the French Communist Party in Paris said the decision concerns only the Communist Party of Russia.

Entire Work Cut Out  
Malenkov, Beria and Molotov were regarded by the West as a triumvirate heading the Soviet government since Stalin's death March 5. Beria and Molotov were "first" deputy premiers and Beria also was minister of the internal affairs.

The announcements said the 33-year-old Beria's "criminal" case would be turned over to the Soviet Supreme Court. He is certain to get short shrift from the Red judges.

Malenkov, himself, presented the charges against Beria at a special meeting of 2,000 ranking Red leaders, including members of the Soviet politburo. He was accused of being a "hiring of foreign imperialism" and an "enemy of the Communist Party and the Soviet people."

Far From Secure  
These are stereotyped accusations, common to Russian purge trials. Possibly more revealing was the additional charge that he attempted to "put the Ministry of Internal Affairs higher than the government and Communist Party of the Soviet Union."

Many Western observers speculated that Malenkov's hold on the government still may be far from secure.

Beria apparently will be made the scapegoat for the unrest now sweeping the Soviet Union's East European satellites. As police chief, he had the job of keeping these nations under the heel.

Perhaps significantly, Moscow censors permitted AP Correspondent Thomas P. Whitney to message that the charge that Beria acted as a foreign agent was viewed in the Soviet capital as "clearly a reference" to the recent East Berlin riots and South Korean President Syngman Rhee's release of North Korean prisoners of war.

Charges Heaped On  
The Soviet press has charged—and Western officials have denied strenuously—that both events resulted from a coordinated Western plan.

Beria also headed the Soviet Union's atomic energy program but there was no indication whether (Continued on Page 12)

## Second Full-Scale Truce Meeting Slated Saturday

PANMUNJOM—(AP)—Allied and Communist negotiators met secretly for 29 minutes Friday, then recessed until Saturday their efforts to clear the final obstacles to a Korean truce, still bitterly opposed by South Korea.

There was no hint whether the top-level delegations made progress toward signing an armistice during their first meeting in 20 days.

But the scheduling of another session for 11 a.m. Saturday (8 p.m. Friday, Texas time) was regarded as an indication that no serious disagreement had cropped up.

Informed quarters speculated that

much of the session was devoted to Communist demands that the UN Command guarantee South Korean compliance with armistice terms. President Syngman Rhee has threatened to pull his 16-division army out of the UNC and fight on alone to unify his nation.

Resumption of the negotiations came after a 30-day recess which followed Rhee's release of some 27,000 anti-Communist Korean war prisoners.

It came on the second anniversary of the first negotiating session.

"The thing now is whether the United Nations commander will give assurance that the armistice will not be broken. Rhee does not figure in the signing, only the military commanders of the two sides."

He said the Communists were interested in the talks in so far as they apply to a UN guarantee that South Korea will not violate a truce.

**Rhee's Capitulation Reported Imminent**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—South Korean President Syngman Rhee and assistant Secretary of State Walter Robertson were reported Friday to have made substantial progress toward an agreement under which Rhee would go along with an armistice ending the Korean war.

Authorities said the conclusion of a full and final agreement with Rhee by Robertson could be achieved almost instantly, if the old Korean leader did not again change his mind.

Some officials said the understanding amounted to an agreement. Others, apprehensive about the way Rhee has vacillated in the past between cooperating with a truce and going on with the war, said nothing could be counted as concluded until signed and sealed.

### Phillips Announces Location For Deep Andrews Prospector

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1-WW Texas University is to be drilled as a 13,500-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Northeast Andrews County, one and one-half miles northwest of production in the Andrews, Northeast (Devonian) field. Drillsite has been staked 667 feet from west and 660 feet from south lines of section 30, block 5, University Lands survey. Operations are to start at once. Drillsite is 18 1/2 miles northeast of the town of Andrews.

### Brahaney Sets Site For Shallow Wildcat In NW Scurry Area

F. T. Brahaney filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting permission to start drilling at once on a rotary wildcat in Northwest Scurry County. The project will be drilled as No. 1 T. R. Martin, four and one-half miles northeast of Fluvanna and 330 feet from north and west lines of section 665, block 97, H&TC survey. It is slightly more than two miles northeast of Brahaney No. 1 Jordan, recently plugged on total depth of 3,512 feet.

