Hunt To Drill To 9,500 Feet At Test In SE Gaines Area

Nelson Bunker Hunt of Dallas No. 1 B. C. Jackson and H. J. Brown is to be a 9,500-foot wildcat in South-east Gaines County.

It will be 690 feet from south and east lines of labor 8, league 313, Gaines County School land survey. Drilling is to start at once.

Shell Stakes Site For SW Stepout To S-C Andrews Pool

Shell Oil Company No. 2-B University is to be drilled as a one-half mile southwest stepout to the discovery well of the Midland Farms, Northeast (Ellenburger) field of South-Central Andrews County.

It will be drilled 2,061 feet from west and 690 feet from south lines of section 16, block 1, University Lands survey.

It is eight miles southeast of the town of Andrews. Operator scheduled the project for a 13,000-foot bottom.

San Andres Opener Is In Prospect At S-C Lamb Wildcat

Interesting shows for a possible San Andres discovery in the town of Littlefield, South-Central Lamb County, have been uncovered at The Texas Company No. 1-98 Union Compress & Warehouse Company, scheduled 14,500-foot Ellenburger or granite wildcat.

Drillstem test was taken in the interval from 3,940 to 4,020 feet. Tool was open three hours. Recovery was 180 feet of drilling mud, 90 feet of mud, slightly cut with oil, 90 feet of mud, cut 50 per cent oil, 90 feet of mud-cut oil and gas and 30 feet of oil and gas-cut mud. An additional 90 feet of drilling mud was recovered.

Operator drilled to 4,087 feet where another drillstem test is underway.

The San Andres was topped at 2,970 feet, elevation 3,565 feet, estimated.

Location for the wildcat is 440 feet from west and 330 feet from southwest lines of labor 10, league 664, State Capitol Lands survey.

Sun Moving In For Deep Wildcat In NE Reagan Area

Sun Oil Company is building roads and moving in rotary material for its No. 1 Sugg, slated 9,600-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Northeast Reagan County.

It will be 660 feet from south and west lines of the T. D. Dickson survey No. 40.

More Oil Is Found On Two Pool Tests In Andrews Sector

More oil and gas have been developed at two stepouts at the recently opened Wemas field of East-Central Andrews County.

Continental Oil Company No. 2 McCollum & Weibusch, 1,981 feet from south and 1,992 feet from west lines of section 24, block A-44, pool survey and one location southwest of the discovery, was drilled and tested from 8,870 to 8,895 feet. Tool was open 30 minutes. Recovery was 38 feet of drilling mud with no shows of oil, gas or water.

Another drillstem test was taken from 8,905 to 8,925 feet. Tool was open three hours. Gas surfaced in five minutes and fluid in 15 minutes. It was flowed to pits to clean for one hour and 45 minutes. It then flowed to tanks for one hour and made 40 barrels of oil and no water. Gas volume was 1,043,000 cubic feet per day.

Good Pressures

Flowing pressure was from 775 to 1,400 pounds and shutin pressure after 15 minutes was 2,575 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 1,086-1.

Operator cored from 8,925 to 8,974 feet. Recovery was 49 feet of lime, 14 of which was bleeding oil and gas. Drillstem test was underway.

Continental No. 3 McCollum & Weibusch, southeast offset to the discovery, was drilled and tested from 8,910 to 8,906 feet. Tool was open two hours. Gas surfaced in 11 minutes. Recovery was 390 feet of (Continued On Page 12)

Guns Bristle, Tension Soars In Canal Zone

ISMAILIA, EGYPT —(AP)— Machine gun-armed British Tommies cordoned off the strategic Suez Canal zone of Ismailia Monday and announced they would search all persons entering or leaving the town until a British airman missing since last Thursday turns up.

Armed Egyptian troops at once took up posts around all government buildings in the town, near Britain's main Suez Canal Zone base, but the headquarters of Egypt's Army said they were only "routine patrols" and would "avoid any friction with the British Army."

There were no immediate reports of any violence, though crowds of angry Egyptians gathered at the British roadblocks.

The British charged the missing soldier had been abducted and that they believed at least one Egyptian official had been involved. The Egyptians denied the charge.

President Mohamed Naguib summoned his Cabinet into emergency session in Cairo. Reports were current that a state of emergency had been proclaimed in the capital and in Ismailia, but the Army headquarters in Cairo denied this.

U. S. Envoy Consulted

Naguib emerged from the cabinet meeting for 15 minutes to confer with U. S. Ambassador Jefferson Caffery. The ambassador said he had talked earlier with Robert Hankey, Britain's acting ambassador. In response to a question as to whether he would use his good offices to try to calm things, Caffery said yes, he was ready to try.

In London, a Foreign Office spokesman told reporters the British commander at Ismailia has the full backing of the government. The British cabinet also met in emergency session and details were sent to Washington, where Lord Salisbury, acting foreign minister, is attending a Big Three conference.

An Army spokesman said the Egyptian troops in Ismailia were "armed only for defense" and that the town was "fully under the control of the British forces."

"Rivers Of Blood"

To the British claim that their missing airman had been kidnapped the Egyptians countered Monday with an announcement that British soldiers at a checking post near Ismailia kidnapped an Egyptian secret policeman Monday morning. No other details were given.

An Egyptian government communique said the British had announced all persons going in and out of Ismailia would be searched for arms and those carrying them without a permit would be detained.

Broadcasting from Cairo, Egypt's minister of the national guidance, Maj. Salah Salem, warned his nation would fight to kick the British out of the Suez and "rivers of blood will flow."

Durant Judge Hears Clooney-Ferrer Vows

DURANT, OKLA.—(AP)—Jose Ferrer, the actor, and singer Rosemary Clooney were married here Monday in the chambers of a county judge.

They gave their names as Rosemary Clooney, 25, Maysville, Ky., and Jose Vicente, 41, Ossining, N. Y.

The ceremony was performed by County Judge Ceph Shoemaker. Ferrer's first wife divorced him last week in Juarez, Mexico.

Flare Spurs Hope For 58 Lost On Transocean Plane

HONOLULU —(AP)— The Navy said Monday there still was hope that there may be survivors of a four-engine Transocean airliner which plunged into the mid-Pacific Saturday night with 58 persons aboard.

Intensive sea and air search operations fanned around a point some 350 miles east of Wake Island where the transport Barrett sighted a second flare just before midnight Sunday. It was in this vicinity that the big DC-6B last was reported.

