"Carol, Concerning your problem with the word "snuck", I don't intend to be critical of your ability as a journalist, newsperson, etc. You do good work. I don't intend to question your dictionary since it is probably correct as far as it goes. However, I have come across the word "snuck" more than once recently and if it isn't disproven then it will become a part of the next dictionary you purchase in the future.

The word seems to have been coined very recently in the country of Uzbek, S.S.R., whose capitol is Tashkent and adjoins Afghanistan on the south. A peasant farmer, Paviodar Iznuckcovsk, wanted to carry his produce into Afghanistan to sell, mainly yak butter and large homemade sausages, in order to support his large family in Uzbek.

This trade across the border was strictly banned by the Soviet guards and KGB Secret Soviet Police.

Paviodar became so adept at evading the guards and KGB that he gained recognition and some rural fame as a smuggler. A Friona man was arraigned Wednesday for possession of a controlled substance before Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts.

Luis Sanchez, 27, is in custody in Parmer County Jail in Farwell.

Sanchez was arrested at a residence on West Sixth Street in Friona at about 1:20 p.m. Tuesday with an undisclosed amount of cocaine, according to Alan Woods, Friona Police officer.

"It turned out to be different people," said Capt. Bailey Roberts of the Friona Police Department.

The FPD had arrested Ernest Crutchfield, 19, and Jesse Garcia, 22, last Thursday in connection with the burglaries of Friona High School and Plains Hardware.

Police have also identified two other individuals who are to be arrested for assisting Crutchfield and Garcia in those burglaries, but declined to release names pending the arrests.

Rando was charged with 10 residential burglaries plus the break-in at the United Pentecostal Church. He was already on felony parole in Lubbock for forgery, and was indicted in late 1989 on a charge of indecency with a child.

Friona police estimated that more than \$11,129 worth of jewelry, VCR equipment and television sets were taken in the residential burglaries, which happened between December 27, 1989, and February 9. About \$1,500 worth of electronic equipment and musical instruments were stolen from the church on January 21.

Roberts said that the burglary methods at all of the houses involved were basically the same.

Roberts said that Rando would walk from one side of town to the other looking for residences where the owners were not at home. He would put on gloves, go to the front door, knock or ring the doorbell, and wait around the corner to see if anyone answered.

If no one answered the door, Rando would try to open the back windows or pry the windows or door open with a screwdriver.

## Board Meeting Held Monday

The Friona ISD Board of Trustees held their regular monthly meeting on Monday, February 12 at the school's new administration building on East Highway 60.

The board passed a resolution calling a school trustee election to be held jointly with the City of Friona for May 5, 1990, to elect two school trustees for three-year terms.

Kathryn Goddard and Dee Willard are the two board members whose terms are expiring.

The board approved contracts for the following administrative and guidance personnel: James Warren, Cliff Stephens, Tom Johnson, Jerry Shelton, Tony Igo, Tonya Gober, Jackie Morgan, Sheryl Salyer and Charles Turner.

Applications for the principal's position at Friona Junior High School are being accepted through March 19.

The board accepted the

resignation of Giva Chandler, junior high school band director, effective at the end of the school year.

In other business, the board voted to drop FISD's contribution for those employees who are not in the group health insurance program and increased the participation for those employees who are in the group health program. This has the possibility of saving the district approximately \$6,000.00.

The board approved Texas Panhandle Medical Group as the health insurance carrier for the coming year.

The board heard a report from Superintendent Hal Ratcliff that enrollment as of January 31, 1990 stood at 1,300, compared to 1,269 for the same date a year ago.

The date for the March board meeting was changed to March 8.

One hundred sixty-nine members attended the 36th annual meeting of the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union Tuesday night, February 13 at the Friona Jr. High Cafeteria.

Tom Hodge, Credit Union official from Lubbock, told those attending that "We need to get the message to our senators and representatives that 'if it isn't broke, don't fix it.'"

## School To Emphasize Attendance

Due to an unexpected enrollment increase, the Friona school system plans to make its second attendance check of the school year, according to Superintendent Hal Ratcliff.

Ratcliff reported to the school board this week that enrollment at the school as of January 31, 1990 was 1,300, compared to 1,269 at the same date in 1989.

The attendance emphasis will be held the weeks of February 19-23, March 5-9, March 12-16 and March 19-23.

When the emphasis was held last October, the school recorded over 97 per cent attendance. "We're hoping for 98 per cent on the new drive, and it would mean increased state funds if we can make it," Ratcliff said.