### Delaware Discovery Further Assured In SW Winkler Region

Further assurance of a flowing discovery from the Delaware sand has been developed at Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1-39862 University of Texas, wildcat in Southwest Winkler County. The project is being tested in open hole section from 5,099 to 5,108 feet. During the last 22 hours of testing, the project flowed 69.5 barrels of new oil and no water through a one-quarter-inch choke. Gas-oil ratio was 652-1 and gravity 42.1 degrees. Tubing pressure was from 150 down to 95 pounds. The project made two per cent basic sediment and water in addition to the oil. Testing continued. Location for the possible new field opener is 660 feet from south and west lines of section-11, block 20, University survey and nine miles west of Wink.

### Amerada Schedules 8,500-Footer In E-C Irion Area

Amerada Petroleum Corporation announced location for an 8,500-foot Ellenburger wildcat in East-Central Irion County. The project will be drilled as No. 1 Van Keuren, five miles west and slightly north of the town of Mertson. Drillsite is at the center of the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 24, block 1, H&TC survey. The Atlantic Refining Company and Stanolind Oil & Gas Company are contributing.

### Lone Star To Test Pennsylvania In Fisher Wildcat

Lone Star Producing Company No. 1 J. S. Criswell, Central-West Fisher County wildcat is preparing to perforate the 5 1/2-inch casing at 6,737-50 feet and test a section there which had indicated fluid of some sort on an electric log. That zone is in the Pennsylvania. It will be washed with 500 gallons of mud acid before the testing starts. Ellenburger Barren This wildcat had drilled to a bottom of 7,305 feet in barren Ellenburger. It then plugged back to 6,858 feet and cemented the casing at that point for the test which now is upcoming. Location is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 100, block 2, H&TC survey. It is 11 miles west of Rotan and three and one-half miles northeast of Camp Springs.

### Four Prospectors Quit As Failures In Areas Of WT

Four prospectors in West Texas have been reported plugged and abandoned as failures. South Plains Oil Company No. 1 Sol Mayer, wildcat in Northwest Sutton County was quit on total depth of 776 feet in shale. Drillsite was 1,747 feet from most northerly south line and 1,602 feet from west line of section 2, block 6. (Continued On Page 16)

Illness Timed 'Just Right'

Aneurin Bevan's left-wing laborites in England have been urging Prime Minister Churchill to meet with Premier Malenkov of the Soviet Union whether the United States agrees or not.

But now Churchill has been ordered by his doctors to take a complete rest and he won't be engaging in any international conferences for a while—either in Moscow or Bermuda.

We don't wish anyone poor health. Least of all the redoubtable and beloved old statesman of Britain. But we can't help observing that his illness couldn't be timed better.

At Bermuda he surely would have put the pressure on President Eisenhower to okay a four-power meeting with Russia. The French would have backed this play.

And if Eisenhower had gently but firmly pointed out that we had nothing to lose in any such conference with the Russians except our shirts, the temptation for Churchill to "go it alone" in one last effort to get peace in his time would have been almost overwhelming.

Bevan's arguments might not persuade the aged prime minister, but the vision of a place in history as the world leader in peace, as he was in war, might be the will of the wisp to lure Churchill into negotiations with the Kremlin.

Caught Bare-Handed

What we like about Sgt. David B. Bleak is his simple directness. Bleak, a 250-pound medic from Shelley, Idaho, has gotten the Congressional Medal of Honor for a private foray he pulled off in Korea.

While his main job was to care for our wounded, he took time off to dive in a trench and knife one enemy soldier to death and kill two others with his bare hands. Wounded in the leg, he started carrying our casualties down a hill when he was set upon by a couple of bayonet-wielding Reds. He banged their heads together and went on about his business.

No radar, time fuses, or other fancy doodads. Just his bare hands. It somehow pulls the fancy gadgetry of modern war back into a focus we can comprehend.

Oh, well, if there were no screen doors, the little kids would find something else to slam.

