Vicki Knight Tells About Saudi Arabia

ISG Vicki Knight, a Friona native and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.E. Knight, is one of the local residents involved in "Operation Desert Shield" in Saudi Arabia.

The Knights this week shared with Friona Star readers a letter from Vicki that told a little about her surroundings and how the U.S. troops are managing during the

current situation.

Vicki has been in the U.S. Army since 1976, trained as a helicopter mechanic, and later was an inspector. She currently is in charge of record-keeping as a First Sergeant.

Following are excerpts from her letter:

"We are surrounded by white sand—it looks like snow that has just started to melt and get a little greyish or dirty tinge...It seems to be of a heavier, grainier consistency which separates from this white, powdery stuff that coats and permeates everything.

"If there's no breeze or wind the heat is really bad, but when there is, it keeps the dust up to where there is a constant haze.

"We are living in a three-story

concrete parking garage that is under construction at an international airport also being built. It's actually not too bad here.

"I don't know how many troops are here in the parking garage, but do know our entire aviation brigade from Ft. Campbell is here, as well as units from Germany and Georgia, and I don't know how many other places. There are two people per parking stall and the place is pretty well-filled. I would guess 5,000 people or more.

"We have breakfast, pre-packaged individual meals or T-rations which are in containers about the size of a 9x13-inch pan with the top sealed. These are heated in boiling water and then served on a plate in portions kinda like in a cafeteria. They're not too bad, but are definitely not home cooking.

"I'm beginning to understand how you felt, Mom, during the Dust Bowl Days. This powdery dust is in everything, and it's so fine it even gets into things that are covered up. The parking garage shields us from the sun, but the sides are open, so it doesn't keep out the dust.

"We got here after the summer heat and it's been staying around 99 to 105 degrees during the hottest part of the day, instead of 120 degrees or more.

"It looks like most of us will be here a year or more, even if there are no hostilities. I guess that does away with Germany, at least for now.

"We see a Saudi Arabian newspaper, in English. Today it said the U.N. is leaning toward taking military action to go into Iraq and Kuwait and end Saddam Hussein's reign, and that if the U.N. votes to do so, Russia will send in troops to support us. It'd sure be nice to know that the U.N. and the rest of the world were backing us with more than just words.

"I want ya'll to know that no matter what happens over here, I'm here because it's what I've chosen to do with my life and that I feel a responsibility to the U.S. to try and keep it strong because no matter what anyone says, it's the best on this Earth at this time. Maybe I'm old fashioned or maybe I saw too many John Wayne movies as a kid. All I know is that if the U.S. lets a nut like Hussein run wild over here, it won't be long until someone will decide they can run roughshod over us at home, too.

....Don't worry, I'll be home before you know it."

