## FHS Tells '90 Grid Schedule

ONE OF MY favorite former Parmer County folks was Paul Crume who wrote the page one column for the Dallas Morning News for many years. Back in 1969 he said, "The grass-roots American is neither liberal nor conservative. He is opinionated."

Well, he hit home on that one. I am an opinionated person, and will be glad to generously share my opinion with anybody whether they need it or not.

Another of my favorite folks was Abe Lincoln who once said, "A house divided against itself cannot stand." Well, I am of the opinion that Parmer County and Friona, in particular, has suffered greatly from being "divided against itself" over the years.

It was the cause of the courthouse being lost from the central part of the county and its being placed over on the edge of the state line many years ago. And it has resulted in these three small towns which have had quite a struggle to grow and remain progressive. You don't see this much divisiveness in counties where the courthouse is the hub of the county.

Friona stands to lose a lot if we don't get our local man elected to the County Judge's spot in the coming run-off election. Run-offs in this county have a very poor record of voter turn-out. This is one time when Friona folks cannot afford to stay at home on election day and lose our toe-hold in the courthouse over at Farwell.

We are fortunate, indeed, that someone with B.K. Buske's experience and training has offered himself for county judge. We definitely need to take advantage of this.

Our guy's qualifications far outshine his opponent's, who has been serving as Justice of the Peace for the Bovina precinct. (She is NOT, as some have thought, Bonnie WARREN Howard, who is the longtime County Clerk and is up for re-election to that position.)

With over 50 per cent of the county's population located in the Friona trade territory, this area deserves to have the benefit of the Judge's position.

In the early 70s, we lost this benefit, and if you'll remember, that was the stretch when Frionans with business in the commissioner's court had a very cold reception.

When the county was re-districted, to supposedly give the more populous area more of a say, the map was drawn so that all it did was force the Bovina commissioner to have constituents in Western Friona, and the Lazbuddie commissioner to have a strip along Highway 214 leading into Friona. This area gained absolutely nothing from the change, and the cost of local elections was tripled because now we have to have three voting boxes in Friona instead of one.

Mrs. Clayton having gained the endorsements of the Farwell candidates, appears that the current play is "let's wrest the judge's seat from Friona's control." That should make voters in the Friona area fighting mad.

I chatted with B.K. Buske a few days ago about the youth in our area and he was reminiscing about his days as a Chapter Farmer and Eagle Scout. He is vitally interested in promoting the youth programs such as 4-H, FFA, scouts, etc. Plus, he wants to further a "get tough" policy toward DWIs and drug offenders in this area.

I'd like to see folks in the Friona area stand together on this issue. The issue is putting the best qualified person in the office of County Judge. I think we'll be very sorry if we don't.

The 1990 football schedule for Friona High School has been completed.

## Board Okays Contracts

At the March 8 meeting of the board of trustees for Friona Independent School District, the board considered contracts of all personnel in the school district for the 1990-91 school term.

All of the teachers were re-hired except two who had submitted their resignations. These were Patsy Kingston, who has taught Early Childhood Education, and Kent Smith, science teacher and assistant coach in high school.

Otherwise, the board approved an order for the election, to be held on Saturday, May 5. Oneida Allen was appointed as absentee voting clerk. Absentee voting by personal appearance will be held at the Superintendent's office from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. from April 18 through May 1.

Kathryn Goddard, board president, certified that all board members have completed the basic amount of school board training required by the Texas Education Agency.

Superintendent Hal Ratcliff reported that school enrollment on February 28, 1990 stood at 1,307 students. This was an increase of 44 students over the enrollment of 1,263 on February 28, 1989.

The board approved the textbook recommendations given by the textbook committee.

