## Telephone Workers End Walkout

### New Contract Puts Strikers Back On Jobs

ST. LOUIS—(P)—A contract agreement ending the 11-day-old Southwestern Bell Telephone Company strike was reached at 6:50 a.m. Monday.

The 53,000 striking CIO Communications Workers started returning to work on their next regular shifts.

The end of the six-state strike came after an all-night negotiations session.

The contract for one year is effective as of Sunday. It calls for a general wage increase ranging from \$1.50 to \$3 a week, depending on seniority and job classification.

Wages ranged from \$35 to \$95 weekly under the old contract.

A compromise was reached on the main stumbling block issue, a company-proposed clause designed to end "quicker" strikes.

"We don't consider it a no-strike clause," said Frank Lonergan, vice president of CWA's District 6. "We got out the objectionable wording. As it now stands, it covers grievances and an arbitration system."

"Members in the field are free to strike at any time, but the union will not sanction a strike while grievance procedure is going on," Lonergan said.

Higher Rates Forecast  
A company spokesman called this "essentially correct." Under the contract, he said, the union is required to go through the grievance procedure rather than to order or sanction a work stoppage or slowdown.

The contract will cost the utility eight million dollars annually and the cost will be passed on to subscribers in the form of higher telephone rates, the company said.

"That will hardly be a popular statement, but it will be the truth and the public ought to know it." Thirteen of the 500 cities served by the company were given a higher classification for pay purposes. Officials explained that this means the increase in wages for some workers will range up to \$10 weekly.

The period in which workers will reach the maximum pay scale was reduced from six and one-half to six years.

Sabotage Clause  
The final issue was company insistence on a clause providing for disciplining any employee found guilty of "violence or sabotage" during a strike.

Under the contract, a company spokesman said, such an employee "must be disciplined or, in actual cases of sabotage, subjected to prosecution."

"We have several cases under investigation," he said.

Several cases of cable cutting and other wire tampering were reported during the walkout. The union disclaimed any knowledge or responsibility for the incidents.

Towns moved upward in the company's classification system, which determines the varying pay scales, include Fort Worth, LaPorte, Borger, Nederland, Orange, Port Neches, Mesquite and Rockdale, Texas.

One Killed As Blast Wrecks Movie House

CHICAGO—(P)—An explosion rocked a West Side neighborhood early Monday, killing one man and demolishing a 1,000-seat movie theater.

The dead man was identified as Joseph Lochansky, owner of a shoe shop next to the Oakley Theater. The cause of the blast was not known.

FORT WORTH—(P)—Army Engineers sent men to Corpus Christi Monday to aid flood workers in an advisory capacity.

Bail Bond Troubles Clamp Union Leader Behind Bars

WASHINGTON—(P)—Ben Gold, fur workers union president, surrendered Monday on charges of swearing falsely he was not a Communist and was locked up when he ran into bail bond troubles.

Gold showed up before District Attorney Leo Rover with \$10,000 in U. S. Treasury bonds owned by his union. This was the amount of bond set Friday in Federal Judge Charles McLaughlin.

James Menzel, clerk of the court's criminal division, refused to accept the bonds as bail. He said there had not been a satisfactory showing that the union, as owner of the bonds, had authorized their use as bail.

McLaughlin backed up Menendez. Gold swore in a statement filed with the National Labor Relations Board that he was not then a member of the Communist Party, had no affiliation with the party, and did not support its policies.

The indictment charged that all three statements were false.

Gold's union, which claims a membership of 100,000, was kicked out of the CIO in 1949 on charges of being Communist-dominated.

Prisoners Released Monday Say Reds To Return More GI's Than Promised

PANMUNJOM—(P)—Another 150 Americans, mostly sergeants and officers, were freed Monday amid indications the Communists may send back up to 500 more Americans than the 3,313 originally promised.

The Reds also released 250 South Koreans on the twenty-seventh day of the Korean War prisoner exchange.

The Communists promised to send back 400 prisoners Tuesday—100 Americans, 25 British, 20 Turks, five Australians and another 250 South Koreans.