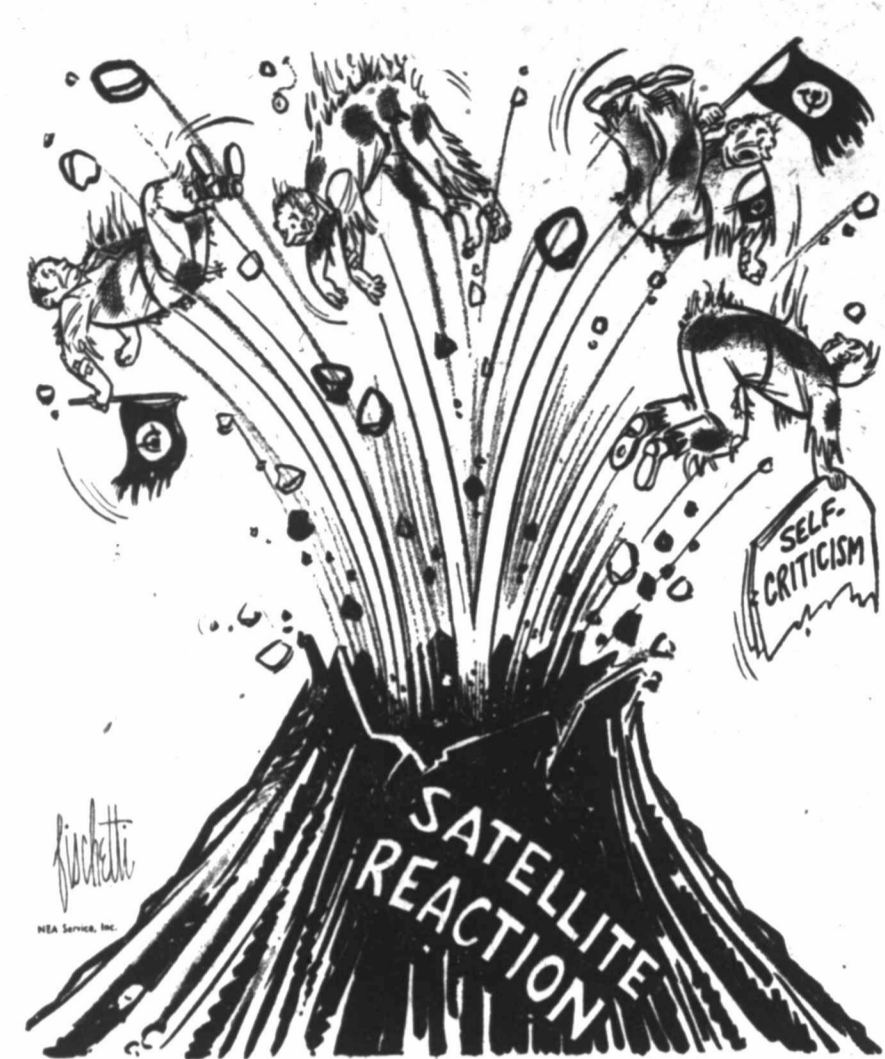

STATE DEPARTMENT CLEAN-UP

Congress Wants Clean-Up; Committees Give Little Help

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Almost all the sound and fury about "cleaning out the State Department" has come from Congress.

Surprisingly enough, the record of the House appears to be better than the record of the Senate on State Department investigations so far this year.

A House judiciary subcommittee under Rep. Kenneth B. Keating (R-NY) did a first-class job in helping the State Department get straightened out on the matter of security clearance for American citizens appointed to United Nations positions.

President Eisenhower announced a new International Organizations Loyalty Review Board on June 2. It applies the same loyalty standards to Americans working for the UN as his earlier order put in force for U. S. government employees.

A House government operations subcommittee under Rep. Charles B. Brownson (R-Ind.) also has puffed up a good record in handling State Department matters.

Its first project was investigation of the State Department's overseas building program. The committee disclosed numerous examples of extravagance. The program was cut down.

The Brownson committee took up the case of John C. Montgomery, a State Department employee in charge of Finnish affairs. Last January 24, he committed suicide by hanging.

In the State Department, he had been put in charge of the Finnish desk without the personnel office being informed. His record had him listed as being on some other, less sensitive work.

That disclosure led to a committee examination of State Department security and personnel practice. Out of it has come a move to revise completely State Department's "Form 57" personnel record.