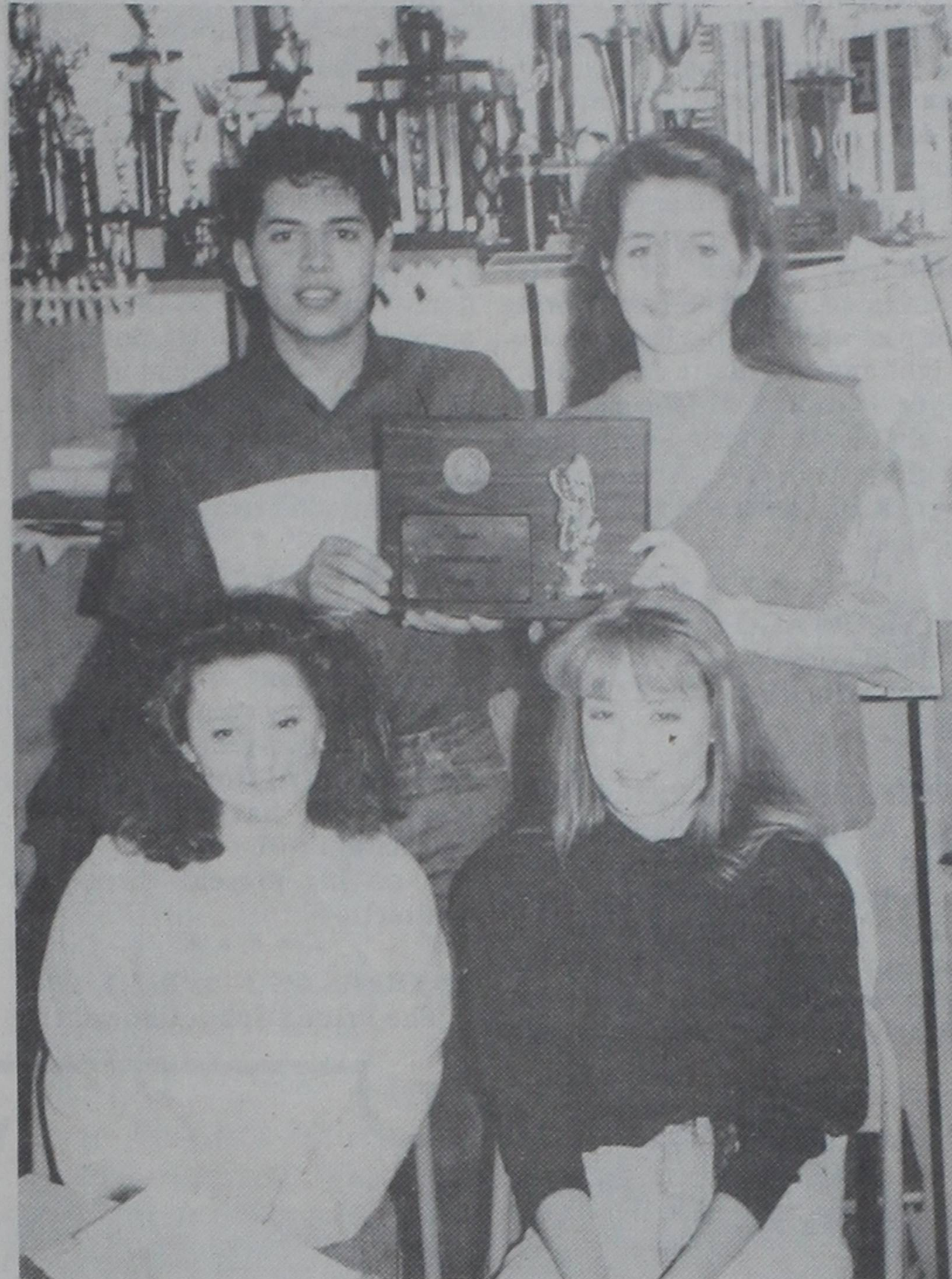
Superintendent Ratcliff reported on other routine matters to the board.

## Good Year Forecast By "Indian Crim"

In the Panhandle of Texas, some things are taken for granted. One of these things is the wind. Most people do not pay any attention to the direction the wind blows, they just know that it is going to blow.

But on March 22 of each year in the community of Lazbuddie, the direction of the wind is very important. That is the day Weldon "Indian" Crim makes his annual spring forecast. The "fire burning" is a vital ritual taken from an old Indian tradition in which the wind actually predicts the weather.

The "fire burning" occurs at sunrise on the 22nd, which is traditionally the first day after the start of spring. The wood is stacked in a teepee-type shape, and the direction in which the smoke travels predicts the weather for the coming season.

According to the year's wind, Crim predicts a "good" year for area farmers.

A good year is needed for the area because the last such prediction came in 1984. The past five years have all been in the "fair" to "poor" range.

This ritual began in the Crim family around 1910. Taylor Crim, Weldon's grandfather, picked up the tradition from the Indians near his home in Van Horn, Texas. He observed this when he was young, and when he settled down and began farming, Taylor began to use the ritual himself to predict the area's weather.

