But we shouldn't forget. So long as the Constitution lives, our liberties are the American Way of Life-fall with it Eternal vigilance is still the price of







Fat for deep frying is at the correct temperature when an inch cube of bread dropped into it becomes a golden brown in 60 seconds. This is for cooked mixtures.


Marinate fresh fruits to be used in salads as soon as they are cut or sprinkle them with lemon juice. This prevents discoloration.

Licetricity and Bacteria. Among interesting papers read be fore the Royal Society in London reently was one by C. Russ upon the electrical reactions of certain bacteria as applied to the detection of tubercle bacilli in urite by means of an electric current. Another by Prof. H. A. Wilson described his experiments to determine the effect of a magnetic deld surrounding it upon the electrical
