present session, the public is watching eagerly for evidence that pledges to reduce extravagance in government are to be fulfilled. Thus far the evidence is scant. There

have been the usual number of "private bills" to increase individual pensions and the like. There has been talk of huge appropriations for various projects obscure both in scope and in purpose. It begins to look as if enough plans to spend the taxpayers' money will be offered this session to run the total high into the billions-as has been the fashion at Washington during recent years.

Naturally all these efforts on the part of legislators to spend the people's dollars cannot hope to be enacted into law. But the persistence with which such attempts recur indicates some-thing worthy of consideration by all of us who pay taxes, whether direct or

"hidden." It is, that while office-holders like to picture themselves as the people's business agents in government, actually many of them seem to play quite the opposite role. Probably that explains the Federal public debt has reached an all-time high; why the government is spending almost two dollars today for every dollar it takes in.

What the office-holder should re-member is that the ability of any busiless agent is measured not by the number and the magnitude of the bills he rans up for his employers to pay, but by the efficiency and economy with which he administers the affairs of those he represents. Helping to run up a public debt that would take thousands of years to pay at the rate of \$5,000 a day, doesn't quite fit the picture. Yet that, statisticians say, is what reckless spending in government has

Big appropriation bills may help put a legislator's name on the front page-but they don't remedy conditions if they also help put a lot of other men's mes among the bankruptcy notices.

### Texans to Spend Millions in 1936 As Host to U.S.A.

Southwest Empire's Fete of Independence to Center in Dallas

Dallas, Texas .- in 1936 the State of Texas will celebrate the passage of a century since her pioneer settlers won freedom from Mexican rule and established the Republic of Texas, which later became a state.

Throughout the Lone Star State there will be celebrations at places of historic and patriotic interest. The cities and towns which were battle scenes in the Texas Revolution, and communities founded during the exploration and colonization preceding the Republic, will commemorate progress of the only state that existed as an independent republic, prior to its entrance to the Union.

Under the six flags that have flown over Texas soil-those of France, Spain, Mexico, Republic of Texas, the Confederacy and the United Statessince 1519, there has been written by men and women, in thought and action, a saga that is truly mighty.

Highlights of the gala and festive celebrations of the Centennial Year will be an event that is in its own right an historic one. It is the Texas Centennial Exposition to open in Dallas on June 6 and continue until November 29.

The Texas celebration represents an investment of more than \$20,000,000. The City of Dallas pledged \$8,000,000 in cash and property and the \$4,000,-000 plant of the State Fair of Texas, located within her city limits, will be used as the Exposition grounds. Dallas also pledged \$5,500,000 in cash for building her share of the enterprise, \$3,500,000 of which was raised by a municipal bond issue and \$2,000,000 bonds sold by the Texas Centennial Central Exposition Corporation, comprised of Dallas citizens.

The Texas Legislature appropriated \$3,000,000 and the United States Government a like sum.

The Dallas Exposition grounds consist of approximately 200 acres. Exposition buildings and their cost follow:

Texas Hall of State, \$1,200,000; Hall of Fine Arts, \$550,000; Hall of Va-ried Industries, Electricity and Comportation, \$440,000; Hall of Livestock and Animal Husbandry, \$300,000; United States Building, \$325,000.

Hall of Natural History, \$250,000; Rural Boys' and Girls' Dormitory, \$250,000; Hall of Foods and Bever-

\$250,000; Hall of Foods and Beverages, \$230,000; Hall of Aquatic Life, \$180,000; Hall of Agriculture, \$170,000; Hall of Domestic Arts, \$75,000; Hall of Horticulture, \$75,000. Band Shell and Pavilion, \$50,000; Hall of Negro Life and Culture, \$50,000; Radio, Police, Fire Station, Texas Ranger Headquarters and Hospital, \$40,000.

Cost of landscaping and paving is estimated at \$675,000. In addition, a half-million dollars worth of utility equipment and \$350,000 in electrical equipment will be installed.

