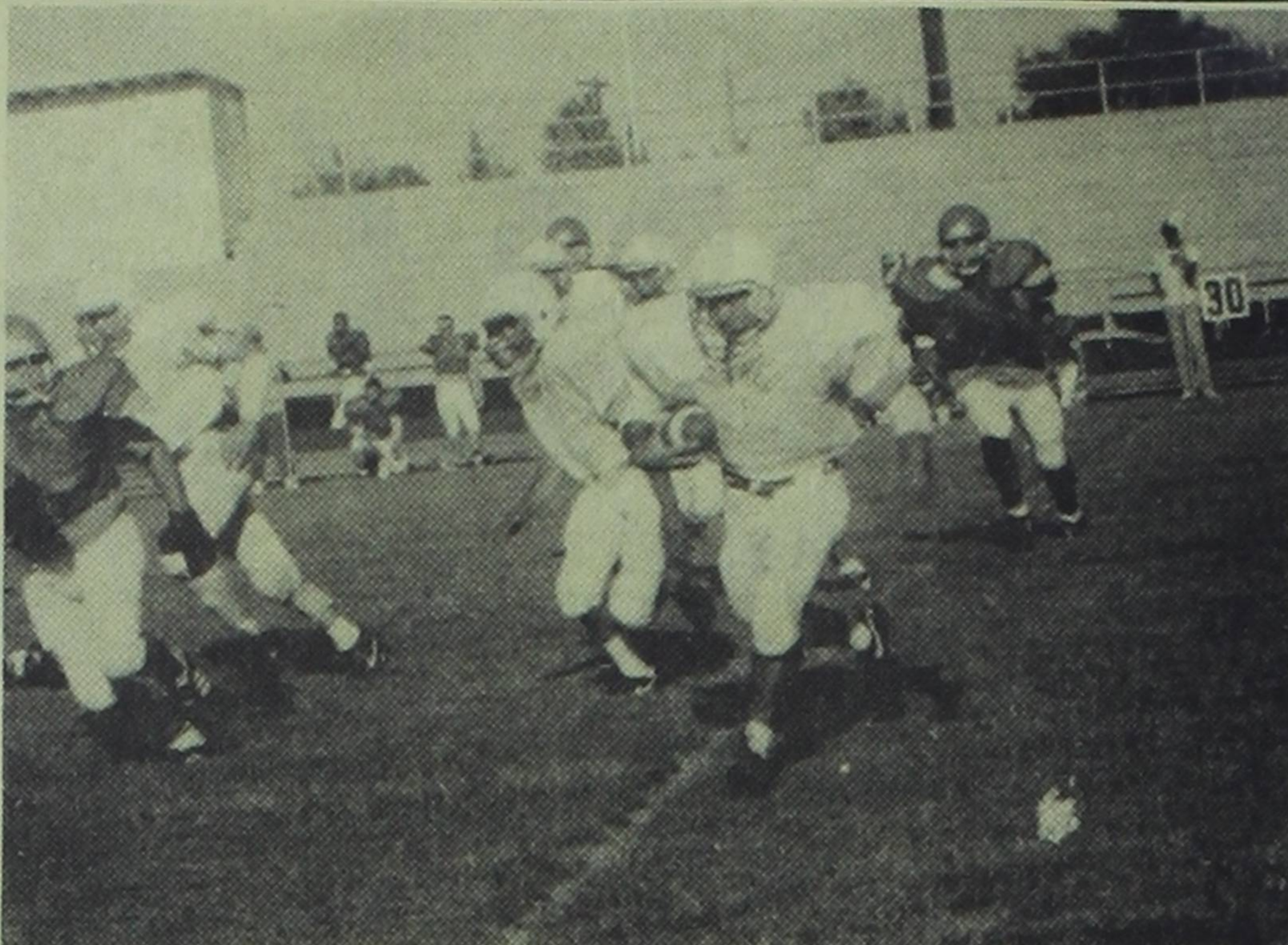
In order to continue to serve a quality meal at a reasonable price, the Chamber board contacted these local yards and asked for some help. We are very appreciative of these generous donations.

Williams Lauds FHS Chieftains

The Friona Chieftains emerged from their first scrimmage against the Seagraves Eagles with some positive signs, according to Coach Steve Williams.