Taylor Crim died in 1937 and his only living son, J.W., carried on the family tradition. In 1983, three years after J.W.'s death, his youngest son, Weldon Crim, resumed the tradition.

Crim said, "My dad said the burnings were between eighty and ninety per cent correct. I would say it is around eighty per cent right," Weldon said.

## Daylight Time Begins Sunday

The time will change this Sunday, April 1.

Your clocks will need to be changed before you retire Saturday night as 2 a.m. is the official time to change.

Clocks will "spring forward" one hour for Daylight Savings Time.

The younger Crim held the burnings privately from the time of his father's death in 1980. It was not until 1983 that the tradition was publically re-established, due to part of the urging of many neighbors and local businesses.

Absentee voting for the April 10 runoff election will be held at the Clerk's office in Farwell April 2-6.

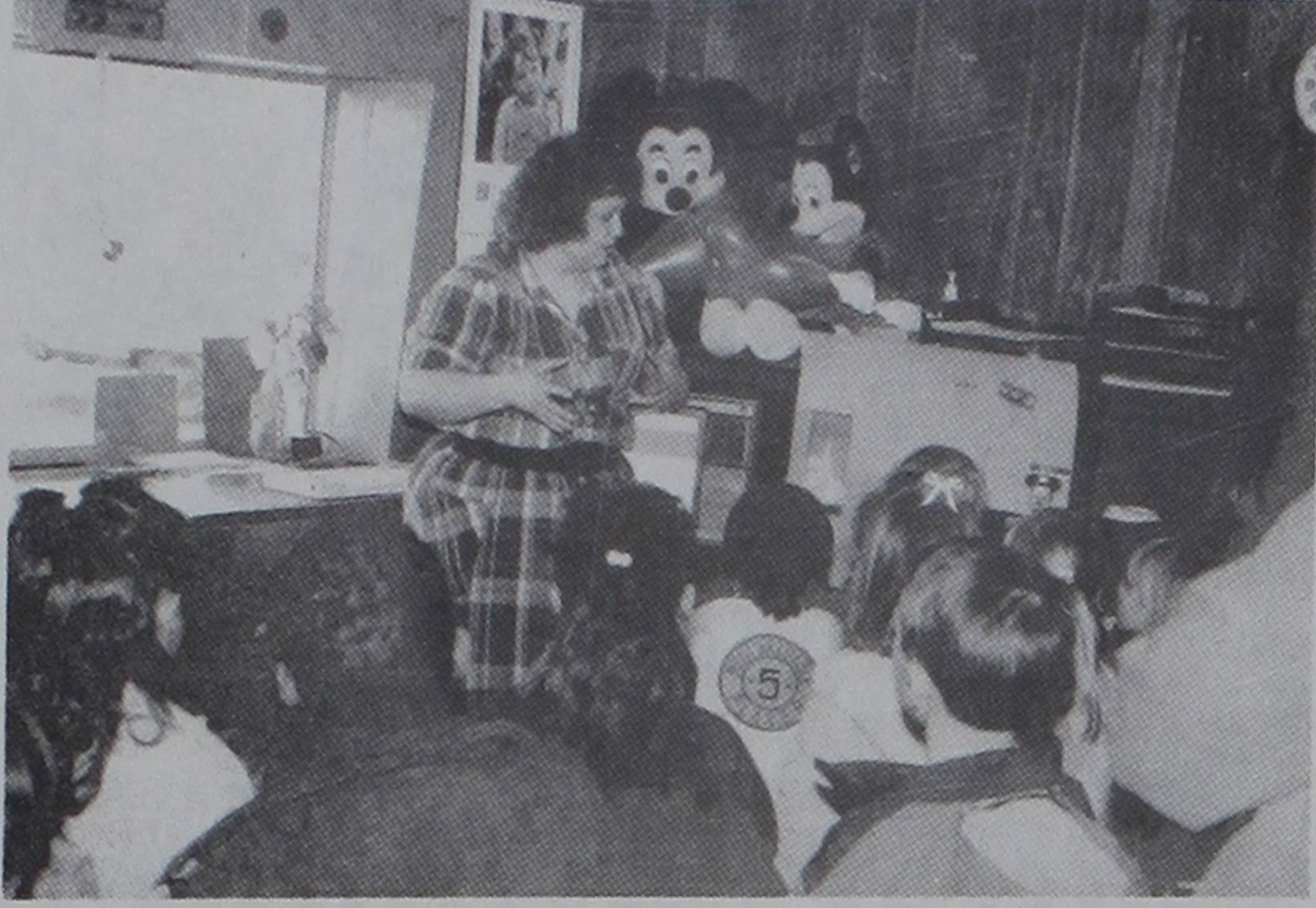
A special booth will be operated at Friona Federal Credit Union on Wednesday, April 4.