A million dollar sports plant will

enable the Exposition to handle sporting events of all kinds. The grounds already have a \$400,000 stadium seating 46,000 people, a horse race track and grandstand costing \$300,000, and indoor boxing and wrestling arena costing \$100,000 and seating 6,000 persons, a polo field, straightaway and oval running tracks and tracks suitable for automobile or motorcycle races. A standard-sized swimming pool will be constructed for aquatic

Main entrance of the Exposition grounds will face the Esplanade of State, 300x1,000 feet, leading to the Texas Hall of State. The esplanade's center will be a reflecting basin 200x 700 feet with concealed lighting effects flashing from the pool to ad-

jacent buildings.
The Texas Hall of State, built of native granite, will be 488x258 feet. An 80-foot high center will house the Niche of Heroes, dedicated to illus-trious figures of Texas history. The front wings will be devoted to regional rooms, a replica of a Texas mission representing the Hall of 1936. An auditorium in the basement will be used for convention purposes.

# CURRENTEVENTS

Farm Leaders Insist on

Crop Control Legislation FARM leaders summoned to Washington to help in devising a new farm program decided to remain there and "picket" the halls of congress until

legislation is passed to take the place of the AAA destroyed by the Supreme court ruling. The proposal that was the first plank in the policy platform they drew up and that is pushed by administration men centers on production control subsidized through soil conservation.

Farmers would get eash grants, provided they had permitted the transfer of certain acreage from commercial production to soil conserving crops, or had "adfusted" the commodities on certain

Administration leaders were considering a plan to raise the half million dollars a year necessary for this scheme by enacting most of the old processing taxes as excise levies. The farm leaders favored this, and also recommended:

"Retention and strengthening of all positions of the AAA act not declared unconstitutional.

"Creation of farm commodity cooperatives, authorized under the Capper-Volstead act, for marketing or distributing farm products."

Foremost among the agricultural experts who took part in the conferences was Howard R. Tolley, director of the Giannini foundation in California. He has been described by administration officials as the leading agricultural economist in the United States, and was hurriedly called from the West coast to Washington.

Lawyers acting for a Philadelphia real estate dealer filed a suit in the Federal District court there to restrain government executives from interfering with the operation of the AAA until its constitutional status has been determined by referendum.

#### Process Tax Refund Ordered by Supreme Court

DROCESSING taxes amounting to \$200,000,000, impounded by the courts, must be refunded to the tax payers, according to a unanimous ruling of the Supreme court of the United States. The decision did not go into the question of whether processors must prove they had absorbed the tax before they could recover, though this one of the main points Presumably this will first be passed apon by a district court. The case was

brought by Louisiana rice millers. The nine justices all agreed that the review of the Bankhead cotton act case, which had been allowed on a 6 to 3 vote, had been "improvidently granted" and so they refused to pass on the validity of the act at this time. Another case involving this law, filed by Gov. Eugene Talmadge of Georgia, a Roosevelt administration foe, will give the court another opportunity to rule on it.

The expected ruling on the validity of the Tennessee Valley Authority act was not forthcoming.

### Protects WPA Workers From

"Chiseling" Employers HARRY L. HOPKINS, WPA administrator, has sent to state administrators a set of regulations intended

to protect WPA workers from "Chiseling" employers and to keep up wage standards. In his letter to the state officials Mr. Hopkins said:

"I want to make perfectly clear the policy of the works progress administration relative to private employment or employment on contract jobs under the direction of other federal departments which may be

offered the WPA workers. "It is expected that WPA workers will accept available jobs in private employment, whether of a permanent or temporary nature, provided:

"(1) That the temporary or permanent work shall be a full-time job. "(2) That such work shall be at a standard or going rate of wages. "(3) That such work shall not be in conflict with established union relationships.

"(4) That workers shall be offered an opportunity to return to the WPA upon completion of temporary jobs."

#### Raskob Is Angered by Government Tax Suits

JOHN J. #### Puerto Rican Sugar Estates Will Be Broken Up

SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR ICKES, making a brief visit to our Caribbean possessions, told representatives of the sugar interests in Puerto Rico that the great sugar estates of that island would be broken up, because they are in violation of a law forbidding the corporate ownership of more than 500 acres of land. He explained the lands will be homesteaded to get thousands of landless persons back to the soil. It is not known whether Mr. Ickes did anything about the general dissatisfaction in Puerto Rico with the policies of certain of the government's representatives there.


