

## "MY TURN"

THE FOLLOWING is a repeat of the "My Turn" column which was published in this paper September 19, 1987, almost exactly three years ago. I feel more strongly about these comments today than I did then.

THE UNITED STATES has placed itself squarely in between Iran and Iraq in the Persian Gulf, which is a terribly precarious position in which to be. Those Aryan-Arabic peoples have been fighting among themselves since about 700 B.C.

Bloodshed, violence and martyrdom are a way of life which has been bred into their genes for centuries. What makes U.S. diplomats and politicians assume they can bargain peace between people who simply do not reason on the same level as peace-loving people?

So now we are endangering American lives while escorting oil tankers through the Persian Gulf with the distinct possibility of bringing the U.S. into a full-scale war. All of this is so that we can have enough oil and gas to run here and there in our cars, trucks and planes while the rich get richer. And, of course, we need lots of rocket fuel so that our missiles will be ready to blow other folks away when the occasion warrants.

When you get right down to it, all wars have been fought so that one side or the other can get richer, which translates into power. The rich start wars: the poor fight (and die) in those wars.

The U.S. seems to get into the mood to go and fight somebody's war about every 18 or 20 years, which is quite relevant since it takes just about that long to grow a new crop of young Americans to ship off to be maimed, killed and blown to bits on foreign soil.

If we thought Vietnam was a no-win war, just wait until we start sending our young people over to those countries which start with "I." Thinking Americans need to try to get the message across to the government that the youth of our nation are not an expendable commodity to be used for fighting foreign wars whenever the economy seems to need a boost.

When discussing preservation of our natural resources, the Chief of our Armed Forces should be aware of the fact that the young men and women of the USA are perhaps the most important natural resource that we have. They are the future of our country.

Instead of spending billions of dollars escorting Kuwaiti oil tankers through the Persian Gulf, wouldn't it make more sense to invest in furthering alternative energy sources in our own homeland? Technology and sources for other fuels are available to us here on U.S. soil, but are not being used to the fullest extent.

Experiments with grain products and also with feedlot manure have proven very effective in the production of ethanol fuel. Goodness knows, we have plenty of those two commodities in the Texas Panhandle. An expanded use of ethanol would be a boost to the sagging agricultural economy of our area. So why do we continue to use petroleum products which clog our motors and pollute our air? I simply don't understand.

Vice President Bush has expressed some interest in pushing grain ethanol production as a boost to the down-trodden farming industry. We need to get busy with some letters to our congressmen, both state and federal, to see what can be done to speed production of alternative energy sources for our country.

Wouldn't it be great if someday soon we could just tell the Persian Gulf countries to take their oil and shove it?

## Holly Makes Sweet News For Economy

Economic prospects here are sweeter in Hereford because of plans at the Holly Sugar factory to install a process that will extract up to ten per cent more sugar from sugar beets.

The molasses desugarization process to be utilized by the new facility, termed ion exclusion, originated in Scandinavia in the 1950's. However, the high-tech separation technique had no economic application to molasses desugarization in the U.S. until early 1981.

Now the process will appear in Hereford, ushering in a new decade of production for Imperial Holly Corporation and expanded economic opportunities for the Hereford community. New jobs will be created, tax revenue increased, and use of the Holly Sugar facilities will expand to 12 months per year.

Roger Hill, president of Holly Sugar Corporation, announced Holly's addition of the ion exclusion process at a press conference in Hereford, August 10, 1990. He described how the new \$12 million plant, which will be ready for the 1991 campaign, would increase sugar production

approximately 500,000 hundred-weight per year. The new facility will create up to 20 new employee positions.

Groundbreaking ceremonies at the site of the new plant were held on Thursday, September 13, 1990. Robert C. Hanna, president of Imperial Holly Corporation spoke to a gathering of company officials, along with local government and business leaders on the significance both of ion exclusion capabilities and the selection of Hereford for the Imperial Holly facility.

