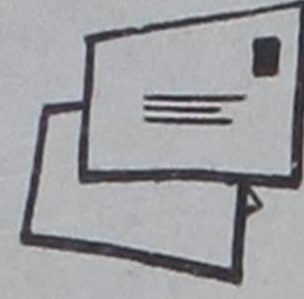




# Letter To The Editor



Dear Editor,  
 Three weeks ago, July 28, we read that about 1-1.5 million Americans are permanently infected with the mysterious and deadly virus that causes AIDS (Acquired ImmunoDeficiency Syndrome). We also read that most of those infected individuals are between the ages of 20-50 years old. But I left out one important sad reality of the AIDS epidemic. These forgotten victims of the AIDS epidemic are those beautiful and innocent creatures that we call babies and children. About 2% of AIDS cases are among patients less than 13 years old.

If we consider children less than 13 years old as the pediatric group, as of February 1, 1990, there had been 2,055 pediatric AIDS cases in the U.S., and every year 1,500-2,000 infected babies are being born in the U.S.!

How do these innocents get the AIDS virus? It is important to know that the most common risk factors for the women who are infected by the virus are Intravenous Drug abusers (IVDU's), which make up about 49-52% of the cases. In 1988, about 70% of the perinatally (shortly after childbirth) transmitted cases of AIDS were children of mothers who are injecting drugs or they were in a close relationship with a drug abuser. Also, unfortunately, a very sad reality is the increasing number of pediatric AIDS cases among sexually abused children, the most innocent victims of this madness.

It is obvious that these infected

babies and children will create a great deal of socio-economical and medical problems not only in the U.S. in general, but also in our fair state of Texas. We must not ignore and underestimate the spectrum of this disaster.

It is estimated that the frequency of infection by the AIDS virus among pregnant women is 0.94 for every 1,000 individuals. In other words, almost one out of every 1,000 babies born in this country may be infected with the AIDS virus. Considering the frequency of infection among college and university students, which is three out of 1,000, it is then obvious that these students have the greater possibility of giving birth to infected babies. The saddest part of this problem is that most of these college students become infected with the AIDS virus while in high school. Can you see the future of Texas and the U.S. now? Are we ready to face the medical, psychological, economic and social impact of the AIDS epidemic?

A pediatric patient without any symptoms of illness costs approximately \$3,600 for one year, a patient with moderate symptoms \$15,600, climbing up to \$50,300 per year for a patient with severe symptoms. Who makes enough to pay this much for the treatment of their loved ones? If the family can't afford to pay this much, who's going to make up the difference?

The only answer is from the government, and that means tax money paid by you and me. If we don't educate ourselves about AIDS, and learn what we can do about it, this money, which could be used elsewhere, will go to pay for this. Remember--no man is an island. We need an "education revolution" to combat this illness. Since there is no cure or vaccination for AIDS at the present time, only education is the key to our survival.