#### Democratic Convention Goes to Philadelphia

A UCTIONED off to the highest bidder, the Democratic national convention of 1936 was sold to Philadelphia by the party's national committee. The price was \$200,000, plus some prizes and concessions. Chicago and San Francisco also bid for the convention. The former offered a certified check for \$150,000. The California city made the same bid and later raised it to \$202,500.

During a brief recess Chairman Fartelephoned, presumably to the White House, and Vice President Garner moved among the members of the committee urging the selection of Philadelphia. Therefore the City of Brotherly Love won the prize. The opening of the convention was set for June 23,

Hauptmann referred to Isador Fisch. German furrier, who died in Bayaria about a year after the kidnaping. The prisoner has steadfastly insisted that the ransom money found in his possession when he was arrested had been left with him by Fisch.

#### Bonus Measure Is Pushed Through the House

NO TIME was lost in putting through the house the bonus measure that had been agreed upon by veterans' organizations and approved by the ways and means committee. It carries the name of the Vinson-Patman-McCormack bill and is a compromise that authorizes immediate payment of the bonus but offers no definite plan for raising the money. It would provide 3 per cent interest until 1945 for veterans refraining from cashing their adjusted service certifi-



### FLORIDA'S INDUSTRIES



Potential Turtle Soup From Florida.

TEW tourists know industrial

Florida. There is no smoke pall more grime and pungent factory smells would be a welcome tonic for the state's commercial progress; yet what factories lack in size they make up in variety.

Output ranges from toys, turtle soup and turpentine to shiploads of dressed lumber, phosphates, and cigars. For even more contrast, add many linear miles of snake and alligator skins, wooden shoes, and canned grapefruit jellies and marmalades.

One mill at Jacksonville grinds oyster shells and ships them by the carload to California, to help the digestions of Pacific coast poultry; another makes glass bottles for Cuban breweries.

Palm fronds by the carload go as far North as Canada, for use on Palm Sunday, Palmetto fiber is made into brushes. A college student pays his way by stuffing baby alligators and selling them to tourists. He stuffed 300 in one season-alligators, not bables!

Men wade on the bottom of the sea picking sponges as a farm boy pulls turnips. They are scientifically farmed and are shipped the world around.

Schooners cruise as far away as the

coast of Honduras, catching sea turtles. Unloaded at Key West, these turtles are first branded on the breastplate with the initials of the local fishing company; then they are put into big tanks and fed on seaweed; later some are sent alive to New York hotels, their flippers neatly folded across their breasts and tied; others, guillotined on a well-worn beheading block. are turned into canned soup at Key West; but before any turtle can be taken from the tank he has to pass an official inspection. Turtles may not have flat feet or suffer from nervous disorders, but now and then one is found in no condition to go to market. He is thrown back into the sea. Then, sometimes, a strange thing happens; mong a cargo of turtles from Honduras, 700 miles away, one is found with the company's initials already branded on his bony breast. Condemned and thrown back into the sea. turtles, it seems, swim all the way back to Honduras from Florida, only to be caught again!

### Fuller's Earth Mill.

Near Quincy, in north Florida, is a big building with wheels, rollers, and hoppers, like a flour mill; but it grinds dirt-fuller's earth. Steam shovels scoop up the claylike substance by the acre. It is dried, ground, sifted, sacked, and shipped to oil refineries all over the world. Through this fine powdery dust the oil is filtered. Drycleaners use it to take out grease spots. It has many other uses; even the clay used in beauty shops includes it.

In beds of this earth workmen often find the bones of ancient animals. Scientists from the American Museum of Natural History dug up the fossilized body of a manatee. The remains of saber-toothed tigers, prehistoric little horses, and even of camels ages old, have been found in Florida.

A man sits on a high chair and reads aloud to workers in Florida cigar factories. They call him a "lector."

Many cigars are made at Key West and some at Miami and Jacksonville, but the industry centers at Tampa, with its 200 factories, big and little. One of them turns out upward of half a million a day.

Much of the tobacco used is imported from Cuba. Some is grown in Florida and wrapper leaf also comes from northern states.

