New Contract Puts Strikers Back On Jobs

ST. LOUIS-(P)-A contract agreement ending the 11-day-old Southwestern Bell Telephone Company strike was reached at 6:50 a.m. Monday.

The 53,000 striking CIO Communications Workers started returning to work on their next regular shifts. The end of the six-state strike came after an all-night

negotiations session.

The contract for one year is effective as of Sunday. It calls for a general wage increase ranging from \$1.50 to \$3 a week, depending on seniority and job classification.

Wages ranged from \$35 to \$95 weekly under the old contract. A compromise was reached on the main stumbling block issue, a com-



Liberalizing Information On A-Bombs Is Under Study

By PETER EDSON

WASHINGTON-President Eisenhower's statement that the atomic energy law should be brought up to date so as to give the American people more information on this subject has tapped a keg of eels.

The bombs of that time had a force of 20,000 tons of TNT. Bombs tested in Nevada earlier this year had the force of at least 50,000 of TNT. So the Weapons Effect Handbook of 1950 presumably is obsolete. The question now is: Should new data be released to reveal the super-bomb force, so that more adequate defenses may be planned? Along this same line, should more information be given on Russian atomic bomb capabilities, so that the American people will know what to expect in case of a surprise atomic

This particular point has nothing to do with changing the U.S. atomic energy law. It will be a determination for the President and the National Security Council to make on revealing U.S. intelligence reports. President Eisenhower's committee on psychological warfare headed by William H. Jackson, has just recommended that this be done.

Should Reveal A-Strength? There has been some expression of opinion that the U.S. should reveal its own atomic strength. The idea behind this is that such disclosure might deter an enemy from trying to make any atomic attack on the free world countries.

This is not taken to mean that the U. S. should disclose the size of its atomic bomb stockpile, nor bomb May 30, 1982. production rate. Gordon Dean, for-Commission, says that the "order PW's Board Ship of magnitude" of U. S. atomic power might be disclosed without mentioning any number of bombs. This could be done by citing the number of cities that could be destroyed in one attack.

In planning for any international defenses against sudden atomic attack, the question of furnishing our allies with information about atomic weapons is most important.

In 1951 Congress amended the atomic energy act to authorize specific agreements to exchange formation on the production of fissionable materials with allied foreign powers. Giving restricted data on the design and manufacture of atomic weapons was, however,

The amendment said further that no information could be given a foreign government unless the President had received a written recommendation from the National Security Council. Even then the information can be given by the Atomic Energy Commission only after 30 days' notice has been given to the Congressional Joint Atomic Energy Committee while Congress is in session. From the point of view of planning an adequate European defense, this is considered by some military authorities as too cumber-

some a restriction. There is, finally, the question of making more data available to pri-vate industry for the production of atomic power. This is considered a real necessity if there is to be the fullest possible development of this new source of energy for peacetime Congress now has this question, but may not act this year.

WASHINGTON-(A)- The 48 state governments last year col-lected a record \$10,452,000,000 in taxes—or an average of \$68.04 from each American.

Reporting this Sunday, Census Bureau said the fiscal 1953 total was 685 million dollars more than was collected in the previous year. Most states end their fiscal years on June 30.

The bureau noted that the figures do not include local government taxes, which on a nationwide basis total almost as much as state revenues.

SEOUL-(A)-A six-man advance party of 5,000 Indian troops who will guard Korean War prisoners refuse repatriation arrived Monday from Tokyo.

The group, headed by Brig. Gen. Bhatia, stopped briefly at Seoul Airport, then went to Munsan in a helicopter.

The Indian officers were guarded heavily by American Military Police. The South Korean governmen vehemently opposes entry of Indian troops on Korean soil.

President Syngman Rhee, however, has agreed not to oppose use of Indian troops in the demilitarized

A spokesman for the advance party said 5,000 Indian troops are enroute to the demilitarized zone by ship and will arrive at Inchon in a few days. They will be airlifted by helicopter to the demilitarized zone thus avoiding landing on South

Iranian Situation Fluid

Cautiously, one may hazard that Iran seems headed back toward an orderly government with Royalist forces in command. Former Premier Mossadegh's surrender evidently concludes at least this phase of the political storm.

Few in the West will bemoan Mossadegh's departure from the seat of Iranian power. He was the rigid symbol of fanatic nationalism in his country. He made himself the foe of even the smallest compromise with Britain on the vital oil question. And with every passing day he became more ruthless in the devices he used to maintain and increase his grip on the government.

Toward the end, he reduced the Iranian parliament to impotence. But still he viewed its very existence as a threat. So, backed by a rigged vote of the people, he dissolved the parliament.

Worse, to solidify his position, he began flirting with the Tudeh, the Iranian Communist Party. He accepted Tudeh assistance in combating his most active enemies, ignoring the grave national danger involved in this tactic.

Observers believe this flirtation contributed heavily to Mossadegh's downfall. Wealthy landlords and some elements in the army took alarm. They saw themselves, and the protection they gain from the monarchy, slipping into the Communist shadow.

The young shah, although openly supported by many elements, including lower echelons of the army, remained indecisive until pushed to the limit. At the eleventh hour, he ordered a coup against Mossadegh. But a tip-off enabled the latter to nip it in the bud. The shah quickly fled the country.

Ironically, this somewhat less than courageous act seemed to dramatize for the Iranians what Mossadegh had famed prelate finally gave an asdone to them. With their monarch gone, they erupted in tounding phony confession of his was set up by Congress for the purfresh revolt, this time successfully.



Fracture Victim Needs Aid Quickly, But Move Carefully

There are many causes for broken bones and few families escape this remove small pieces of bone and experience. A broken bone, or fracture, requires attention as soon as possible. A person with a broken except with great care, as the fracture may be made worse by motion. Splinting with a board or some other rigid substance is advisable before moving.

If a person fractures the lower leg while wearing high boots, the boots should not be taken off until after reaching the hospital, as the boot itself serves as a sort of splint. The proper splinting and moving of a patient who has sustained a fracture may make a great deal of difference in the setting of the fracture and the time in which it takes

Once a person who has a fracture has been brought to the hospital skilled care is important. X-ray films must be taken to show just where the fracture is and the position of the fragments. To do this, the X-ray films have to be "shot" from different angles.

If the two parts of bone can be brought together in good position. then healing should take place easily, especially in younger people When the fragments are brought in proper position, the parts must be kept from moving to give the bone a chance to grow together. This rest generally is accomplished by using