## FHS Team Takes Investment Victory

Daniel Fling of Shamrock High School and the Marketeers of Friona High School took the honors as individual and team victors in the second annual Investment Challenge stock market competition, sponsored by Shearson Lehman Hutton and the Amarillo Daily News.

The seven-week competition challenged students to invest \$100,000 in imaginary money in stocks listed in the NYSE, AMEX and NASDAQ exchange. Fling successfully invested his \$100,000 for a total of \$230,881 upon liquidation, and the Marketeers, consisting of Heather Griffin and Dave Reed, liquidated their investments for a team total of \$211,100. Teachers of the winning students were Tim Reynolds of Shamrock and Oscar Bronniman of Friona.

Friona High School also had the second-place entry in the team

In addition to the investment competition, students were invited to submit an essay chronicling their experience in the competition. Submitting the winning essay was Shalyn Lewis of Hillcrest Elementary School in Dumas, under the instruction of Genevieve Sheets. Both Lewis and Sheets will each receive two shares of Shearson Lehman Hutton stock. Lewis will also receive \$25 cash from the Amarillo Daily News for her winning entry.

Runners-up in the investment competition were Darin Morris of Tulia High School in the individual category, instructed by Dorothy Hulsey, and in the team category, the IV Bunch from Friona.

Competing for recognition only were team members McCurdy and Elderidge as "The Insiders" from Panhandle State University, who earned a team total of \$836,237.50. They were instructed by Diane Murphey.

Over 200 teams from the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles and Eastern New Mexico from 32 schools participated in the challenge. Over 175 students participated in the individual category.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

#### 60 YEARS AGO--APRIL 4, 1930

Occasionally indications of the progress and prosperity of the territory surrounding Friona at the present time appear in unexpected places, yet are the more welcome in that they help establish the fact that people are better contented throughout this region and are planning homes of greater convenience and comfort. During the past week, Blythe Bros., Delco-Light and Frigidaire distributors have installed nineteen Delco-Light plants in farm homes in the region they serve. Among these were R.P. Daniel and Hugh Lee of Friona.

#### 55 YEARS AGO--APRIL 5, 1935

In 1935, a one-year subscription to the Friona Star cost \$1.50 for a year.

#### 50 YEARS AGO--APRIL 5, 1940

F.A. Spring, who has succeeded Dan Ethridge in the insurance business here, moved his family here last Saturday, and is occupying the Kinsley house that was vacated by Mr. and Mrs. Ethridge, when they moved to

Lubbock. Spring will be in charge of the agency office, the name of which has been changed to The F.A. Spring Agency.

#### 45 YEARS AGO--APRIL 6, 1945

Owing to two wrecks that occurred on the Santa Fe Railroad on Thursday of last week, the mail service here was badly demoralized. One of the wrecks occurred west of Clovis, during the early part of the day, and the other occurred at Friona, just west of the stock pens, during the afternoon. No mail was received here Thursday and Friday.

#### 35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 31, 1955

Dillie M. Kelley was tendered contract for the position of Superintendent of Schools in Friona Monday evening. Kelley, in signing the two-year contract, will take over July 1 from Supt. Dalton Caffey who has submitted his resignation with two years still to run on his present three-year contract.

#### 25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 1, 1965

The Friona School Board this

week let a contract to Vibra-Whirl and Company of Panhandle on a bid of \$52,975 for the construction of a new football stadium at Friona High School. The bid figure will include the building of a permanent stadium on the west side of the proposed field, which will contain 1533 seats exclusive of aisle space.

#### 20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 2, 1970

Residents of Friona will be called upon for the second time to vote for or against a one-cent city sales tax this Saturday, as a highlight of the annual city and school elections. City Manager Jake Outland points out that in reality, the vote will give residents an opportunity to choose between a sales tax as a means of additional revenue, or the alternative of a raise in property tax.