The new form will reveal at a glance all essential information about an employe. It will give instant warning on unsuitability for any type of work, and so prevent misassignment.

Other Good Work
Senator Bourke B. Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) headed a foreign relations subcommittee which did an equally constructive job in its investigation of International Information Administration and Voice of America programs.

This committee began work almost a year ago under Senator J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.). It now has published a comprehensive report, including nine staff studies on U. S. overseas information programs.

It recognized that the information programs had done more good than harm. It came to the conclusion that the international exchange of scholars and experts was a good thing to promote world understanding.

Finally, the Hickenlooper committee decided unanimously that no changes were needed in basic legislation creating the overseas information work. This was important to the State Department in giving it a green light to proceed on present policies.

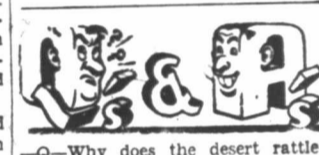
In these respects the Hickenlooper committee has presented an entirely rational, restrained and constructive set of recommendations for State Department guidance.

Some Poorer Work
The record of other Senate committees investigating State Department work hardly meets this standard.

A Senate appropriations subcommittee hearing on State Department funds was used by Senator Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.) for an argument with the new U. S. high commissioner to Germany, Dr. James B. Conant, over American personnel on his staff.

The internal security subcommittee under William E. Jenner (R-Ind.) hasn't concerned itself primarily with State Department affairs of today. The Jenner Committee seems to have been interested principally in digging up old cases for another rehash.

The burden of Senate investigation of the State Department today has been left to its Government Operations Committee headed by Senator McCarthy. The record of that committee will be dealt with in the last in this series.

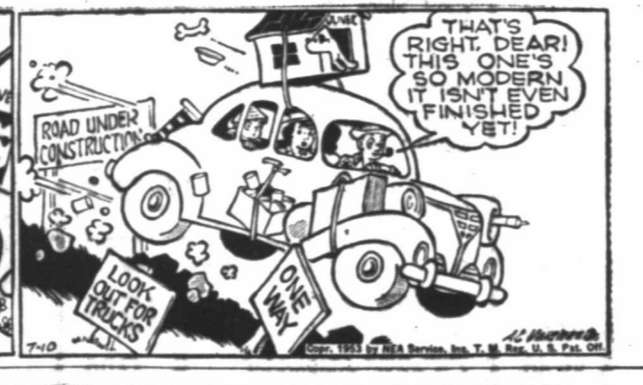

# Moscow Correspondent Tells Meaning Of Beria's Removal

Note: Eddy Gilmore was an AP correspondent in Moscow from 1941 until 19 days ago, when he and his family left for the United States. Now in Stockholm, he examines various aspects of the purge at Lavrenty P. Beria from the standpoint of one who for 12 years observed the Russian government from the Kremlin's front yard.

By EDDY GILMORE  
STOCKHOLM, SWEDEN (AP)—  
Lavrenty P. Beria's expulsion from the Communist party and Soviet government means that Premier Georgi Malenkov—and perhaps others—now feel strong enough or desperate enough to doom the supreme policeman to utter disgrace. In this mighty struggle for Stalin's power, which does not necessarily appear to have ended, the

sensational action against Beria was a natural development.

Like so many other mysterious things about that mysterious country, Russia, when did it all take place?

Has Beria just now been kicked out of the party and government or did all this happen some time ago?

Among Those Missing  
Just before I left Moscow, high members of the party and government on June 27 watched the premiere of a new opera at the Bolshoi Theater.

Oddly, very oddly, Beria's name was not listed among those present. "Do you suppose that it's already happened?" one Western diplomat asked me, referring to what we all expected in the power struggle—the inevitable arrest of someone on top.

The cold-eyed Beria has been damned by the most terrifying

phrase of all in the Soviet lexicon—an enemy of the party and people.

Beria Has Had It  
On top of this he has been branded an international imperialist agent, a sickeningly familiar expression.

From almost every angle, Beria has had it.

It seems certain that the Supreme Court, which now has his case in its hands, will give him the works.

One of the momentous points involved in the disgrace of Beria is the question of what connection it has with recent moves of the Soviet government to slightly normalize some relations with the West and make the gestures of a new look.