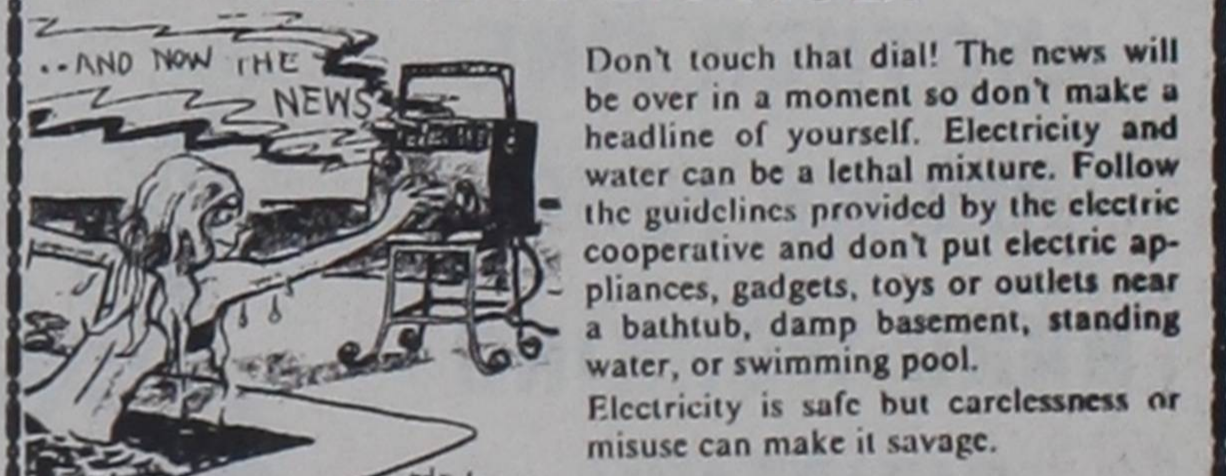

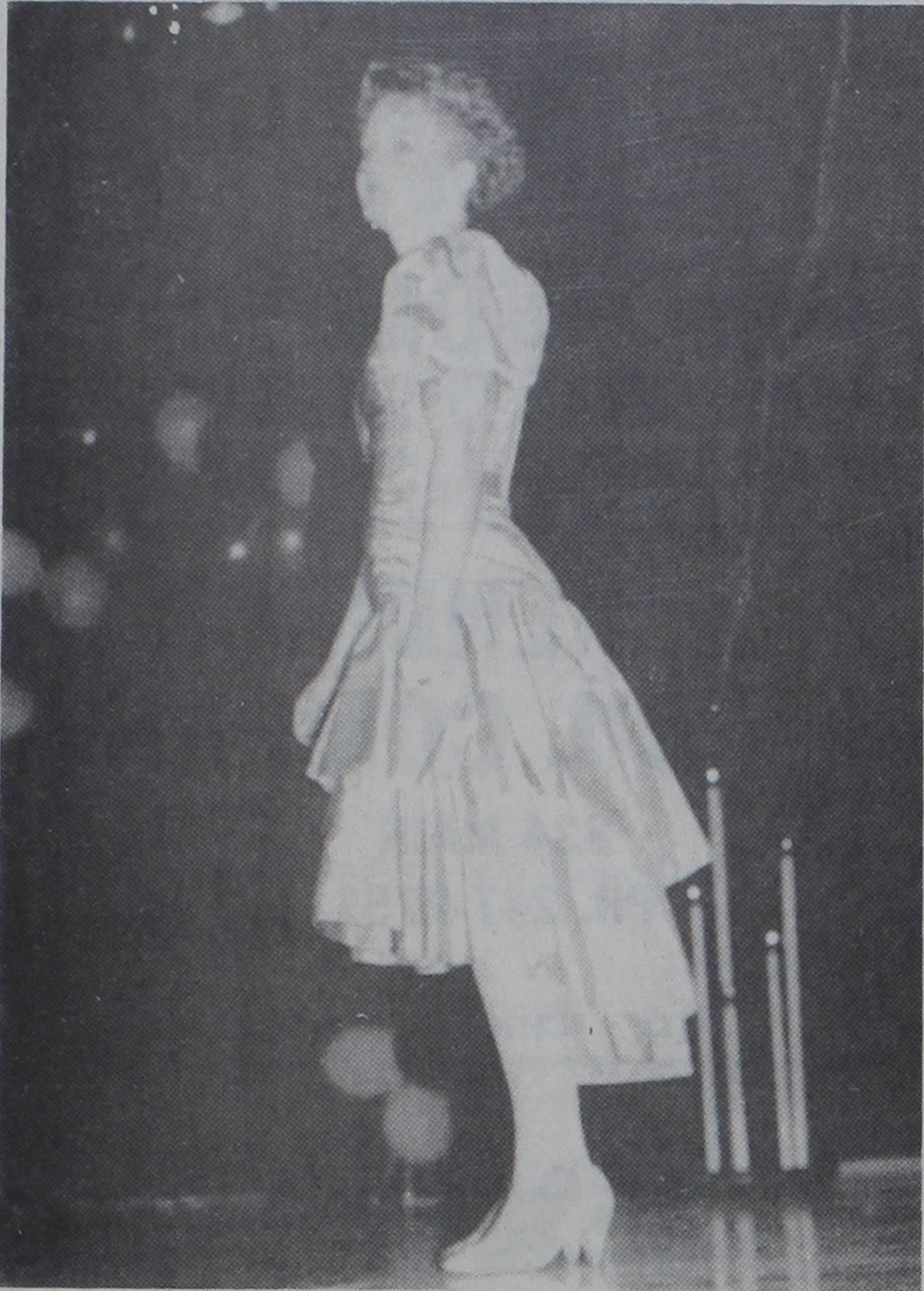


Six accidents were investigated with one injury.

