Secretary of State Dickinson Claims That Fee Should Be No Less

Trenton, Nov. 9 .- Application was made before the second branch of the supreme court today by former Attorney General R. H. Carter for a peremptory writ of mandamus compelling Secretary of State Samuel Dickinson to issue a certificate of authority to the Texas Company to do business in New Jersey, up on the payment of the usual fee of \$10 for OPPOSED TO PRIVATE TESTIMO.

Dickinson insists that the Texas Company is a Texas corporation and having a capital stock of twelve mil lions, should pay \$12,040 to do business here. That is the amount Texas would charge a similar corporation from this state for a certificate.

TANK EXPLOSION.

FLAMES QUICKLY SPREAD

Estimated That Loss Will Be Over Half Million-Much Crude Oil Desroyed.

Beaumont, Texas, Nov. 9 .- Destroying an enormous amount of oil and resulting in the loss of many thous ands of dollars, a fire, caused by bolt of lightning, is raging in the oil

Yesterday during an electrical storm a bolt of lightning struck a tank and set fire to the Gulf Refining company's 55,000 barrel tank of naptha near Port Arthur. Another bolt hit also devoid of anything sensational. and set fire to nine oil tanks belonging to the Texas company near Beaumont. The loss will go over a half million dollars, and thousands of barrels of crude oil will be destroyed.

No attempt has been made to stop the fire, as nothing can check it. Many explosions have resulted.

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STRANGE REVELATIONS.

The most startling information that has yet come from the investigation of the affairs of the state penitentiary system now in progress, beyond doubt is the testimony of Assistant Financial Agent Guinn and ex-Financial Agent J. W. Wright, relative to the financial methods of the system.

The testimony of Mr. Guinn was to the effect that in October, 1907, he could not get money to meet his payroll from the financial agent, and that notwithstanding the fact the payroll was due and payable on November 15, it was December before the funds were forthcoming.

Now then, follow the correllated tes timony. In October, 1907, Financial Agent Wright, who at that time was president of the Citizens National lank of Tyler, drew from the state treesury \$45,000 in money. At the t'me this money was drawn from the state treasury the financial atmosphere was murky with stressfulness Unfortunately no complete reports have yet come to the public showing the peringrinations of this \$45,000 from the time it left the state treaspry until it was disbursed. It was in the sole charge of Mr. Wright. Mr. Wright was president of the Citizens National Bank of Tyler. Gov. Thomas M. Campbell owned then and perhaps now owns \$15,000 of the capital stock of that bank.

During the first part of November. 1907, money was tighter than a drum head. For about three weeks actual eash was a commodity so scarce that it was almost a novelty. Yet \$45,000 was available for use by the financial agent of the state penitentiaries and the financial agent was president of a bank in which the governor of the state of Texas owned \$15,000 worth of stock, carrying with it, of course, a corresponding ownership in its other

This is but one strange fact that has been developed. The other is the manner that smacks strongly almost of a public scandal in which the iron industry and the state railroad got entangled. It would appear from the published testimony that the iron industry was mulcted of its funds that the state railroad could be constructed. Fort Worth, Nov. 6 .- The constitutionality of congregating forsaken precincts in Cooke county for the purpose of holding local option elections will be tested in a suit filed here this afternoon in the court of civil appeals by the prohibitionists of Gainesville against William Schwarz.

This is the renewal of a fight that started in Cooke county about six years ago. The prohibitionists have been setting aside certain parts of the county in precincts, by this method gradually sewing up the county in local option. At one time about six years ago seven of these precincts voted dry. Following the election the court of criminal appeals held that the combination of these precincts for election purposes was unconstitutional. On the other hand the Texas supreme court recently ruled adversely in a similar case.

As a result of this latter decision the Gainesville suit has been filed, and the matter is now to be threshed out.





The method if operating the invention is simple. Inside a small glasstopped desk are fitted a pair of tiny batteries, together with a rheostat. condenser, and resistances, through which a powerful electric current is nduced. . The circuit is closed by what appears to an ordinary stylographic pen attached to the desk by a piece of ordinary insulated eleteric wire.

The check or other document to be written upon is placed upon an alumnum plate affixed to the glass top of the desk, and is written upon in the fusilade of tiny electric sparks passes from the pen through the paper to complete the circuit inside the desk. Thus there is burnt a continuous series of almost imperceptible perforations in the track followed by the pen. Each hole is carbonized by the process, and to alter the order of the markings is impossible.

In fact, the earth where original wealth is found, and manufacturing, that transforms raw materials into merchantable commodities, are the only two wealth producing sources in this section. If we would attain our marifest destiny we have got to make the necessary investigation to bring forth the true possibilities of this section, and once let us get our land settled with a working people, San Angelo will be in the center of a million people, none of whom will live more than 75 miles from here in less than ten years. We can do.it. Will we?'


