They now live at Hico end have an apartment with the Weldon Pierce family. Mrs. Kruse works as a nurse in the Hico Hospital & Clinic while her husband teaches agriculture.

HIS week America pays tribute to Thomes A. Edison, "Wizard of Menlo Part," who was born February II one hundred

Edison's legacy to the world included such inventions as the phonograph, motion pic-tures and fluoroscope, but he is most famous of all for his work in the field of electric lighting and power distribution.