Does Fight Go On?  
Another mighty question of the moment: has the struggle for power been halted with Beria's disgrace?

This action against him indicates on first examination that the police have been dealt with by Malenkov—or others. If the police have been dealt with, what about the army?

Is someone else, in the hours before dawn, (dramatic things always happen in Russia shortly before sunrise) going to be accused of being an enemy of the party and people and an international imperialist agent?

Anything can happen in Russia. Anything.

Night Follows Day  
Has Stalin's old fellow countryman—both were Georgians—been damned because of this?

It is quite possible, no matter what official explanation is now rolling off the propaganda machine of the Central Committee of the Communist party.

Twelve years of watching events in Russia certainly have convinced me of one thing: When something happens as has happened in Germany, somebody has to be singled out. If it is anybody the boys can get their hands on, punishment follows denunciation as night does day.

Gun In Beria's Face  
A great wrestling bout for power was going on before the German demonstrations, of course, but those events coming on top of the liberation of the framed doctors and a denunciation of the police and their methods could have given Malenkov the gun he was seeking to fire in Beria's face.

Beria is being denounced in Moscow Friday for, among other things, trying to put his police before the party and government.

I one can believe this, it could mean Beria had been trying to arrest some of his colleagues in the party and government. Possibly Malenkov himself.

Who Is Next?  
Noteworthy, also, is the continuing emphasis from Moscow today on criticism of the "leader cults," of which Stalin worship was the supreme and utter example. There also has been more emphasis on collective leadership.

Are the Communist leaders in power really trying to work out a government by committee or is this the same old Communist trick of calling the sun the moon and day night, and saying it over and over again?

Malenkov and/or others have now dealt with Beria.

Is anyone else next?

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## ILA Director Stands Ground In Face Of McCarthy Attack

WASHINGTON (AP)—The State Department stood its ground Friday in the face of Senator McCarthy's attack on its new declaration that many books by Communist authors are to be returned to the shelves of U. S. overseas libraries.

Dr. Robert L. Johnson, retiring chief of the International Information Agency (IIA) which operates the 189 libraries in 63 foreign countries, quickly served notice he does not plan to budge.

In a statement Thursday night, Johnson said the libraries "are in business to advance American democracy, not Communist conspiracy." Agreeing with McCarthy that Communist authors do not speak affirmatively for democracy he said: "But it would be unwise to foreclose the opportunity of using, to serve affirmatively the ends of democracy, something that a Communist has written for an entirely different purpose."

## Scientist Declares Possibility Of Panic Top Atomic Danger

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. (AP)—According to one of the nation's top atomic scientists, Russia may now have 200 to 500 atomic bombs. "But," added Dr. Alvin C. Graves, "Russia still trails the U. S. both in quantity and quality of atomic weapons. That, I believe is the only reason we are not now involved in a major war."

Johnson cited protests against "book burning" which arose after prior orders to purge the libraries books by Communists, pro-Communists and other controversial writers. He said: "In some cases the most effective way to refute propaganda of the Communists may be to turn the words of their own writers against them."

McCarthy challenged Johnson to tell the Senate Internal Security subcommittee which he heads the names of "those Communists whose writings you feel 'serve the ends of democracy.'" The senator asked Johnson to bring with him "the individual or individuals responsible for the decision to continue the purchase of books by Communist authors."

**Voters Of Stanton To Decide Highway Right-Of-Way Swap**  
 STANTON—A "highway trading," and with it a four-lane highway, will learn its fate July 15 when Stanton voters go to the polls to decide whether they'll trade 25 feet of their South Front Street right-of-way for 10 feet of the Texas and Pacific Railroad right-of-way on North Front Street.


The 10 feet sought is needed to provide the required 80-foot right-of-way set by the state for a four-lane thoroughfare.  
 The four-lane strip through Stanton would be part of the new highway which stretches to the city limits, and between the Midland and Howard County lines.  
 The proposal, if okayed, would allow the city to trade the northern 25 feet of South Front Street, virtually abandoned street, to the T&P Railroad for 10 feet of right-of-way along the northern side of the railroad's present property line.  
 An unfavorable vote would force the city to decide whether to buy right-of-way for a highway around Stanton, or to move building fronts now on the northern end of the present Highway 80 and pay damages to property owners.