Samarron To Defend Wt. Record

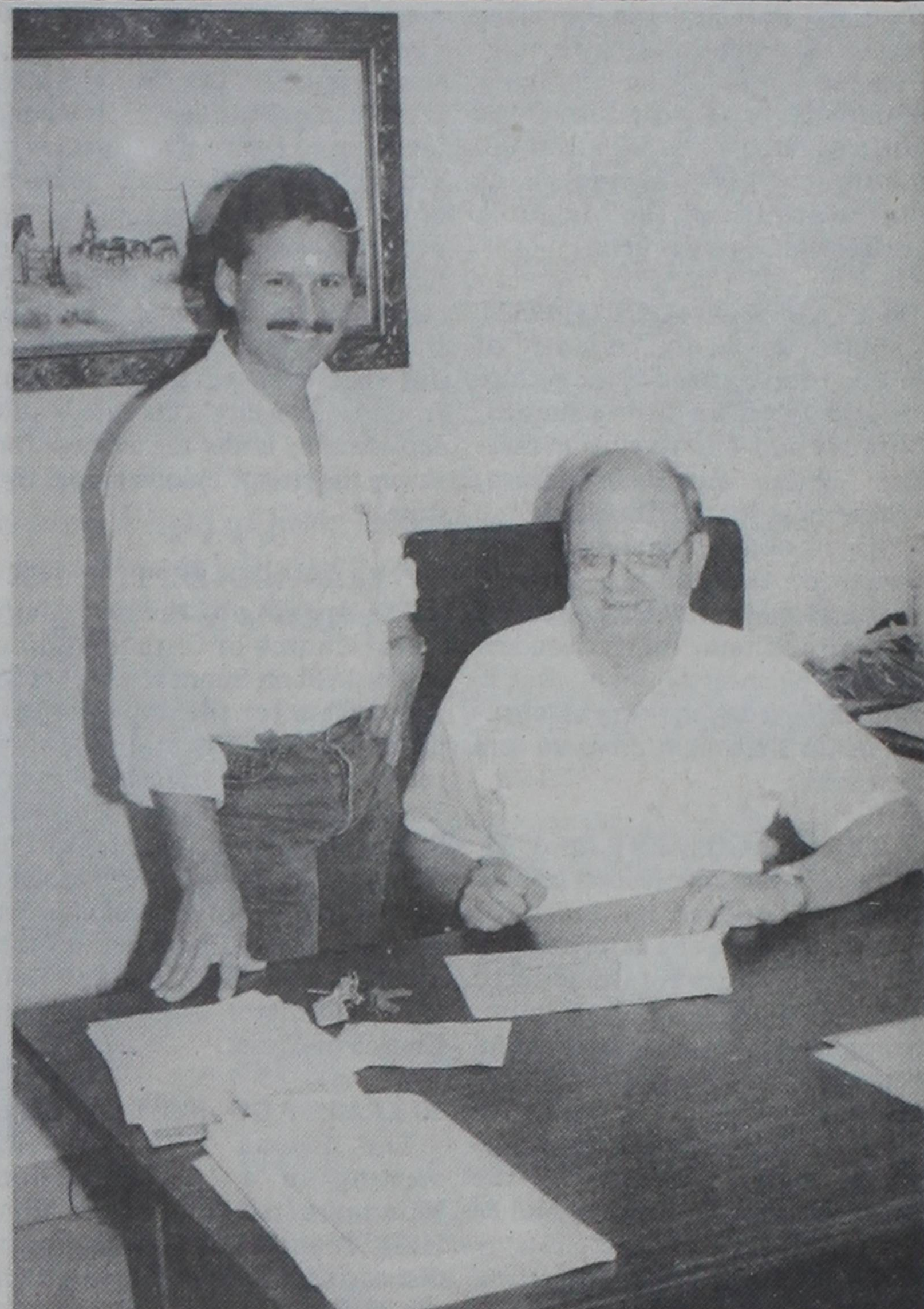
Richard Samarron, who at age 20 has already made a name for himself in national and international power-lifting circles, will be going to Russia November 23 to defend his international title.

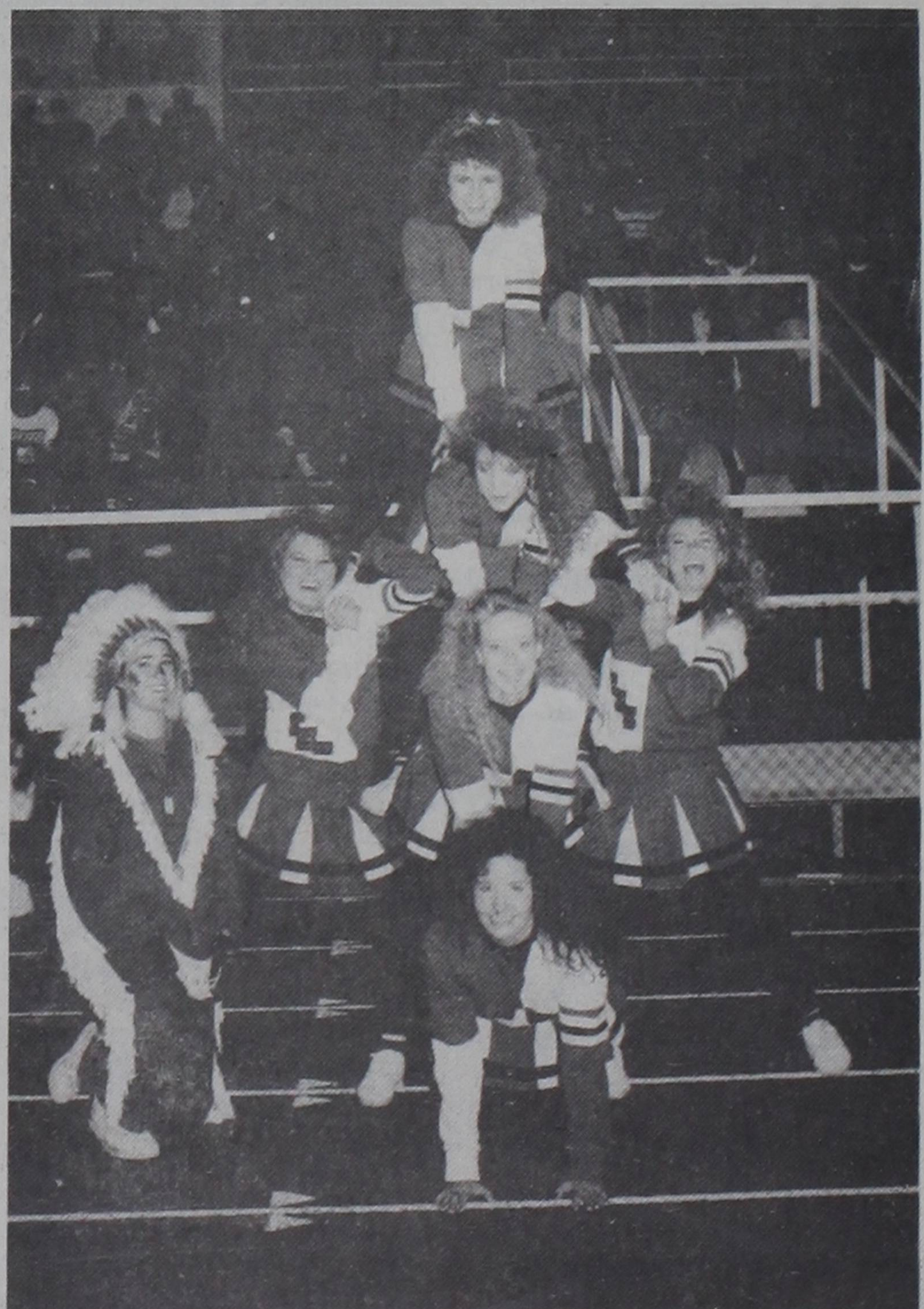
"Parents and supporters are needed to cheer the band on. There is a \$2.00 admission for the