"We were encouraged. We saw some bright spots. The mistakes we made were correctable. Seagraves is an outstanding team, and it was good for us to work against a team with that type of players," Williams said.

In the final analysis, the visitors scored two touchdowns and Friona one, but where the first teams were concerned, the score was one apiece, and Williams thought that spoke well for the Chieftains' effort.

Friona's score came on a ten-yard pass from Daniel Saiz to Gary Stowers.

"I thought we played exceptional defense against the run, and we played extra well on our second defensive series," Williams said.

The Chieftain mentor singled out Ryan Sifford, Blue Field and Wayne Jackson for their defensive efforts, and Daniel Saiz, Marcus Reyes and Corbin Riethmayer for their work on offense.

Williams said that the team had no new injuries in the scrimmage. They were looking to get Scott Houston back for duty, although Steven Dickson and Gabe Gonzales are still sidelined.

This Friday, the Chieftains visit Sanford-Fritch for their final scrimmage outing. The freshmen from the two schools tangle at 5 p.m., and the junior varsity at 6 p.m., followed by the varsity at 7 p.m.

The Chieftains launch the 1990 grid season on September 7 when they host the River Road Wildcats in what has become their traditional season-opening opponent.

Kansas Trial Will Omit Texas Deaths

Judge Stephen Nyswonger ruled last week that the trial of Diana Lumbra in Garden City, Kansas will be limited to evidence pertaining to the death of Jose Antonio Lumbra who died in Garden City on May 1.

Mrs. Lumbra has been charged with first-degree murder in this case.

The ruling means that evidence concerning the deaths of three of her children here in Parmer County will not be used as evidence in the Garden City case, and also that evidence concerning the deaths of three other children in Texas will be excluded.

It was excluded because the judge ruled that evidence in these cases could not be used because no conclusive pattern or plan was shown in Ms. Lumbra's behavior concerning the deaths in Texas.

Ms. Lumbra has been charged in this county with the deaths of

Joanna Garza Lumbra, Melissa Garza Lumbra and Melinda Ann Garza Lumbra who died between 1976 and 1982 while Ms. Lumbra resided in Bovina. A trial in these cases will begin when her trial in Kansas has ended.

No formal charges have been filed concerning the deaths of Joselion Garza, 2½ months, who died February 13, 1978 at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock; Ericka Aleman, 6 weeks, who died October 8, 1980 in West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe; and Christopher Daniel Lumbra, 5½ months, who died March 28, 1984 at Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt.

It is possible that the Bailey County Grand Jury which is scheduled to meet early in September will be asked to determine whether there is sufficient evidence to try Mrs. Lumbra in Bailey County.

Salleys Are New Friona Residents

Anyone who has passed by the parsonage of Friona United Methodist Church during the past several months could tell by looking that a person with a green thumb lives there.

The green thumb, which is owned by Mary Salley, is evidenced by the beautiful array of pot plants among blooming plants the entire length of the front porch at 803 Columbia.

She and her husband, Henry, who is pastor of the church next door west, moved here from Memphis about three months ago. The couple has three children, but they are all gone from home.

Their son, Gary, who is a CPA, lives in Austin; one daughter, Darla Salley, lives in Fort Worth and another daughter and her husband, DeAnna and Gary Ward, live in Lubbock.

All four of these along with Doug Miles of Fort Worth and Nancy O'Neil of Austin, were guests in the Salley home last weekend.

The Salleys share their home with a large black eight-year-old Persian-Siamese cat named Dinky and have three dogs living in the back yard. Rev. Salley explained, "Only one of them belongs to us. We're babysitting the others for the kids."

Henry and Mary are both native Texans. She was born near Weinert, which is in Haskell County and he was born at Colorado City.

His father was also a Methodist preacher, so he grew up moving around to different places but never lived outside the Lone Star State.

His parents, Rev. and Mrs. S.H. Salley, have lived in Lubbock since his father's retirement. Her parents are deceased.

Rev. Salley attended McMurry College in Abilene and Southern Methodist University in Dallas before enrolling in Perkins School of Theology.

His first preaching assignment was in Andrews. Since that time he has held pastorates at Big Spring, Throckmorton, Crosbyton, Seminole, Paducah, Memphis and Friona.