The superintendent pointed out that the school would have the option of accepting the figures that would best benefit the school, either those registered last October, or those the school achieves in the new drive.

Hodge was referring to the move to lump credit unions with banks and savings and loan institutions for federal regulation.

Hodge spoke in place of Leahnore Taylor of Houston, TCUL consultant, who was unable to attend due to illness.

Hodge is Texas Credit Union League consultant for the West Texas region.

During the business session, Ralph Shirley and Troy Sharrock were elected to the organization's board of directors. Carmen Rape was re-elected to the organization's credit committee, and new members elected were Matt Osborn and Beth Shelton.

Holdover board members are Charles Fleming, Geneva Williams, C.H. Veazey, Coy Jameson and Gene Schueler.

Holdover members of the credit committee are Sam Mears and Gerall Wyly.

Credit Union manager Barbara Maynard presented the yearly financial report, which showed an increase in overall business and in earnings for Credit Union members.

A ten-year comparison of business showed a 34.96 per cent gain in loans; an 84.41 per cent increase in shares; a 223.06 per cent increase in reserves (equity); a 100.99 per cent gain in income; a 70.49 per cent hike in expenses; a 100.77 per cent increase in dividends and an 83.04 per cent increase in assets.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

**60 YEARS AGO--FEB. 21, 1930**

The building committee of the Methodist Church met Thursday night and adopted plans for the new Methodist Church building. It is to be a three-story brick building, containing 14 rooms besides the auditorium. The auditorium, including the balcony, will seat about 500 people and the general dimensions will be 42 by 74 feet, and the cost will be between \$12,000 and \$14,000.

**55 YEARS AGO--FEB. 22, 1935**

The Parmer County basketball tournament held here the latter part of last week was, in all respects, the most satisfactory tournament that has ever been held in Parmer County. The local teams, both the Chiefs and the Squaws, won the championship of the county by good safe scores, and will be thus entitled to represent the county in the district tournament.

**50 YEARS AGO--FEB. 23, 1940**

The local highway leading into Friona from the north on the west side of the city is now receiving a substantial caliche surfacing, the work being done by WPA workers of the county. It is proposed to extend the surfacing to a distance of three miles north. This will be a decided help to traffic from that part of the territory.

**45 YEARS AGO--FEB. 23, 1945**

The Air Medal and Oak Leaf Cluster has been awarded to Staff Sgt. Roy E. Hughes, and the decorations will be sent to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Buford Hughes, according to word received here last week from the Air Force.

**40 YEARS AGO--FEB. 17, 1950**

The \$93,000 sewer system was completed in Friona this week, finishing a project which was started by passage of a bond issue in June of 1946. Completion of the new system should pay big

dividends to the estimated 1550 Friona residents.

**35 YEARS AGO--FEB. 18, 1955**

Construction has commenced on a cotton gin located one-half mile west of Hub, the owners announced this week. To be known as the West Hub Gin, the firm is to be headed by Leo Ruzicka, manager. The gin expects to be completed in March. The project is reported to involve about \$210,000.

**30 YEARS AGO--FEB. 18, 1960**

Funeral services for Mrs. F.L. Reed, a resident of Parmer County the past 52 years, were conducted from the Friona Methodist Church at 4 p.m. Saturday.

Needing a victory to enter the district playoffs against Tulia, the Friona Squaws soundly defeated the Canyon girls, 83-48 last Friday night.

**25 YEARS AGO--FEB. 18, 1965**

A man was found dead, apparently from exposure early Sunday morning in a Friona street. Patrolman Travis Clements, who investigated after a call was received by the police department, discovered the man's body at Fourth and Prospect. Officers are investigating.

**20 YEARS AGO--FEB. 19, 1970**

Members of the Chamber of Commerce, the city manager and

publisher of the Friona Star met with representatives of General Telephone Co. of the Southwest Tuesday at noon, and discussed possible additional telephone service to Friona. One of the things discussed was the possibility of connecting Friona and Bovina for dialing purposes, with no toll or long distance charges.

**15 YEARS AGO--FEB. 16, 1975**

Friona and Dimmitt, each winners of half a district title, go for the whole ball of wax next Thursday in a special playoff game to decide which team will enter the state playoffs. The battle will be played at Levelland's Texan Dome fieldhouse on Thursday, February 20.

James Andrews, assistant band director for the Friona Schools, was named first place national winner in the music composing contest sponsored by the College Band Directors Association and held last week at the University of California in Berkeley.

**10 YEARS AGO--FEB. 17, 1980**

It was announced at the annual meeting of the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union that longtime manager and treasurer of the organization, Geneva Williams, would retire as of March 1, 1980.