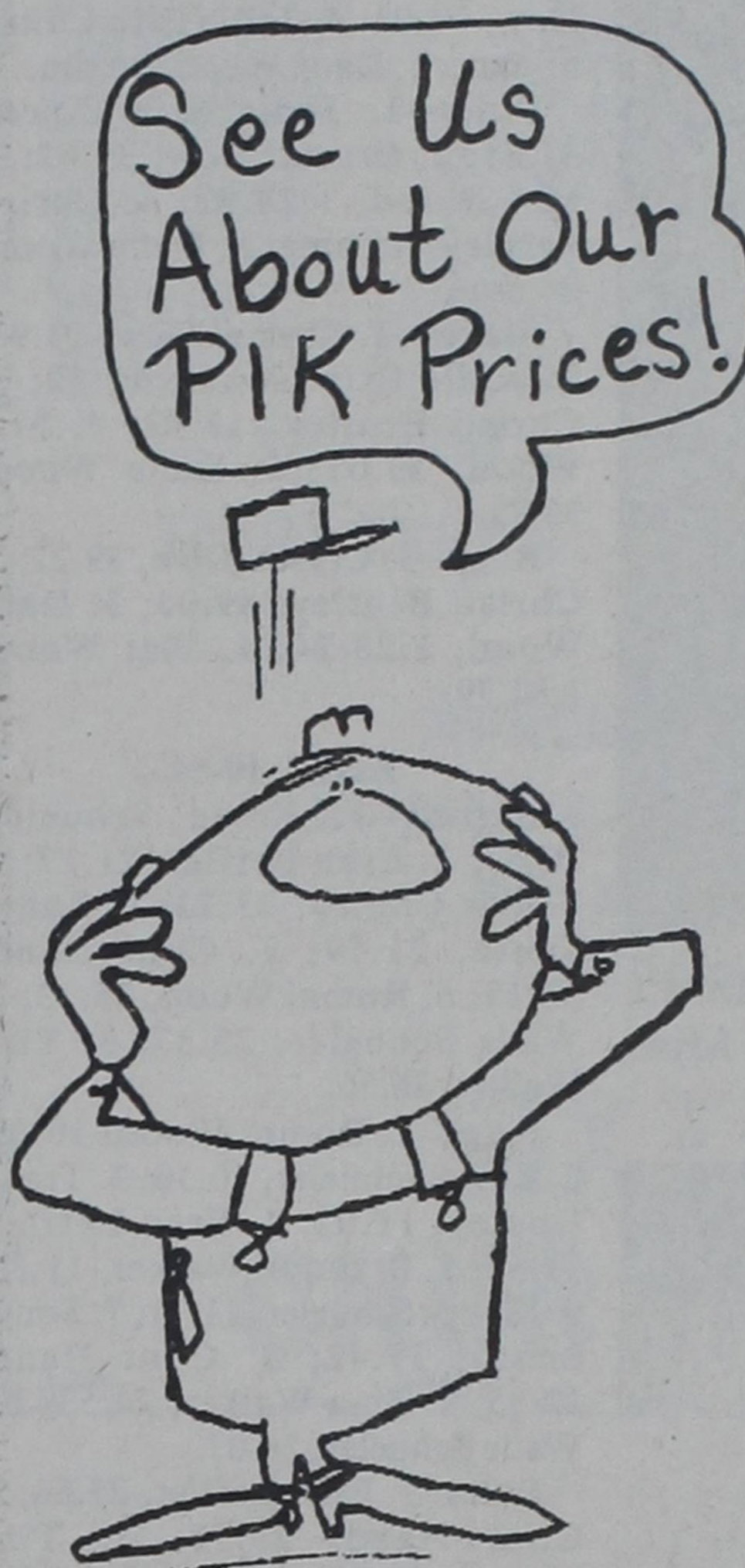

### More Investment Choices In The 1990s

Ten years ago, no one would have predicted that the mutual fund industry would grow from less than \$100 billion to more than \$1 trillion today.

One reason for this phenomenal growth is that today's mutual fund shareholders have a multitude of investment choices that were unavailable to most investors 10 years ago. More variety, however, demands more selectivity.

At one time, it might have been simple to entrust your savings to a professional money manager. Now, with more than 3,000 funds from which to choose, you have to evaluate the success of established managers as well as hundreds of new, untested money managers.

Look, for example, at one of the most popular mutual-fund concepts introduced in the 1980s--government income funds. These funds allow investors to invest small amounts into the highest-quality government securities and to have their investments professionally managed. At the time, the reliable income these funds offered was a welcome alternative to falling CD rates, and they became an instant success.