His hobbies include painting, playing golf and camping. Some of his most recent oil paintings have been done in classes by Ben Konis

and some of them are hanging in the local Maize Days art show. He especially enjoys painting portraits.

Mary is a Licensed Vocational Nurse and at the present time is involved in doing home nursing care through Deaf Smith General Hospital, Hereford. She has been doing this type work the past seventeen years.

She is also an avid walker. Even though she doesn't do much handwork, the Salley home is decorated with several hand crocheted pieces including a dining room table cloth, which were made by her mother.

When asked about her cooking skills, she modestly replied, "I'm really not very adept in that field, but I do prepare healthful meals and have a few favorite dishes."

Most of her menus feature dishes which would be approved by the American Heart Association as they consist mostly of boiled, broiled or baked chicken, fish and lean beef and a variety of fruits and vegetables, which are served raw or cooked.

Her favorite main dish is Cashew Chicken: boil one chicken, bone and set aside broth. Combine 2 cups boned and diced chicken, one five ounce chow mein noodles, less 1/2 cup; 3/4 cup chopped celery; 1/2 cup chopped green onions; 1 can cream of mushroom soup; 1 cup cashew nuts and 3/4 cup chicken broth in two quart casserole dish. Sprinkle reserved noodles over top. Bake at 325 degrees for 30 minutes.

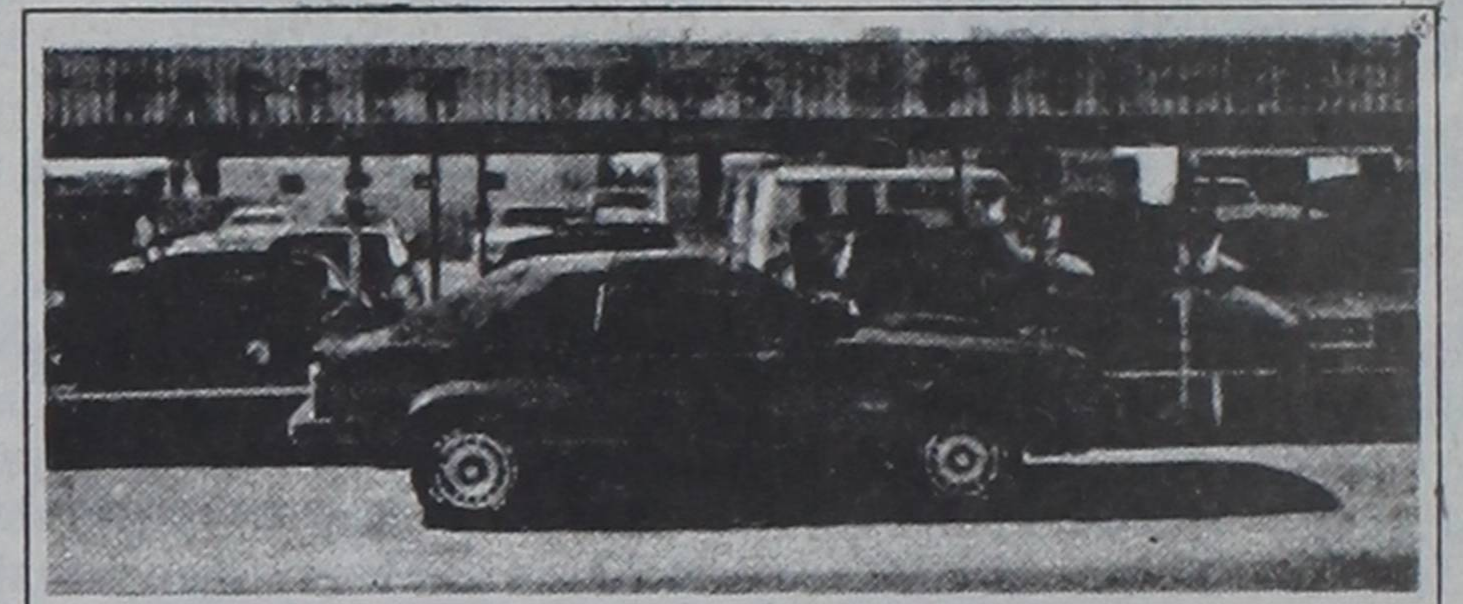
Another recipe she uses often is Fudge Sauce: combine one 12 oz. package semi-sweet chocolate chips and 1 cup butter or margarine. Melt over low heat stirring constantly. Gradually add 4 cups (1 pound) confectioner's sugar and 2 1/2 cups evaporated milk, blending well. Increase heat. Bring to boil and cook, stirring constantly, 8 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in 2 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract and 1/8 teaspoon salt. Serve warm. Store in refrigerator. Yield: 5 1/2 cups.