"It's a long wait," said Capt. N. J. Frank, Jr., assistant chief of staff for operations at the Navy's Hawaiian sea frontier.

"We have hopes there are still survivors out there," he said. "Due to the remoteness of the area it is taking time to get ships and planes out. From now on it's purely a mechanical proposition of combing the area."

REDS BLAME TEXAS SHIRTS

LONDON —(AP)—Moscow Radio kept the propaganda drums rolling Monday against the American proposal to send food to East Germany, claiming the offer was made in the hope of stirring up more trouble in the Communist world.

The broadcast also gave this version of the workers' uprising in East Berlin on June 17: It was all the work of foreign hirlings "in Texas shirts who came from the Western sector."

Many Dallas and Tarrant County localities received gully-washers, but Weather Bureau stations in those counties reported "only a trace" at the official gauges.

Clouds and showers almost blanketed the state Monday except for the Panhandle.

The showers were valuable to the parched crops and rangelands. They were spawned by a slow-moving cool front which covered most of North and West Texas Monday.

Dallas, north of the front, had a Sunday high of 80 degrees—coolest maximum there in almost two months. But to the south the heat continued. Presidio had 110, the state's high for Sunday.

Several entire families were on the liner.

Weak Distress Signals

Just before dark, the Barrett spotted the inflated life raft, which carried carbon dioxide bottles stamped with the initials "TAL," meaning Transocean Air Lines.

Earlier, weak distress signals were picked up for two hours in the lonely Wake-Honolulu lanes where the plane disappeared.

Although the signals were too faint for an accurate bearing, the Navy widened its search to sweep a greater expanse.

The Barrett found other debris amid 30 to 40 gasoline oil slicks where the plane apparently plunged into the bleak waters.

It was only 30 miles from the point where the plane last reported its position.

A Japanese fishing boat in those waters, however, said it had not seen any crash.

Millions Made Available For Special Loans

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Both the Senate and House Monday passed and sent to President Eisenhower legislation setting up a multi-million dollar relief program for drouth-stricken areas.

The legislation authorizes loans to farmers in regions declared to be "disaster areas," and permits special livestock loans at five per cent interest above the \$2,500 limit the Farmers Home Administration now is authorized to make.

It also provides for special emergency assistance in furnishing feed and seed to the affected farmers and livestock growers, financed through a revolving fund of the Agriculture Department.

The big question still facing the Administration is price supports for cattle.

In Amarillo Friday to meet with drouth state governors, President Eisenhower told almost 3,000 Southwesterners the government will not "dilly dally around" while cattle starve.

He did not mention price supports publicly. The governors said price supports were discussed privately with the President. They issued a statement recommending a "thorough study" of the problem.

Many small and middle-sized operators in the cattle business are clamoring for price supports.

Blow On Head Fells Midland Man; Police Investigate Attack

A 45-year-old Midland painter was in a critical condition in the Midland Memorial Hospital Monday after being struck on the head Sunday night.

The man, Jake Cornelius, 609 South Colorado Street, was rushed to the hospital with a fractured skull shortly before 9 p.m. after he and another man became involved in an argument in the 900 block of Waverly Drive.

Police said a 32-year-old laborer is being held in connection with the attack but no charges have been filed.

Detective Sgt. Willie Hill said Cornelius was struck on the head with an automobile jack during the argument.

Big Three Told Korean Armistice Now Is Possible

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Secretary of State Dulles told the foreign ministers of Britain and France Monday that an armistice in the Korean war "is now possible if the communists want one."

The State Department press officer quoted Dulles as making the statement at the Big Three foreign ministers meeting while reviewing United States efforts to win the cooperation of South Korean President Syngman Rhee.

French Foreign Minister Bidault and Britain's Lord Salisbury reportedly expressed confidence in United States handling of the truce negotiations.

12 conferences with Rhee, as reported by correspondents at Panmunjon and broadcasts by the official Red radio, heard before Rhee's latest statement.

The Allied and Communist truce negotiators met twice in secret at Panmunjon Monday and scheduled another session for 11 a.m. Tuesday.

Reporters outside could see the UN and Red delegates reading statements, but there was no indication of progress on the armistice agreement.

But Communist correspondents at Panmunjon and the official Red Peiping Communist radio, two usually good indicators of official opinion, indicated the Red delegates are far from satisfied with UN assurances that South Korea will obey a truce.

Robert D. Coe Named Denmark Ambassador

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Robert Douglas Coe, former career diplomat, has been picked to be the new United States ambassador to Denmark. It was reported Monday.

Coe, who retired from the State Department in May, 1952, after 20 years service, would succeed Mrs. Eugenie Anderson of Red Wing, Minn.

Hospital Asks County Pay \$41,000 In Indigents' Bills

A formal request for financial assistance in paying more than \$41,000 in unpaid and uncollectable bills of indigents given care at Midland Memorial Hospital was presented Monday to Midland County Commissioners Court.

A delegation headed by Joseph I. O'Neill, chairman of the hospital's board of trustees, appeared at the regular meeting of the commissioners to explain the situation.

And the commissioners promised to give the problem further study and indicated they would reach a decision Monday afternoon.

Of the more than 11,000 patients treated during the year, only about 800 fell in the indigent class and their bills totaled \$41,000.

Midland County patients, he added, had bills totaling \$28,969 while the remaining \$12,671 was for patients from outside the county.

Last year the county contributed \$7,500 in addition to indigent bills paid through the year.

Rhee's Written Pledge Not To Obstruct Truce Leaves Reds Still Not Satisfied

SEOUL —(AP)— A well-informed source said Monday President Syngman Rhee has pledged in writing that South Korea will not obstruct an armistice and Rhee himself indicated his country has relaxed its demand for unification by force.

Meanwhile the Communists charged at the Panmunjon truce meeting Monday that Allied planes strafed and bombed a prisoner camp north of P'yongyang last Friday, killing five UN prisoners and wounding 15. There was no immediate UN reply to the charge.

No other results of the meeting were announced.

Rhee said in a statement that South Korea may change its methods but not its objective of unifying the country.

A well-informed source told Associated Press Tokyo Bureau Chief Robert Enson that President Eisenhower's special envoy was sweeping concessions from Rhee, including the written pledge that South Korea would not obstruct an armistice. The source said Rhee did not wish to embarrass Rhee by disclosing them.