Due to their immediate popularity, however, new government income funds were introduced regularly, each offering more income. In an effort to provide the highest rates, some managers used investing techniques that often put shareholders' capital at unnecessary risk. As time went on,

selecting a quality government income fund became more challenging.

In addition to government income funds, several other types of mutual funds were introduced in the 1980s.

Asset allocation funds generally invest in whatever the managers select. Their choices could range from money-market securities to precious metals. The idea is to keep money allocated to the most-profitable investment at the time.

Zero coupon bond funds, as the name implies, invest in zero coupon bonds, which are sold at a deep discount. These funds offer some predictability for financing future retirement or education.

International funds offer individual investors access to securities from around the world.

Real estate funds allow investors to own shares in income-producing property without the problems of managing it themselves.

Municipal bond funds are made up of individual state municipal bonds and are free of federal and state taxes. These types of funds have been established in nearly every state.

Sector funds invest in particular industries. For example, ten years ago only one fund was investing in health care. At this writing there are nine.

The past decade was a dynamic period for the mutual fund industry. And although, as with any investment, care should be taken in selecting mutual funds, your choices are greater today than ever before.

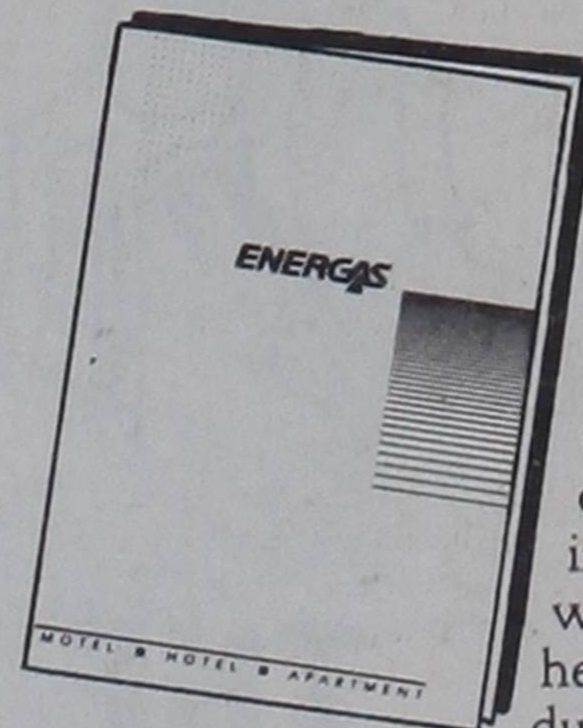

Sponsored by the Friona Evening Lions Club, this camper had the opportunity to fish, study nature, and participate in sporting events. Michael is the ten year old son of Charles and Rhonda Wilkins.

A team of doctors, nurses and dietitians from the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston taught campers about exchange diets, blood sugar level testing, exercise effects upon blood sugar, and how to give their own insulin injections. The team helps campers to understand the importance and reasons for medical testing.

A well-trained staff supervises each camp activity with a ratio of just three campers to each counselor.

Located on 500 acres of Texas hill country, the camp serves handicapped and diabetic children ages 6-17.

The remainder of the year, the facility provides instruction through its Texas Education Agency accredited school.