#### 5 YEARS AGO--APRIL 7, 1985

Friona High School's UIL one-act play was tapped as a winner at the District 2-AAA competition last Saturday. "Amadeus" was chosen for area competition to be

held on April 5. Sheila Gresham was named "best actress," Brent Hinkle and Chuck Ellis were named to the district's all-star cast.

The Friona High School Band received first division ratings in both sight-reading and concert competition held recently.

A cold front moved in last Friday and by nightfall the driving conditions were hazardous with blowing snow and high winds. Temperatures dipped to the high 20s, with an even lower chill factor. The rain changed to blowing snow which measured about two inches in the Friona area.

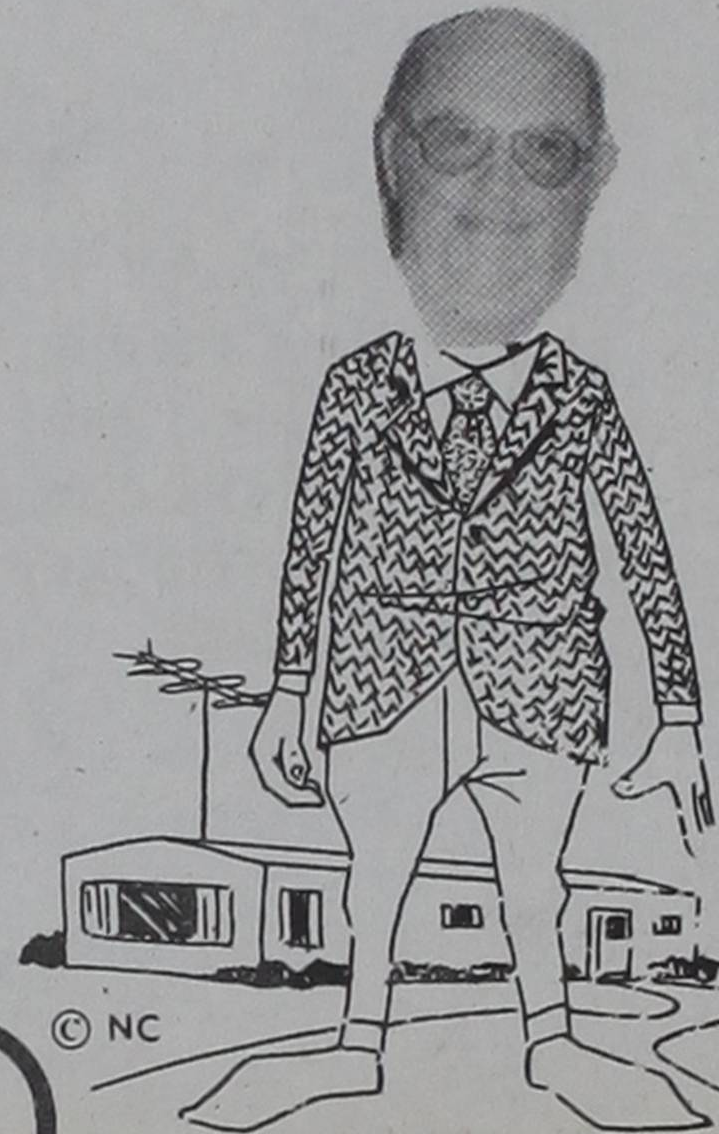

Principal Roy Willingham then explained the procedure for junior high and high school visitation. Bells were to be rung at thirteen-minute intervals, and parents were invited to follow their students' class schedules from room to room, remaining in each classroom about ten minutes.

In this way, parents gained an idea of what a typical school day is like for their child. During the ten minutes in each class, parents heard from teachers a brief description of the goals and accomplishments of the course.

Module XV: Understand Preferred Stocks Before You Invest

Some investors incorrectly identify preferred stocks with fixed-income debt investments such as bonds. Although preferred stocks carry more income predictability, they're still equity investments whose worth, and often dividends, rise and fall with the success of the company.

Generally, preferred stock pays a fixed dividend. For example, unless there's a written provision to the contrary, a \$3.50 preferred stock pays a \$3.50 dividend each year and cannot be increased regardless of the company's earnings.

On the other hand, if economics dictate, the board of directors can choose to pay no dividends to preferred holders. Whether or not the shareholder eventually receives these passed dividends depends upon the type of preferred stock. With a cumulative preferred stock, passed dividends are accumulated and must be paid to preferred stockholders before dividends are paid to the holders of common stock. On the other hand, a passed dividend on noncumulative preferred stock is generally gone forever. As you can see, if income

is important in your investment plan, complete understanding of the type of preferred stock you own is essential.

