11th Texas Cavalry, the follow Inth Texas Cavalry, the follow ing statement was made by Jasper B. Wells, official historian

Co. G, of the 11th Texas. this statement he gives the mor

Sam Jackson participated op to the time he was killed, in which he savs:
"'The 11th Texas (dismounted Cavalry lleft Knoxvilie, Tenn,
in August, 1862, marching up he Cumberland Gap road t Within thirty miles of the Gap. We camped one evening at the
oot of the mountain, cooke our days rations. consisting o hree pounds of ier, At dark we began clime ing the mountain, following wild hog trail, We could not agons or artillery. itt f ers walked and let their horses est. Every two hours the words ould come; 'Forward: March! clock continued until twslye came down the mountain near Barboursviile, Ky. We waded up Cumberland River, marchod ed near a cornfield then in the roastlng ear stage 1 doubt tha ever a drove of hogs in Kentucky did more damage to a cornfie han Ector's Brigade did that night. The next morning we
marched up to Cumberland Fo marched up to Cumberiand Ford
about fifteen miles, and twelve
miles from Cumberland Gap.

General, Morgan. We could hearthe guns of Gen. Kirby
