"MY TURN"

THERE ARE FLAWS in any system of government. In theory, communism sounds pretty nice. This form of government advocates common ownership and sharing of all means of producing goods, with the government owning and "equally" distributing all property, industry and wealth. Unfortunately, it simply doesn't work.

Christians have long been great advocates of kindness and sharing with one another. Did you know that various Christian sects have tried experiments in communistic "common ownership" since the Middle Ages?

In the 19th century in Europe and the U.S., groups such as the Mennonites and Shakers were founded on a practice of common ownership of property.

But for the past 70 years, we have had the classic example of Russian government as they have slaughtered, starved and imprisoned tens of millions of their own people in an attempt to make communism effective. It has failed, as other state-run Utopias such as Fascism and Nazism have failed before them.

The American plan of democratic capitalism, with all its flaws, has worked pretty well for us for the past 214 years. Private ownership, free markets and the individual desire to improve one's lot in life may sound rather selfish, but somehow it works.

Most of us get up every morning and go to work in order to earn money to purchase goods and services for our own families.

The rancher who raises cattle doesn't waste time wondering if the Ellis family is going to be able to enjoy a hamburger cookout on their barbecue grill this weekend. He just wants his price for his beef.

The fellow out at EXCEL who slices and boxes the beef doesn't worry about the Ellis family's hamburger dinner either. He just wants to draw his paycheck. And so it goes.

Russian folks, now that they are rapidly shedding the yoke of communism, would probably enjoy this sort of capitalistic selfishness like a duck takes to water. But what about the poor folks, you ask. Well, there have always been the "haves" and the "have-nots" in any system. The have-nots spend a lot of time working hard to have-a-little. There is a much better chance of the have-nots being able to improve their lot in life under capitalism.

For instance, Henry Ford's descendants are probably still reaping monetary benefits from those Model As which came off that first assembly line a little more than 70 years ago. Prior to that, only the very wealthy were able to afford automobiles.

Mass production of a less expensive auto made Ford a very wealthy man, but look at what he did for the rest of us. Today, one out of every seven people employed in the U.S. owe their jobs directly or indirectly to the automobile.

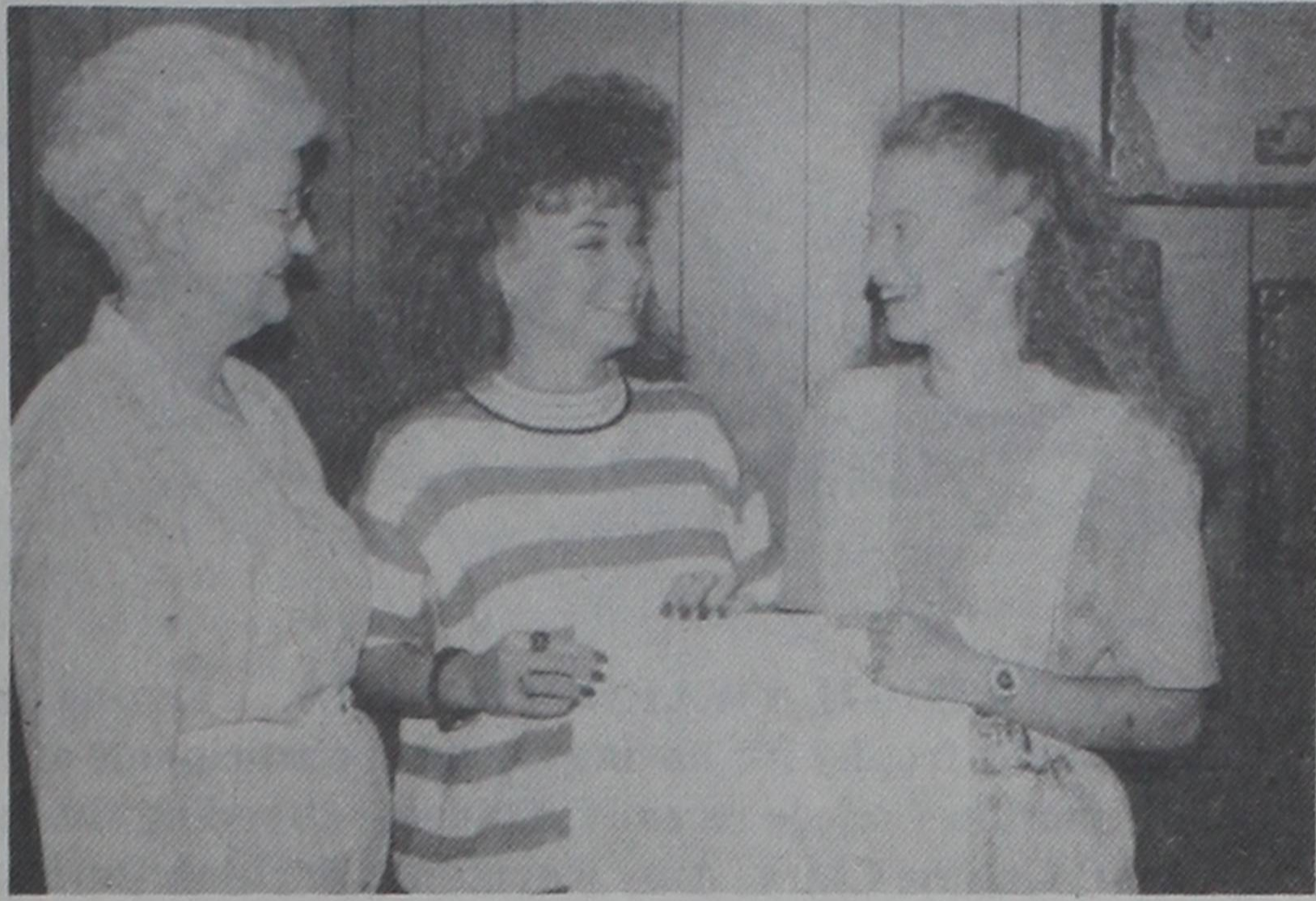
Wealthy people could always afford to have someone keep their clothes clean, but automatic washers in every home have enabled common folks to enjoy clean clothes, too.