Imperial Sugar Company of Sugar Land, Texas acquired the Colorado Springs-based Holly Corporation in 1988 and merged it into Imperial Holly Corporation. At that time the new company embarked on a capital investment program intended, in Hanna's words, "to balance Imperial Holly Corporation's interests and increase its capabilities for the long term."

"In the past three years we have committed almost \$60 million to bringing factories up to their most modern potential," Hanna said. "The single most important item in that three-year program is the

new facility in Hereford for desugaring molasses—a \$12 million project in itself."

The Holly Sugar factory is one of Hereford's largest individual private employers, providing jobs for more than 400 citizens in a city of 18,000, and generating an annual payroll of \$5 million, according to Mike Carr of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce. Carr and other officials in Hereford are enthusiastic about Holly's influence on their region's economic outlook. "For growers it certainly will be a long-term gain, it will open avenues for the sugar industry and make it more solid than it ever has been," said Carr. "Hopefully allied industries will be attracted. If so, the tax base will be increased and it puts more jobs and more money in the economy. This enhances the entire business community and further stabilizes the beet industry."

Mayor Wes Fisher, who came to Hereford 13 years ago as the first agricultural manager for Holly Sugar, says he is elated and grateful for the confidence Holly has shown in the Hereford area. Hereford was chosen from among a number of communities for its proximity to the cattle feeding industry and because of the successful 26-year relationship between Holly and the Hereford community. "Our strongest asset is promoting agriculture and the cattle industry," Fisher said. "Anything that enhances the industry makes us more solid."

Imperial Holly Corporation, with eight beet sugar factories, and a cane sugar refinery at Sugar Land, is now the second largest publicly held sugar company in the United States and ranks among the Fortune 500 industrial corporations.

## Area Receives Some Great Rain

Up to 2.3 inches of rain was received in the Friona area last Sunday morning, and the moisture has been a considerable aid to farmers who were needing to plant their wheat.

"We hadn't had enough moisture to plant before this," said Wesley Barnett, who indicated he got about two inches of rain.

Alan Monroe, who lives southeast of Friona, received 2.3 inches, and this also boosted his wheat-planting activity.

"We got over two inches of rain out there and it didn't even run out at the end of the rows," said Clarence Monroe. "It was like getting money from home without even asking."

The rainfall was moving south to north, and was considerably

heavier to the south.

The measurement in Friona's official gauge for Sunday totalled only .54 inch. This was about the size of the rain to the north of town, also.

The Rhea area got from a half inch to .7 inch, according to Joe Allen. "Most of the farmers are through planting their wheat, and the wheat that's up looks good. We need a good general rain to get things in shape," Allen said.

Weather forecasters were predicting more rain for Thursday night and Friday, so hopefully there will be more of the good stuff coming our way.

# Friona Flashbacks

## 60 YEARS AGO--AUG. 15, 1930

The contract for transportation of pupils to and from school has been let to F.W. Reeve, who had the contract the past three years. Mr. Reeve is having all his chassis equipped with new bodies that will be attractive and comfortable for the inmates. This work is being done at Clovis and all ten busses will be in readiness for the beginning of school September 8. Mr. Reeve will supply the busses and superintend their operation and the school board will provide drivers.

## 55 YEARS AGO--AUG. 16, 1935

The Southwest Associated Telephone Company has had men at work building the lines and installing the phones on the party line between Friona and the Lakeview Community and from Friona to Rhea. More than a dozen new patrons will be added to the Friona central list.

## 50 YEARS AGO--AUG. 16, 1940

What might have easily been a serious affair happened at the home of Mr. and Mrs. James Bragg, south of town Saturday, when their small son, Clyde Ray, fell from the tractor on which he was riding with his father. The little fellow fell from the tractor in front of the disc drill and before the tractor would stop the plow was upon him. Fortunately, a disc passed on either side of the little body and he escaped with only a bad cut on one foot and a few scratches and bruises on other parts of his body.

