Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Alexander. Rt. 7, Hico, has brought in the following letter from their son:

Chongdo, Korea April 24, 1946 Dearest Mother and All:

How does this find all of you? am okay as far as I know. The veather has been cloudy and rainy but the last couple of days it has een pretty warm, with some rain.

Sunday we went out to the oldest temple in Korea. It is a beautiful place. We all dolled up. since it was Easter Sunday, and got in the truck and took off up mountain road. We drove along the side of a mountain around the clouds. We had a pretty good road-just had to back up twice on the curves on the side of the mountains.. Just passed three riv-But finally after two hours got into a country with much higher mountains and with rock cliffs and tall pines and spruce. All of a sudden we went down a mountain and there beside the swift, clear stream lay about five temples, and were they pretty! The big one was built in piecework by hand and had little designs painted in bright colors of flowers, and gods and goddesses, The priest was there to show us around. He opened the big door and there before us was a huge He bowed before it three The smaller ones were the We took some pictures of them. Then have a big drum and bell there. Then higher up the mountain, right beneath a high cliff, was Omen Temple. We never

went up to it. Tomorrow afternoon we are getting our bedding and food and are going to the mountains in the big pine country and spend the night and get up early the next morning and spend the next morning hunting deer and tigers. The Koreans up there say there are many tigers and deer up there. We hunt with carbines which shoot a 30 caliber shell. We also carry our 45's to use in case we wound a wild boar or run into a tiger.

I went up to a waterfall which is about two miles from here this morning. It is about 40 feet high, although it is right on top of a mountain which was above the clouds today. By the way, we have about two and a half miles long. Have received several letters, one with the clippings about Uncle Hartey's death.

#### Patients With Mumps Should Be Isolated. Savs Health Officer

AUSTIN, May 6 .- With a total of 5,906 cases of mumps having been reported in Texas in the first seventeen weeks of this year, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a statement stressing the fact that the contagion factor exists before symptoms appear, and urging strict isolation of all patients, in order to control the spread of this disease.

Mumps is transmitted by direct contact with an infected person and with articles freshly soiled by the secretions or discharges from the mouth or nose of persons having the disease. It takes from 12 to 26 days for mumps to manifest itself after the infection takes place. The disease can easily be transmitted, but one attack usually establishes immunity although second attacks sometimes occur.

The most easily recognizable characteristic symptom of mumps is a painful swelling of the salivaten than not is mild.

Mandeville of Hico recently celebrated the 60th anniversary of their marriage which took place in Sherman soon after the young bridegroom had returned to Grayson County after spending some years as a cowboy for Barton Brothers on the range between Dodge City, Kansas, and the South Canadian River, in Texas. The bride of 60 years ago was Miss Sarah Eden, Grayson County. Mandeville recalls some of the highlights of their 60 years "partnership" on Texas land.

"When we were married I decided to rent a tract of land, Joining the Jot Gunter ranch on the north. Rent was \$250 a year for 230 acres in cultivation and fair improvements. With pencil and paper I figured what the net income should be, and rented the

"That year, 1886, was the dryest the county ever had, and it didn't work out on the ground, as it had on paper. It broke a young married couple. We didn't give up, but ceased making debts unless the money to pay was available. "One-horse farming is only an existence, scientific farming on large scale is a two-way risk. I have experienced both.

#### Warning Issued On Use of Social Security Cards in Identifying

"Instances where efforts have been made recently to secure cash on social security checks by using ment by officials of the school. A who holds the contract on Hico's social security cards as identification have been reported to our office," said Alwin A. Moerbe, Officer in Charge of the local office of the Social Security Board, Recently at Tyler, Texas, a 17-year old boy had stolen a beneficiary's check and when he presented it to a bank, he also offered a social security card as identification. The cashier became suspicious and upon investigation it was found that the possessor of the check had secured a social security card in the name of the person to whom the check was issued.







TO ALL INTERNATIONAL HARVESTER DEALERS:

I am glad to be able to tell you that the long strike in our farm equipment factories is settled, subject to ratification of the agreement by the local unions involved and the actual signing of contracts between the various plants and the local unions. We know how much the strike has meant to you in lost sales and how much to your customers in lack of needed equipment. We will do all we can to make up for lost time.

The necessary preliminaries should be out of the way and most, if not all, of the local union contracts signed in the early part of next week. Thereafter we will call employees back to work as rapidly as possible. Naturally, after the long shutdown, there is much maintenance work which must be done, and certain operations involving furnaces which operate at high temperatures will require several days of preparation. I believe it is reasonable to expect that most of the plants will be operating at near capacity within about two weeks of the time they reopen, barring unforseen contingencies,

Thereafter we will get machines and service parts to you as rapidly as possible. We recognize the importance of providing service parts for machines already in use. Some time, of course, will be required to "fill the pipelines" from the factories to the branches and to you. For awhile, therefore, machines will come in a trickle rather than in a flood, even though production is going ahead at full speed.

For example, consider our situation on combines. Our maximum capacity for combines of all types is about 400 machines a week. Several thousands of dealers want combines. So, even though we are producing at capacity, it will not be possible to fill all orders at once. In this situation we must naturally ship the early production to the areas where the need is most immediate. The same general considerations will apply to other machines.

During the strike, there was some indication of a feeling by farmers that the Company was holding back machines which were finished and on hand, in anticipation of higher prices. That was totally untrue. We provided you and, through you, the farmers, with every salable machine in our possession. We held nothing back.

Now, because we will be back in production, it may be expected that such rumors will circulate during the period when we will be "filling the pipelines." We believe it is to your interest as well as ours to explain the situation to your customers. I can assure you that the Company will not hold back any machines in the expectation of price relief. We are too conscious of the farmers' need for machines in this food crisis, and of your need for goods to sell. We will ship machines as rapidly as we can produce them.

On behalf of the Company I want to thank you for your patience, your understanding and your encouragement during the troubled times we have been through. We truly appreciate your support. We will try to show our appreciation by rapid production and the best service possible. We believe better times are ahead for both of us.