Ex-Resident Rites Held In Lubbock

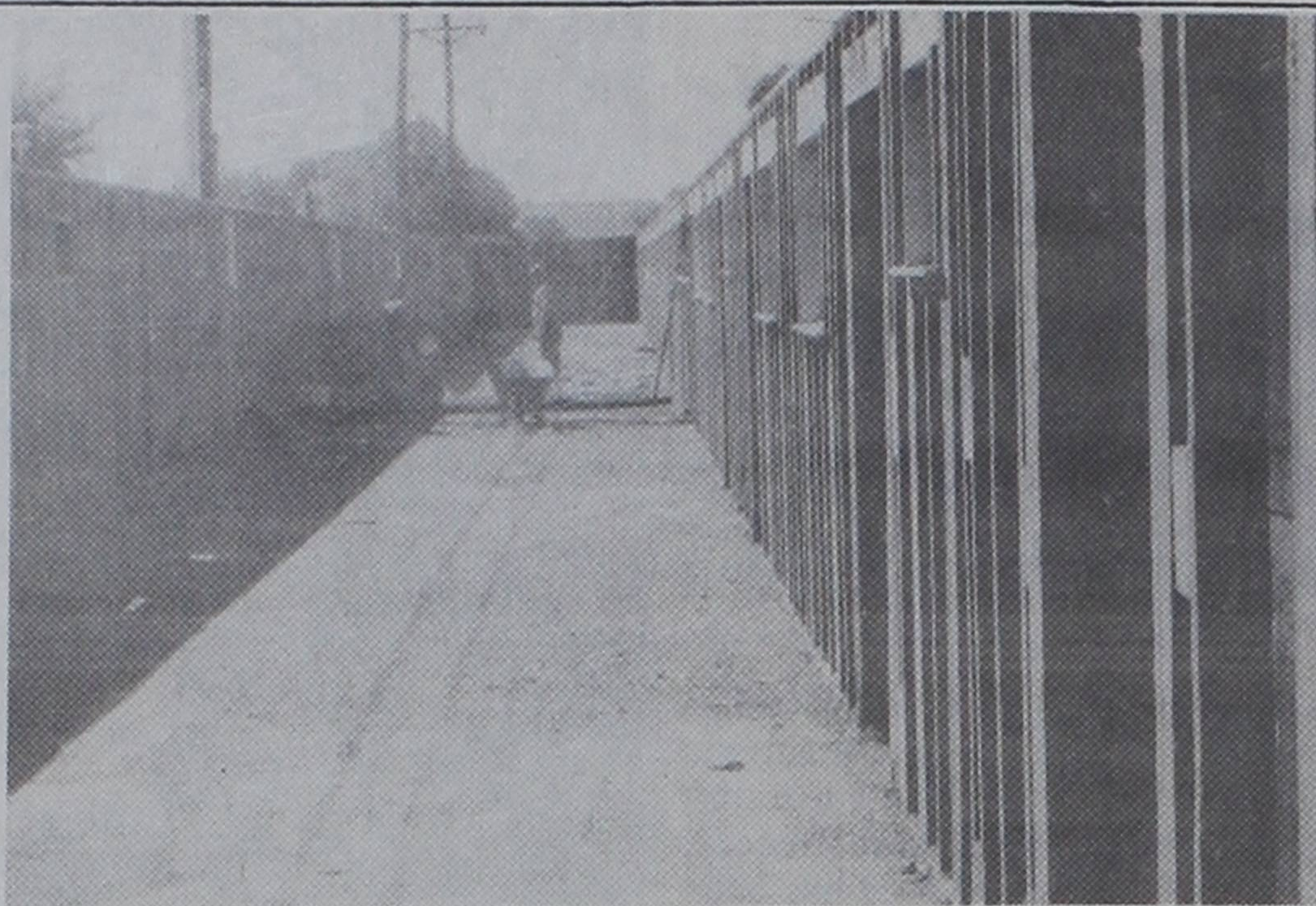

The Thrift Store will be open Friday, September 7 from 2-4 p.m.