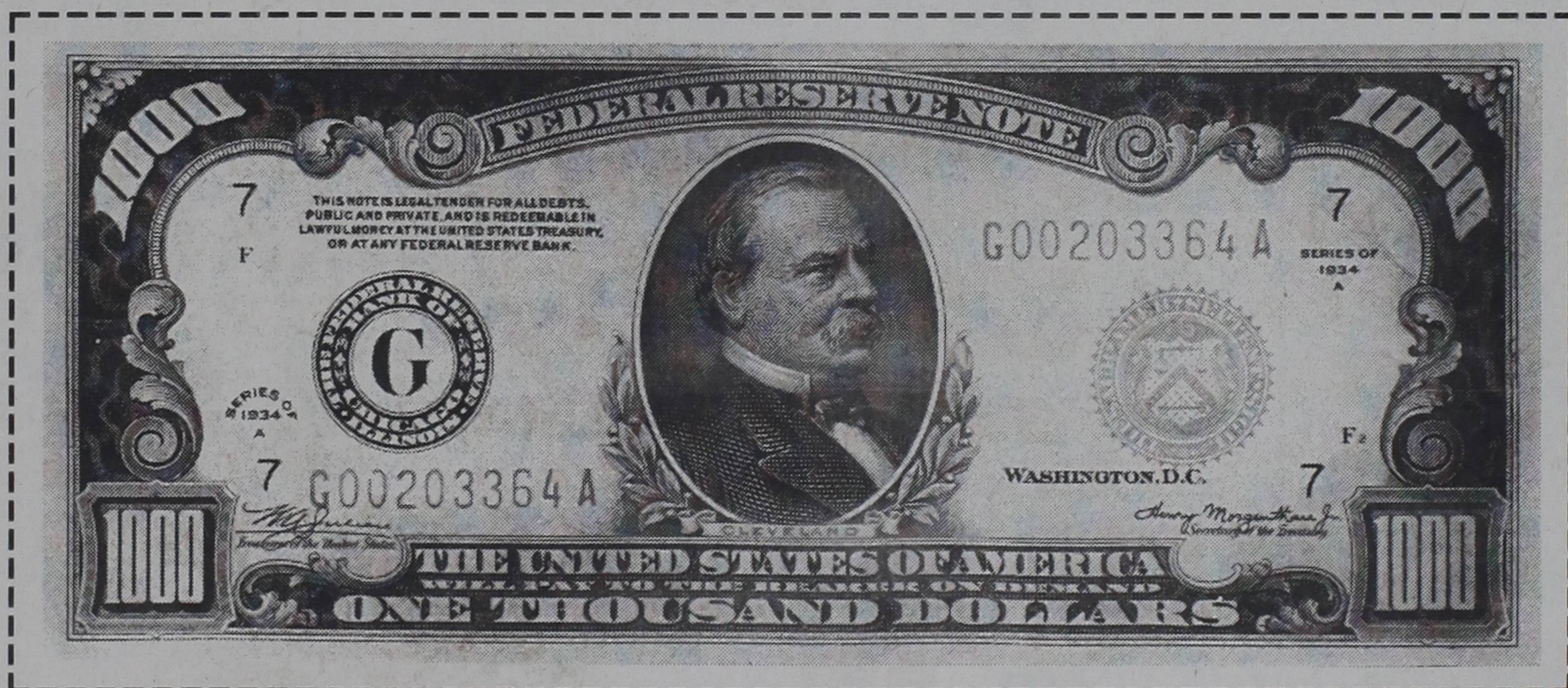

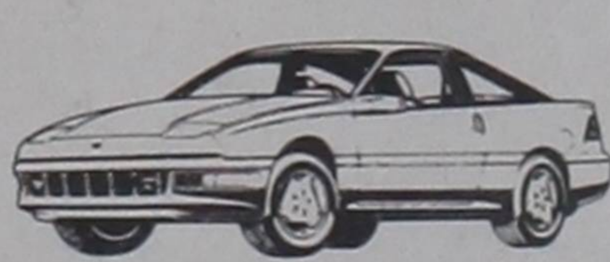

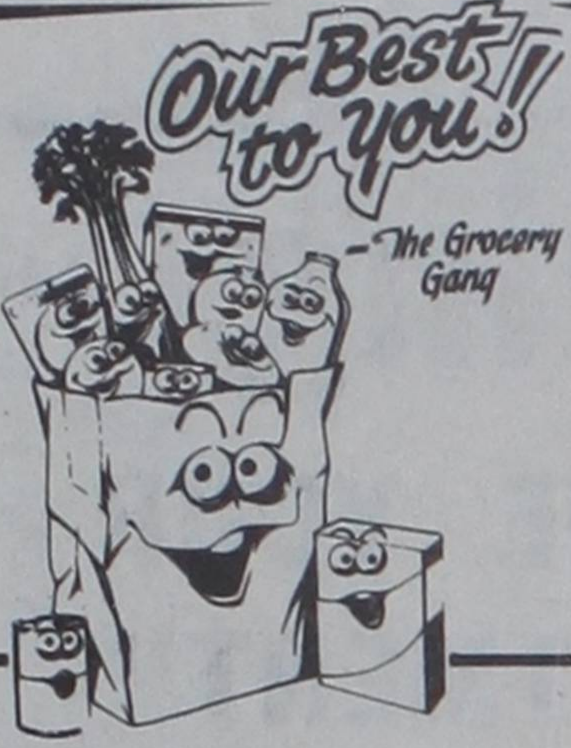