## 45 YEARS AGO--AUG. 24, 1945

In addition to the interior arrangements and decorating at Friona State Bank, which was completed a few months ago, the bank's officers have just completed another job of improving the appearance of the interior of their banking room.

## 40 YEARS AGO--AUG. 10, 1950

Hugh E. Moseley of Friona was one of the 59 registrants to be processed by the pre-induction machinery of the Amarillo recruiting station Monday. Moseley, who had been called under the present draft step-up, took physical examinations at Amarillo and returned home to await further word from the Hereford office out of which the Parmer County registrants are handled.

## 35 YEARS AGO--AUG. 12, 1955

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas W. Martin of Honey Grove, Texas are announcing the engagement and approaching marriage of their daughter, Tommie, to Billy Joe Mercer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mercer. Vows will be repeated by the couple in the Friona Methodist Church September 3 at 7 p.m.

## 30 YEARS AGO--AUG. 11, 1960

Two Hereford, youths died almost instantly Sunday morning when their car ramed a tree two and one-half miles east of Bovina on Highway 60. The dead were identified as Bobby Gene Province and Harley Earl Davis, both 20. Investigating officers said the driver apparently went to sleep at the wheel since there were no skid marks before the crash.

## Dr. Johnson's Rites Are Held In Clovis

Funeral services for Dr. V. Scott Johnson, 89, were held September 17 at the Kingswood United Methodist Church in Clovis.

Burial was in Sunset Terrace Cemetery in Farwell.

Dr. Johnson was born in Dublin, Texas, on April 15, 1901 to Effie Perrick and Peter William Johnson. They moved to Spur in 1911, where he graduated from high school in 1917. He worked his way through Simmons University (now Hardin-Simmons) and through Baylor Medical School, graduating in 1929.

During his internship at Missouri Baptist Hospital in St. Louis from 1929-1930, he met Lucille Lampp. Upon completion of his internship, he moved first to Clovis, New Mexico, and then to Farwell.

He worked with Dr. William Lancaster from January 31, 1929 to April 15, 1930 when he moved to Farwell.

He opened his office on August 28, 1930 in the back of the building that is now Farwell City Hall, but at the time was Security State Bank. Lucille moved to Farwell in August 1930 to nurse for him. They were married May 5, 1931 in Nashville, Illinois.

In 1945, they moved the practice to Clovis. In 1946, the family moved, residing first at 1101 Gidding and then at 310 John Doe. On August 17, 1980, a celebration was given at Clovis at the Kingswood Methodist Church to commemorate the Johnsons' fifty years of service to the area. Dr. Johnson delivered nearly 3500 babies during his career.

This couple periodically took extra children into their home. In the 1940s, they bought and remodeled an airplane hangar which was dubbed "The Barn," and was a Christian place for young people to gather.

This couple educated not only their own children, but many others as well. They provided counseling to both parents and youth and were active in their church. After Mrs. Johnson's death, the Adult Sunday School Class at Kingswood was renamed "The Johnson Class."

Dr. Johnson was active with the Boy Scouts. He was instrumental in beginning the first school cafeteria in Farwell. He was also Chief of Staff at Clovis High Plains Hospital as well as being active in his church. On the occasion of his 85th birthday, in 1986, the Governor of New Mexico declared April 15 as Dr. V. Scott Johnson Day in the state. The mayor presented him a plaque to commemorate Dr. Johnson Day in Clovis.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Lucille, December 1, 1987. He is survived by three children: Marsha Cole of Farwell, Nancy Currier of Scottsdale, Arizona and V. Scott Johnson, II of Portales, and nine grandchildren.