For investors who like the equity benefits of stocks, there's participating preferred stock. Participating preferred stock entitles its holders, like the holders of common stock, to share in profits above and beyond the regular declared dividend.

Another, but not as common, preferred stock is adjustable-rate preferred stock. This unique preferred stock pays a dividend that's adjusted, usually quarterly, to the Treasury-bill rate or other money-market rates.

Finally, there's a convertible preferred stock that's exchangeable into a given number of common-stock shares, usually at a predetermined price. Since this preferred stock is directly associated with common stock, it's more volatile in market price than the nonconvertible preferred stock, which behaves more like a fixed-income bond.

If your only reason for owning preferred stock is safety of principal and current income, perhaps you should consider alternative investments.

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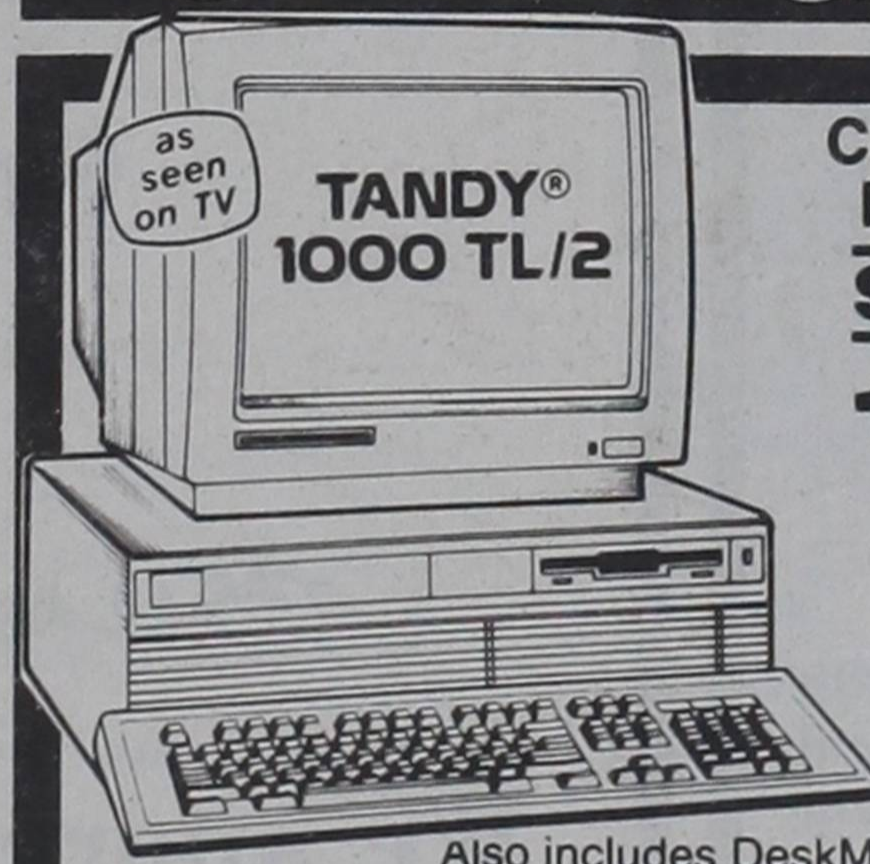
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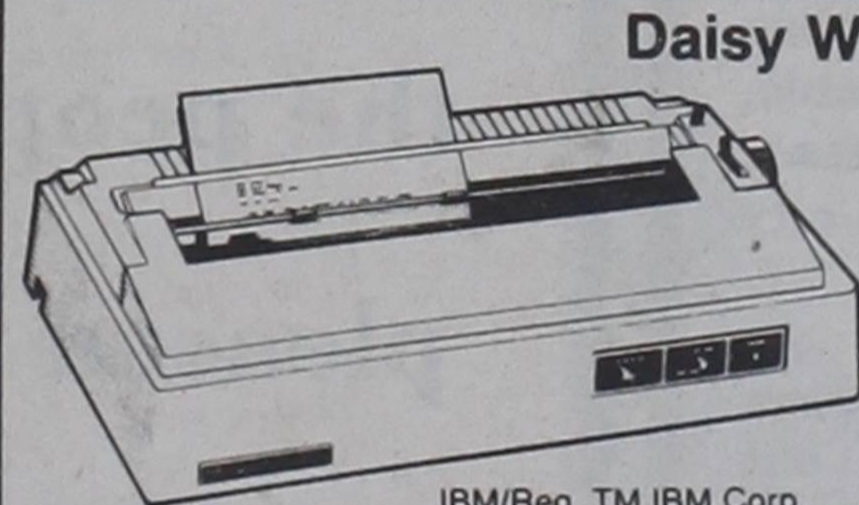
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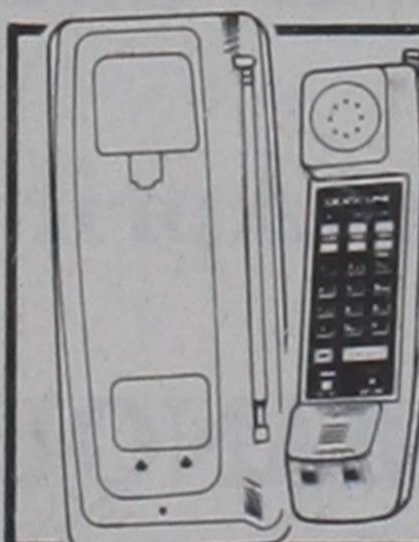
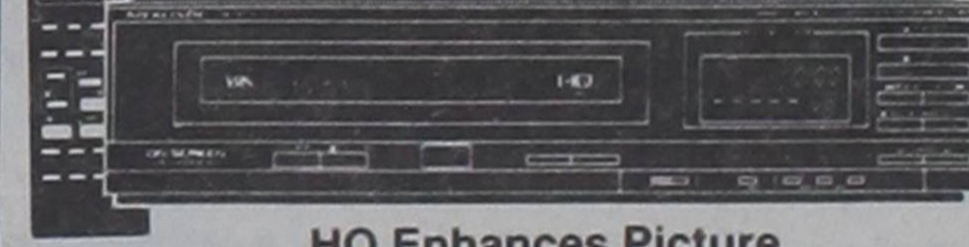
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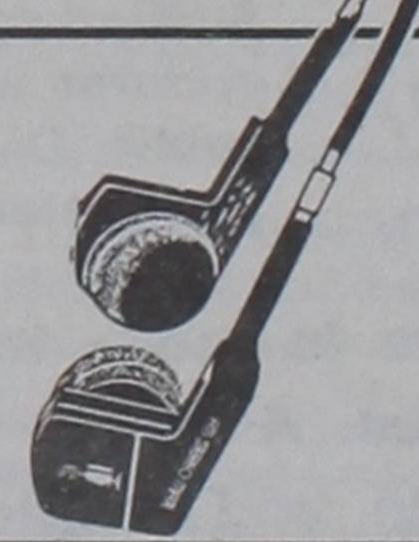