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

Local Girl Reports On Spain Residency

Two years ago, the Friona High School Spanish teacher, Peggy Hamil, created an interest in some of her students to make a trip to Spain. One of her students, Mindy Johnson, cultivated her interest in the country and after Mrs. Hamil didn't return to the classroom that fall, decided to fulfill her dream of going by becoming a part of Youth For Understanding.

After applying for participation in this organization, she did more study about the country and was very excited when she received notification that she had been accepted for summer residence in the home of Antonio and Ana De Lopez and children, Veronica, 16; Alvaro, 10; and Estela, 7.

By the end of the school term, Mindy had solidified her plans and began making arrangements for her departure, which was scheduled for June 25.

On that date she flew to New York City by way of Lubbock and Dallas. In New York City, she joined a group of 67 students from all over the United States and all ethnic groups.

The Lopez de Frutas family, whose home is in a small town named Colemanar Viejo and located two miles north of Madrid, met her at the Madrid Airport.

Although her Spanish vocabulary was limited, she says, "At first I felt somewhat handicapped because of the communication problem, but before long I became comfortable and everyone in the family was very supportive of me."

Both of her Spanish parents were teachers. Senor Lopez taught natural science and his wife taught biology. In some ways their school system resembled ours and in others it was very different.

Mindy reported, "Schooling there is much more difficult than ours and students are required to take many exams to determine the progress they are making. Pre-school begins with three and four year olds and continues through the twelfth grade, but a student has to take an exam at the beginning of each year to determine what grade he or she will be in that term."

She also observed that the majority of people were more interested in being well educated in general rather than specializing in one subject or another.

School terms begin in October and end in late June. September exams are studied for a long time at the end of each summer. Their seasons are much the same as ours.

On a typical day in the Lopez de Frutas home, everyone got up about 9:30 or 10:00 and had breakfast together between 10:30 and 12:00 noon. Then dinner was served between 2:00 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. Dinner consisted of several courses beginning with cold soup for an appetizer and ending with fresh fruit for dessert.

"People there use a lot of dishes," Mindy said, then continued, "my mom had two dishwashers and both of them were filled with dishes all the time."

One of Mindy's favorite entrees was Anchovies, which are large fish similar to sardines and are pickled. She also liked a rice dish and brought home a recipe.

Paella

Combine ½ cup rice, 1 cup water, 1 cinnamon stick, ¼ teaspoon salt, 3 ounces sugar and some lemon peel in a sauce pan and bring to a boil. Cover and simmer over low heat until water is nearly absorbed, about 8 minutes. Add 5 cups milk and continue cooking until rice is very tender.

There should be enough liquid left to give a creamy consistency to this dessert.

Remove cinnamon stick and lemon peel. Dust lightly with powdered cinnamon and serve hot or cold. Makes 6 servings.

Their money is quite different from ours, too. Generally \$1.00 in American money can be changed into 100 pesetas, but the value varies.

Their paper money begins with a 1,000 peseta bill and each denomination is larger as the value increases and a different color. The coins, which are made of different metals including aluminum, begin with 1 peseta. The next size is a dudo, which equals five pesetas. Other pesetas came in 10, 25, 50, 100 and 500 sizes.

Mindy brought a collection of coins home and it is interesting to look at them.

Trips Mindy took included a tour of the castle at Manzanres El Real, which was built in the 16th century. It was designed with three round towers and a keep, which have smaller towers on top.

A trip to Madrid involved riding a bus to the city then riding the subway wherever anyone wanted to go.

The family also went on vacation one weekend and camped on the beach on the north shore of the country. Mindy reported, "They were surprised that I wasn't familiar with a beach and asked if we didn't have beaches in Texas?"

"Of course," she continued, "they were surprised when I told them the distance from my home to the Texas coast. Their country isn't quite as large as Texas."

One of the major differences Mindy observed was the opening and closing of shops. They were usually open from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., and were closed for siesta until 4:00 p.m. when they reopened and didn't close until 7:30-9:30 p.m.

Another difference was the scarcity of cars. A person can receive a license to drive a moped at 16, but has to be 18 before he or she can receive a license to drive a car.