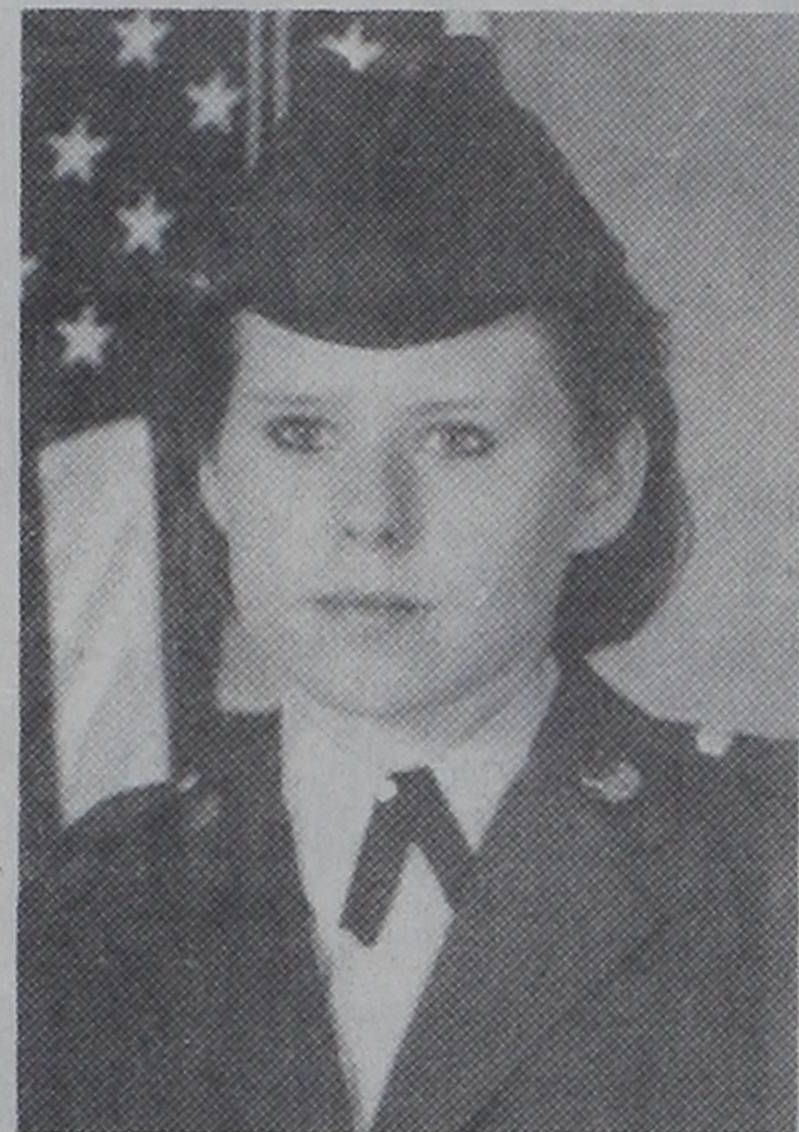

# Tahoka Ruins H'coming For Chieftains, 13-8

See if we invite the Tahoka Bulldogs back for homecoming at Friona.

The opportunistic Bulldogs, like Friona in a building stage in football, took advantage of five Friona turnovers and scored a 13-8 upset win over the Chieftains to spoil their homecoming party last Friday at Chieftain Field.

Friona, which had trouble with fumble and interceptions all night long, was able to get the ball into the end zone only once, and that came on a quick, two-play drive.

Otherwise, the Chieftains drove the ball inside Tahoka's 20-yard-line four other times, but came away with no additional points for their efforts.

Friona led in first downs, 21-8, in total yardage, 336-223, and in possession, running 67 offensive plays to Tahoka's 42. But the Bulldogs led in the main statistical department—points scored.

Tahoka had scouted Ismael Rocha pretty well, and held him well below the 243 yards rushing he had gained against River Road.

The Bulldog defense threw Rocha for four losses and caused him to cough up the ball on a fumble on one of his carries at the Tahoka 12-yard-line. Rocha finished with 86 yards on 23 carries, but scored Friona's only touchdown on a pass reception.

But Rocha's runningmate, Curtis Brady responded with a 150-yard performance as the Chieftains came up with a good offensive output for the second straight game.

And Daniel Saiz connected on six passes for 93 yards through the air. But three interceptions hurt the Chieftain cause, which showed flashes of brilliance throughout the game.

