GARLAND, TEX., 4-H BOY NATIONAL FIELD CROPS WINNER



One of the four national winners in the 1946 4-H Field Crops Contest, Harris Hill, 17, of Garland, Dallas county, Tex., receives his \$200 Fowler McCormick scholarship award from John L. McCaffrey, president of International Harvester Company.

Harris was named 4-H southern extension section winner follow-ing the judging of the national field of 859 county champions in 44 states. The presentation of the scholarship, good at any accredited state agricultural college, was made during the recent 25th annual 4-H Club Congress, when International Harvester, donor of the awards, brought all state winners in the Field Crops contest to

Chicago for this silver anniversary assembly.

During his seven years in 4-H, Harris raised 41 acres of cotton, 30 of corn, 46 of wheat, 101 of clover, 17 of barley, 35 of oats, four of row cane, nearly eight of grain sorghum and two of sudan, Income from these was nearly \$10,000 and with swine, beef and dairy returns, brought the total to \$17,890.56. He employs the best known tillage methods, and much of his grain and all of the cotton and clover seed are being certified and sold for planting.

The assistant county agent says, "He has a brilliant mind and is valuable not only to the club but to his home and community." Harris is now a freshman at North Texas Agricultural College.

ability compensation. The after effects of malnutrition vary and, in certain cases, do not show up until long after the prisoners of war have been released from confinement.

Therefore, former prisoners of war who have any reason to believe they are suffering from a disability as a result of their confinement may file a claim with the Southern Religious Radio Contheir nearest VA office.

Former prisoners of war who have already filed disability claims and whose claims have been denied, also may get in touch with their nearest VA office and have their cases re-opened.

The Veterans Administration is reminding World War II veterans of important deadlines for enefits to which they are entitled. Approximately 10,000,000 veterans who let their GI term insurance lapse, may reinstate this insurance on or before February 1. 1947, without a physical examination by signing a statement that their health is as good now as when their policies lapsed, and by paying premiums for only two

months Deadlines for several other benefits will be set automatically when the President or Congress officialy declares World War II

Austin, Texas, Jan. 1 .- Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer, stated today that he believed it would a worthwhile idea for every Texan to take a health inventory at the beginning of the New Year.

"At the beginning of a new year, we should give some thought to mistakes we have made during the past year, and a great deal of hought to planning some way of aproving our health conditions in 1947." Dr. Cox said.

"The American people are very fortunate. We have scientific knowledge of communicable diseases; we have already made important conquests in the warfare diseases. We material wealth to make knowledge work; we have capable leaders in the sciences of life proesses who see great opportunities or public good in health measures unite effectively the resources of medicine, education, finance and government." Dr. Cox asserted

"Every Texan should make a lew year's resolution to practice better personal, home and community sanitation, with a view to eleing the health level in every mmunity, and in so doing create better health conditions throughout the State.

The State Health Department. according to Dr. Cox, is confident that with national health being stressed as one of our nation's nost important problems, 1947 will see great strides made in the upbuilding of public health on a national scale.
