Concurrent with the open house will be dedication of two rooms furniture and furnishings for which have been donated. Time for the annual stockholders meeting of the Hico Hospital has been set for next Thursday night, December 11, starting at 7:30 p. m. at Fireman's Hall, according to notices sent out this week. At this time the annual election of officers and directors will be held, and such other business as may properly come before the meeting will be transacted. The local hospital, which was opened for receiving patients less than a year ago, has shown marvelous progress and is filling a genuine need throughout the entire community. The officers and directors are anxious to have as good a representation as possible from stockholders interested in reports to be made at the meeting.

As is the custom of the Chamber, since the December meeting comes so close to Christmas, it was decided to omit the December meeting and assemble again the first Tuesday in January, 1948. Local Purina Dealer Announces A Good Plan to Save Grain

Webb McEver has announced a plan for feeders of this area to save grain by following a nationwide program launched by the Ralston Purina Company at a meeting held November 20, at Clifton. This plan which calls for grain saving through such practices as efficient feeding, elimination of waste, proper sanitation, marketing non-productive poultry and animals, and balancing the farmer's own grain, was explained in detail by L. M. Gardner, district salesman for the Ralston Purina Company.

By following a program of good breeding, sound management, good feeding and careful sanitation, the poultry and livestock producer can produce milk, meat and eggs at a profitable level and still save grains so urgently needed abroad.

Specifically, the program outlined by L. M. Gardner calls for (1) marketing hens that have stopped laying and selling low producing cows, (2) balancing feed rations to save feed, (3) feeding cows and poultry according to their production, (4) marketing hogs and broilers early, and (5) eliminating waste caused by disease, worms, and rats.

The purpose of the meeting was to train members of McEver and Sanders to aid farmers in this area in cooperating with the national grain saving program.
