Continental Oil Company No. McCollum & Weibusch, south offset to the discovery well of the Wemac (Wolfcamp) field of East-Central Andrews County, has been completed for a calculated daily flowing potential of 1,244 barrels of high-gravity oil.

Production is from perforations at 8,917-8,927 feet and 8,988-9,014

The potential was based on a sixhour flow of 311 barrels of oil through a one-inch choke. Gas-oil ratio was 914-1 and gas-volume 1,137,000 cubic feet daily.

Location is 1,982 feet from south and 664 from east lines of section 24. block A-44. psl survey.

The same operator's No. 3 Mc-Collum & Weibusch, southeast offset to the field discovery, has been swabbed to test through perforations at 8,857-8,868 feet, 8,883-8,890 feet and 8,898-8,892 feet. During the last 13 hours of swabbing, the project made 190 barrels of new oil and 20 barrels of basic sediment



Official Word On War's End Due Saturday

SEOUL -(AP) A usually reliable source Friday night said the Korean armistice probably will be signed Sunday. Official confirmation was lacking.

The informant, close to the truce talks, said only a last-minute hitch stemming from President Syngman Rhee's opposition could block the signing.

The informant said announcement of the signing date could be expected Saturday. He said he did not know the contemplated hour of the ceremony which would formalize a cease-fire in the war, now more than three years

The signing date probably was set, tentatively at least, by senior liaison officers at a meeting in

Welcome But Be Careful

Residents of Lea County, N. M., say they love their Texas cousins and like to have them visit, but that they don't want their highways cluttered up with Texans killed in traffic accidents.

That is the gist of an editorial in a recent issue of the Hobbs, N. M., Daily News Sun. "Don't Do It, Please. In Lea County" is the title of the editorial, which should be of interest to the many, many Texans and particularly West Texans who travel the New Mexico highways daily.

It seems Lea County has organized a Traffic Safety Commission which actively is engaged in promoting highway safety in that section of the state.

"We herewith inform all and sundry Texans that the welcome mat is out for them in Lea County, New Mexico." the editorial says.

"There's just one request we have for our neighbors to the east of us. We'll respectfully ask it of all who come

visiting. "It is: Please don't allow yourselves to be killed in traffic accidents on our highways."

Now, that is a perfectly legitimate request and we surely do not blame the Lea County citizens for not wanting their highways all cluttered up with dead Texans.

Then too, the New Mexicans are concerned because their safety record is taking a heavier beating than it should as a result of accidents in which Texas cars are a slim majority of one. Taft's sucinvolved

The editorial states further, "So far this year, seven citizens of Texas have been traffic accident fatalities in Les County to our own six. Our own record is bad enough without yours more than doubling it.'

Yes, the New Mexicans have a right to be concerned in the light of evidence presented, and we commend them for taking steps to correct a bad situation.

"Our police tell us," the editorial continues, "speed is a contributing factor in 70 per cent of these fatal accidents. New Mexico speed laws are 60 miles an hour in the day time and 55 at night - the same as yours. Please drive within these limits when you come to visit us because we want to see you come back time and time again."

We Texans appreciate the New Mexico invitation and we should appreciate and heed the "drive safely" request which actually is made for our benefit.

Furthermore, we urge Texans to take it easy on Texas highways when driving to New Mexico or to any other state for that matter.

In contrast, they get enthusiastic about a total eclipse of the sun, because it helps them get further information on such things as distances between various points on the earth.



The great mob of shotgunners in this country shoot trombone actions or



somewhere near a hundred bucks of these guns-and most of the double-barrels either less or more costly-come with a pistol grip. It makes a solid han dle for the trigger hand, and as a nation of rifles shooters we've be come accustomed to them.

But try positioning your right hand higher than its normal placement on the curve of that pisto grip, and then bring Old Betsy points. Notice you see more bar rel? High hand position has pushed the breech end of your smoothbore down, has consequ elevated the muzzles and you'd shoot high if you mis-spotted your righ hand that, way.
