#### Almost One-Fifth of **Texans' Bond Quota** Reached In 9 Days

DALLAS, June 18 .- With the first peacetime promotion for the sale of Savings Bonds by the U. S Treasury only nine days old, Texans have invested almost one-fifth of their \$33,000,000 quota in Series E Bonds. Sales through June 15th were reported at \$6,429,123.75 with a total of \$9,206,266 in all U. S Savings Bonds at that date.

In encouraging the citizens of Texas to increase their purchases of Savings Bonds during the present promotion. Nathan Adams, Chairman of the Texas Advisory Committee on Savings Bonds, said: "A bad case of inflation would be a national catastrophe, affecting each and every one of us. It would distort every economic value, private and public, Investing in Savings Bonds will go a long way toward averting infla-We must invest our savings and take as few of our dollars as possible to market until produc tion shall match demand."

"Spending money rocklessly buying scarce goods at inflated prices," Mr. Adams continued, "is like cutting down the tree to get at a few green apples. The thing to do is wait until the apples are ripe before you eat them. Leave the tree to bear fruit in years to

The Treasury reports a total of 3.4 billion dollars in Savings Bonds sales during the first five months of this year. Redemptions have amounted to 2.8 billion dol lars. Strikes, tax payments, etc. were credited with this large per centage of redemptions, but figures for May disclose that the trend is toward a much lesser percentage in redemptions. It is further hoped that a current promotion will accelerate the downward redemption trend, giving renewed impetus to the regular purchase of Savings Bonds.

Washington, D. C. (NWNS) .-While congress is making up its mind what to do further toward curbing labor union racketeering and what to do in order to keep our armed forces from becoming dangerously inadequate, we shall devote this column to a our nation's housing situation.

For right now there are almost 5,000,000 families looking for homes—and there is no chance that more than about 25 per cent will find them by the end of the year. If all goes well, it is esti-mated that 475,000 houses will be completed this year. In addition, approximately a million families may find older homes or move into newly constructed apartment houses or houses which have been turned into twofamily homes. Over 3,000,-000 of those seeking homes will have to double up with other families, live in trail-ers, unheated summer cottages, or temporary quar-ters provided by the govern-

But the shortage of homes is only one part of the housing problem facing the returning veteran. Even more of a hurdle is the present cost of homes. It is estimated that home costs have just about doubled in most sections of the country. The home that sold for \$6,000 in 1940 is now selling for \$11,000 to \$12,-

afford to pay more than \$50 a month for housing and it is obvious that the few homes which are available are out of reach of the veter-

What's the answer? shall devote this column to a Well, for veterans there are brief analysis of the statistics on priorities which will make materials available to them for building. That is, they can stand at the front of the line to wait for the materials to be produced. Then they can borrow money for a down payment and, if they build a shack that doesn't cost over \$5,000, will be able to finance it at their \$50 per month maximum. But the kind of a home they can get for \$5,000 will be equal to the \$2,500 home of 1940—if any homes were built at that time at such a low figure. Pre-fabrication may help. if the unions don't interfere too much with their progress, but even with pre-fabrication not much of a house can be built for

\$5,000 during these times.

WHY all the camouflage about Spain? Millions of words are being wasted to try to cover up the obvious attempt to drag that country into the Communist camp. Does anyone believe that the gentle masters of Russia. Poland and their "travelling companions" are tearing their hair in deadly fear of mighty Spain, or because they feel sorry for the poor Span-

Every grown person knows that Spain is threatening no one and would be laughed at if she did so. So she can scarcely be called a "threat to peace." A possible "danger to peace" maybe. But every government is a "danger to peace," and none more so than that which-as Russia's stoogeis stirring up this dangerous international trouble - Poland. What a laugh for the future historian!

So Australia proposed that a committee be appointed to ascertain if Spain constituted a threat to peace. racies again. There is a war being fought all over this globe between two diametrically opposed ideologies. If the philosophy of "the freedom of man" wins it will sooner or later spread





Bangpla, Siam

August 2, 1935. This is our resting spot on the ay to Bangkok. Tomorrow we had planned to go

but there will be no train tomor row, and perhaps not the next day either. We find that the train leaves here only when there are enough passengers going Bangkok way to make the trip pay. This is not a too pleasant place in which to rest. We waded through deep mud to this place which they call the hotel. It is more like a hut. No dining room, no bath, and no convenience of any kind whatever The manager of this place re ceived us coldly, making no answer of any kind as to our request for food. We went out into the town looking for something to satisfy our appetites and found othing but rice and cakes.

Nothing here appears too clean. but when one is hungry, dirt is forgotten

We came here last night and as we arrived, so did a howling storm. It lasted most of the night and today is one of those murky. sultry days and everything damp and sticky.

Near the center of this town there is a monastery erected by the Buddha's. It is not very pretty and the thatched roof is supported by slim bamboo poles. Underneath the balcony there is a place for ravelers to rest. Always there are score of them there with their bales and bundles of clothes and rope fibre. They are the human freight trains of the Siamese juncles. They carry shipments into part of the country where no train, wagon or cart could ever go.

They are surly fellows, these human freight carriers-and they treated us like people who are under a ban of excommunication. Physically though, they are rea sights. They all had great knots of muscles standing out on their brown bodies. I told Cappy Hall that they all looked as if they had taken the body building course of mobiles-or perhaps because of instruction from Charles Atlas back in New York.
