This Thanksgiving season makes its advent at a time when the whole civilized world is conscious of social disorder, mistrust, avarice and unrest. America, rich in resources and in tradition, with all her cherished ideals and democratic principles, finds herself, as other nations, bereft of a solution to calm the troubled waters of earth.

World War II veterans desiring to study abroad can qualify for benefits at the same time under both the G-I Bill and the Fulbright Act administered by the State Department, the Veterans Administration ruled this week

The VA ruling held that payments of education and training benefits under the G-I Bill may be made to student-veterans regardless of any grants made to them under the Fulbright Act, since the funds used to administer the Fulbright Act were not secured from United States Government appro-

The Fulbright Act, passed by the 79th Congress, provides for grants in aid to American students for study abroad or to foreign students for study in this country with costs defrayed by credits acquired through sale of surplus

property abroad. The Act also specifies that veterans of World Wars I and II must be given preference by the 10-man Board of Foreign Scholarships which awards the study grants.

It is hoped that a limited number of grants will be made under the Fulbright Act for the academic year 1948-49. Applications are not being received at this time, but persons desiring information on the program may obtain it from the Division of International Exchange of Persons. Department of State, Washington 25, D. C.

Almost all of the 2,013,000 World War II veterans who completed or dropped out of school or job training courses they began under laws administered by the Veterans Administration are eligible for additional training.

VA said this week that all but 29,000 of these veterans interruptwaite some ten years ago when ed or discontinued their training she bought the Melba and operated before they had used all of the training time for which their active war service qualified them.

Highest bidders are to get designated lots of oxygen cylinders. valves and accessories in a bid sale on surplus property offered by War Assets Administration until Thousands of them are being offered through the Customer Service Center of WAA at Grand Prairie, Texas. The items, however, are all located at the Tinker Field disposal depot at Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The sale is open to everybody and inspections may be made at Tinker Field from 8:30 a. m. until 3:30 p. m., Monday through Friday except holidays until the sale closes.

Three locomotives of various types for sale through competitive bids to priority and commercial buyers are being offered through the Customer Service Center of War Assets Administration at the Grand Prairie zone offices. They are steam, diesel and gasoline powered. Bid opening date on these locomotives is December 11. Casting frames, blocks and lamps are listed in the same sale. The diesel and steam engines are located at the Louisiana Ordnance Plant at Shreveport, La., and the gasoline locomotive is stored at Ellington Field at Houston, Texas.

#### Marry Young? Marry Old?





ver as an acute infectious disease the onset of which is sudden. The first symptoms including throat, vomiting, fever, and headache, may appear in three to five days after exposure. These are followed by the distinctive scarlet rash which gives this disease its name. Dr. Cox stated.

Complications can result in prolonged disability or death. Children suffering with scarlet fever may develop sinusitis and middleear infections which can lead to mastoiditis. As the germs spread through the child's system, the joints, kidneys, and heart may be come involved, causing life-long invalidism or crippling.

"A child with any kind of sore throat should be seen by the family physician promptly," Dr. Cox urged. "If scarlet fever is pres ent, the treatment the doctor pre scribes will do much to alleviate discomfort, and reduce the possibility of dangerous complications.