The wealthy were always able to attend performances or employ private entertainment. Professional entertainers and sports figures nowadays are becoming wealthy, but through movies, radio and television they allow us poor folks to enjoy entertainment, too.

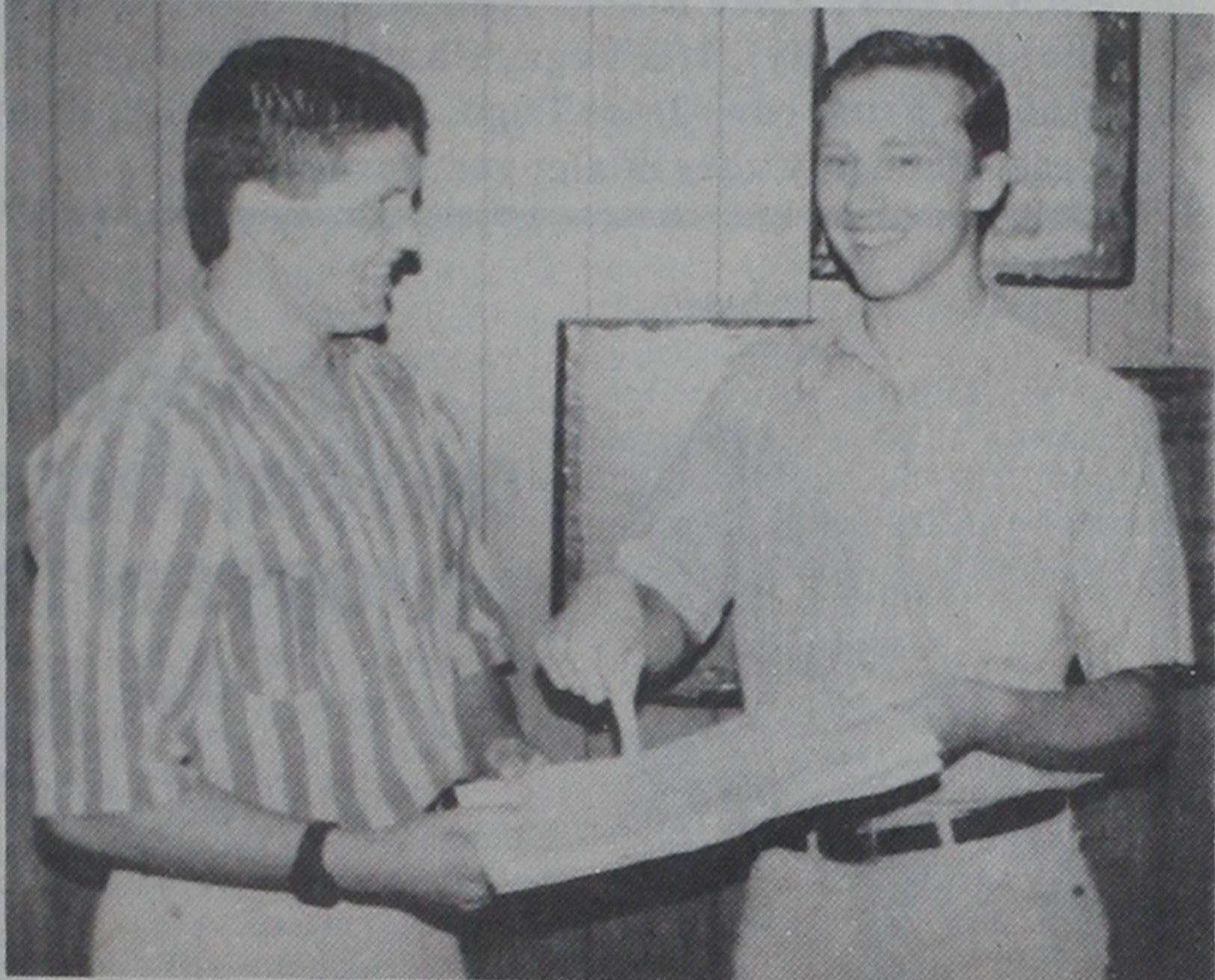

Ex-Resident Wins Cow-Cutting Event

The son of the late Verner Lee "Shorty" Reece of Friona and Amarillo's Treva Drake Reece and grandson of the late A.O. Drakes, Bailey Reece of Spur, Texas, won \$1,318.56 in one of the largest cow-cutting competitions ever sponsored by the Caprock Cutting Horse Association.

Hosted by Friona's PACO Feed Yard, Inc., which is managed by Wayne Tunnell, the cutting attracted over 100 horses and riders and four "cutting mules," whose ears showed tremendous "expression," as they say in the national Cutting Horse Assn. rule book.

Reece, who is General Manager and CEO of Dickens Electric Cooperative in Spur, rode Smoken Lena Bar, a six-year-old gelding, to capture first place in a non-professional class, second place in another, and placed in still one other class.

A special "sweepstakes" type event was then held for all first place winners in each of the 11 classes, sponsored by PACO Feed Yard, offering \$1,080 in prize money.

Reece's score of 71 swept him to victory over the ten other competitors. He performed in the face of dust devils and eventually encroaching dusk, which

threatened to eclipse Reece's vision. Reece, 57, began cutting only four years ago. He attended Friona Grade School until 1945, then graduated from Adrian High School in 1950.