Rhee reportedly agreed not to free any more prisoners. He offered freeing 27,000 POW's held by the Allies last month stalemated the almost-completed truce negotiations.

The envoy, Assistant U. S. Secretary of State Walter S. Robertson, refused to agree to Rhee's demand that the United States walk out of a post-armistice political conference if it failed to make headway in 90 days on unifying Korea, the source said.

Instead, Enson said, Rhee reportedly was assured that the United States would hold another top-level conference with South Korea after a truce signing—to work out a joint policy and that the United States would defend South Korea if it were attacked.

These assurances, Enson learned, were in addition to previous U. S. promises of economic and military aid and efforts to unify Korea peacefully.

Optimism for an early truce was strengthened also by an order of the U. S. Information Service dispatching its photographers to the truce conference site at Panmunjon "by Wednesday."

The picture was clouded, however, by a hostile Communist reaction to the result of Robertson's

The school board is to meet to consider criticism of Eby.

The 46-year-old educator has been described as a "social reformer" by attorney John P. Rogge, representing a group he has not identified.

The House Forum of Public Education has asked that Eby be treated fairly and not dismissed because he might be "controversial." Eby's contract expires August 15.

Operating Engineers Postpone Walkout

HOUSTON —A strike which would have tied up \$100,000,000 in major construction projects Monday has been postponed a week.

AFL operating engineers announced they instead would resume talks with the Gulf Coast Construction Employers Council. They are asking a 50-cent-an-hour wage hike.

New GG Campaign Planned In Stricken North Carolina Area

HICKORY, N. C. —A polio epidemic continued to hold a vice-like grasp on two western North Carolina counties as the number of victims climbed to 152.

Four have died from the disease in the worst local epidemic since 1944.

Two new cases reported in Catawba County Sunday brought the total there to 44 within the last month. Neighboring Caldwell County, which last week inoculated almost 13,000 children in a mass inoculation program, reported three new cases Sunday. The total in the county is 108.

One death was reported by the Caldwell County health officer, Dr. William Happer, Sunday. Three have died in Caldwell this year and one in Catawba.

A mass inoculation program, duplicating the one in Caldwell, is being planned for Catawba. It will start either Wednesday or Thursday, depending upon the arrival of 25 gallons of gamma globulin which has been allocated to the county. Children 10 and under will receive the shots.

'Raidin'' May Halt Labor Merger Drive

WASHINGTON —CIO President Walter Reuther says a campaign by the AFL Teamsters Union to take over CIO brewery workers may kill a long-proposed merger between the giant AFL and CIO labor organizations.

In an angry statement made public at CIO headquarters here Sunday, Reuther declared that a "series of raiding excursions" led by AFL Teamsters President Dave Beck "have in effect repudiated" recent CIO-AFL efforts to agree to a ban against "raids" on each other's membership.

Such an agreement, which had been reached tentatively, between top CIO and AFL leaders, has been regarded as a necessary stepping stone toward a merger between the two groups.

Johnson Says Lack Of Supports Drives Cattlemen To Wall

DALLAS —(AP) — Senator Lyndon Johnson says the lack of price supports for cattle leaves the drover at the mercy of the market.

The Senate minority leader's address broadcast over several Texas stations Sunday was transcribed before he accompanied President Eisenhower to the Amarillo drought meeting Friday.

Johnson condemned "a price structure then keeps feed prices high at the same time that cattle prices are falling to all-time low points."

Said Johnson: "We support wheat, corn, cotton, tobacco and other crops at 90 percent parity. The secretary of Agriculture has price-support authority for cattle within his jurisdiction. But he says he will not exercise it. He says the present program is enough—that it will go no further."

"So beef is sold on the so-called free market—a market that leaves cattle producers free to choose between starving and going out of business."

Pediatrics Academy Elevates Dr. Nichols

EVANSTON, ILL. —The American Academy of Pediatrics has announced the election of a record number of 284 new fellows, including Dr. Myron M. Nichols of the Mast Clinic, Midland, Texas.

After completing the usual internship, a doctor must have at least five years of specializing in the care of infants and children before he is eligible for fellowship in the Academy. Then he must pass examinations given by the American Board of Pediatrics. After passing these examinations, a pediatrician may be elected a Fellow of the academy upon application and approval by the executive board.

The MATURE PARENT

Big Fuss Over Child's Hurts Can Turn Him Into A Whiner

BY MURELL LAWRENCE
Carl is a whiner and a tattler. In school, he always is complaining that someone has shoved him or taken his red clay. He's getting himself disliked, his teacher says. His mother has been asked to help him with his problem. "Has something in me encouraged this behavior?" she writes. "If so, what might it be?"

We always influence children's behavior. "The character of a child is molded by the character of its parents in response to whom it develops," says psychoanalyst Erich Fromm.

The thing in us which encourages whining and tattling may be over-concern with Carl's emotional and physical hurts.

If we make a great sympathetic do-to every time he falls down or is outraged by a playmate, he's bound to exaggerate all hurts that come his way. Indeed, if we don't moderate our attitude, he may begin to actually provoke others into hurting him in order to gain the attention and tenderness he associates with hurt.

... We can help Carl best by distributing our tender treatment of him more equably, so that he stops associating kisses and cuddles with discouragement and depression and learns to expect them from us when he's feeling just so-so.

To help Carl, we may have to be uncomfortably honest, with ourselves. Few of us are wholly certain of our value to others. Because we are unsure, it is very easy to make big, unwholesome fusses over the little boy who's cut his knee or been slapped by a playmate.

Without knowing it, we'll enjoy our opportunity to play the role of Big Strong Comforter to Carl's weakness.

... But the fact that we can exploit and encourage weakness in the child we love to inflate our own sense of importance should not alarm us. We need to know it in order to grow.

Carl's problem will bless everyone if it forces us to purify our love for him. If we think it through we'll see at once that love's comfort never leaves us feeling weak or dependent on the one who comforts, but renews our own sense of strength and power.

This is one of the most important discoveries we can make as parents. So let's not be depressed by what Carl's teacher says, but use it to release our little boy from his sense of weakness.

New Developments In Eye Surgery Relieve Cataracts

The easiest way to describe cataracts is to liken them to what happens with a camera. When the lens of a camera is badly smudged, the picture which it takes will be cloudy. A cataract is similar. Clouding develops in that part of the eye which serves as a lens. Objects viewed through a clouded lens are no longer clear and sharp.

