Just as in all other groups, there are small men in industry and in the business establishments which control so much of it. But the majority of those who compose industry and business management made their way up the ladder by using their wits.

Veterans' News

More than 6,900,000 of the 14,447,000 World War II veterans have applied to the Veterans Administration for education and training benefits.

Veterans seeking these benefits by states included: Texas, 228,895; Mississippi, 76,728; and Louisiana, 51,780.

Of the 2,604,000 on-the-job or in educational institutions on April 1, Texas accounted for 154,313, Mississippi for 33,998, and Louisiana for 36,076.

VA estimated that 2,560,000 World War II veterans have been granted certificates of eligibility but have not yet entered training or educational courses for reasons of their own.

Men and women who served in World War II are enrolled in 25,000 colleges and other educational facilities and are taking on-the-job training in 365,000 factories, farms and offices.

Educational facilities being utilized in VA's Dallas Branch Area included 1,534 in Texas; 1,469 in Mississippi; and 887 in Louisiana.

Communities Need Good Old-Fashioned Spring Housecleaning

Austin, April 30.—A good old fashioned spring housecleaning in every city and community in Texas would do a great deal toward furthering good health in this state, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who said in Austin today.

"Cleanliness is next to Godliness" is still well worth emphasizing. A general clean-up program of state-wide proportions with the objective of bettering health conditions for our citizenship should include the surface cleaning of streets and alleys, proper drainage or fill-in of low areas, cleaning all parks and playgrounds and the clearing of weeds and rubbish off of vacant lots.

"The destruction of mosquito breeding places and rat harborage, the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the general cleaning up of all premises will be," said Dr. Cox, "of inestimable value in helping to keep down summer health hazards such as dysentery, typhoid, and poliomyelitis.

Good community housekeeping and ordinary sanitary measures require the prompt removal of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases, and insure good health protection throughout the State.

Dr. Cox stressed the fact that many dangerous diseases are filth-borne, and the only possible way to control them is to eliminate the insanitary conditions responsible for their spread.

Hico Senior Girls Invited to Visit St. Joseph's Hospital

Fort Worth, Tex., April 28.—A special invitation to the Hico High School senior girls to attend an open house in St. Joseph's Hospital in Fort Worth from 1 to 6 p. m. Saturday, May 10, was extended today.

The announcement was made by Sister Anna Joseph, director of nurses at the hospital.

The open house will be in celebration of National Hospital Day, which is May 12, the anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale, the English nurse who focused attention on the need for improved nursing and hospital service during the Crimean War.

Sister Anna Joseph explained that the celebration will be held two days early at St. Joseph's to give the girls interested in the nursing profession opportunity to visit the various hospital and School of Nursing departments on a day when they do not have to attend school.

The public is invited to the open house, but potential nurses will be given special attention. They will be taken on a tour of the hospital.

Refreshments will be served by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Hospital. In addition to commemorating the memory of Florence Nightingale, the open house will begin an extensive recruitment program which will continue until June 16, time for enrolling a new class of student nurses.

St. Joseph's School of Nursing is affiliated with Our Lady of Victory College in Fort Worth and Incarnate Word in San Antonio.

Students taking the three-year course are given two years of college credit as well as an RN.

Any single girl between the age of 17 and 20 who is a high school graduate or a college student is eligible to enter the school.

The American Hospital Association, in a nation-wide nurse recruitment program, has pointed out that the nursing profession has ever-growing opportunities for graduate nurses—with higher pay and better hours.

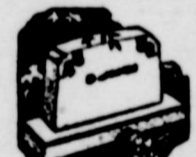
Eighth Grade

Notes From Office Of County Home Demonstration Agt.

Every week is Clean-Up Week. In many parts of the country now, Spring Clean-Up Time is being observed. No particular time has been set aside for Texas, however. A report from the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service states that every week can be clean-up week... and if we practice good clean-up methods all the year round we won't need a special week to emphasize the need for removing fire, accident and health hazards from the farm home.

Mrs. Bennice Claytor, Extension home management specialist, gives us a few items to keep a check on all year round. See that yards and all areas around the house are free of broken glass, barbed wire, boards with nails and other dangerous litter. Keep oil or paint-soaked rags only in covered metal cans. Make a regular tour of your basement, closets and attic to hunt for loose and piled paper or any material that's a fire hazard. And see that all steps, porches and stairways are kept in good repair, are well-lighted and clear of rubbish.

Of course there are a thousand things we could think of to check during a clean-up week. Mrs. Claytor believes that if we watch these things the year around, we can keep our homes in a condition that won't call for special attention at any certain season.

Red Spider

A threat to flower gardeners and ornamental shrub growers is the red spider, a tiny reddish mite just larger than a chigger. Entomologists of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service say that the spider can be controlled by dusting the plants thoroughly with finely ground dusting sulphur, applied when the mites are first noticed. Usually, two dustings, seven days apart, are sufficient.

A Diagnosis

Here's a diagnosis for flower gardeners. When the tips of flower leaves wither, curl up and die, and buds fail to open normally, it's a good bet that the trouble is being caused by thrips, which are small, slender-bodied insects which feed on many varieties of flowers, according to entomologists of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service.

Thrips vary in color from yellowish to dark brown and often almost black, and are less than one-tenth of an inch in length. Control measures consist of dusting with a five per cent DDT dust. It is also wise, say the entomologists, to keep old buds or blossoms removed from plants, to keep thrips from developing.

Festival Season At State Fair Grounds Opens On Midway

With special facilities for picnics and a full week-end of fun and relaxation, the State Fair of Texas this week issued a special invitation to the people of this area to join in the Fair's spring festival season which began with the opening of the spectacular new \$750,000 Midway.

The invitation came from W. H. Hitzelberger, Executive Vice President and General Manager of the State Fair, who announced that a new picnic pavilion would be available to families, school groups and organizations driving to Dallas for a week-end of enjoyment.

The State Fair grounds, in addition to the Midway, offers a host of educational and cultural features, such as the Hall of State, Museum of Fine Arts, Aquarium, Dallas Health Museum, and the Museum of Natural History.

One of the largest amusement parks in the Southwest, the Midway offers more than a half-mile of exciting rides and entertainment. Free shows are presented twice nightly, and three times on Sunday.

There are 46 concessions open for the spring festival season, including 22 rides in a colorful area lighted by 30 miles of gleaming neon and a half-million electric bulbs. Enough power is consumed along the Midway in a single night to serve a city of 30,000 persons.

There are rides and amusement for all age-groups, small scooters, boats, airplanes and even a miniature ferris wheel for the kiddies plus the largest merry-go-round in the world. Then there are others for exciting fun—the 50-mile-an-hour "Moon Rocket," the whirling Octopus, the soaring Flyoplane and Spitfire and many others.

"The State Fair of Texas," Mr. Hitzelberger declared, "is a non-profit organization sponsored for the enjoyment and education of the people of the state. We have complete facilities to suit every taste."

Mr. Hitzelberger said that large groups contemplating coming to Dallas should have their representatives write or contact Mr. Charles Kaigler, special events director, for reservations on the picnic pavilion.
