I THINK OF HIM each year around Father's Day. I had the perfect father. He was a gentleman and a gentle man.

I don't know where he learned his impeccable manners. He took his hat off in elevators, stood when a lady entered the room, always walked on the street side and took hold of your elbow when crossing the street. Men don't have manners like that anymore.

He was as at home in the kitchen as he was in the garden. He could grow anything and he could throw together a dandy breakfast.

He was the middle one of nine children born on a farm located on the border between Marion Co., Arkansas and Taney Co., Missouri. The big old Stone farm house is now located at the bottom of Bull Shoals Lake in the beautiful Ozarks.

He didn't approve of smoking, drinking or gambling and anyone who did those things could not reside at his house. Playing cards were frowned upon as the "devil's instrument" to lure the unwary down the road to degradation. Of course, it was okay to play with a pack of cards called "Flinch," "Rook" or "Canasta" or even a set of dominoes. I don't guess anyone ever gambled with any of those.

He could make just about anything out of a piece of folded newspaper, such as a boat, a hat, a kangaroo, a kite, etc. He knew absolutely everything and could fix anything, but he wasn't particularly interested in impressing anyone with either of those feats of endeavor. He was simply there.

If you wanted to know something, you went to him and asked and he would tell you the answer. Then later at school or at the library, when you looked it up to be sure if he was right, you found out that he was.

If something was broken, you went and told him. He would get up out of his chair and go fix it. He could fix leaky faucets, jamming door locks, jiggly chair legs, anything under the hood of a car, and all sorts of mysterious electrical things. He used to embarrass me to death talking about male and female electric plugs and stuff. When he got through fixing something, he cleaned up the mess, wiped the area with a rag, and put his tools away. Men don't do that anymore either.

One of my earliest memories of "togetherness" with my Dad is of sitting beside him in front of the old console radio looking at that green glowing round dial as we heard Gabriel Heater say, "Ah, there's good news tonight!" He was quite fond of the Friday night fights sponsored by Gillette Blue Blades and Joe Lewis was the big hero of the day.

He would sit on the edge of his chair when the St. Louis Cardinals were playing some team like the New York Giants. If things weren't going well for the Cards, he would get real red in the face. That was about the only emotion he ever displayed about anything.

If you had a problem or were worried about something, he was a good listener and never judgemental. One or two words of advice seemed sufficient. He was security, gentleness, compassion, wisdom and courage all rolled into one. He was my rock.

Every evening at bedtime, he would fold his socks one over the other and put them in the laundry hamper.

I wish I'd ever told him that he was the perfect father.

## County To Sponsor DARE Program

Parmer County Sheriff's Office, schools and cities have adopted the Drug Abuse Resistance Educational (D.A.R.E.) program that has grown from a small pilot program in Los Angeles in 1983 to a national level that is taught in all fifty of our states.

D.A.R.E. teaches our youth what being grown up really means—not giving in to peer pressure, making your own decisions and learning to cope with life's problems in positive ways. Students are taught in the school classroom by a specially trained, uniformed police officer. These officers are volunteers that have a good rapport and communicative abilities with young people from kindergarten to high school age.

The lessons focus on four major areas:

1. Providing accurate information about drugs and alcohol.
2. Teaching students decision making skills.
3. Showing them how to resist peer pressure.
4. Giving them ideas for alternatives to drug abuse. The 17 D.A.R.E. curriculum will be presented to all schools in Parmer County under the direction of the Sheriff's Office.

## FADA Sets Meeting Tuesday

The monthly meeting of FADA (Friona Against Drugs and Alcohol) will be at 7 p.m. Tuesday, June 19 in the Junior High School Cafeteria. The regular business session will be at 7 p.m. and a program will follow regarding the music that teenagers are listening to today.

This is a very interesting program and will call your attention to some things your kids are listening to today. The committee urges all parents, grandparents and interested persons to be there.

There will also be a drawing for door prizes at the end of the meeting. You must be present to be eligible for the drawing.