Cataracts usually develop in the later years of life. A cataract is one of the difficulties with vision which tend to occur with advancing age. Occasionally one can be present at birth and sometimes it is connected with certain diseases.

The amount of disturbance in sight depends on whether all or only a part of the lens is affected, and also on the degree of the clouding. For this reason persons with cataracts do not all have the same amount of difficulty. Also, cataracts vary in the speed with which the clouding of the lens progresses.

It is common to speak of a beginning cataract as "incipient" and when it is full grown and not getting worse, as mature, or "ripe."

The general opinion is that there are no medical treatment, that is, drugs, which can be used to dissolve the material which clouds the lens and to restore normal vision. This may come some day and promising work in this direction has been reported.

At present, the preferred treatment for cataract is an operation. Results usually are good. Formerly, it was necessary to wait until a cataract was mature, or ripe, before it could be removed. Now surgical methods are available which make it possible to remove a lens with a cataract on it at any stage. This is a tremendous advance as it may prevent years of poor vision.

Causes Not Known
The causes of cataract are not known but certainly age plays a part and in some cases, diabetes, occupation, injury, or perhaps heredity.

There is no reason to believe that eye strain leads to the development of cataract, though of course it can lead to other disturbances of the eye. The most encouraging developments regarding cataracts are those in surgery, which often makes possible their removal before being ripe.

Food On Way To Hungry East Germans Despite Soviet Snub

BERLIN—(AP)— Food for hungry East Germany already is on the way by sea and the United States "has not abandoned hopes" of delivering it, despite Moscow's scornful rejection of the 15 million dollar offer, U. S. authorities said here Monday.

These sources said alternate possible ways of aiding the 18 million hungry people under Commanding rule in Germany's Soviet zone are being studied in Washington, Bonn and Berlin.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov scornfully rejected President Eisenhower's offer of the food Saturday night with a note terming it a propaganda stunt. He claimed the Russians were supplying their occupation zone adequately.

West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer termed Moscow's action "highly regrettable" and described Eisenhower's offer as a "generous and humanitarian gesture." A U. S. High Commission spokesman said, "Nobody can deny that East Germany is hungry."

Through Trade Channels
Some officials suggested perhaps the Americans could give the food to the West Germans, who could funnel it to the East through international trade channels.

West Berlin Mayor Ernst Reuter told 15,000 persons at an outdoor rally of his Socialist Party Sunday night that his government is determined to help their Eastern neighbors in some way. He suggested the East Berliners should be allowed to buy foods in West Berlin they are unable to obtain in their own sector.

He spoke of "already drafted plans" which he said he expected the federal West German government to approve, the West Berlin newspaper Montag Morgen reported. Reuter predicted, however, that

Moscow would be forced eventually to accept the American offer of help.

Stocks Available Now
"The offer will be repeated so often as they can no longer say no," he said.

American authorities said if some method of sending the food to the East is found, they need not wait for arrival of food shipments by sea.

"Stocks are available right here in Berlin," they said. It could be sent across the Soviet zone border in a matter of hours.

The initial supplies, they explained, could be taken from reserves accumulated in West Berlin as insurance against any new Soviet blockade of the West sector like that which threatened to starve the city in 1948 and 1949.

Allied investigators said the East German hunger situation had not yet reached famine proportions but that almost all the East zone's residents were suffering from it.

Ross, trucker from Osgood, Ind., was wounded in the left shoulder, abdomen and groin.

John Buckman, 22, was shot once in the back.

Kalker, who fired a pistol into his mouth when police closed in, was not expected to live.

Special Edition Fetes King Ranch's 100th Anniversary

CORPUS CHRISTI —(AP)—A 212-page edition commemorating the 100th anniversary of the King Ranch was published Sunday by the Corpus Christi Caller-Times.

The ranch was started in 1833 when Capt. Richard King bought his first pasture on Santa Gertrudis Creek near the present town of Kingsville. Since then the King Ranch has grown into a 940,000-acre domain spread over parts of seven counties.

The edition was handled by the

regular Caller-Times staff. Assignments were made the first week of last January.

"Months have been spent in gathering and preparing the material," the paper said in an editorial. "Never before in any publication has the subject been treated with more thoroughness and in such volume, with emphasis on accuracy and detail."

Staff photographers took 505 pictures. Wordage dealing with the ranch filled 200 columns and pictures another 200.

In recent years the ranch has adopted a unique agrarian system of branches. In addition to holdings in Texas, the ranch has a farm in Kentucky, pastures in Pennsylvania and has begun ambitious experiments in beef cattle raising in Cuba and Australia.

Santa Gertrudis cattle—the first all-American breed and the first beef breed developed anywhere in 200 years—was perfected on the King Ranch. Santa Gertrudis were developed after 30 years of intensive breeding. The breed evolved from a Shorthorn-Brahman cross.

Midland Motorists Due DAV Auto Tags

Midland motorists will receive this month from the Disabled American Veterans their 1938 Identio Tags for key rings carrying their individual license numbers.

The DAV tag, which provides key-loss insurance in addition to an opportunity to assist disabled veterans, will be distributed from the organization's national headquarters in Cincinnati where disabled veterans make and assemble the tags in a plant owned and operated by the DAV.

All funds contributed by motorists for the tags are used solely in the service and rehabilitation work of the DAV.

The school gets underway July 19 and continues through July 24.

They are Inspector O. A. Goodman, Drivers O. S. Tekell, Max Monroe and Byron Pace and Fireman Raymond Lewis.

More than 900 firemen from through the state are expected to attend the school, directed by Col. H. R. Brayton.

Scientists Unearth Complete Skeletons Of Ancient Reptiles

GARNETT, KAN.—(AP)—Scientists have unearthed fossils which may prove to be the granddaddy of all reptiles.

Four complete skeletons, two with skulls, were found in a pasture near here. They go by the jaw-breaking scientific name of petroleocoeloceras kansasensis but are commonly known as rock lake lizards.

Dr. Raymond Hall, Kansas University museum curator, said: "We will be able to tell definitely after study whether this is the granddaddy of all reptiles. This may be the oldest of the fossils found."

The fossils were described as important "missing links" between the reptiles and amphibians of 230 to 250 million years ago.

Dr. Frank E. Peabody of Kansas University headed the expedition which dug out the fossils. He said the lizard "represents nature's first attempt at a fast-moving vertebrate."