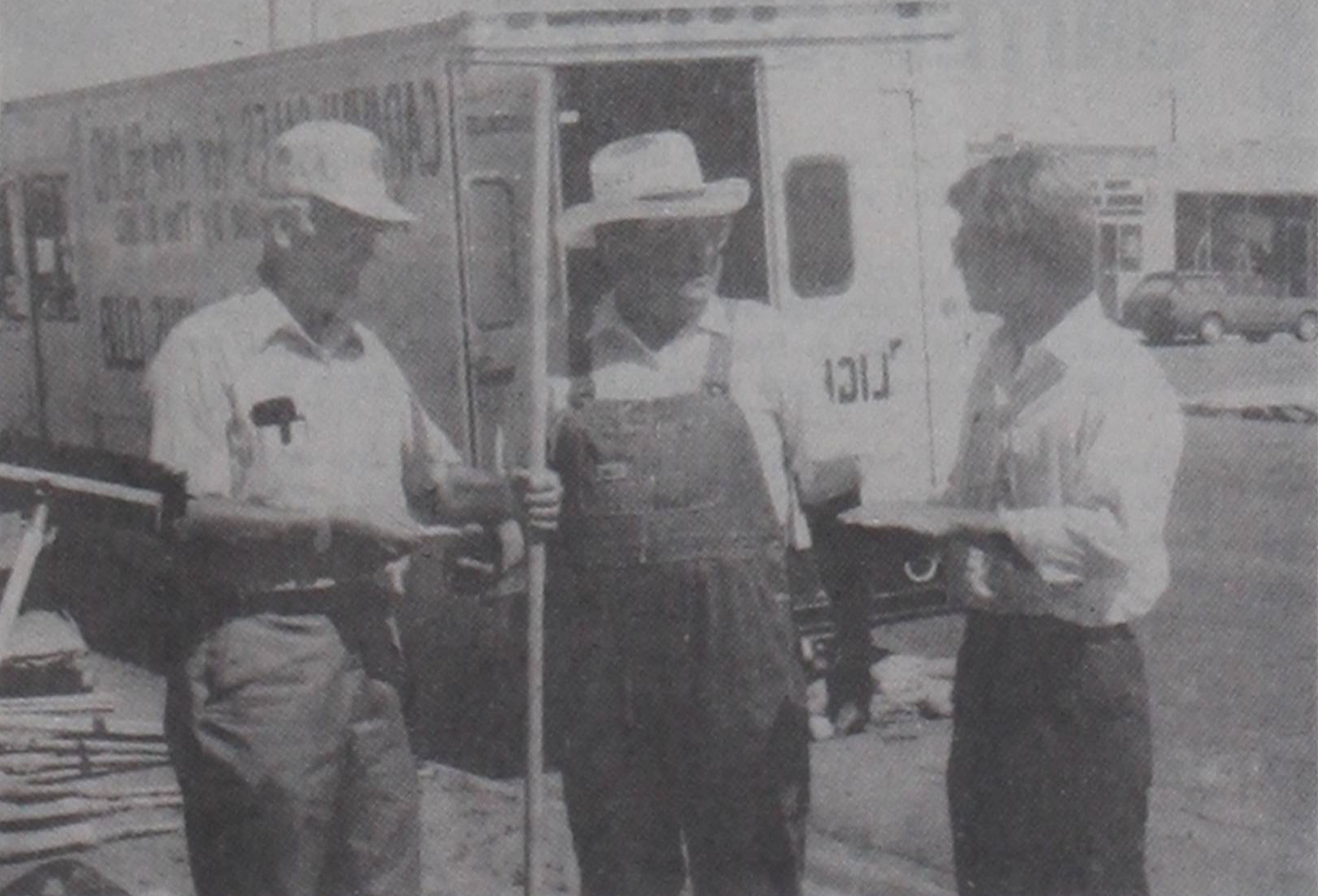
Reece spent two years in the U.S. Navy before receiving his degree in Agriculture and Business Management from West Texas State University, Canyon.

Reece's wife, Houstene Pritchard of Canyon, also is a cutter. The Reeces have two daughters, one son and four granddaughters.

"Cutting is a sport whose heritage is rooted in the oldest traditions of American ranching," said Reece. "It was born here in West Texas."

Reece's father, "Shorty," told him "he remembered the days when he could ride from Friona north to the Canadian River and never strike a fence. He viewed grass that would reach a horse's belly," reminiscent of the old open range traditions of Texas.

Boys, Girls State Delegates Selected

The Friona American Legion is sponsoring two young men to the American Legion Boys State at the University of Texas in Austin from June 6-12, and the Auxiliary is sponsoring two young ladies to Bluebonnet Girls State at Lutheran College, Seguin, June 12-22.

These young people will fly by American Air Lines to their destinations.

Boys State delegates are Wes Drake, son of Owen and Melody Drake and Wade Procter, son of Dewayne and Cheryl Procter.

Girls State delegates are Holly Grimsley, daughter of Jimmy Grimsley and Amy Israel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Israel.

They are delegates when they attend and become citizens when they return.

