State Health Officer **Gives Information On Rat Pest Control**

the economic losses they cause to industry and commerce and the annoyance they create in homes, rats have been considered a serious menace to mankind since long before their role as vectors of disease was understood. Today at least six diseases which are transmitted to man from the rat are known to medical science, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. These diseases include the dread plague, typhus, trichinosis, a form of jaundice. tapeworm, and food poisoning. The whole history of the role rats play in the transmission of disease remains as yet unknown.



Peach Leaf Carl Control

Right now leaves on many peach trees are curling up and then dropping off -- in some cases the trees have shed most of their leaves. This condition, according to J.

F. Rosborough and C. R. Heaton, horticulturists of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service, is aptly known as peach leaf curl It's always at its worst in cool, rainy seasons, such as we have been having over the eastern part of the state this year.

Rosborough and Heaton have been getting so many letters about peach leaf curl that they've decided to tell you a little about itit's a fungus disease—it not only gets the leaves, but sometimes the twigs. Swells them up about 4 or 5 inches from the tip. Such twigs may die and drop off and in any case you needn't expect them to do much in the way of setting


What to do about it? Nothing much right now, they say. The time to control leaf curl is during the winter when the trees are dormant. Then a lime-sulphur spray will give 90 to 98 per cent control the next year by killing the spores of the fungus. The same spray will hold San Jose Scale, Brown rot, and Scab in





But how are you going to save your strength when you feel as if you hadn't any? And how are you going to rest when there are so many things to do for the baby? There used to be a grandmother or a maiden aunt in nearly every family who took charge of the baby for a month or so. But while this saved a young mother's strength it also built up a tradition of many changes of clothes for infants, with at least one period of the day when they were dressed in handmade finery. Nowadays babies wear simple gowns and wrappers all day long. But even this plain baby wash can be re-

duced in volume. A little extra care in covering baby's clothes during the orange juice and feeding sessions will usually mean one less change a day. For this purpose, make an over-all bib waterproof material. large enough to cover the shoulders and the whole dress or nightgown. If baby is in his crib spread a waterproof cover to catch the dribbles and save the sheet. If you can't use a diaper washing service, use disposable diapers.