Leukemia Victim Plunges To Death

NEW YORK—(AP)—Fifteen-year-old Mark Samuels, who was suffering from leukemia, plunged to his death Sunday from an eighth-floor window of James Ewing Hospital. Police said he fell or jumped. He was to have been discharged from the hospital Wednesday after spending six weeks there for treatment of the disease, a type of cancer which affects the blood.

Special Sunday Call Gets Blood Needed For War Casualties

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A special weekend call for blood needed in Korea kept many blood centers of the Red Cross operating Sunday for the first time on a Sunday since the outbreak of the war.

A Red Cross spokesman said the need was met in full, with 25 centers across the nation operating. In the past, such weekend calls have been filled entirely on the West Coast.

The Red Cross declined to say the amount of blood collected or the reason for the special call.

In Tokyo, the commander of the U. S. Army's big blood center said Monday an increase in blood shipments from the United States had been asked "because of increased activity on the battlefield in Korea."

Col. Richard P. Mason called the request routine and said he knew of no acute blood shortage in the Far East.

Tennessee Demos To Pick Nominee For Governorship

RICHMOND, VA.—(AP)—Two stalwarts of Virginia's conservative Democratic organization do battle at the polls Tuesday for the party's nomination for governor.

The candidates are ex-Rep. Thomas B. Stanley, 62, of Henry County, and State Senator Charles R. Penick, 52, of Arlington. Studiously avoiding any criticism of the party organization headed by Senator Byrd (D-Va.), they have waged a campaign long on handshaking but short on issues.

Tuesday's winner will move on to November general election as a solid favorite to defeat Republican nominee Ted Dalton, a state senator from Radford, despite rumbustious of a GOP resurgence. The Democratic gubernatorial nominee generally is regarded as a shoo-in.

Heavy Rains Soak Drouth Area's Edge

Wide sections of the plains states—on the fringe of the drouth area—were cooled Monday after heavy rains and thunderstorms Sunday spread over a broad belt from the Canadian border to the Gulf of Mexico.

Showers and cloudy skies dropped temperatures 10 to 30 degrees in Oklahoma, Northern Texas and Northeastern New Mexico.

The heaviest showers, bringing almost three inches of rain to some sections, extended from Minnesota and Wisconsin southward across Iowa, Eastern Nebraska, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Light rain fell along the Northern Pacific Coast and in the extreme Northeastern states.

Low Prices Turn Oklahoma Rancher Into Beef Peddler

SNYDER, OKLA.—(AP)—With his back to the wall because of the prolonged drouth, a desperate rancher did a desperate thing—and it worked.

What would you do if this happened to you? You're a rancher in Oklahoma's powder-dry Kiowa County. A few months ago you bought a calf for \$33, turned it out to pasture, and watched it gain 150 pounds. Then you brought it to the market, and when the auctioneer's gavel fell, it had sold for only \$21.50. Despite the feed and care, you had lost \$11.50.

It happened to Clay Weaver, 42, and just about turned his tough, tanned flesh white.

"Boy, I knew I had to do something, and quick," he explained. "I didn't have a big herd of cattle or a big bank account. I was one of the small boys who made his living in a small way."

What Weaver didn't mention was that, aside from other responsibilities, he had an ailing wife and three small children to support. His finances were at a low ebb because his wife, sick with a mysterious and troublesome disease, required the attention of specialists.

"My sister and I hit upon the idea of selling our cattle directly to the consumer. We knew that was the only way I'd ever get my money back on the cattle I had on hand."

So Weaver and his sister pooled their resources, rented a small shop in Snyder and began selling both wholesale and retail.

The first day's take was \$271. Now Weaver is buying cattle from ranchers in his area, trying to give them a decent return on their investment, and at the same time sell the beef at a price the folks in the neighborhood can afford to pay.

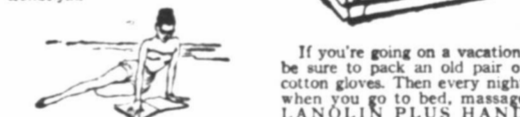

Braves' Skeptics Becoming Believers After Twin Win

Ask almost any National League manager what he thinks of the Milwaukee Braves and he'll shake his head in wonderment and tell you they should have folded long ago.

They'll tell you the Braves still will fold, but with the season more than half over, they don't say so with the same finality they used a month ago.

When the Braves lost three games in a row to the Brooklyn Dodgers late last month, their detractors thought they had cracked good and never would recover. Then early this month, they fell three and one-half games behind the Dodgers, and again the experts figured it was all over but the shouting.

Yet Monday, the Braves are just a game and a half behind the Brooks and creating more noise than any dead Indian should.

The St. Louis Cardinals had a good opportunity Sunday to help bury Charley Grimm's tomahawk slingers and they succeeded only in digging a grave for themselves. The Braves won a double-header from the Cards 10-1 and 4-3 and knocked the Redbirds right into fourth place. The Philadelphia Phillies took over third place by whacking the

helpless Pittsburgh Pirates 6-4 and 6-5. In other games, the Dodgers turned back the New York Giants 4-3, and the Cincinnati Redlegs won two games from the Chicago Cubs 7-4 and 7-3.

In the American League the New York Yankees whipped the Washington Senators, 6-5, but saw their lead sliced to five games when the Chicago White Sox mauled the Cleveland Indians twice, 14-2, and 3-1. Boston and Philadelphia split a double-header, the Red Sox winning the first, 9-5, and the A's the second 4-1. The Detroit Tigers won the first game of their twin bill but the Browns took the second, 3-2, beating Ralph Branca, making his first American League start.

The Brooks themselves snapped an eight-game winning streak of the Giants when they scored a run off relief ace Hoyt Wilhelm in the bottom of the tenth inning. With the bases loaded, Wilhelm passed Bobby Morgan to force in the winning run. Billy Cox had tied it for Chuck Dressen's operatives with a home run in the ninth with one on.

Robin Roberts hurled the Phillies to their first-game triumph for his fourteenth victory of the year, while Bob Miller and Steve Ridzik tossed the nightcap. The defeat was the Pirates' tenth in a row. Harry Perkowski and Fred Baczewski each went all the way for the improving Redlegs in their twin triumphs over the Cubs. Ralph Kiner hit two homers off Perkowski.