"The committee again would like to take this opportunity to express its concern over the apathy of the citizens of Friona and Parmer County. Since the majority of people in our area do not think that we have a problem with drugs and alcohol, most of them will continue to sit at home and hide their heads in the TV and let this problem continue unchecked," a spokesman said.

At a meeting on May 29 of Friona's D.A.R.E. chapter, Friona Against Drugs and Alcohol (F.A.D.A.), Police Officer Roy Don Rector of the Hereford Police Department gave a version of the D.A.R.E. program that he has taught in the Hereford Schools for the past two years. Each sixth grade student "graduates" at the end of the session. He has taught D.A.R.E. to 2,700 students, only sixth grade students graduate. Each "graduate" receives a D.A.R.E. t-shirt. These t-shirts are purchased by the Hereford Police Department, and with contributions from businesses and concerned citizens of Deaf Smith County.

Rector is a graduate of Friona Schools, being born and raised in Friona. He married Sherri Jo Thorn, also of Friona. They have two children, Tara Shae, ten, and Tyler Brice, seven.

Officer Rector is concerned about drug abuse and the future of our youth, and feels that with D.A.R.E., our children will become educated about drugs and alcohol, and will say "no" to this national horror. "Stop the demand and the supply will be stopped," he says.

Parmer County law officers, school officials and concerned citizens have worked for several months to bring D.A.R.E. to our schools. Officer Rector has given valuable input to the program.

Beelee Goodwine, Friona city manager, has worked many hours obtaining a grant to help fund D.A.R.E. in our county. This grant will be used to employ an officer to teach the D.A.R.E. program in our schools.

We stress that this is a Parmer County program involving Bovina, Farwell, Lazbuddie and Friona schools and concerned citizens. School schedules will be worked out after the officer is hired.

Although Parmer County received a grant, the success of the program will depend on the ability of all of you, the concerned citizens and businesses of all four cities to morally and financially support drug prevention education.

The costs of combating adolescent drug/alcohol abuse are high, but the benefit to society is a sound investment. We can pay now for education, or pay more later to rehabilitate, or even for who end up in prison.

We must acknowledge that the welfare of our society rests upon the ability of our children to cope with the responsibility and stresses which they inherit as our future leaders and workers.

## Excel Pulls Out Of WC

The Excel Corp., which last month threatened to close its Texas beef processing plants if workers' compensation claims were not reduced, announced Tuesday it has withdrawn from the Texas Workers' Compensation system.

"In our desire to establish a more cost-effective program for handling job-related injuries, Excel has opted out of the state system effective June 11," said Cary Humphries, general manager of Excel's Plainview plant.

"In its place, we have instituted an occupational temporary disability plan that is fully funded by the company."

Excel's announcement follows an earlier threat to close plants in Friona and Plainview if soaring costs of workers' comp claims among its employees continued. On May 1, the company gave the plants 60 days to significantly reduce the cost of claims.

Tuesday's announcement does not stop the clock on the 60-day deadline. However, Humphries indicated confidence that goal will be achieved.

Workers' comp costs had risen at the company's Texas plants to a combined annual cost of more than \$20 million. In Plainview alone, he said, W.C. was costing the company more than \$30,000 a day.

Excel blamed high workers' comp costs for the May 18 closing of a processing facility (Excel Foods), that cost 200 people's jobs.

The Friona Police Department received 228 calls during the month of May, 1990.

Dear Bill:

As you and your readers may or may not know, my 17-year-old daughter is in a drug and alcohol rehabilitation program in the Dallas area and has been for nearly a year.

My letter to you is three-fold in that I am seeking you and your readers' help in sponsoring her in a walk-a-thon that is being held in the Los Colinas area this weekend. It is a five mile walk that benefits Straight, Inc., a substance abuse treatment program for adolescents.

All that I am asking for is from a \$1.00 per mile donation to whatever your readers might feel comfortable with. I would then like to take these contributions to Straight and show them that the people in our area are concerned with the drug and alcohol problem and show my daughter that these same people do care about her and want to help in some small way.