On Friona's second possession, Rocha fielded a Tahoka punt at his own 36, found a wall of blockers and raced 64 yards for the apparent go-ahead touchdown.

But the Chieftains were flagged for clipping, and the ball was returned to their own 35-yard line. Penalties plagued Friona, which amassed 80 yards in step-offs during the game.

Brady and Rocha's running advanced the ball to the Tahoka 14 after the nullified touchdown, but both runners were caught for one-yard losses, to bring up fourth and eight from the 16.

Mike Scott tried a 36-yard field goal which was plenty long but just wide left and again Friona was denied the scoreboard.

Early in the second quarter, Tahoka's Mike Rodriguez grabbed a pass from Trey Nance, and burned defender Marcus Reyes who went for the interception, and raced up the sidelines for the game's first score. A kick was good and Tahoka held a 7-0 lead with 10:56 left in the half.

Brady's 25-yard scamper moved the ball to the Tahoka 20 with 4:40 left in the half, and his hard run on third down kept the drive alive and gave Friona a first and goal situation at the Tahoka nine.

But Rocha was hit, recovering the ball back at the 11, then caught an eight-yard pass to the four. A bobbled snap caused Brady to be stopped for no gain, and on fourth down Saiz' pass was over Rocha's head in the end zone. Halftime arrived with the Chieftains on the short end of the 7-0 score.

Good defense on the part of the Chieftains kept Friona within striking distance all night.

The Chiefs forced a punt and Reyes fielded the ball at his own 15 and set sail up the west sidelines. Sixty yards later he was stopped at the Tahoka 25.

Rocha gained three yards, then was open in the end zone where Saiz lobbed him the ball for Friona's touchdown.

A try for two points worked, as Saiz ran to his left and hit Brady at the goal-line, as Friona took the lead at 8-7 with 4:09 left in the third quarter.

Scott Houston caught Mike Burleson from behind after a 59-yard pass play at the Friona ten, and the Chieftains made a great defensive stand to protect their lead.

The offense began what looked to be a drive from their 11 out to midfield, but then unraveled when the team was hit with three penalties in seven plays, two of them major penalties, and an interception stopped the drive.

A 25-yard pass gain from Saiz to Bryce McMurtrey was called back for a 15-yard penalty against Friona, which in effect cost the Chieftains 40 yards during this drive.

Again the Chiefs were burned on a long pass, as Nance hit Burleson on a 56-yard TD up the sidelines. A pass for the PAT was incomplete, but the visitors had regained the lead at 13-8 with 7:44

left in the game.

Rocha returned the kickoff to the Friona 45, and then gave the Chiefs a first down to the Tahoka 44. Brady ran three times for 26 yards, as Friona moved to the Bulldog 18. But Rocha was rolled down at the 12, the ball popped out and Tahoka recovered with 5:15 left.

The Chiefs got the ball back in good field position at the Tahoka 35. Rocha ran nine yards to the 24, and on a big play, Brady gained six for a first and goal at the Bulldog 10.

But on first down Saiz pulled out from center without the ball, and the visitors again played "pounce on the pigskin" as the Chieftains felt snakebit with 1:43 left.

A last-gasp attempt was fruitless as Friona got the ball back with 33 seconds to play, but had no time outs remaining.

# Echols Starting Receiver For SMU

Sometimes after SMU team meetings on road trips, wide receiver Daniel Echols breaks the tension of chalk talks in hotels by sitting behind a piano and becoming a lounge lizard.

"Sometimes the players put a cup on top of the piano and ask me to play requests," Echols said. "They make me feel like I'm in Las Vegas. It's a blast."

Echols played the requests of SMU coaches well when he switched from cornerback to wide receiver during spring practice. The simple experiment turned out to be one of the most pleasant finds of the spring when Echols became the replacement for starter Mitchell Glier, who graduated in May.

SMU coaches simply wanted to look at Echols as a receiver to see if he was capable of playing the position. They found Echols was a natural, and his training at defensive back actually made him a better offensive player.