The Yanks had to win their game the hard way. They had a 5-3 margin going into the ninth, but Jackie Jensen hit a home run off Haller and Bob Kuzava to shave the net deficit to one run. That called for Allie Reynolds to take over the mound for the Yanks. He gave up a triple to Keith Thomas and a game-tying fly to Gil Coan.

In the home half of the ninth, Gene Woodling singled Mickey Mantle, who had walked and gone to second on another walk to Irv Noren, home with the winning run. Reynolds got credit for the victory.

The fearless White Sox really lambasted the Indians in the opener as a parade of five Tribe pitchers paraded to the mound. They took their lumps to the tune of 19 hits. Mike Fornieles had no trouble on the hill for the Pale Hose.

In the second game, the Indians put up more of a fight, although Bob Lemon, one of their aces, was tapped for 13 hits. The Sox couldn't capitalize, though, and needed a tightly pitched game by Virgil Trucks and Billy Pierce, who came on in the ninth.

Senior Loop Sure Of 'Classic' Victory

CINCINNATI —(AP)—Skeptical American Leaguers, openly critical of Casey Stengel's pitching strategy, hoped the old manager's World Series magic will work in Tuesday's All-Star Game against the powerhouse National League.

Stengel is under fire for his insistence on going with only one southpaw pitcher—Chicago's Billy Pierce—against the National's left-handed fencebusters. Only the memory of Stengel's successful use of lefty Bob Kuzava against the National's tough right-handed hitters in the last two World Series tempered their remarks.

"Speaking as a fan," said General Manager Frank Lane of the White Sox, "I can't see why Stengel picked only one left-hander when anybody can see that the National is stacked with southpaw swingers. How did he overlook Mel Parnell, Boston's fine left-hander?"

"If I were the National League manager, you can bet I'd keep my left-handers in all games. But then again, we front office men aren't supposed to know as much as the managers."

Calvin Griffith, Washington vice president, also expressed amazement over Stengel's failure to select Parnell.

"The last time I looked," Griffith said, "Parnell had the best record in the league. How did Stengel ever pass him up?"

National Leaguers, still smarting from four straight World Series defeats by Stengel, were confident they could gain some measure of revenge by whipping the Yankee skipper for the fourth straight time in the mid-Summer classic. They beat him 4-3, 8-3 and 9-2 in the last three years.

Although the American League has won 12 of the previous 19 clashes, the betting gentry has installed the Nationals a 7-5 favorite. They base their odds on the home run ability of Cincinnati's Ted Kluszewski and Gus Bell, Milwaukee's Eddie Mathews and St. Louis' Stan Musial, and Enochs Slaughter, all of whom bat left-handed. Red Schoendienst of the Cardinals, the National League's leading hitter, hits both ways.

White Sox Now Chief Challengers

CHICAGO —(AP)—The Chicago White Sox now seem to be the New York Yankees' chief challengers in the American League pennant race. Even Pale Hose Boss Paul Richards admits it.

Richards could afford to be expansive after the second-spot Sox twice trounced third-place Cleveland, 14-2, and 3-1, Sunday before Comiskey Park's largest day crowd of the season, 43,419.

The Indians' heralded pitching strength didn't mean a thing against the well-balanced Sox who moved five games behind the first-place Yanks by winning four of five from Cleveland from Friday through Sunday.

"I think we have enough balance and pitching help to make a good run for the money," Richards said. Although overshadowed by the recent collapse of the Yankees, the surge of the White Sox has been terrific. They have won 25 of their 31 games since June 13.

Veck Gets Support For Plan To Move

CINCINNATI —(AP)—Bill Veck's plan to move his St. Louis Browns' franchise appears to have gained new support.

The American League discussed Veck's problem at length in its meeting Sunday, and there were indications that a new attempt to move would receive more favorable consideration. They turned down Veck's attempt to shift the Browns to Baltimore last March by a 5-2 vote.

A league spokesman declined to elaborate except to say that the St. Louis situation had been discussed.

However, Frank Lane, general manager of the Chicago White Sox, said that the outlook for the Brownie shift appeared to be more favorable than ever.

"All I can say is this," he said. "The owners looked upon Bill's plight in St. Louis with a great deal of sympathy. I have no way of knowing whether they would give approval, but I think he could get more votes than he did last March."

Lane was one of the two club officials to cast his vote in favor of the transfer at the Tampa meeting. Cleveland cast the other favorable ballot.

Asked whether any specific reference was made to Baltimore as the site for a possible shift of the Browns, Lane said:

"No city was officially mentioned. Any city with a population of more than 500,000 thinks it is capable of becoming a major league town."

Veck declined to discuss his future plans although it appeared almost certain he would make another attempt to move next winter.

"All I'm going to say right now is that we're going to finish the season in St. Louis," he said. "As for next year, we'll just have to wait and see."

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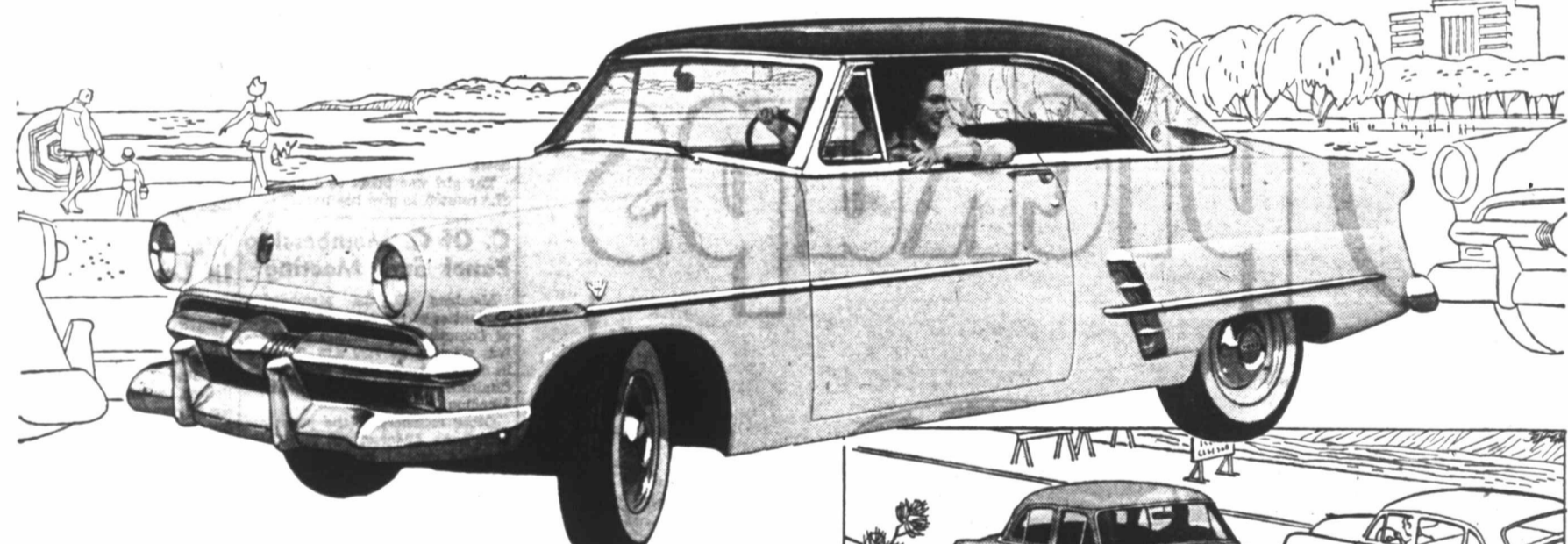

