

#### DEAN SPAULDING TELLS OF BAD ACCIDENT WITH JET PLANE IN CALIFORNIA

March Field, Calif. February 12, 1946 Dear Mr. Holford:

I'm not doing anything so I hought I would drop you a line or two. We had a very bad accident today involving a close friend of mine, Captain Homer Worley, who was killed in a P-80 jet, the Shooting Star. He left the field about 9:30 this morning and he crashed about 11:30 in the mornng, and they didn't find him till 4:30 this afternoon. The plane was a total wreck as they only found parts of his body; for example, they found his ring in one part and his watch in another.

This Captain was Engineering Officer and I worked for him since November as this was when the 39th Reconnaissance Squadron was organized. We didn't get our Jet Planes in until we hit March Field about the first of December and he was devoted very much to the future of these Jets. His death now brings the total to two as the other was the famous Major Bong. Captain Worley was married and the father of an 18months-old child. He was only 26 vears old

Well, that is about all I have to say right now as I have a few more letters to write, and I hope this note finds you in the best of spirits and health.
