"The old fashioned theory that it is a good thing for children to have a number of the catching diseases and get them over with, has long since been known to be a serious and sometimes fatal error. onger a child can keep from havng these diseases, the better it s for him. Every child should be ompletely protected by vaccinaion or inoculation against any such diseases where an immunity can be produced.


Prompt diagnosis, good medical and nursing care give the patient the best chance for a satisfactory recovery without the serious complications that ometimes accompany even the mild forms of communicable disases. 

#### Most Accidents Occur In Home, Statistics Show

That fact is brought to light by rs. Eleise T. Johnson, family life ucation specialist of the Texas College Extension Service. an effort to make Texas parents

Over half of these 20,000 fatal cidents take place in the home. Mrs. Johnson says, and most of hem could be avoided.

Here are the principal causes of child accidents in the home: knives, scissors and other articles left within each of children; internal inelectric outlets and suffocation, particularly infants that become er angled in loose bed clothing: drowning, in the "old swimming ole" and even in the bathtub; and unshot wounds, due to firearms oft within reach of the child.

Mrs. Johnson offers the follow ing points as good methods of preventing these accidents. Protect the child, she says, by making his environment free of accident haz-And of course, he must be arn things by doing. And conition him by training; teach him he correct method of doing things while his habits are being formed. Finally, teach him to recognize danger and meet it, since all hazards are not avoidable.