Cheaper cigars are made by clever machines, whose movements often curiously resemble the motions made by the hands of a human cigar-maker. More expensive cigars, of the size and | down, serving their never-satisfied apshape known to the trade as coronas. royals, perfectos, panetelas, etc., are all made by hand. Three workers, sitting in a row at the same bench, form a team. They are paid by the thousand. This grouping of workers into threes is not done by the management; it is left to the cigar-makers themselves, to choose their benchmates. The finishing touch on every cigar is putting on the wrapper and pasting the closed end shut with a dash of

gum. From the workbench cigars go on to bigger tables, where they are sorted for color and perfection of form. Fancy colored bands are put on by machines, at the rate of 50,000 an hour, the whole process run by two girls. After being packed, each box is labeled and one of Uncle Sam's green revenue stamps affixed. That, briefly,

Pine and Its Products. Thick pine woods covered all of north Florida when white men first came. Today, at dawn, in these pine woods, the earth smells as fresh as if it had just been created. The pine was and still is the chief natural resource of the state. Lumber and its allies, turpentine and rosin, are the state's chief manufactured products.

Throughout much of all middle and north Florida you ride through forests of pine and see trees "cupped" or scarified for turpentine. Pungent fumes from wayside stills weight the air. To tap a tree and draw off its resinous gum, bark is chipped off in strips a few inches above ground; then cups of metal or clay are placed under these cuts to catch the gum. It takes many thousands of trees to keep one fair-sized turpentine mill running. which works just as does an alcohol

Turpentine and its associated product, rosin, are known as "naval stores" because originally their chief use was in shipbuilding. Today turpentine goes mostly into paints and varnishes and resin goes into paper, hard soap, and many other commodities. A few big mills in the state now grind up pine stumps and other waste lumber and steam these chips in great boilers, extracting not only turpentine and rosin, but pine oil and other ingredients useful in industry and medicine.

"Fatwood" the natives call the roots, stump, and lower portions of the pine, because it burns so readily. A visitor is always amazed at the speed with which a fire can be kindled in Florida

with a few splinters. Besides various pines, Florida also yields much cypress lumber, from a bee which grows with its feet in water. Some of the world's largest cypress mills are here. There is red gum, too, and black gum, though not in quantities, and time was when Florida live-oak timbers were in much demand among northern shipbuilders. This live oak and its cousin, the water oak, are beautiful trees, especially when festooned with long, graceful filaments of Spanish moss, as one sees them along certain stretches of the Suwannee river.

### Great Place for Anglers.

When one considers the number of golf players the ancient game has developed in the United States, then multiplies the total by perhaps ten, some idea of the army which swears by fishing as a hobby may be imagined and the lure of Florida's teeming waters for the followers of Izaak Walton pic-

Our government experts may scientifically estimate the hidden supply of coal, ore, oil, and relative natural resources, but no one has the temerity to try to gauge the crop of the fish life of the Gulf stream, except to prove that there are more than 600 known varieties and others being steadily added to the list. The warm waters off the east coast and corresponding conditions in the Gulf of Mexico, on the western side, are perhaps unequaled the world around as nature's own incubator of marine life.

Just offshore on either coast the piscatorial enthusiast finds his happy hunting ground. The sea is alive with such fighting tribesmen as tarpon, sailfish, marlin, albacore, tuna, barracuda. wahco, amber jack, dolphin, grouper, and many others familiar to salt-water fishermen. On the coral barrier reefs. but five miles off the east coast, extending from Miami Beach to Key West, endless varieties of smaller fishes abound, finding their food as well as a fair protection from natural enemies in the holes and crannies of the submerged coral ramparts. Great schools of Spanish mackerel, kingfish, and the lowly mullet migrate up and petites, but always on the lookout for a thousand fees who lie in wait behind coral head and sea fern to strike.

At Key West you see boatloads of Spanish mackerel and kingfish brought in, to be barreled and iced and then away to your distant table.

From Pensacola fleets fish for grouper and red snapper as far away as the coast of Campeche, in the Gulf of Mexico, let us say, for purposes of location. A smack out four weeks will, if the biting is snappy, bring in 25,000 or 30,000 pounds of snapper. From Pensacola scores of carloads go North each season. Snapper fishing is best in winter, but boats go also in summer, in spite of the fact that a long calm and intense tropical heat may mean drifting till all ice on board melts; then there's nothing to do but tack for home-perhaps with no fish at all.