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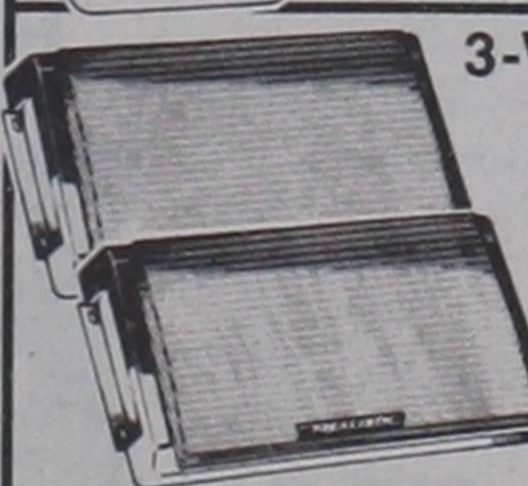


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# Town Talk

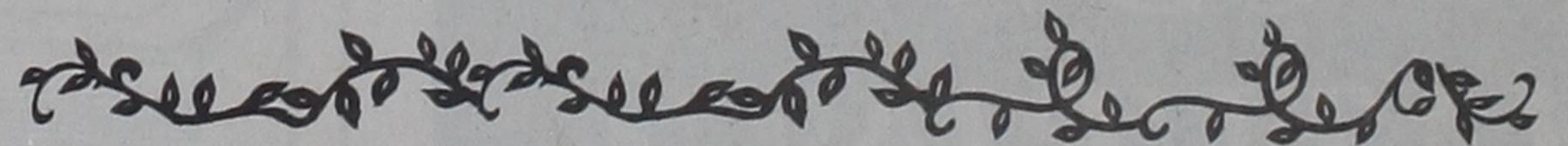

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**NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE**

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

This award is a prestigious honor very few students can ever hope to attain. In fact, the Academy recognizes less than 10% of all American high school students.

