

Teeling cited for the Exchangeites a number of facts and figures relating to the dam: the lake area will cover more than two million acres, about half the size of Buchanan dam; 1,635,000 acres will be set aside for flood control purposes, and 109,000 acres for power; the dam will be 155 feet high and will be constructed of concrete in the river channel and of earthen fill for the balance of its three-mile length; the spillway will be 680 feet long and will contain 17 gates, each measuring 38 by 40 feet; a 34-foot road will be built on top of the dam, which will actually be a relocation of highway 22; while the lake is expected to be about 50 miles long when it is full, it actually will be only onethird that long in normal times. for it is being designed to be able to hold back for 48 hours the largest flood on record; a flood of average proportions may be held back for four days, according to present plans. These figures show how the dam is planned today, but some of them probably will be changed before construction actually gets under way, Teeling pointed out.

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WASHINGTON, D. C .- Among all the breath-taking events which followed the President's plea for strong, anti-strike legislation, perhaps the most amazing was the unexpected opposition which rose out of the Republican ranks. First reaction of newsmen here was: when Senator Taft suddenly becomes allied with the CIO leaders, anything can happen.
Of course Senator Taft did

not actively go to bat for the CIO, but it was his opposition to the President's anti-strike to the President's anti-strike measure which prevented the bill from being rushed through the senate as it was through the house. The real reason behind Senator Taft's opposition is considered by many here to be primarily political: he thought he saw an opportunity for the Rean opportunity for the Republicans to get a big chunk of the labor vote. Labor was angry at the President for asking for this legislation and the Republican leaders felt that the moment had arrived for them to win back

labor's support. But political strategists here say that the idea will never work They say that labor leaders would organize a third party rather than turn Republican, that it is too obvious that the cloak of "labor's friend" doesn't fit the Republican leaders, and that the rank and file of labor is not nearly as disturbed over the President's proposals as are their

By his twelfth-hour action on labor, when the country had become paralyzed by the railroad strike, President Truman was merely giving in to the demands of the public.



FINDS NEW COMET . . . David Rotbart, Washington grocer and amateur astronomer, discovered a new comet during a routine search of the heavens which has caused a stir in the astronomical world.

The pressure brought upon him by public opinion had become terrific. It was necessary for him to do some-thing which would make it impossible for labor unions to defy the government. His recommended legislation was no stronger than the people had demanded.

Whether the President's recommendation that those who strike against the government be drafted into the army was the best "penalty" for defiance is of course open to question. Some object to this provision on the grounds that it gives the army the status of a prison. Others object on the grounds that it has too much of a flavor of totalitarianism. But so far no one has offered any other suggestion for a substitute penalty considered nearly as effective.

It is interesting to note that the President's suggested le islation was an emergency measure based on the fact that the war isn't over yet.