One of the Britons to be handed over Tuesday will be Lt. Col. James P. Carne, top-ranking British officer held by the Communists, Red newspapermen said.

Carne, commander of a battalion of one of Britain's great fighting units—the Gloucestershire Regiment—was captured in April, 1951, in the fierce Imjin River battle.

Surrounded by Reds, most of the men of Carne's 1st Battalion were killed or captured in a gallant stand against overwhelming forces. Only a few trickled back to Allied lines.

The Communist Peiping radio said Monday Carne was awaiting repatriation at Kaesong, the Red holding point just north of Panmunjom, and was in "splendid physical shape."

Returning Americans Monday raised hopes that the Reds would return more U. S. soldiers than they originally promised.

### AS ROBSTOWN WATERS EBB— More Rainfall Is Forecast In Flooded Coastal Areas

The rain-fed Rio Grande was 6.7 feet deep at Laredo and rising, but this was far below flood stage. Sunday, the river measured 2.2 feet at Laredo. Rio Grande water backing up behind the new Falcon Dam 75 miles downstream from Laredo was 82 feet at the dam, with 535,000 acre-feet stored.

Six inches of rain fell on Uvalde Monday morning and the surrounding area also was hit hard enough to close two highways.

The Rocksprings and Pearsall highways were closed because of high waters. At Knippa, the rainfall measured 5.50 inches, at Cline there was a 1.90 downpour.

The South Texas flood produced no great danger to life because the water rose slowly. It spread over vast areas and was trapped behind drainage ditch levees, railroad embankments and other obstructions.

Flooding there began Saturday, when an embankment softened by eight and one-half inches of rain in 36 hours gave away, flooding much of the town.

At Kingville, 40 miles southwest of Corpus Christi, about 60 families, possibly 300 persons, still were sheltered after high water Thursday and Friday.

Mayor Dudley Dunlap warned Robstown residents Sunday their municipal water supply was contaminated.

Sinton had a seven-inch cloud-burst in less than five hours Sunday, making a total of almost 20 inches since Thursday. About one-fourth of the town was under water.

On the upper Texas Coast at Bay City, 50 miles southwest of Houston, 10.23 inches of rain had fallen since Saturday. Streets were flooded with eight inches of water measured in two downtown stores. Houston had 4.19 inches of rain since Friday night. More rain was forecast.

Heavy rain along the coast was in sharp contrast to vast dry areas of Central and West Texas.

### Seven Are Injured On Area Highways

Seven persons were injured in a trio of traffic accidents in and around Midland Sunday afternoon. But only two of the seven received hospitalization while the others were discharged after receiving emergency treatment.

Five of the casualties were accounted for in a two-automobile collision three miles southwest of Midland at the intersection of the Garden City Highway with FM 1213.

Admitted to Midland Memorial Hospital for treatment of a broken nose and other facial injuries was Mrs. Everett Wiley Stone, 1109 North Big Spring Street, whose husband was driver of one of the automobiles.

Stone himself received only slight knee injuries.

Conner and a sister, 13-year-old Betty, and a brother, 12-year-old Otis Lee Conner, were treated at Western Clinic-Hospital for contusions and abrasions.

State Highway Patrolman Herbert Hale said the Stones were driving toward Midland when the Conner truck pulled out to the highway from the farm-to-market road.

In Midland, 12-year-old Robert E. Mayfield, son of W. M. Mayfield, 1008 South Big Spring Street, was injured, police said, when he darted in front of an automobile near his home.

Police said the car was driven by James Thomas Gray of Tyler. Gray swerved off the street in an unsuccessful attempt to avoid hitting the lad.

The youth was admitted to Midland Memorial Hospital for treatment of multiple abrasions and contusions and a mild concussion.

Police Officer Virgil Williams was treated at Midland Memorial Hospital after being struck by an automobile while directing traffic around the scene of a fire at 1008 West Missouri Street.

He returned to duty after being treated for multiple abrasions and contusions.

Police said he was struck by an automobile driven by Sue Smith, 3611 Cunningham Street.