Lonnie Baxter, 89, died in Clovis, New Mexico Sunday, October 14. Services were held Tuesday, October 16 at the Steed-Todd Funeral Home Chapel with Condy Billingsley officiating.
Burial was in Long Haven Memorial Garden under the direction of Steed-Todd Funeral Home of Clovis.

He was born September 25, 1901 in Weatherford, Oklahoma. He was a resident of Clovis. He moved to Friona in 1935 from Elk City, Oklahoma, where he farmed and was a rural mail carrier for 13 years. He moved to Clovis from Friona in 1948 where he ranched southeast of Melrose.
Baxter was co-owner and operator of the 4-C's Company Sale Barn for seven years. He was in real estate in the early 1960s and was still active in ranching with his son, Ralph.

Baxter was a member of the West 21st Street Church of Christ in Clovis, was a member of the Curry County Mounted Patrol and the New Mexico Cattle Growers.

He married Jewell Word June 25, 1919 in Elk City, Oklahoma.

40 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 28, 1950

Friona city commissioners and mayor met Tuesday and unanimously framed ordinances setting the city tax rate at \$1.25 representing a twenty-five cent increase over the previous levy. This action followed on the heels of increased agitation for a paving program for Friona, heretofore blocked by lack of sufficient credit earned by the city under its old tax structure. Mayor Bainum pointed out that even with the old tax structure, the city's tax rate is still considerably under the average for towns the size of Friona across the state.

35 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 30, 1955

The opening of the new Sixth Street Church of Christ building will be held on Sunday, October 2. A program for the day has been planned. The formal opening services will be held at 3 p.m. There will be three guest speakers, Stanley Lockhart, minister of the Church of Christ at Levelland, and former pastor of the local church; Doyle Chapin, minister of the Vega Church of Christ, and Bob Wear, minister of the Canyon Church of Christ.

30 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 29, 1960

The Friona City Council, meeting in a special session Monday afternoon at the City Hall, spent about three hours discussing a budget under which the city of Friona will operate during the tax year, October 1, 1960 to September 30, 1961. This is the first year that the city has operated under a budget set up on a tax year; as previous budgets were based on calendar years. The budget just ended was based on a nine-month period.

25 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 30, 1965

The enrollment in Friona Public Schools is up almost nine per cent over last year, it was revealed this week by Superintendent Alton Farr. Current enrollment was listed the past week at 1367, which was an increase of 111 students over the 1256 total at the end of the 1964-65 school year.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 1, 1970

Business places in the city of Friona will begin collecting the one-cent city sales tax on all purchases starting Thursday, October 1. City Manager Jake Outland reminded merchants that the city sales tax will be collected on everything that currently is taxable. Merchants will simply add the extra penny to each \$1 purchase.

15 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 28, 1975

"This project actually had its beginning back in the 1920s, when people living to the south of Friona had problems crossing the draw at times when they needed to come to Friona," said Mayor R.L. Fleming during his remarks at dedication ceremonies at the new overpass into the city Tuesday. Also speaking on the program was George C. Wall, Jr., district engineer for the highway department's Lubbock district.