The Boys State and Girls State programs are companion programs but are held separately. This is the study of state government by setting up a 51st mythical state. These young people are all juniors in their schools and have never attended these programs.

They will set up their own city government, county officials and state officials just as the true government of the State of Texas exists today. This is truly a learning experience by actually doing the work of the state.

"After completing this work they will be better equipped to become voting citizens of our state," says Geneva Williams, the Girls State chairman. "All of these young people will become eligible to vote on their eighteenth birthday and this experience will make them more knowledgeable about state government."

The Boys State program lasts one week but the Girls State program is for ten days. Both groups will go to the state capitol and the state officers will be seated in the chairs of their offices.

They will have the privilege of seeing how the government works and hear some of the most noted speakers in our state. Two delegates will be selected to attend Boys Nation and Girls Nation in Washington, D.C.

This will involve setting up a "national" government and

learning the operations of our national government.

Only junior students are eligible to attend Boys and Girls State and this puts all the delegates on the same level, says the Boys State chairman.

Junior counselors are selected from this group of delegates to return to the next session to work with the new delegates to Boys and Girls State. This is indeed an honor. A former citizen of Boys State, Shane Woodard, has been working with Boys State since he attended Boys State and is now working in State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office in Austin. "We are proud of Shane and his accomplishments," says the Boys State chairman.

Hwy 60 Widening Bid Given

Gilvin-Terrill, Inc., Amarillo, was awarded the contract for the widening of U.S. Highway 60 from Friona to Summerfield, it was announced this week by the State Department of Highways and Transportation.

The low bid on the project was \$10,625,378.30. Rhea Bradley of Littlefield said his engineer's estimate had been \$10,710,843.65.

"We were very satisfied with the bids," Bradley said.

Tentative starting date on the project is July 9. The contractor is presently assembling his materials. A pre-construction meeting will be held in Friona in late June.

Jason Brown is the music leader for the youth-led revival team. A native of Tucker, Georgia, he also attends Dallas Baptist University, where he is a religion major.

John Loring is the youth leader for the team. From Lawton, Oklahoma, he is a religion major at Baylor University.

D. Lumbrera Still Held On Charges

Diana Lumbrera is still being held in Garden City, Kansas in lieu of \$50,000 bond on a charge of first-degree murder of one of her six children who have died. This is not the only death being investigated.

Another five of the woman's children and one she was baby-sitting have died in Parmer and Castro counties since 1976. There were four deaths in Bovina and two in Dimmitt.

Parmer County law enforcement officers and Castro County investigators have joined the Garden City police in the investigation. The Texas Rangers have also been brought in.

Report was that Ms. Lumbrera took her dead son, Jose Antonio, four years old, to the emergency room at a Garden City Hospital on May 1. Medics tried to revive him but were not successful. An autopsy indicated that the cause of death was by "asphyxia due to smothering."

Diana was arrested on May 5 and formally charged with the little boy's death on May 7. An autopsy ruled that the death was of natural causes. The charge in the death was not changed, however.

Lumbrera's first baby died at the age of three months; the second one at fourteen months old; one died at three years old; another died at two years old; a little boy died at five and one-half months; and a six-week-old baby died that she was baby-sitting.

Police investigators have turned up evidence that there were three life insurance policies but it was not thought there was a connection to the deaths.

Anyone who has any information pertaining to the investigation is urged to contact the sheriff's office in Parmer County or Castro County.

60 YEARS AGO--MAY 16, 1930

At about four o'clock Sunday morning three masked men made their appearance at the front of the Friona Consumers Oil Company filling station and with their pistols staring the attendants in the face, bade them stick up their hands and keep them up, while they rifled the cash drawer of its contents to the amount of between forty and fifty dollars. No evidence of the identity of these has yet been found out.

55 YEARS AGO--MAY 10, 1935

Forty-one seniors will graduate in exercises beginning Sunday morning. The number is the largest graduating class that Friona has ever had. Commencement will be Friday evening, May 17, at 8 p.m.

45 YEARS AGO--MAY 11, 1945

Wayne B. Stark, formerly Santa Fe station agent at Friona and agent at Black for several months, has returned to Friona, and again taken charge of the local depot as agent. Mr. Stark's many Friona friends are truly pleased to have him here to serve them again, and he expresses his pleasure at being back.