### Mother, Five Tots Die In Home Fire

PITTSBURGH—(P)—A mother and her five young children burned to death early Monday as flames destroyed their home in nearby Plum.

Paul Kritzian, 40, who burned his home in a futile attempt to save his family, was the only person who escaped.

"I got up early to look for a job," sobbed Kritzian. "I walked out of the house and was in the rear of our lot something like 30 minutes."

"When I returned the whole back of the old two-story frame house was a mass of flames. I tried to get in, but clouds of black smoke that filled the stairway drove me back."

### Weather Sets Back Salvage Operation

BRUSSELS—(P)—The Belgian representative of a London insurance adjuster firm said Monday salvage operations for bringing up more money from the sunken Flying Enterprise have been halted until next year because of bad weather.

Hamilton Mack, manager of the Belgian branch of Tyler and Company, told of this interruption in a project which already has yielded about \$100,000 worth of sodden U. S. and British currency. Tyler and Company has been financing the job.

Mack said the little Italian salvage vessel Rostro, which had recovered the money and sent it to a Brussels bank to be dried out and counted, had left Ostende last week for an "unknown destination" after calling off further diving operations on the sunken American freighter this year.

The flying Enterprise lies split in two under 240 feet of water in the English Channel.

The Ostende ship broker handling the unloading of the waterlogged treasure said he expected the Rostro back in three or four weeks with more bundles of money.

British navigators said the Rostro has appeared to be working several miles from the spot where the freighter slipped under the waves in a Winter storm 19 months ago.

Officials of the Isbrandtsen Company, which owned the Flying Enterprise, also were reported mystified by the reports of the recovery of the dollars and pounds—money consumed originally by Swiss banks in New York banks.

These officials said they knew nothing of any big shipment of money aboard the Flying Enterprise when she left Hamuliary for New York on her ill-fated voyage in the Yuletide of 1951.

The Enterprise's captain, Kurt Carlsen, won fame by sticking to the battered freighter for 13 days before she finally sank. He jumped into the sea at the last moment and was saved by a British tug.

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### Potential Underway At Strawn Producer In Midland Sector

The Texas Company No. 3-B Scharbauer, confirmation test in the one-well Clarence Scharbauer (Strawn) field of West-Central Midland County, was flowing on potential test at the rate of 12.3 barrels of oil per hour.

Production is coming through perforations at 10,311-10,343 feet. That section had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid.

The potential gauge is through a 19 64-inch choke.

Location is 1980 feet from south and 680 feet from east lines of section 35, block 40, T-2-S, T&P survey and nine miles southwest of the city of Midland.

SE Midland Sector Gains Location For Ellenburger Wildcat

Fifteen miles southeast of the city of Midland, The Superior Oil Company and The Texas Company staked location for a 13,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat.

The project will be drilled as No. 1-44 J. J. Willis, 660 feet from south and west lines of section 44, block A. O. G. Gray survey.

The test is three miles west and the same distance north of Strawberry production in Southeast Midland County.

Operations are to start at once.

### NW Howard Opener Draws Two Offsets

Oceanic Oil Company and Charles C. Green, Jr., and Joe W. McSpadden No. 1 Winans, recently completed Pennsylvanian reef discovery in Northwest Howard County, has drawn its third and fourth offsets.

Oceanic and others and Phillips Petroleum Company will drill No. 1 J. F. Winans one location south of the discovery and 660 feet from north and east lines of section 25, block 33, T-3-N, T&P survey.

Phillips Petroleum Company spotted location for No. 1-A Reef (C. W. Roberts) one location west of the discovery. It is 683 feet from south and 660 feet from east lines of the northwest quarter of section 25, block 33, T-3-N, T&P survey.

Both offsets are to drill to 8,300 feet.

The new field has been designated Oceanic (Pennsylvanian).

### Quinco Stakes Site For Reeves Project

Quinco Oil Corporation of Wichita Falls filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting permission to start drilling at once on a 5,000-foot wildcat five miles south of the town of Pecos and in East Reeves County.