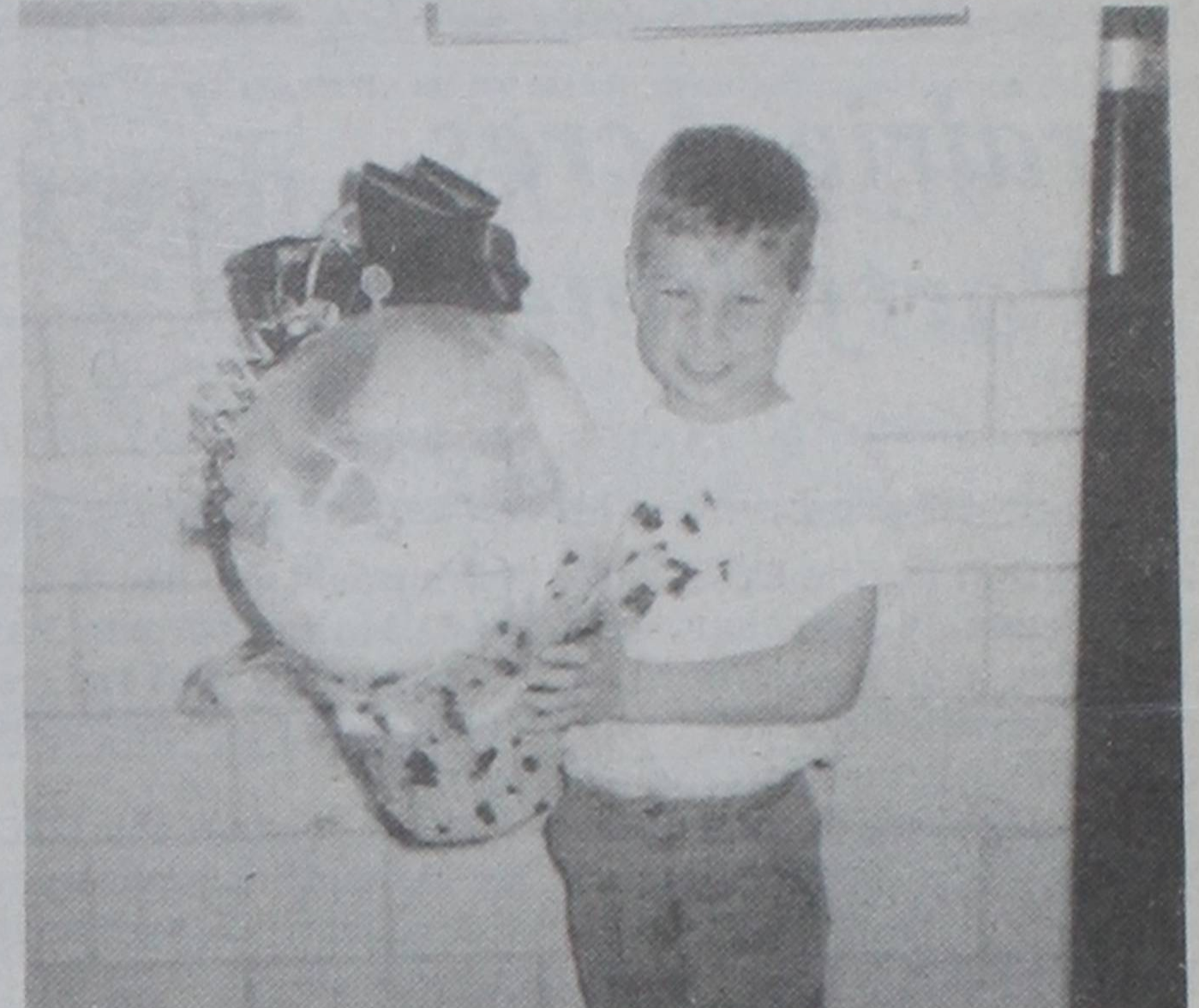

### Module XIII: Improved Annuities Provide Tax Shelters

The new tax laws have made it necessary to be more selective in investment planning. Since the tax advantage of long-term gains has been eliminated, it has become more important to protect these gains and to allow them to compound under some type of tax shelter. New and improved insurance annuity contracts offer a safe and reasonable way to accomplish this.