Secondly, I want to call your attention to an article in "Texas Monthly" magazine this month that talks about Straight. I know from personal experience that not all treatment facilities work. My daughter spent eight weeks and six weeks in a treatment program in Amarillo and we felt it was not effective. Within a few days of her admission into Straight we began to see a change that was unbelievable.

Time nor space allows me to tell you and your readers all about this program, but if you had been with us this past weekend that we spent with our daughter and could have seen the changes she has made in her life you would be ready to support Straight with all your might.

If you take the time to read the article in "Texas Monthly" you will find that Straight derives most of its success because it is a TOUGH program and it uses many of the adolescents that have completed the program as staff. In other words, it's "kids helping kids."

As you know, most young people will not listen to an adult whereas do pay attention to what other kids think and do. This is called peer pressure and Straight uses reverse peer pressure to help kids get off drugs. Presently, my daughter is a staff trainee and plans to go to work for Straight when she commences.

My main concern is that the State of Texas in its infinite wisdom is trying to take some of the teeth out of Straight. They are trying to say that some of Straight's methods are abusive. It compares with the State taking corporal punishment out of the schools. You and I both know we have to have discipline or we will lose the battle.

That is why Straight needs our support. Not only financially, but also through out state senators and representatives. If any reader cannot help financially, please drop me a note with your name on it saying you support our cause.

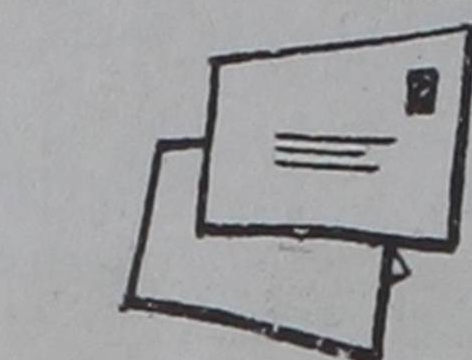

Because of that help I hopefully won't have to face the other alternative and our family can live our lives the way God planned it to begin with. I do thank God every day that He took a terribly bad situation and turned it into something good.

Thank you and your readers for allowing me this time to discuss my story.

A number of grass fires have been experienced lately in the area.

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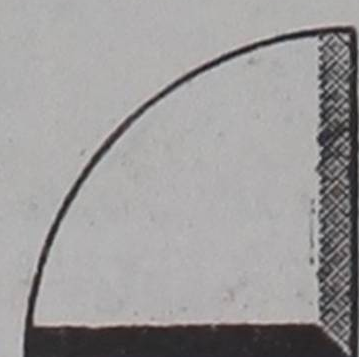

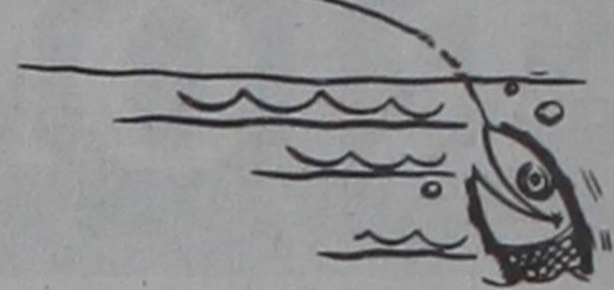

# Angler's Corner

Welcome to Angler's Corner, a summertime weekly column devoted to fishing facts and news. In this column we will explore the various facts relating to the types of fish available, their habitats, behavior and how they relate to their environment.

I would also like to extend an invitation to the area anglers to contact me after an outing so that we may share the information with other folks through this column. You can contact me at (806) 238-1649 or leave a message at (806) 238-1167 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday, and I will call you back as soon as possible. There is nothing more valuable than current information to insure a better catch.

Contact me even if your trip was not as good as expected. This may help some anglers to decide whether or not to go at a particular time or to wait until conditions are more favorable. Your input will be welcomed and appreciated.