Sparkman Plans Amendment To Excess Profits Extender

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Senator Sparkman (D-Ala) said Monday he will give the Senate a chance to vote on raising exemptions to \$100,000 when it considers a House-approved bill to extend the excess profits tax till January 1.

"I'm also thinking about a proposal to change the base years on which the tax is figured, so that new businesses will have more leeway in selecting their base," he said in an interview.

Sparkman said his proposal to increase the exemption from the present level of \$25,000 to \$100,000 before the excess profits levy comes into operation would cost only about 60 million dollars in revenue.

He said he thinks it would be a boon to small businesses which are struggling to build up reserves.

President Eisenhower, who asked for extension of the tax for six months, estimated it would bring in about 800 million dollars.

The strong note from the foreign office threatened to tighten the already-strained relations between Japan and South Korea.

The note denounced what it called "ROK nationals' intrusion of Japanese territory and fishing in Japanese waters" and demanded payment for damage to the 450-ton Japanese coast guard boat Hekura.

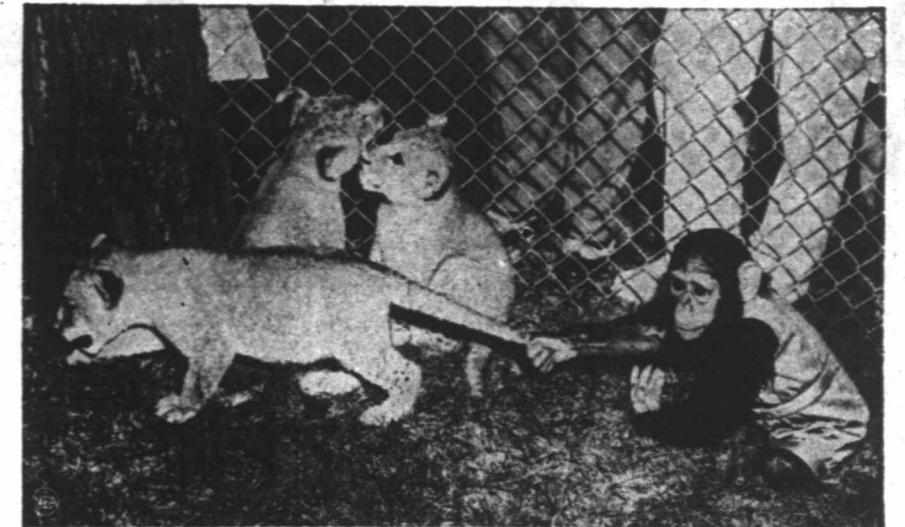
Japan also asked punishment of the Korean officials responsible and assurance the Sunday morning incident would not be repeated.

For several minutes, the cabinet official and committee members all talked at once, yelling to be heard above the uproar.

Representative Murray (Tenn), senior Democrat on the committee, declared he was "mortified" at such procedure and called the recess move—by Representative Hagen (R-Minn) and Representative Gross (R-Iowa)—"the rankest kind of discourtesy to a cabinet member."

Rep. Catherine St. George (R-N.Y.) termed the incident a "disgraceful exhibition."

After 20 minutes of confusion, Committee Chairman Rees (Kan) restored order and Summerfield proceeded with his plan for an annual increase of \$240,025,000 in postal rates to help erase the post office deficit.

He has asked for one-cent increases in first class and air mail rates, and other boosts for other types of mailing.

AMA Urges Slash In Medical Care For War Veterans

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Curtailed of veterans whose ailments are not connected with their military service was urged Monday by the American Medical Association.

Dr. Walter B. Martin, president-elect of AMA, said in a statement prepared for a House subcommittee that Congress should cut down on practices of the Veterans Administration which he said encourage benefits for non-service-connected cases.

The committee is considering proposals to limit privileges now accorded veterans for treatment of non-service-connected disabilities, and to charge them according to their ability to pay.

Western Bloc Leads In Lebanon Elections

BEIRUT, LEBANON.—(AP)—Pro-Western Nationalists and Moderate Independents made the strongest showing in returns Monday from the first round of Lebanon's parliamentary elections. Fourteen of the 21 deputies chosen in the voting Sunday were members of the old Parliament.

Balloting for the 44-seat, one-house legislature was in Beirut and Mount Lebanon. The remaining 23 deputies will be picked in other sections on the following two Sundays.

Soviet Chess Teams Return To Moscow

PARIS.—(AP)—The Soviet chess team, which last week canceled its trip to the United States in a dispute over visa regulations, went home to Moscow by plane Monday, a Soviet Embassy spokesman announced.

The team earlier had canceled a scheduled match this week with an American team.

One Killed, One Hurt As Thunderjets Crash

TOKYO.—(AP)—Two F-84 Thunderjets collided Monday over Nagoya, in southern Japan, killing one pilot and injuring the other, the Air Force said.

The surviving pilot, who bailed out, broke his leg.

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Only Defection By Red Army Could Topple Soviet Regime

By ELTON C. FAY
WASHINGTON—(AP)—Only if the Red army joins in it is likely there can be an upheaval mighty enough to topple Moscow's monolithic government—and the present chances of this happening appear remote.

For these reasons American military men are making no revisions in their estimates of the capabilities of the Soviet armed forces, whatever political convulsions may appear to be going on in Russia.