Receivers in the Run-and-Shoot offense make decisions on their pass routes according to the look

the defense gives them. As a defensive back for two years, Echols learned the techniques and tricks of the position.

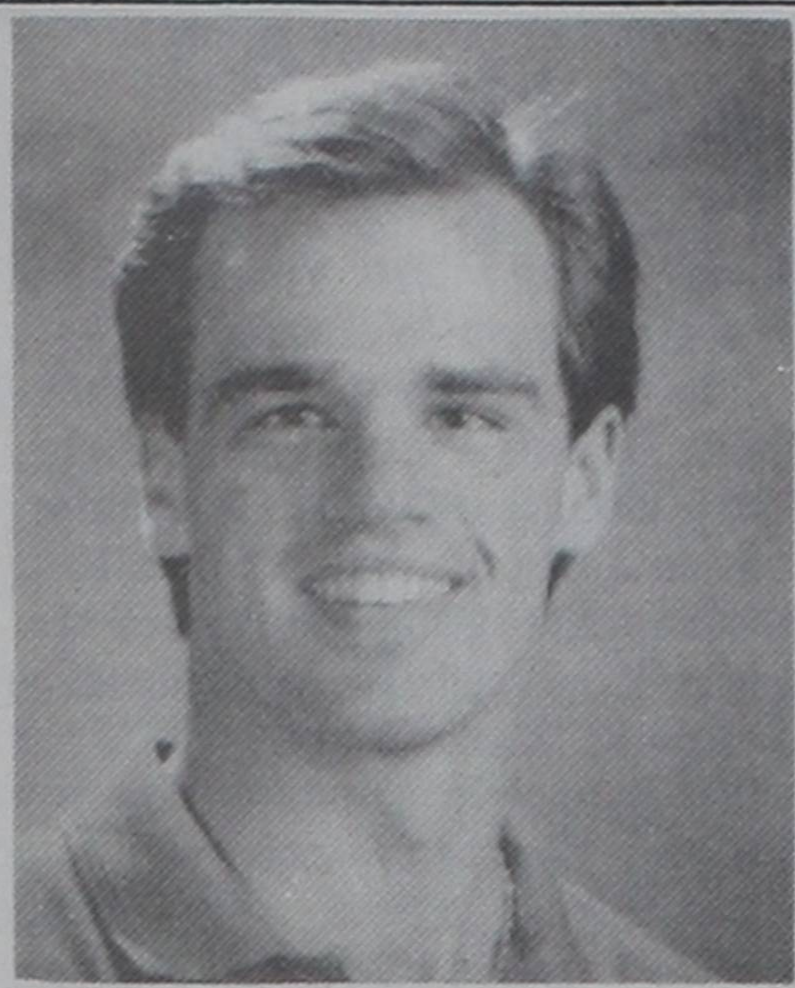
"All I remember from practice was No. 83 kept catching the ball," SMU offensive coordinator Larry Kueck said. "He kind of made himself a player. We would start the day waiting to see if he would drop the ball or mess up some routes, but he kept making catches. I really hope he has a big year."

Echols played quarterback and safety at Friona High School in West Texas, and was recruited to play wide receiver at SMU. But when he arrived at SMU his 4.5-second speed in the 40-yard dash was at a premium on defense. Echols was among the group of players that practiced throughout the fall of 1988 but didn't play a game because university officials cancelled the 1988 season. At the time, Echols was the fastest member of the secondary.

But when SMU recruited seven defensive backs for last season, Echols found himself on the second team and played in eight games. After the season, the Mustangs were looking for speed at the outside receiver position and moved Echols to offense.

"Either way, I would of been happy," Echols said, "But I think the coaches saw I was better suited for offense. Now I can read the technique and see if they're playing man-to-man or zone (defense) and then run the right route. You learn the moves, and you try to exploit what you do well."

SMU players and coaches aren't very surprised Echols picked up the offense so quickly. Echols, who academically is a junior, has a 3.8 grade-point average and is majoring in psychology. Echols wants to graduate next year and

then attend graduate school with hopes of eventually being a counselor or even a psychologist.