After talking with many anglers it seems that the walleye ranks as the most sought after fish in this area. As many of you already know, a walleye fillet is hard to beat and this seems to be the main reason for stalking the toothy creatures.

Here's some walleye facts. First and foremost, the walleye is not a pike as it is commonly referred to in this area. It is actually a member of the perch family (Percidae) closely resembling the yellow perch whose natural habitat is in the northern states.

The walleye needs cold water, 45-50 degrees to spawn. The female normally spawns at night along rocky rip-rap, gravel covered tributaries and windy shorelines. After spawning the fish leaves the eggs and returns to deeper water. The adult walleye will feed almost entirely on other fish if available, but as most walleye stalkers know, the nightcrawler is hard for the fish to turn down.

Being a deep water fish, light line, 8-10 pound test and spinning gear is preferred because of its ability to detect the light strike. In

deep water even a hard strike is difficult to detect particularly on heavy tackle. Since we are already getting into the hot weather months, the walleye will go down to cooler water. This is why night fishing can be very productive.

As the water cools the fish move into the shallows to get to the forage they need to survive. The walleye can see better in darker conditions than most any other fish. This accounts for an improved catch rate when cloudy conditions are present. The bite also improves on windy days as the bottom current is increased which in turn stirs up debris and clouds the water, thus giving the walleye a decided advantage over its prey.

This does not mean that an errant walleye will not be caught during the heat of the day in the shallows as all fish are not completely predictable. It simply means that your chances for a hook-up are greatly diminished during this time of day or in bright sunlight unless you are probing the depths.

In this area, trolling is the most widely used method and will on occasion produce, but the facts remain that this fish prefers deep water. A small inexpensive down-rigger will get your lures or live bait down to their habitat resulting in a much more productive outing. If night fishing is not your favorite, then early morning will be next in line for filling the livewell.

I, too, must confess that a moving boat with a little breeze is more comfortable in the heat. Use

the deepest diving crankbaits you can obtain. When trolled on a long line these baits can reach depths unobtainable by casting. Trolling requires heavy line, 12 pounds and up and stout tackle so forget the light stuff when using this method. To fish deep, a depth-finder is needed to find the firm bottom

that this fish prefers. This includes gravel, sand, rocks or any combination of the above.

In next week's column we will explore the walleye further. Until then maintain a tight line and please keep only what you can use to insure the future of fishing for everyone.

**Specify The Shares You Want To Sell**

Investing in mutual funds is an excellent way to accumulate a nest egg. Mutual funds enable you to invest when you have money available. They also allow you to reinvest capital gains and dividends so your money compounds. All these things, of course, occur at different times, and your shares are bought at different prices.

On the other hand, when you need money, the fund simply sells enough shares at the current net asset value (NAV) and mails you a check. (Net asset value is the current market value of a fund's shares minus any liabilities divided by the total number of shares outstanding.) But which shares you sell could make a big difference in the taxes you pay.

Suppose you own 5,000 shares of ABC Fund. In 1978 you bought 3,000 shares at \$10 a share. You added another 1,000 shares in 1988 at \$20 a share, and in 1989 you bought the last 1,000 shares at \$25 a share (Figure 1). Today the NAV of the fund shares is \$20, and you ask the fund to send you \$20,000. The fund sells 1,000 shares at \$20, mails you a check for \$20,000, and reports the transaction to the Internal Revenue Service.

Because you did not specify which shares to sell, the IRS's FIFO (first in, first out) rule would apply. In this case, 1,000 of your January 1978 shares were sold, and your cost basis was \$10,000. That gives you a profit of \$10,000 which, in the 28 percent tax bracket, means a tax bill of \$2,800.

Had you instructed the fund to sell the 1,000 shares you purchased for \$25 a share at a cost basis of \$25,000, you would, instead, show a loss of \$5,000, which could save you about \$1,400

in taxes. Accurately determining the cost basis of your mutual fund shares requires some detail, but it may save you some money in taxes.