She also stated that teenagers wore a lot of jeans and t-shirts like their counterparts in America, but that most young ladies wore very little make-up and hairdos were much simpler.

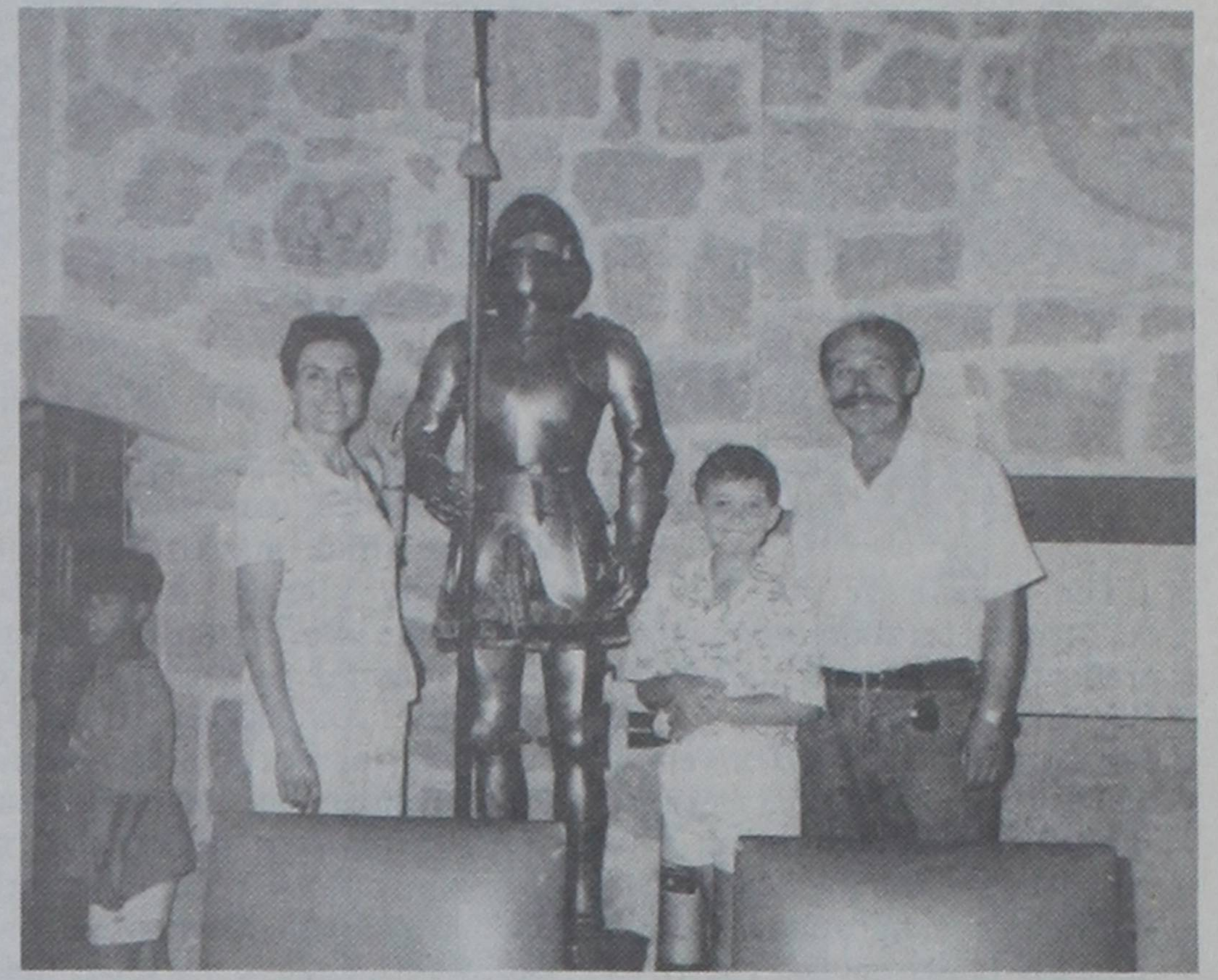

History Says Common Stocks Are A Good Bet

The decade of the '80s was outstanding for those who invested prudently in the stock market. The 500 stocks that make up the Standard & Poor's Index went up an average of 17.5 percent annually during that period. Over the past 50 years, the S&P 500 has shown an average annual increase of nearly 12 percent (see chart).