35 YEARS AGO--MAY 13, 1955

Latest business to open in Friona is the Tasty Cream firm across from Friona Consumers on Main Street. Owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Williams, the business opened last weekend and plans are to remain open from 10 a.m. until 10 p.m. each day.

30 YEARS AGO--MAY 12, 1960

With all the "Chamber of Commerce" figures going down the drain in the three towns in Parmer County, official reports from the district census director's office in Amarillo, revealed that the total county population in Parmer County are as follows: Friona,

2,035; Bovina, 1,023; and Farwell, 1,009. The figures are said "subject to revision."

25 YEARS AGO--MAY 13, 1965

The Friona City Council annexed a total of 52 acres of land in its meeting Monday night, bringing in two new subdivisions. The newly annexed land is comprised of Western Addition, of which 24 acres were annexed, and Welch Acres, a 28-acre plot, belonging to Nelson Welch.

20 YEARS AGO--MAY 14, 1970

Norman (Skip) Mohr, Friona High School senior, returned from Austin last Saturday with the first place plaque and medal in informative speaking in Class AA. Mohr has been district champ in the event three straight years. It also was his second trip to Austin, having won regional as a sophomore, and placing third in the state meet that year. The son of Rev. and Mrs. Paul Mohr, Skip's honor adds to an already impressive list of achievements, including class valedictorian.

15 YEARS AGO--MAY 11, 1975

Mrs. E.D. Matlock of Friona received the title of "Pioneer Woman of the Plains" for 1975 at the Pioneer Roundup in Plainview last weekend.

The Friona High School Band learned this week that it had been selected as the Outstanding Sight-reading Band at the Greater Southwest Music Festival held in Amarillo, April 24-26.

10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 1, 1980

A vicious storm system moved across Parmer County Wednesday afternoon, May 28, depositing rain and up to tennis ball-sized hail, leaving considerable damage behind in a strip a couple of miles wide, running mainly north of

Highway 86 across the entire county.

Jim Dixon of Friona was among a group who climbed the third and fifth-highest mountains in North America earlier this year. Pico de Orizaba, 18,851 feet tall, and Popocatepetl, 17,887 feet tall, both in Mexico, were scaled by the group.

5 YEARS AGO--MAY 26, 1985

Delegates Attending Conference

More than 1,000 United Methodists will gather in Midland June 4-6 for the 81st Session of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference, to be held at First United Methodist Church, 305 N. Baird.

The event, an annual meeting of

clergy and elected lay delegates from United Methodist congregations, is the official business and policy-making session for the denomination in the Northwest Texas area.

Delegates from Friona will be Lois Norwood, Hal Ratcliff and Ted White. Gene Ezell and Durward Bell are delegates from Bovina, and Glenn and Barbara Lust are delegates from Lazbuddie.

Highlights of the annual conference will include a State of the Church address at 7 p.m. June 4 by Bishop Louis W. Schowengerdt, area bishop of the Northwest Texas/New Mexico area since 1980. The giving and

receiving of new pastoral appointments for 1990-91 will also take place during the evening worship service.

A total of ten men and women--five Deacons and five Elders--will be ordained during the Service of Ordination at 7:30 p.m. June 6 in the sanctuary of the church.

Featured preacher will be Bishop Ole Borgen, former United Methodist bishop of the Northern Europe area (Denmark, Finland, Norway, Sweden and Estonia) and current guest faculty member of Asbury Theological Seminary in Willmore, Kentucky.

The author of numerous articles, Bishop Borgen is a noted authority on John Wesley, the

founder of Methodism, and Methodist history. He has two books to his credit: "John Wesley on the Sacraments: A Theological Study," and "John Wesley: An Autobiographical Sketch of the Man and His Thought."

The annual conference will begin at 2 p.m. on Monday, June 4 and will conclude with the Service of Ordination at 7:30 p.m. June 6.

The Northwest Texas Annual Conference is composed of 242 local churches, divided geographically into seven districts: Abilene, Amarillo, Big Spring, Lubbock, Pampa, Plainview and Seymour. There are 80,469 members of the denomination within the conference.