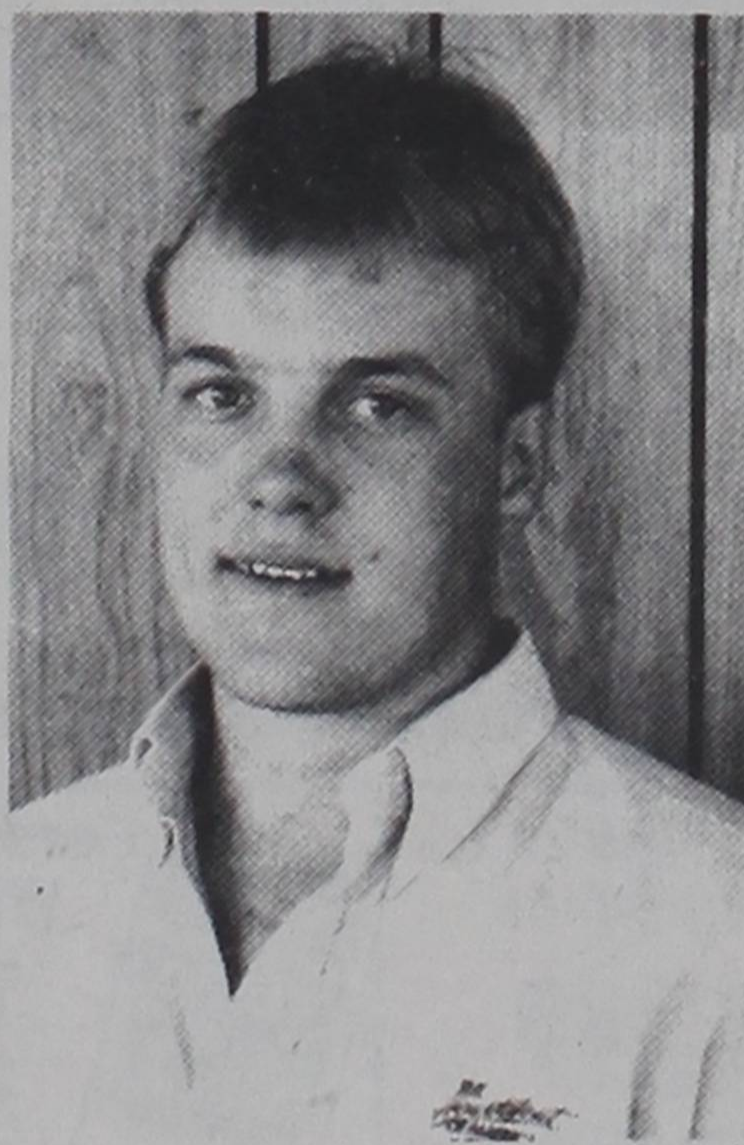

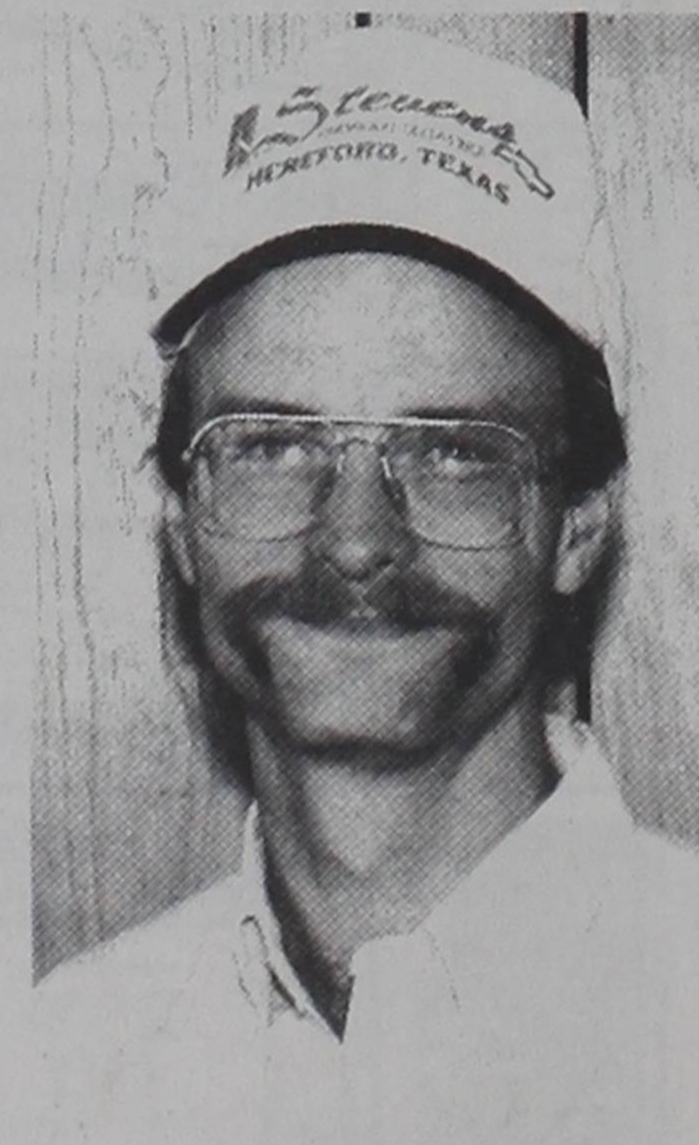

## Corner



While humans have access to air conditioning to combat climbing temperatures, animal experts warn that unless protected, pets may be threatened by excessive heat.

Virtually every year, reports surface of pets suffering brain damage or even death by heat stroke because the animal was left alone "for a few minutes" inside a closed car.

Veterinarians say it matters little if the windows are down. Temperatures in a car standing in hot sun still can climb far over 100 degrees.

Pet owners also should be sure the animal has plenty of water, access to shade and adequate ventilation during hot weather.

Cats may appear better able to handle heat, but veterinarians say it's possible for a cat to suffer a heat stroke, also.

Veterinarian Craig Dietrich, writing in Guide Dog News, recommended that owners watch for signs of heat-related problems in pets and take the proper measures if an animal appears in trouble.

Danger signs will begin with excessive panting and anxious behavior, Dietrich said, combined with rapid heart beat, a dark red cast to the gums and warm dry feel to the animal's skin.

As the animal's body temperature climbs into the danger range of 106° to 109° Fahrenheit, vomiting, stupor and collapse may follow unless the temperature is brought down to the normal range of 101° to 102°.

Dietrich recommended the animal be taken to a cooler area and cooled with water from a hose or bucket. Massaging the animal's legs will restore central circulation.

Any time a pet has exhibited signs of heat stress, he said, the animal should be taken to a veterinarian to be checked, even if it seems to be recovered.

The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District Court of Travis County, Texas.

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

### Claim Forms And Additional Information

Those customers who think they may be entitled to a refund or who desire more information must call 1-800-782-3026, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or write to WATS Refund Pool Administrator, One Bell Plaza, Room 670, P. O. Box 650376, Dallas, Texas 75265-0376, to request a WATS Refund Information Package. The WATS Refund Information Package will contain further information regarding the lawsuit and eligibility for a refund, a description of documentation required to support a customer's claim for refund, and a refund claim form to be filled out and submitted requesting a refund. REQUESTING A WATS REFUND INFORMATION PACKAGE DOES NOT OBLIGATE YOU IN ANY WAY.

All claims for a refund must be received by the Refund Pool Administrator by Friday, October 5, 1990, and all rejections of the settlement (that is, requests for exclusion from the class action lawsuit) must be received by the Court by Wednesday, September 5, 1990. Only those who respond by filing a claim or by filing a rejection of the settlement, as explained in the WATS Refund Information Package, will receive notice of future developments in this proceeding.
