THE NATION'S Bicentennial Census will be taken beginning April 1, 1990.

The 1990 census, the 21st in our nation's history, will be the largest and most complex ever undertaken. The Census Bureau expects to count some 250 million Americans, and 106 million housing units. About a week before Census Day (April 1, 1990), most households will receive a census questionnaire by mail. Others, depending on their location, will have forms delivered by census takers. Roughly five out of six households will receive a "short form." About one out of six households will be asked to fill out a longer form. Getting a complete count on the census is vital for a number of reasons. First and foremost is the fact that the population figures are used to determine how our representation is determined, all the way from county commissioner's courts to state representatives to U.S. Congressional districts.