The project is to be drilled as No. 1-A Balmorhea Ranches, Inc., 1,527 feet from north and 330 feet from east lines of section 43, block 6, H&GN survey.

Operations are to start at once.

### NW Lea Prospector Discovery Completes

The Ohio Oil Company has completed No. 1 Trigg-Federal as a flowing discovery from the Permian-Pennsylvanian lime in Northwest Lea County, New Mexico.

The new oiler flowed 112 barrels of oil and no water in 24 hours through a 13 64-inch choke. Casing pressure ranged from 860 to 820 pounds and tubing pressure was 750 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 1,410 and gravity of the oil 43.9 at 86 degrees.

This producer is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 20-13a-32e and one and one-half miles northwest of Lary J (Permo-Pennsylvanian) field.

Production is coming through perforations at 9,590-9,660 feet, 9,673-9,677 feet and 9,696-9,718 feet.

### Reef Discovery Flows Naturally

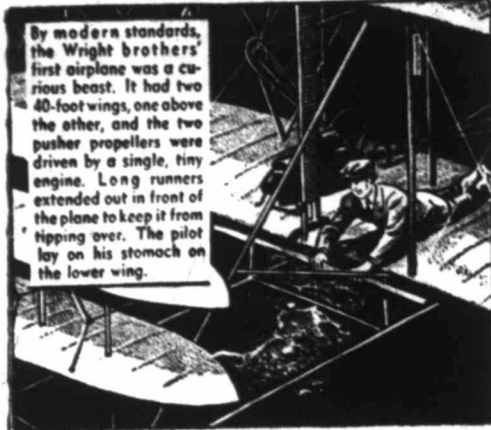

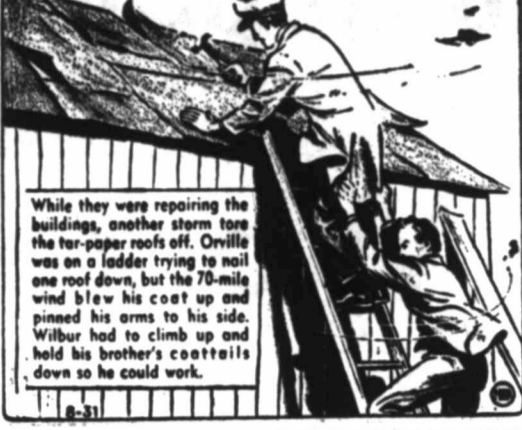
FATHERS OF FLIGHT—The Wright Brothers—(7)



By modern standards, the Wright brothers' first airplane was a curious beast. It had two 40-foot wings, one above the other, and the two pusher propellers were driven by a single, tiny engine. Long runners extended out in front of the plane to keep it from tipping over. The pilot lay on his stomach on the lower wing.



The Wrights arrived at Kitty Hawk, late in September of 1903, after sending their plane and spare parts ahead by rail. Trouble still followed them. They found a storm had wrecked one of the buildings they had erected the year before and damaged another one.



While they were repairing the buildings, another storm tore the top-paper roofs off. Orville was on a ladder trying to nail one roof on, but the 78-mile wind blew his coat up and pinned his arms to his side. Wilbur had to climb up and hold his brother's coat tails down so he could work.

## Clergyman Is Named Speaker For Stanford Club Dinner

The Stanford Club of Midland will hold a dinner meeting Monday night in Hotel Scharbauer honoring Alexander Miller, lecturer in religion at Stanford University.

Mr. Miller, New Zealand-trained clergyman, youth worker and author, has been at Stanford since 1960. Although Stanford chaplains in the past have taught various religious courses, this was the first time that a special teaching appointment in the field of religion was made at the non-sectarian university.

### Works On Degree

Mr. Miller, who is completing requirements for a doctoral degree in religion at Columbia University, served there as a teaching assistant to Dr. Reinhold Niebuhr. He also taught at the Union Theological Seminary in New York.

From 1935-37, he spent three years as general secretary of the New Zealand Student Christian Movement. During this period, he lectured in the United States, Canada and New Zealand. From 1939-43, he held a ministry in Stephney, East London, in the heart of one of the most severely bombed sections of London.

