With the resignations, the Majlis, Iran's last remaining legislative house, was unable to muster a querum (69) of its 79 members, Mossadegh dissolved the Senate last

The Premier has announced he will hold a referendum on his policies and will resign if the public's vote does not back him up. He has not issued any plans for holding the referendum, however.

The parliamentary crisis came after months of wrangling over unprecedented powers granted Mossadegh last Summer permitting him to govern by decree. Parliament has been paralyzed

since February when the opposition, led by Ayatuliah Seyed Abolghassem Kashani, fiery Moslem religious leader, began boycotting session after session. Only nine of the last 40 scheduled meetings have been held because of the lack of a quorum. On July 1. Kashani was replaced as speaker by Dr. Abdullah Moazemi, a Mossadegh parti-

The 27 deputies from Mossa degh's National Movement handed Moazemi their resignations Tues day after a four-hour caucus. Moazemi did not join the action because, he said, the speaker must be impartial.

The deputies' two-year term normally would end in the Spring of 1954. The last Majlis elections never were completed and only 79 of the 136 seats were filled.

These disaster loans have not been limited to livestock farmers. The new legislation permits loans to be made to farmers adversely affected by "economic disasters"such as substantial price declinesas well as by natural disasters.

These disaster loans — as dis-tinguished from the new livestock loans-have been made in parts of Loans have totaled about 126 million dollars.

To obtain the disaster loans, a farmer must show he has suffered damage or loss from the natural or economic disaster and is unable to obtain credit elsewhere to carry on his operations or to rebuild damaged

The disaster loans are made by local offices of the Farmers' Home Administration. They bear interest

at three per cent. Large parts of Texas and Oklahoma and parts of Kansas, Colo-rado, New Mexico and Arkansas have recently been designated as disaster areas. In such areas, both the livestock type and the disaster



His "weakness" prevailed, however. So he's back with Big Spring. The weakness?

"I never saw so many low, outside curves," White remarked to a Temple teammate just before his return to Big

Class B Loop Fast

Having White back with us is one more point in evidence backing the Big State's contention that hardly any other Class B league compares; it's one of the fastest, they say. And the fact that few Longhorn Leaguers are moving there to stay lends ample support.

The Longhorn Loop, itself, is a rapid Class C, as is the West Texas-New Mexico League. Their players though find it easier to crack the Class B Gulf Coast circuit rather than the Big State,

Seeing-Eye Dogs Grow From 4-H Pups

Every once in a while, Bonnie Lechproject. That's when the man comes to take away her puppy. Of course, he generally brings another one, but a girl can get pretty attached

to a nice pup in a year. Actually, she knows it's gong to happen. Her project is to raise See ing Eye dogs, and she knows all along that when the dog gets old enough, it'll be taken away to begin its training as a guide dog for the blind. She raises them from about three months old until they are between 15 and 18 months.

This dog-raising project is pop-Morris and Sussex Counties. They have the fun of keeping good, sturdy German Shepherd pups for a year, the Seeing Eye organiza-tion pays for the dogs' keep and care, and the youngsters know that the work is really important.

For years, the Seeing Eye trained dogs that had been raised in commercial kennels. But they found that kennel-raised pups were un-familiar with the sights and sounds of a normal home, the environment be conditioned to automobile horns. crying babies, slamming doors, ranon-kennel life.

Morris County Agent J. R. Porter of Rutgers University's Agricultural Extension Service, and Seeing Eye's Director of Training, John Humphries, worked out the present plan to speed up the dogs' training. Each year, some 150 pups are raised on farms by youngsters like 12-year-old Bonnie Lecher.

Presently, she has a black-andtan German Shepherd named Kyna. This is her tenth Seeing Eye pup. They've all been born and bred at Seeing Eye's breeding farm at


