Heat Cramps May Be Prevented by Pinch Of Common Salt

AUSTIN, June 17.—If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers, and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient...

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various other ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting.

T. C. U. Enrollment Will Be Restricted To Certain Groups

FORT WORTH, June 17.—Three groups of new students will be given primary consideration in determining admissions to T. C. U. for the 1946-47 school year, according to Dean Jerome Moore.

These three groups include T. C. U. ex-students who have been in service and now wish to re-enroll; high school graduates of the immediate Fort Worth area who have a grade average of "C" or better; and veterans whose homes are in Fort Worth.

"Because of the large number of applications for admission, it becomes necessary for T. C. U. to adopt some plan of selection of new students," Dean Moore comments.

"We are going to do everything in our power to serve as many students as possible. We are expanding all our facilities of staff, space and hours to the utmost. But we still will not be able to take care of all who desire to enroll, so it becomes necessary to give preference to the groups named above."

Almost One-Fifth of Texans' Bond Quota Reached In 9 Days

DALLAS, June 18.—With the first peacetime promotion for the sale of Savings Bonds by the U. S. Treasury only nine days old, Texans have invested almost one-fifth of their \$32,000,000 quota in Series E Bonds.

In encouraging the citizens of Texas to increase their purchases of Savings Bonds during the present promotion, Nathan Adams, Chairman of the Texas Advisory Committee on Savings Bonds, said: "A bad case of inflation would be a national catastrophe, affecting each and every one of us.

In connection with the carnival attractions, Cheek stated that he had been assured of several novelties in rides and shows, and that this end of the celebration would be up to par or above.

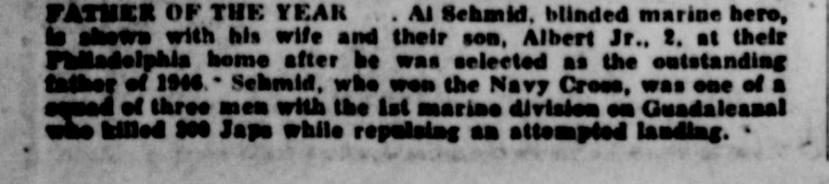

This Week in WASHINGTON

Washington, D. C. (NWNS).—While congress is making up its mind what to do further toward curbing labor union racketeering...

For right now there are almost 5,000,000 families looking for homes—and there is no chance that more than about 25 per cent will find them by the end of the year.

Stack the cost figures up against the army's finding that no more than 1 out of 10 discharged veterans can

afford to pay more than \$50 a month for housing and it is obvious that the few homes which are available are out of reach of the veterans.

What's the answer? Well, for veterans there are priorities which will make materials available to them for building. That is, they can stand at the front of the line to wait for the materials to be produced.

Veterans emergency housing program order No. 1, aimed at controlling the use of building materials in order to steer them into the construction of homes for veterans, is designed to clear the way for the construction of homes which will sell for less than \$10,000, or rent for less than \$30 a month.