Echols bruised his shoulder Tuesday making a diving catch, but is expected to return to practice later this week and start in the Mustangs' opener against Vanderbilt at Ownby Stadium on September 8. Echols is being pushed hard by freshman Brian Perry who is one of the fastest wide receivers on the team with 4.4-second speed in the 40-yard dash.

## PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1990

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

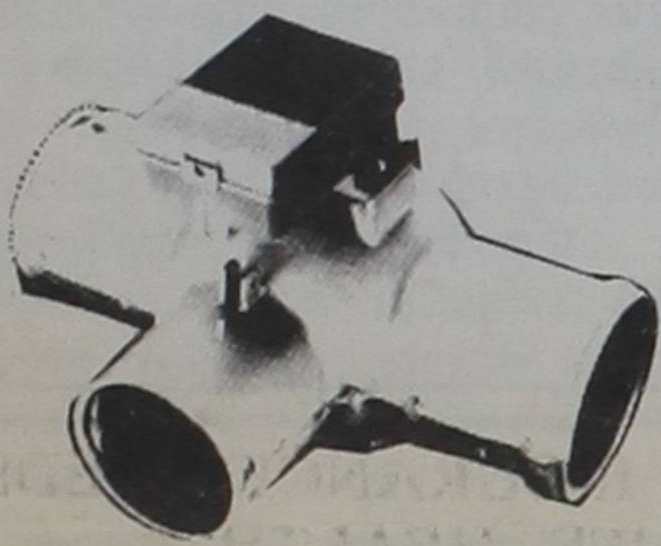
"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

### A Recession Is Not A Panic

Being a student of history may not make you a better investor, but it can help put economic problems into perspective.

Take, for example, the economic downturn or "recession." We didn't hear much about recessions before the market collapse of October 24, 1929 and the ensuing "Great Depression"--not because a recession never happened, but because they had previously been called "panics."

In his book, "199 Things Every American Should Know," John A. Garraty, chairman of the Department of History at Columbia University, recalls six major economic "panics":

**The Panic of 1819**--This panic followed the War of 1812 and was triggered by an agriculture slowdown. Agricultural prices plummeted, and farmers were unable to pay their debts. There were foreclosures and bank failures nationwide. This lasted until about 1822.

**The Panic of 1837**--"Wildcat" state banks made easy credit available, which led to a boom in Western land sales as well as major canal and road construction. In 1836 Andrew Jackson proclaimed that all purchases of government land had to be paid for in gold or silver--banks suffered mass withdrawals, which led to credit restrictions, bank failures and mass panic.

**The Panic of 1857**--After the

Crimean War, increased exports of Russian wheat caused U.S. grain prices to spiral downward. Western farmers were most affected, and, as a result, hundreds of rural banks collapsed.

**The Panic of 1873**--When the banking house of Jay Cooke and Co. failed, the New York Stock Exchange closed for ten days to stabilize falling prices. The ensuing panic was the most severe up to that time.

**The Panic of 1893**--Bank failures and business bankruptcies fueled an economic decline. In the United States there was a dispute over the coinage of silver, and the Treasury's declining gold reserves fell below the critical hundred-million-dollar mark. To avoid bankruptcy, the government had to borrow gold from private banker J.P. Morgan.

As you can see, economic recessions have always been a part of U.S. history. They are not generally long-lived and have never proved devastating.

Fruit and tomatoes, which are really not vegetables as most of us classify them, can be canned in the oven. She even shared the directions, which were given to her by Eva Dilger Baxter of Rye, Colorado, so I am sharing them with our readers.