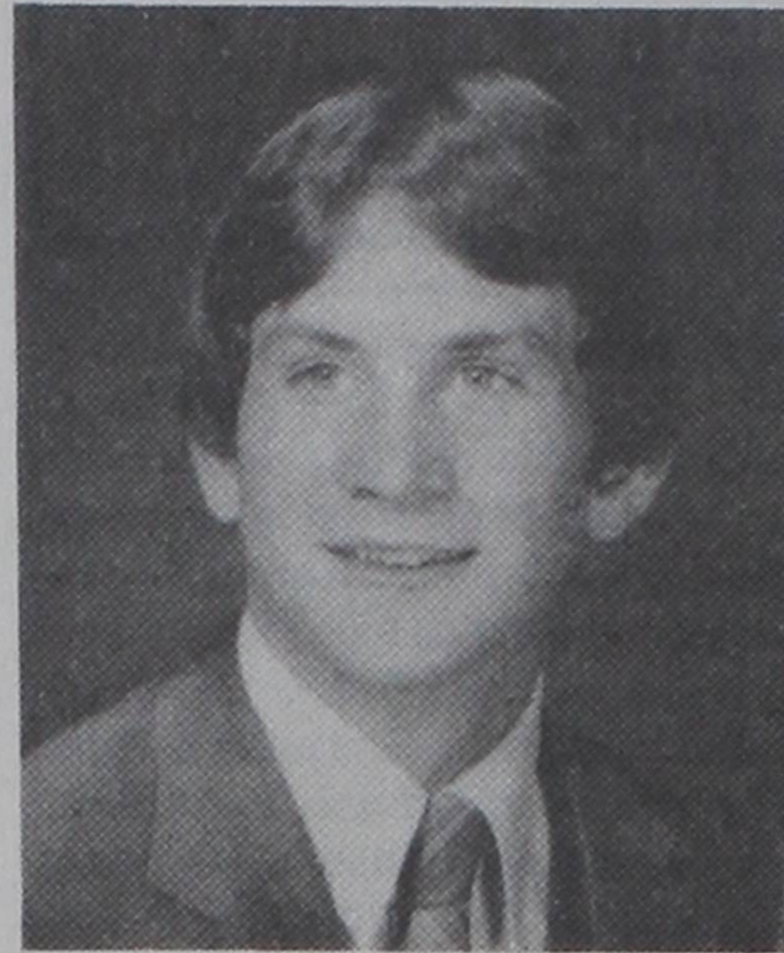
Tarter grew up on his family's hog and row crop farming

Investments Are Not Made In Heaven

Would the blessing of Moses persuade you to invest in an oil and gas deal?

According to a survey by the North American Securities Administrator's Association and the Council of Better Business Bureaus, just such a scheme, promoted on religious radio stations, made millions for swindlers.

Financial Services Week reported the scam this way: Deuteronomy 33:24 said that Moses promised the tribe of Asher, "the feet of the people will be bathed in oil." The promoters told investors that the drilling would be in the area allotted by the prophet Joshua to the tribe of Asher.

According to the NASAA and BBB, some 15,000 Americans each year are victims of such schemes.

State security regulators say these religion-based frauds are increasing. Because of religious implication, many investors fail to exercise the basic caution they normally would in evaluating an investment. Some victims have even confessed to a feeling of comfort in seeing a Bible verse at the end of their monthly

statement.

Financial Services Week cites the state of Utah as an example. A state task force, established to investigate and uncover religious investment fraud, found that more than 10,000 Utah investors lost an estimated \$215 million in the mid-1980s. The Utah Security Division tightened state regulations, but victims of the swindlers may never recoup their losses.

This is not to suggest that legitimate fund raising for established churches should be suspect. The warning of the NASAA and BBB is against self-proclaimed "Christian" financial planners. States are attempting to tighten their security regulations, but enforcement is often difficult.

The only way to protect yourself against these religious schemes is to scrutinize all security salespeople, whether from a religious group or an investment firm, with equal intensity. Religion-based investments and their promoters are regulated by the same laws that apply to any other investment or salesperson. Don't let anyone convince you otherwise.

Marriage may be made in heaven, but investments are born here on earth.