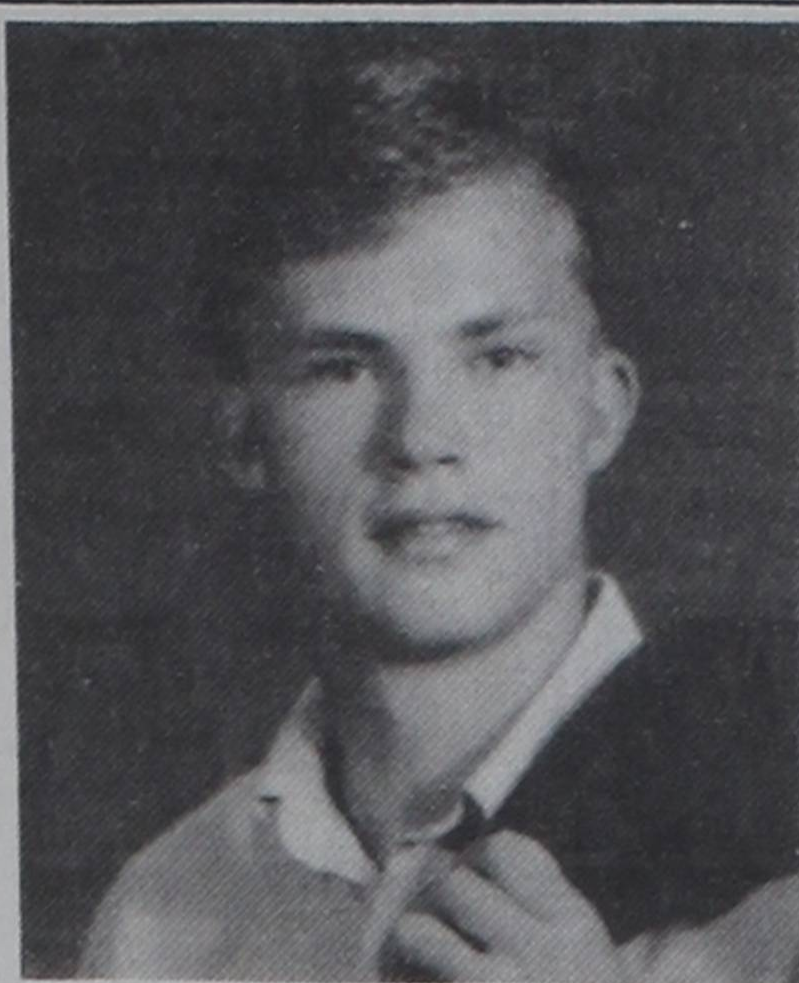
Procter, who attends Friona High School, was nominated for this national award by Benny Pryor, his Vo-Ag instructor.

Since this is membership month, anyone may attend this concert even if they are not currently members of the concert association, by registering at the door.

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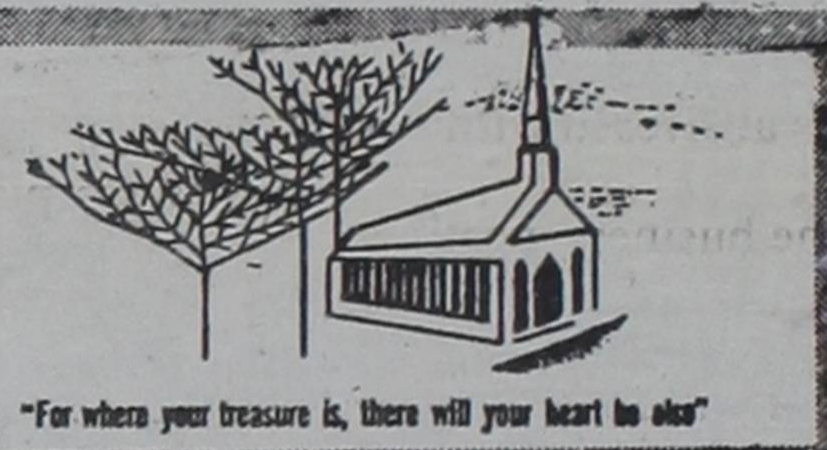
