Record Crowd At Tuesday's C-C Meeting

Keeney's Serves 38 Preceding Lively Business Session

The local Chamber of Commerce met in regular session Tuesday, March 30, at 7:00 p. m., with 38 members and guests being served. After this the attendants retired to the City Fire Hall for the business session, with two other members joining to make a total of 49 of the 65 members present.

The following account is taken from the notes of M. S. Norton, secretary:

President J. B. Woodard introduced the guest speaker for the night, Mr. R. C. Madely, District Conservationist from Stephenville. Mr. Madely in turn introduced the following district supervisors in the soil conservation program: Walter Hamilton and Bill Heizer, Dublin; Cliff Tinkle, Fairy; Elmo Newsome, Hamilton; Rance Phillips, Iredell, and Mr. Chenault of Hamilton, with the PMA.

The above named men presented a very interesting and challenging program of soil conservation which was well received by the audience. Each speaker brought out the fact that our soil in this area as well as the nation over is going fast and it is only a matter of a few years until our soil will not yield a productive living for the land owner unless something is done to conserve the top soil. The soil conservation program is set up to help the land owner help himself and all men interested in saving the soil and future productivity of the land should contact the district supervisor in his neighborhood, whose name is listed above, and tell him your needs and he will help you do something about it. The Chamber of Commerce stands ready to help in any way possible.

The president also introduced Mr. Ray, Mr. Nonce and Mr. Knudson, new members of the Chamber of Commerce.

Buddy Randalls reported that the Red Cross goal was successfully reached and appreciation was expressed for assistance from the Chamber and individual members. Jack Nonce, general chairman of the Stock Show Committee, reported a job well done on the past stock show and explained that a bigger and better show is in the making for next year.

Bill Norton made a motion that the Chamber donate \$10.00 to the Firemen's Social Fund. This was seconded by H. N. Wolfe. Carried.

A discussion was brought about in regard to a public address system for use in the Hico area. A motion was made by Buddy Randalls that a committee be appointed to investigate a good speaker system; seconded by S. J. Cheek and amended by H. V. Hedges that the committee be empowered to act if a desirable system be located. Seconded by Bill Norton, and carried. The chair appointed Morse Ross, H. V. Hedges and Odus Petsick to this committee.

Odus Petsick announced that a meeting is being held Friday night at 7:30 p. m. at the Bluebonnet Country Club to discuss the possibility of putting the property in first-class state of repair. The discussion can be summed up in this plea by a member:

"Fellow Hicoans, we have something out at the Bluebonnet Country Club and only a few have ever done anything about it. There is a \$50,000 project out there and it hasn't cost us a penny except for maintenance. The clubhouse needs repair; the fences need fixing up, and new things need to be added for additional recreation.

"This is not just a golfer's haven, but it is a spot that can be developed into a real amusement place for all ages.

"Let's all go out Friday night and see what the loyal ones have in mind. Offer your suggestions, and let's all get in on the nominal dues and blue the Bluebonnet Club up a bit. It should be to all of us—and all of us should belong to it."

Veterans Have Until July 31st to Reinstate Lapsed GI Insurance

Service for Southwestern veterans on their GI insurance is now on a current basis, D. C. Pray, Director of Insurance in the Dallas Branch Office of VA, has informed the VA Waco Regional Office.

Elimination of wartime backlogs together with greatly improved service is prompting thousands of veterans in this area to reinstate lapsed insurance originally issued to most persons serving in the armed forces during World War II, Pray said.

He revealed that reinstatements of GI policies in the Dallas Branch Area (Texas, Louisiana, and Mississippi) now amount to about 5,000 per month with a face value of approximately \$30,000,000. This is the highest rate of reinstatement since the war ended.

Veterans have until July 31 to reinstate lapsed term policies under present liberal regulations, Pray said.

"Premiums received by the Insurance Service of VA at Dallas are now deposited within 24 hours after they reach our Collections Unit, and are normally entered on individual premium account cards within 48 hours thereafter," Pray declared.

"Receipts for these premiums are mailed promptly to veterans, and the notice for the next premium due is issued at least ten days before the first of the following month."

The only cases presently involving delays in the Dallas Office are for those veterans whose records are in another VA Branch Office, the VA Insurance Director said.

"In such cases," he explained, "we are expediting the transfer of records from other sections of the nation, and notifying veterans concerned that a final reply to their insurance inquiry will be made as soon as the records are received in Dallas."

"If we have a veteran's records in Dallas, which is now the case for nearly all ex-service people in our three-state area, we can give him any kind of service he desires with reasonable promptness."