The old annuities, as many remember them, were insurance retirement vehicles that required either a lump sum or periodic deposit. When the annuitant decided to begin withdrawals, a regular income was guaranteed for a specific period or for life. When that period ended, any money remaining in the account went to the insurance company. Although this eliminated the worry of outliving an income, the rates were generally low and once annuity payments began, they never increased. Although the annuitant was assured a lifetime income, inflation caused the buying power of that income to drop each year.

The variable annuity, however, offers a possible solution. It combines the benefits of a mutual fund with the advantages of deferring taxes under the shelter of an insurance policy. You have the choice of several stock, bond and money-market mutual funds as your investment, and returns vary based upon how well the funds perform. Upon death, the insurance company pays your heirs the greater of the current market value or the amount of your contributions. This guaranteed death benefit is very appealing to those who want the returns available in the market without subjecting their heirs to a loss of

principal.

The key to selecting a variable annuity is to scrutinize the management and investment results of the variable accounts. They vary considerably from company to company, so results will depend upon your choice.

If you select to switch mutual funds within the annuity, you don't have to pay taxes on any gains you might realize at that time. Taxes are due only when you begin withdrawals from your annuity. One negative feature is that the government imposes a 10 per cent penalty on withdrawals taken before age 59½.

Most variable annuities are offered with no initial sales charge, which allows all of your original investment to go to work immediately. However, to protect the insurance company from loss should you decide to remove your deposit before they recoup their expenses, there's generally a declining contingent deferred sales charge. This charge is based upon the number of completed contract years between the date the deposit was made and the date withdrawals begin. It varies with different insurance companies.

Variable annuity contracts are generally straightforward and simple to understand. However, should you receive your contract and decide it does not meet your needs or contains some unacceptable features, most insurance companies allow up to 20 days to return the annuity for its current market value with no surrender charge. This option is clearly stated in your contract.

At a time when tax shelters have all but disappeared and investors are looking for safe and reliable options to IRAs, the variable annuity contract offers an alternative you may want to consider.

The Care-Link representative then answered all questions from the group.

"We sincerely thank Care-Link for letting Bonnie Jackson present this program to us," said a spokesman for the group.

Fifteen FFA members from Friona will be joining 4-H and other FFA members from throughout the state for showing competition at the upcoming Houston Livestock Show February 17 through March 4.

These FFA and 4-H exhibitors compete in one of two divisions of the Houston Livestock Show--the junior show division. The other division, the open show, attracts its exhibitors from the world's agricultural industry, primarily professional breeders and ranchers.

Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest.

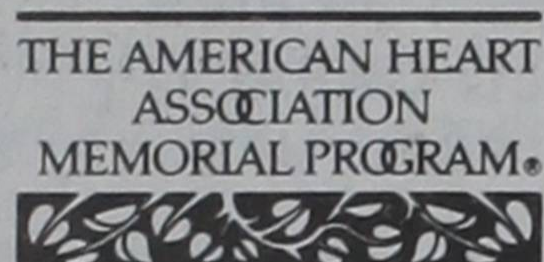
"Our show, the world's largest livestock show, attracts some of the finest breeders and ranchers from throughout the world. Yet during the second week of livestock show competition, the

The American Agriculture Movement of Texas, Inc., will host two meetings to inform farmers, ranchers and the general public of pending legislation.