The reliability of the four-million-man Red Army to the Russian government, whoever heads that government, is well nigh perfect. No army in modern times, not even that of Nazi Germany, has been so well controlled. The army is watched closely by the men who control the Communist Party.

Dual Spy System
For the armed forces, there is a dual system of surveillance:

1. The political commissars, who have been attached to the Army since the early 1920's.
2. Operatives of "Smersh," an organization of secret agents within the MVD, the major function of which is internal security and counter-intelligence.

The operations of the commissars are in the open. The commissars in a Russian Army unit is known to all officers and men. He is responsible to the party, receives his instructions from the Communist political chiefs and reports to them. His mission, in one respect, is something like that of the "information and education" officer in the U. S. Army: he explains political objectives of the government. Because he lives and serves with an Army unit, he also is in a position to know the talk and attitude of soldiers and to tell the party.

There have been reports that regular Army officers dislike and distrust the political commissars assigned to their units. But the same may not be true of the Russian GI. He has little daily contact with any commissioned officer. He knows only the noncommissioned officers and the commissars. And he can appeal, as much as any Russian daren appeal an order, to the commissar.

Super-Secret Mission
The agents of the MVD's Smersh operate in the utmost secrecy. They may be masquerading as either enlisted men or officers. Their sole mission is to detect defection in thought or action. Their methods of operation are ruthless even for the savage secret police of Russia.

These agents are especially concerned with troops that are or have been at posts where they had contact with the Western world, such as the occupation forces in Berlin.

In addition to the political commissars and secret agents within the Army, there is a large force of uniformed security troops—full-fledged and fully armed military units but not within the structure of the regular Soviet Army. Their job also is to keep control, but it includes supervision over civilian populations in Communist-controlled areas.

L. P. Beria, tossed from his high government job and branded a traitor, was the man who headed the uniformed and secret agents of the security force and MVD. The fact that a man with so potent and deadly an organization under his command could be ousted and

arrested served to point up the tight control held by the state over its police and soldiers.

Kruglov Is Party Man
Successor to Beria is Sergei N. Kruglov, who though he wore a uniform and held the rank of colonel general in World War II, is not a professional soldier. He is a member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party. Before that he had been a deputy commissar for home affairs.

Virtually the only look at Krug-

Safeway Official Describes New Building For Midland

Construction will begin "sometime in August" on Midland's newest Safeway supermarket on Baird Street, between Michigan and Tennessee Streets.

The large food store will be built in the center of the block, thus affording parking space for 200 cars on all four sides of the store. The parking area will be paved and lighted.

Contract for the building had not been let, Art West, manager of the present Midland store, said Monday.

"In fact," he said, "I don't know a whole lot about the new building. I have received no information from the El Paso office."

In El Paso, however, David Kimmel, manager of the El Paso Division of Safeway Stores, Inc., gave this description of the new Midland store:

The exterior front of the building will be of cut stone with a large window of solar heat-absorbing glass to reduce glare and solar heat. The other exterior walls will be constructed of buff-colored face brick.

Overall size of the structure will be 105 by 160 feet, with a 67 by 137-foot area used for sales and merchandising. A refrigerated packaging room of 60 by 12 feet will be installed to handle processing and packaging of meat.

Aisles will be covered with asphalt tile. A marble wainscot will extend to a height of nine feet, seven inches on the wall of the merchandising section, with painted gypsum wallboard extending from there to the ceiling, which will be of fiber board.

Other features of the air-conditioned building will be electrically operated exit doors and a series of eight checking stands to provide rapid customer service. An automatic sprinkler system will give fire protection.

Work on the new structure should start "sometime in August," Kimmel said. Plans are being drawn by Davis and Foster, El Paso architects and engineers.

Services Are Held For Stanton Farmer, Victim Of Gunshot

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Monday in the Lenorah Baptist Church for Leo Hart, 58-year-old Martin County farmer, who was found shot to death in his apartment on the Sid Lacey farm near the Lenorah Community.

Martin County Justice of the Peace M. L. Gibson ruled Hart had died at about 10 p. m. Friday of a self-inflicted wound from the .410 barrel of an over-and-under rifle. There was no shell, he said, in the .22 caliber barrel of the gun.

Hart's body, however, was not found until 8 a. m. Saturday when the Lacey returned to their farm from a three-day trip.

They found the screen door to his room locked but sighted Hart through a window. Lacey broke through the screen door and found him sprawled in the room with a wound in the right temple.

Gibson said Monday there was not enough evidence to show whether the death was suicide or accidental, and there was no evidence to support a definite suicide theory. He seemed to be in good health, the Lacey told Gibson, and had shown no signs of worry or mental anguish.

Hart was born in Canada in 1895 and came to the United States 29 years ago. He moved to Martin County five years ago from Jack County and had been a farmer in the Lenorah Community since that time.

A brother, Percy Hart of Topeka, Kan., was in Stanton Monday for the funeral.

He is survived by another brother and two sisters.

16 Die Violently During Weekend; Autos Take Nine

At least 16 persons died in week-end violence in Texas.

Nine were killed in traffic. Three were shot. Three youngsters drowned in separate mishaps and one person was beaten to death.

D. C. Norton, 51, publisher of the Conroe Courier, was injured fatally Sunday night when a panel truck in which he was riding hit a cow near Fostoria. Norton was thrown through the windshield.

Judy Ann Martinez, 11, drowned in the Neches River near Beaumont Sunday when she fell into deep water while wading.

Verna Marie Wheeler, 16 months, drowned in a stock tank at the family home near Brownwood.

Aaron Dean, 47, was shot to death in Houston Saturday night. Police held a woman for questioning.

Mrs. Ruby Nettman was found dead in her Houston apartment Sunday. An autopsy showed she died of a brain injury caused by blows. Gordon Roland Morris, 29, a former convict, was charged with murder.

Pink Garret, 82, was killed in Houston Saturday night when struck by an automobile as he crossed a street.

Billy Wayne Anderson, 14 months, was injured fatally at Dallas Friday night when run over by a car in a driveway.

Thrown From Car

R. W. Tinsley, 80, retired Southwestern University professor, was killed Saturday in a car wreck near Anson.

Mrs. J. D. Nelson, 56, Denton was killed Saturday night when her car hit a fence at Carrollton near Dallas and overturned.

The body of an unidentified man was found in Ennis Friday mid-night. Justice C. W. Duke said he had been shot in the head and thrown from a car.