Pray requested that any veterans in this area, who have not received explanations for delayed service, write to him personally at the Dallas Branch Office, marking their letters "Personal and Confidential."

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—What happens if a disabled veteran fails in his course while he is being rehabilitated under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16)?

A—Generally, Veterans Administration will take special steps to enter him in another course in which there is every likelihood he will be able to complete successfully. The situation depends on the facts and the circumstances in each case.

Q—I am considered totally disabled for insurance purposes but receive only 20 per cent for compensation. Can my award be increased?

A—Your compensation will be increased only if the service-connected disability is shown to have increased in severity. For insurance purposes, there may be other disabilities, not service-connected, which, combined with the compensable condition produce total disability. Facts and material for determining the existence of permanent and total disability are different in insurance and compensation matters.

Q—What are the conditions of eligibility for rehabilitation under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act?

A—A disabled veteran must have had active service on or after September 16, 1940 and before July 25, 1947, with a discharge under conditions other than dishonorable.

He also must have a compensable service-connected disability incurred in or aggravated by such service. He must be in need of vocational rehabilitation to overcome the handicap of his disability.

Two Trustees To Be Elected Here Saturday

Two school trustees are to be chosen in an election ordered for Saturday, April 3, over the signatures of E. C. Allison, president, and W. M. Horsley, secretary of the Hico County Line Independent School District.

County Judge Eugene Tate reported in a telephone conversation from Hamilton Thursday afternoon that three names would appear on the ballot, as follows:

- H. G. (Grady) Wolfe
- W. E. (Bill) Alexander
- Herschel W. Sherrard.

Only two places are to be filled, those of present members whose terms are expiring: J. D. Jones and Hardy Parker.

J. W. Autrey, A. A. Brown, and D. P. McCarty have been appointed to hold the election at City Hall in Hico.

According to an additional order over the signature of County Judge Tate, one county trustee and one county trustee at large are also to be selected. Names of candidates for these offices were not immediately available.

Fire Damage Loss At Stephenville \$50,000

Stephenville, March 27.—An early morning fire which damaged three business buildings here Saturday entailed a loss estimated at \$50,000.

The blaze, which broke out at 3 a. m., was believed to have originated in the motor of a refrigeration unit at George Minter's grocery and market, where the heaviest loss occurred. Mel Morrow's Cafe and the Star barber shop, in adjoining buildings, reported losses of \$19,000 and \$5,000, respectively.

The same buildings, located just off the square on Highway 377, were damaged by fire two years ago.

Minter owns his own building and that occupied by the barber shop, operated by Caleb Smith. The cafe building is owned by Homer Nix.

LOCAL FIRM OPENS NEW HOUSE IN FORT WORTH

operation, transporting fresh merchandise from the growers to the plants for processing and to make wholesale deliveries in Fort Worth and Dallas.

Mrs. Knox and Mrs. Tulloh are in charge of the general offices in Fort Worth and also take care of the retail trade.

Weekly SURPLUS NEWS

War Assets Administration is soon to stage another nation-wide clearance of surplus aircraft under both fixed prices and sealed bids from veterans and other buyers. A total of 336 planes, 90 per cent located at Bush Field, Ga., are in the offering. Tactical, training and transport airplanes are included, with one C-47 transport on sale at Walnut Springs, Ark. On the fixed price portion, veteran buying begins March 29, with other classes buying in successive later periods. The sealed bid sale stipulated that purchase offers must be in the hands of WAA's Washington, D. C., office by March 29.

More than 80 communities over the length and breadth of Texas now have surplus chapels purchased through the War Assets Administration. In the state, a total of 109 churches, schools and veteran or charity groups received the chapels. Awards were approved by the office of Chief of Chaplains at prices ranging from \$271 to \$3100 per building. Top on the list for number of chapels received were Dallas and Abilene, with six buildings each. Other towns receiving more than one included Grand Prairie, Waco, Wichita Falls, Brownsville, Mineral Wells, Brownwood, Belton, and San Antonio. The chapels came from 36 military installations in every section of the state.

One of the major site clearances of the region will take place in a few days at Tinker Field, Oklahoma. With veterans and others accorded preference according to the sequence of buying, \$1,750 worth of surplus will be sold by spot bidding April 8. The inspection will be April 5, 6 and 7. Among the hundreds of items will be four trucks, 12,000 raincoats, storage batteries, 500 auxiliary light plants and office furniture. About a hundred lots will be in the offering. A final clearance of the New Orleans Consolidated Vultee plant is also being planned.
