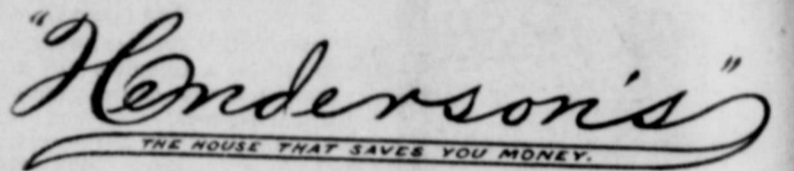

POLICE CLEAN-UP FORTWORTHACRE IS IN FULL SWING

ORDERS ISSUED TO ARREST ALL LOAFERS CAUGHT HANGING AROUND THE SALOONS.

EIGHTEEN BAGGED THE FIRST DRAG

Capt. Blanton Receives Letter Threatening All Kinds of Things If He Insists on Making Raids in Red Light District.

Fort Worth, Aug. 29.—Following the receipt of a letter by Capt. Blanton in which the threat is made that Capt. Blanton and Capt. Bills, Patrolmen Wallace, Jones and Haynie and Detective Williams will be killed in the same manner as was Patrolman Campbell, orders were issued to the police at roll call to get busy and clean out the "acre." As a result the dragnet was thrown out and eighteen arrests on charges of vagrancy were made before noon. In every case orders were issued that only gilt-edge bonds should be received. The letter was delivered to Capt. Blanton. It says: "Capt. Blanton, just a few words to you and Bills, Wallace, Williams, Haynie, Jones, in fact, all you bluecoats. You may lafe at this but we will get all and all at once and when you are not lookin, just like Campbell got his. That is all I will

say now." The letter is signed with a skull and crossbones and the word "hell" printed.

On the reverse side of the sheet of paper is written: "I have been in jail all rite but I am not now and the next time it will be for sumthan. So no more. You will find it all out sum day."

Captain Blanton declared that he was not alarmed by the letter and stated that the orders for a cleanup were not due to it.

Assistant Chief Parsley denied that any special orders had been issued to drive out the bums and thugs from the "acre," declaring that the numerous arrests were simply due to the officers performing their duty without any special instructions.

Commissioner Maddox also denied that any special orders had been given to clean up the "acre." He said that the officers had only been told to do their full duty and that the many arrests could not be taken as an indication that a special crusade was being waged.

However, it is known that at roll call a lengthy lecture was delivered to all the patrolmen. They were told to arrest every man found loitering in the "acre" and to arrest them every day until they either secured work or left the city.

Commissioner Maddox stated that the letter received by Capt. Blanton did not seriously alarm him. "I have received a basket full of them," he said, "and I have never yet been hurt. It looks to me very much like the work of a nigger and it doesn't alarm me at all."

Those arrested on charges of vagrancy gave the names of John Stokes, Ray Smith, J. Williams, F. G. Henree, Tom Miller, J. W. Huckaby, D. W. Balleau, Israel Balleau, Alonzo Gilman, M. C. Alford, Sam Steele, W. C. Davidson, John Campbell, Nick Harrison, J. E. Medley, Tom Coleman and Pink Henderson.

Patrolmen Wallace, Aiken and Turner and Detective Jackson, led by Captain Blanton, made the arrests.

They visited every saloon and resort in the district, arresting every man not working and issuing orders to saloon keepers that the loitering of bums and thugs around their places would not be tolerated.

Refuse Pagitt's Offer. Superintendent O. Pagitt, head of the law enforcement bureau of the Texas Brewers' association, tendered his services to the police department in assisting to clean out the dives in the "acre." His services were refused, the

officers declaring that they could regulate the saloons here without any outside aid.

Assistant Chief of Police Parsley stated that he had never heard of Capt. Pagitt until he tendered his assistance to him. Parsley declared that his offer had been refused because the police could enforce the law without his aid.

Capt. Blanton, who was in conference with Capt. Pagitt, when asked concerning his visit, said: "I believe that Pagitt is chief of detectives of the brewers of something like that. We don't need his services here. If we can't enforce the law without his help we will go out of business."

Commissioner Maddox said that Capt. Pagitt has done good work in the state in driving out the dives. "He is at the head of the law enforcement department of the state brewers," he said, "and he enforces the law. He is absolutely on the square and when he goes after the keeper of a low dive he usually gets his man. I believe that he offered his services to the Fort Worth police, but I do not know whether they were accepted or not."