**APPLES:** Peel and quarter, place in jars. Cover with syrup of sugar and water. Cook 35 minutes in 275 degree oven.

**APRICOTS:** Pack whole apricots in jars. Cover with syrup. Cook 35 minutes at 275 degrees.

**PEACHES AND PEARS:** Peel and half. Pack in jars. Cover with syrup. Cook 35 minutes in 275 degree oven.

**PLUMS:** Prick with fork, pack in jars and cover with syrup. Cook 45 minutes in 275 degree oven.

**TOMATOES:** Pack in jars tightly. Do not add water. Start in cold oven. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon citric acid per pint. Cook 45 minutes in 275 degree oven.

When fruit raises 1/8 inch from bottom of jars, it is cooked.

For apples, peaches, apricots, pears and plums, heat oven before placing jars on bottom rack, which has been covered with foil.

Apples, peaches and pears may be put in water with Fruit Fresh after peeling. Add 1/2 teaspoon more Fruit Fresh per pint before pouring syrup in jars for more colorful fruit.

**FOR DIABETICS:** Use 2 heaping teaspoons Sugar Twin for each pint. Add boiling water to make syrup.

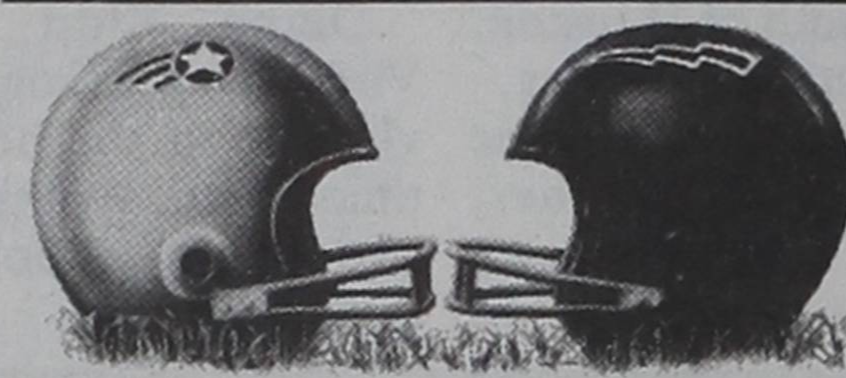

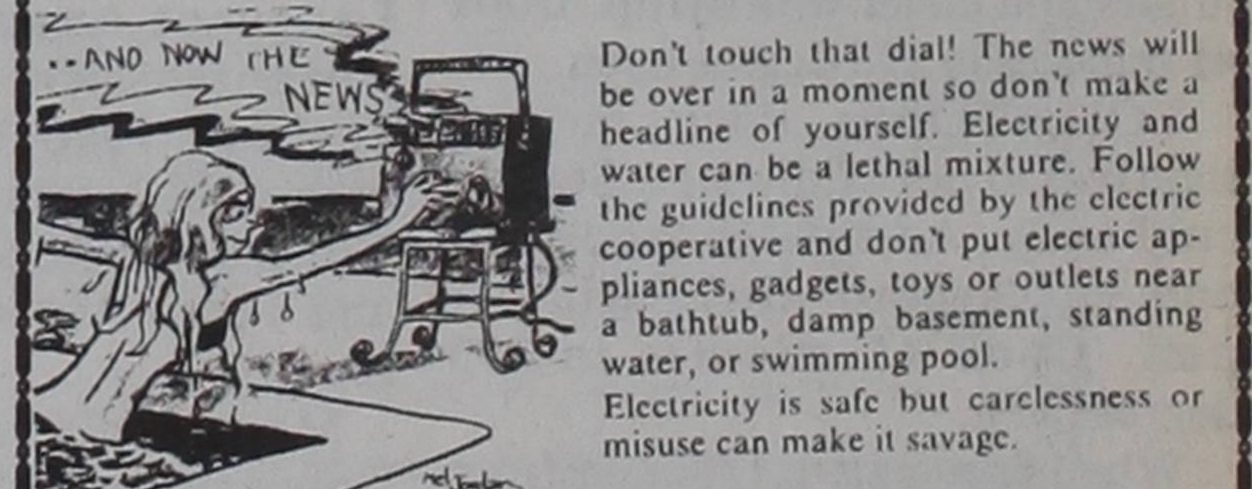