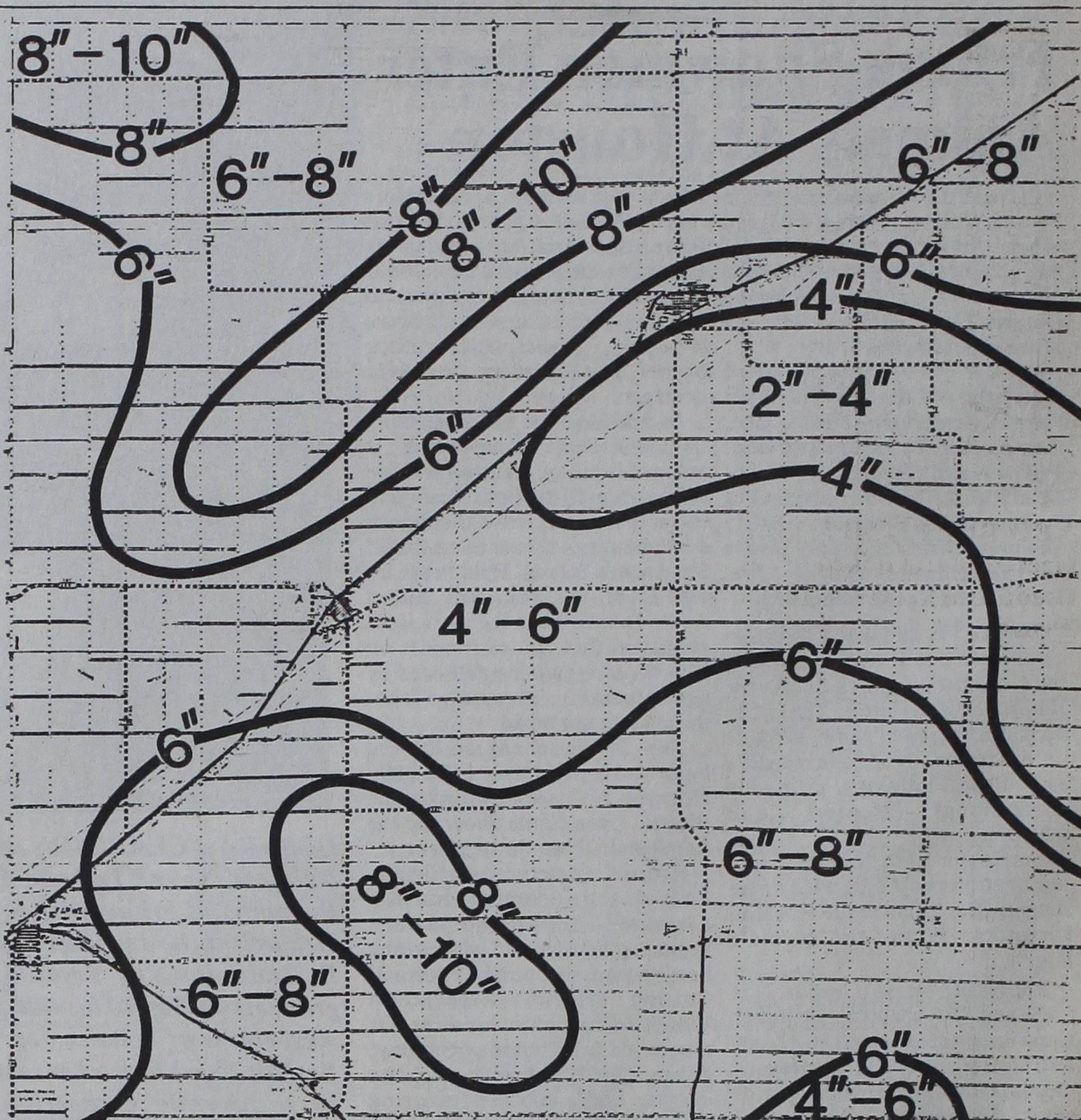

# Area Needs 6-10'' Of Water For 1990 Spring Planting

Parmer County irrigators will have to apply from two to ten inches of water to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before 1990 spring planting, according to soil moisture survey data released by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 and the USDA-Soil Conservation Service.

Soil moisture conditions within Parmer County are highly variable, says Mike Risinger, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist. "These variable soil moisture conditions depend upon the type of crop grown in 1989 and the relative availability of groundwater for irrigation," he says.

The most favorable field conditions were found in the central portion of the county where corn was grown or where the 1990 wheat crop has been irrigated. Soil moisture deficits in this area range from two to six inches.

Larger soil moisture deficits ranging from six to ten inches were found northwest of U.S. Highway 60, near Bovina and Friona. In southern Parmer County, soil deficits were mostly from six to eight inches, with one exception being a small area near the Oklahoma Lane community. Soil moisture deficits in this area were from eight to ten inches.

"Available water of less than two inches exists across 30 per cent of Parmer County and is found mainly in the northern portion of the county. Only the east central and southeast portions of the county have significant areas with

as much as four inches of plant-available water entering the planting season," says Risinger.

Water District and USDA-SCS personnel take annual soil moisture readings by inserting neutron probes into aluminum access tubes at more than 230 monitoring sites across the district's service area.

The annual soil moisture survey results are designed to inform irrigators about general soil moisture availability and deficit conditions across the Water District's 15-county service area.

With this information, irrigators can estimate the amount of water they will need to apply during pre-plant irrigation to bring their soil to field capacity without over-irrigating or under-irrigating.

Soil moisture levels have traditionally been a good indicator of potential crop yields. If the soil profile is near field capacity at planting, the chances for good crop yields is greater.

Rain gauge totals at the 22 soil moisture monitoring sites maintained by the Water District ranged from 13 inches of precipita-

tion in western Parmer County to 21 inches in the extreme eastern part of the county.

Any precipitation and/or irrigation received between now and planting season will improve soil moisture conditions and improve crop yield prospects.