 The blasting incident was the third attack on a bus since the strike began. A tear gas bomb was hurled into a bus July 1 and injured six persons. A few days earlier someone fired a load of buckshot at another bus. No one was injured.

LOS ANGELES.—A paper-bag robber got \$1,500 Thursday — with apologies.  
 Police said he waited his turn in a teller's window at a downtown branch of the Bank of America. When his turn came he produced a gun and a note demanding "all the money."  
 While teller Virginia Holcomb was placing the money in the bag he commented: "I'm sorry to have to do this." He seized the bag and fled.

# Lawyers Ask Supreme Court To Oust South Texas Judge

AUSTIN.—Eleven lawyers who practice in the 79th District asked the state Supreme Court Thursday to remove Judge Woodrow Laughlin from the bench in the politically turbulent South Texas area.  
 Their petition charged the judge had been "guilty of partiality or in the alternative, official misconduct and is unfit to hold the office of district judge."  
 Laughlin said in Alice the move was a "political fight."  
 Laughlin was the center of a political battle during the recent Legislature. No final action was taken on demands for an inquiry. The 79th District long has been a battleground between George Parr of Duval County and anti-Parr forces. Laughlin is a friend of Parr.  
 The attorneys said Laughlin "adversely affected the investigation of the Jacob S. Floyd, Jr., murder"

by wilfully requiring disclosure of the names of witnesses to be summoned in Duval County.  
 The charge concerned the Jim Wells County grand jury investigation of the Floyd slaying. The young son of another South Texas political leader was slain from ambush in the driveway of his home September 8. The elder Floyd testified his son was killed with bullets intended for him.  
 Laughlin said he will answer the charges later.  
 Attorneys signing the petition were J. W. Wilson, Harold Vittitoe, Markel Heath, Sam Burris, John Mullen, Robert Mullen, Jr., Jacob Floyd, Garmel Davis, Kenneth Oden, C. W. Perkins and Lawrence Warburton, Jr.  
 The petition was filed by State Senator William Shireman of Corpus Christi as their attorney.  
**Acts Are Cited**  
 There was no indication of when the court might act. Copies of the petition were given the nine judges. The court will be in session through July 22 at least.  
 Article 15, Section 6, of the state Constitution provides for removal of a district judge by the Supreme Court if such judge is found guilty

of partiality, oppression or other official misconduct.  
 The petition accused Laughlin of discharging the October, 1952 Jim Wells County grand jury without authority, releasing impounded election ballot boxes to the Duval County sheriff, selecting his own judge to try himself in an illegal book sale incident (Laughlin later took back the books he sold the county and charges were dropped), and acting illegally in selection of grand jury panels.

## Denver Damaged By Pouring Rain

DENVER.—A sudden, driving downpour at Thursday night's rush hour transformed city streets into raging streams, snarled Denver traffic and flooded basements in widely-scattered sectors.  
 Lowry Air Base measured the rainfall in less than one hour at three inches. The downtown Weather Bureau recorded an inch.  
 Fire Chief Alie Feldman, whose men were swamped with calls for aid, said damage would exceed one million dollars.

## Florida Lion Drags Reptile Menagerie To Chicago Meeting

CHICAGO.—Oscar, a seven and one-half-foot boa constrictor—large enough to crush a man to death—a pet of Mayor Peaslee Streets of Lake Park, Fla., is missing from his cage atop the mayor's automobile.  
 Streets discovered Oscar's disappearance Thursday when he returned to his car in a Loop parking lot.  
 Streets said Oscar is a pet and won't hurt anyone unless the person hurts him. He offered a \$50 reward for the return of Oscar — in good condition.  
 Streets, here to attend the International Association of Lions Clubs also had a little trouble with two other pets he brought along. They are alligators, Eloise and Napoleon, each about four feet long and weighing 50 pounds. He put them in the bathtub of his Loop hotel room.  
 But he received complaints from a hotel official that hotel maids and elevator girls were afraid of the alligators. Streets, his wife and the alligators moved Thursday night to another Loop hotel.

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