He is the author of three books: "Biblical Politics," "The Christian Significance of Karl Marx," "Religious Book Club choice in 1945," and "Christian Faith and My Job." He teaches courses at Stanford on the Old and New Testaments, the History of Christian Thought, and

Ironically, this somewhat less than courageous act seemed to dramatize for the Iranians what Mossadegh had done to them. With their monarch gone, they erupted in fresh revolt, this time successfully.

### Fracture Victim Needs Aid Quickly, But Move Carefully

There are many causes for broken bones and few families escape this experience. A broken bone, or fracture, requires attention as soon as possible. A person with a broken bone should not move or be moved except with great care, as the fracture may be made worse by motion.

ally, it is necessary to do what is called an open operation and use a knife to enter the fractured area, remove small pieces of bone and place the two ends of bone together, perhaps inserting pins, staples, plates or screws to hold them in place. This often brings good results where other methods fail.

If a person fractures the lower leg while wearing high boots, the boots should not be taken off until after reaching the hospital, as the boot itself serves as a sort of splint. The proper splinting and moving of a patient who has sustained a fracture may make a great deal of difference in the setting of the fracture and the time in which it takes to heal.

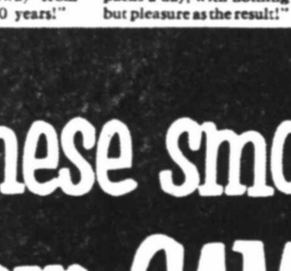

National League sluggers went wild Sunday, blasting 22 home runs to set five new records and tie two others.

Brooklyn's Dodgers walloped the St. Louis Cardinals, 20-4, and then saw their league lead cut to 10 games when the Milwaukee Braves trounced the Pittsburgh Pirates, 19-4 and 11-5.

In the American, New York's 8 1/2-game margin over Chicago remained intact after the Yankees split a doubleheader with the White Sox, winning, 10-6, and losing, 1-0.

But the spotlight was on the senior circuit, where these marks were recorded:

Major league record tied: Eight home runs in one game, by Milwaukee. The Yankees hit eight June 28, 1939.

National League records set:

- Eight homers in one game, by Milwaukee. Seven teams had hit seven.
- Twelve homers hit in double-header, by Milwaukee. The Giants hit nine in 1939.
- Twelve home runs in two successive games, by Milwaukee. Pittsburgh hit 10 in 1925.
- Twenty-eight home runs on the road, by Milwaukee's Eddie Mathews, who rapped three Sunday for his forty-first, forty-second and forty-third of the season. Pittsburgh's Ralph Kiner hit 25 on the road in 1948.
- A hundred runs scored by Stan Musial of the Cardinals for the tenth consecutive season to break his own league record.

National League records tied:

- Twelve runs in the seventh inning, by Brooklyn. Chicago's Cubs scored 12 May 28, 1925.
- Five runs batted in by Brooklyn Catcher Roy Campanella to give him 122 for the season. Gabby Hartnett of the Cubs set the record for 122 RBI's for a catcher in 1930, later tied to Walker Cooper, Giants, in 1947.

While the 22 homers fell three short of the National League's record of 25 on July 16, 1950, the league raised its total home run output to 1,008, only 92 short of its all-time mark set in 1940. The American League hit only nine home runs Sunday to raise its total to 740. The league record is 937 in 1950.

Spearheaded by rookie Jim Pendleton's three homers in the first game and three by Mathews in the twin bill, the Braves practically assured themselves of second place. Other Braves' homers were hit by Johnny Logan (two), Del Crandall, Joe Adcock, Sid Gordon and Jack Dittmer. Johnny O'Brien hit Pittsburgh's lone four-bagger.

Only one other rookie besides Pendleton ever hit three home runs in one game. That was Mathews last year. Incidentally, Mathews now is only four home runs behind Babe Ruth's pace when he blasted 60 in 1927. The Babe, however, hit 17 in September.