Although there's danger in following averages exclusively, there is no reason to believe that economic conditions have changed so much that historical averages no longer make sense.

If you review as far back as 1926, including wars, recessions, the Depression, inflation, stagflation and almost every other type of economic condition, the average annual increase in the stock market has been about 10 percent.

You might say that history shows that taking reasonable investment risks has paid off. At some point, however, the stock market inevitably slows down and may even retreat before another move forward. When that occurs what's the prudent investor to do? Continue systematically investing in good, quality stocks.

The best stocks are generally those of established companies that are well financed, well managed and make profits. These companies usually have weathered other economic storms and proved

they can adapt to change. As evidence, consider that on a day the stock market takes an unusually large drop, the percentage loss of industry leaders is less than the percentage loss of their lesser competitors. In a weak economy--or worse, a recession--the performance of companies that offer consumer necessities is superior to those offering luxury products. Even when times are bad, we continue to use food, fuel, health products and the like. However, we're more likely to postpone vacations, designer clothes and other luxuries until prosperity returns.

Serious investors understand these trends. They are much less apt to sell proven stocks during a weak market. In fact, serious investors often recognize excellent value at depressed prices and buy more stocks.

The stock market does not offer guarantees, but as history attests, stocks are still one of the best investments available. With average annual growth at 10 percent, stocks have beaten all other securities in nearly every long-term period.

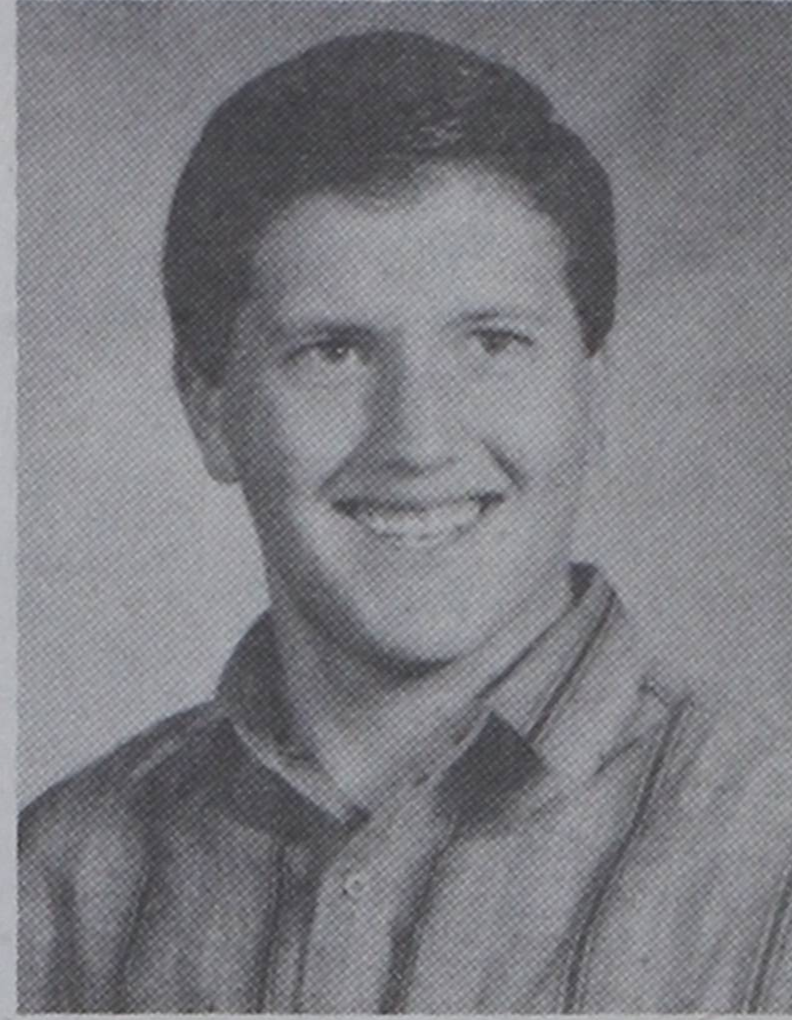

"A lot of Diamond Shamrock employees contributed to the fund-raiser and helped me earn the title by purchasing candy," she says. "I appreciate their support."

