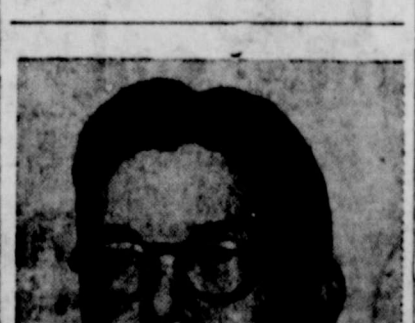

A vast majority of the 15,000,000 servicemen and women who took out National Service Life Insurance during World War II will eventually receive dividends on their policies...

"Special Reporter" Gives Account of Texas City Blast

Mrs. Frank Haggard, formerly of Hico but now living at Galveston, wrote back to the paper last week an eye-witness account of how the tragedy at Texas City affected people in Galveston.

"You know of course about the awful disaster that has happened over at Texas City, just 11 miles across the bay from Galveston. For information will tell how it affected Galveston."

"About 8:30 a. m. Wednesday I was sitting at my radio when the first blast went off. It rattled windows. I got to my feet and then the big boat blew up—"

"My daughter, Mary Ellen, who is a technician at John Sealy Hospital, went over to Texas City with blood plasma and she said it was just awful. The hospitals here in Galveston are full, even to the halls, and all day Wednesday and Wednesday night they were bringing the dead and injured here."

"A clinic across the street from me has been getting the wounded. All doctors, nurses and Red Cross workers from Galveston are over at Texas City. It's awful, and even though I am 11 miles away, we feel the effects of it. I tell you this old State of Texas has got what it takes. Never have I been so proud of living in such a state. There is no better place—everybody has been so wonderful all over the state, with people helping on every hand. They are coming from all over the United States—"

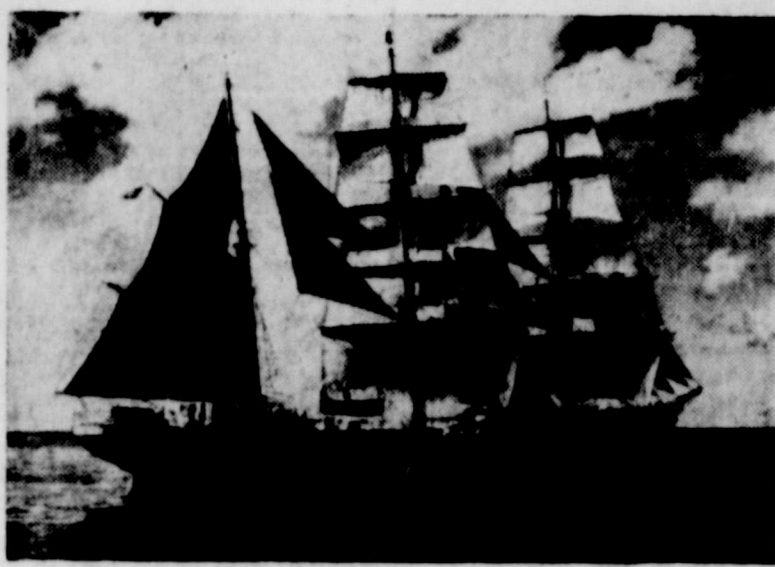
Local Poultrymen Seek State Title In National Contest

Hamilton County will be represented by A. A. Brown of Hico and Miss Leila Woodward of Hamilton in the 1947 Texas Chicken-of-Tomorrow contest.

They will compete against entrants from 19 other counties for one of 15 prizes totaling \$315 in cash to be awarded at the judging in Fort Worth on May 28.

Regional and state winners will participate in the national finals to be held in 1948. Grand champion will receive \$5,000 from the food chain and runner-up, \$1,000.

Overall objective of the three-year breeding program, which got under way in 1946, is to achieve quick-growing, meatier birds which will consume less feed, resulting in increased profits to poultrymen and greater consumer satisfaction.

Hico to Share In \$9,500,000 Project Of Gas Company

Lone Star Gas Company anticipates expenditures of more than \$9,500,000 for extensions and additions to physical properties this year to meet growing requirements for service.

Anticipated expenditures for additions during 1947 will top expenditures for similar purposes during last year by about \$500,000, Mr. Hulcy said.

Following are the principal expenditures: service lines, street mains, meters, regulators and other facilities for serving customers, \$3,279,513; acquiring leases and drilling wells to insure adequate gas supply for many years, \$2,566,230; pipe line construction from and in gas fields to tap additional reserves and to provide additional transmission capacity, \$1,732,100; dehydration, cycling and gasoline plants to treat gas and promote conservation, \$1,071,650; supplementing existing facilities such as automotive equipment and machinery and tools and building improvements, \$986,105.

Healthily growth of Lone Star's territory is indicated by the fact that the company added more than 23,000 customers during the past year. Total operating expenses increased by \$1,132,019 in 1946 over the previous year. The tax bill was \$6,486,087 and represented approximately \$1.50 out of every customer bill rendered each month.
