## Texas Ahead of Rest Of Nation On Farm Roads

The Texas Highway Department is further advanced on its farmto-market road program than any other highway department in the Eplen. president of the Texas years of age. Good Roads Association. This statement is based upon a report just released by Thomas H. Mac-Donald of the Public Roads Administration in which Texas is warded and the total number of miles involved in these contracts. Of total miles under contract Texas led all other states according to Mr. Eplen. Pennsylvania ranked first with 1.117 highway projects under contract between lived in San Antonio. Jan. 1 and Dec. 28, 1946. These projects comprised 1.715 miles of road construction costing \$57,700. California awarded contracts for 344 projects on 1.025 miles of highway at a cost of \$53,700,000. Texas let contracts for 685 projects costing \$52,500,000 on 4,650 miles of roadway.

## Pellagra Causes Health Officials **Great Concern**

Austin. Tex., Jan. 14.-Pellagra lthough not a communicable disease, is one of great concern to public health officials in Texas for many people die of pellagra in this state every year. The disease is caused by the lack of certain foods, and as it comes on slowy may not be recognized until the victim begins to have the more serious symptoms such as sore mouth, stomach trouble, and reddening and scaling of the skin.

"When these symptoms appear, the disease has been present for some time," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer. longer an individual has pellagra the harder it is to cure. It is advisable, therefore, to watch for the early symptoms such as nervous-ness, indigestion, and burning of the hands and feet, and if these symptoms appear, treatment should be instituted at once. In its advanced stages pellagra may because physical suffering but seriously affect the mind."

Pellagra is not contagious, Dr. Cox pointed out, and he emphasized that it can be prevented entirely by including the right kinds of foods in the daily diet. These essential foods include milk, fresh meat, whole wheat products brewer's yeast, salmon, as well as tomatoes and other fresh fruits and vegetables. The inclusion of these foods in the daily diet will prevent pellagra, and as in the case of any diesease, it is better to prevent it than to try to cure it.

## Turkeys Brought **Boom In Texas** For Thanksgiving

Austin, Tex., Jan. 15 .- Thanksgiving brought the usual turkey boom in Texas for November. marking up a 739 per cent increase in total shipments over October. according to figures released by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research, with interstate shipments of turkeys climbing to

ten times October's total. At the same time, total shipments of other poultry and eggs was declining at rates ranging from 40 to 50 per cent. Shipments of chickens fell off 40 per cent an announcement by the Texas from the previous month; shipments of eggs decreased 50 per cent.

> Greatest decline was in intrastate shipments, with shipments of chickens falling off 75 per cent and egg shipments decreasing 73 per cent. Interstate shipment de clines were not so sharp. Ship ments of chickens decreased 17 per cent and shipments of eggs dropped 47 per cent.

Declines seemed to mark Noember's shipments compared with Safety Conference, calls for enact- the same month of 1945.