About 300 people make up the current membership of the Citizens Forum, which works in cooperation with Amarillo College, the Amarillo Independent School District, and the YMCA through various programs to target and assist high school dropouts or individuals who need to upgrade reading and math skills.

The new building will be utilized to bring some of the joint programs into the community, as well as providing assistance for senior citizens and children in need.

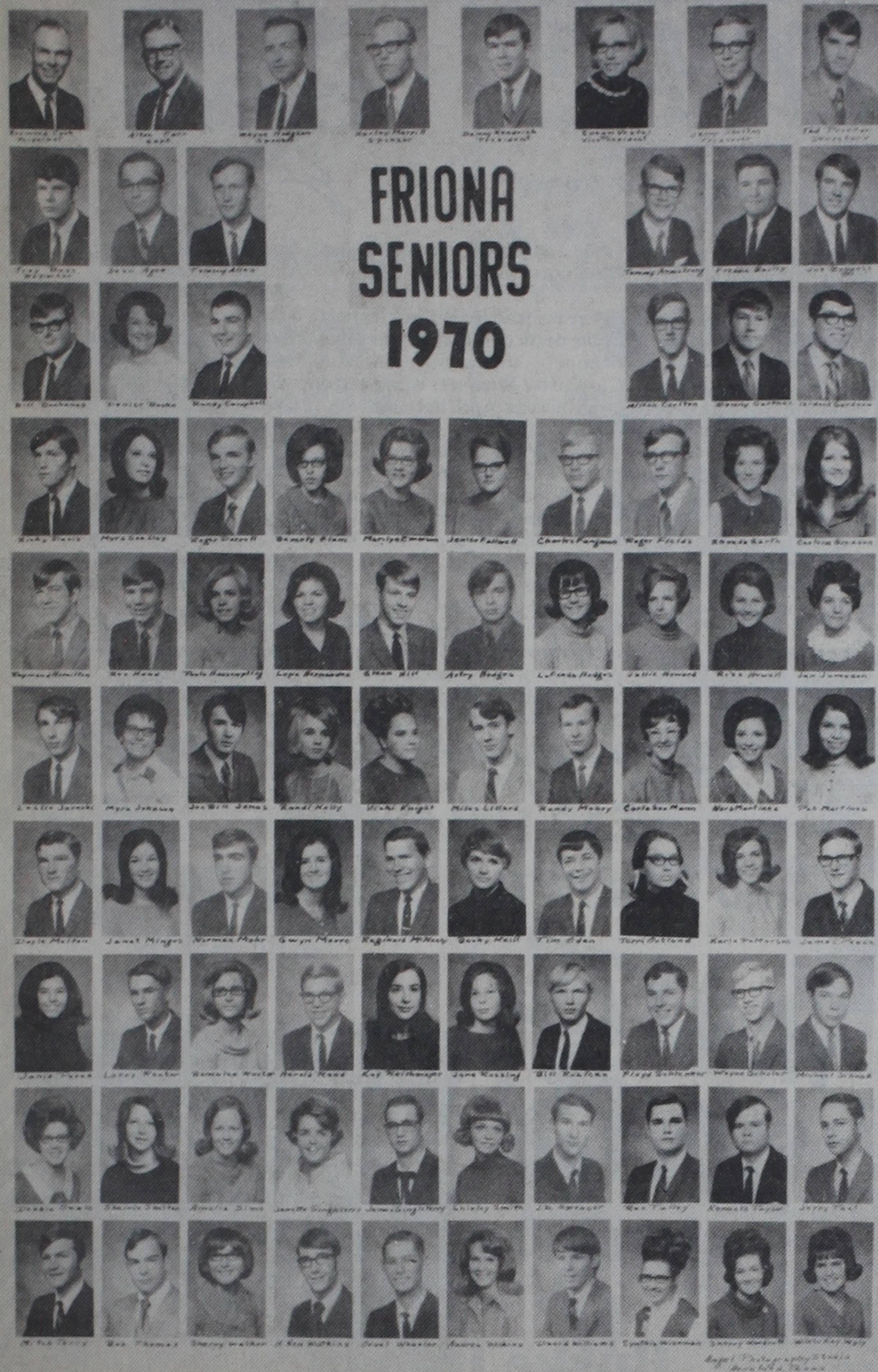

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