10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 19, 1980

Friona Chieftain Band's marching percussion section came home with top honors from the Drum Corp competition held last Saturday at Texas Tech. 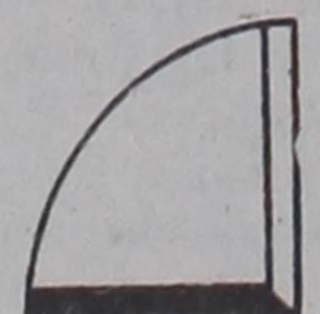

Good Crowd Hears Advice To 'Seniors'

Highlight of the Friona Senior Citizens' monthly luncheon at Friendship House Tuesday, October 16, was the Medicare Seminar for "seniors." Roy V. Miller, president,

welcomed over fifty people who registered and introduced Van E. Dryden, LUTCE, who spoke on the diverse areas of concern "seniors" all have in the rapidly changing Medicare situation, and Jo Blackwell, Prairie Acres administrator, who enlightened those attending by giving the facts about long-term care.

Especially helpful was Dryden's explaining forms and discussing the mysteries of part "A" and part "B" Medicare in regard to Medicare supplements and what to look for, along with shopping tips, in key areas.

"Be very alert to percentages," Dryden said. "Take time to figure out, dollar-wise, what 100 per cent to 200 per cent approved by an offered supplement policy actually is. Or is it 100 per cent usual and customary, or 100 per cent actual

charge?"

Your signature is legal and binding. Read everything. See that no blank spaces are left. He said he was not connected with any state or government agency. He is an instructor for several colleges and professional organizations.

Dryden gave the phone number to call to obtain a list of physicians who accept assignment, and told how to obtain information here in Texas that will protect the "seniors."

Jo Blackwell, who has been in long term care for over 25 years, stated that Prairie Acres is no longer designated as an intermediate care nursing home. In Texas, as of October 1, 1990, all are Certified Nursing Facilities.

The intricacy involved in admittance to a long-term nursing facility under Medicare vs. Medicaid was discussed by Ms. Blackwell with answers to the perplexing "whys, wheres, hows and whos" questions from the group.

Prairie Acres is contractual with the V.A. Administration. There is help for spouses, also.

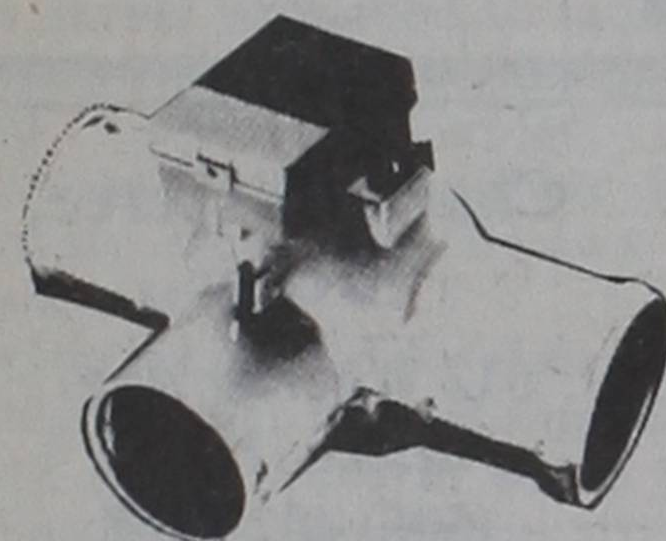

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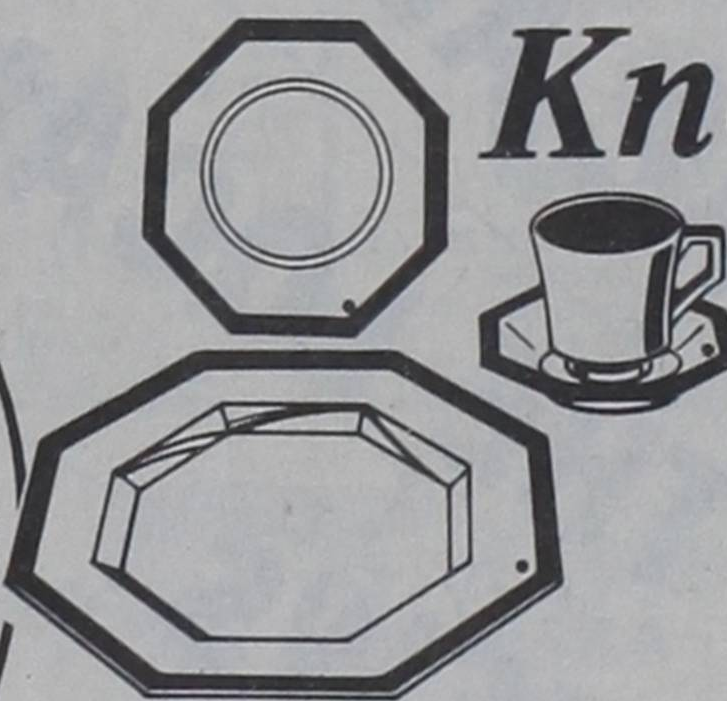

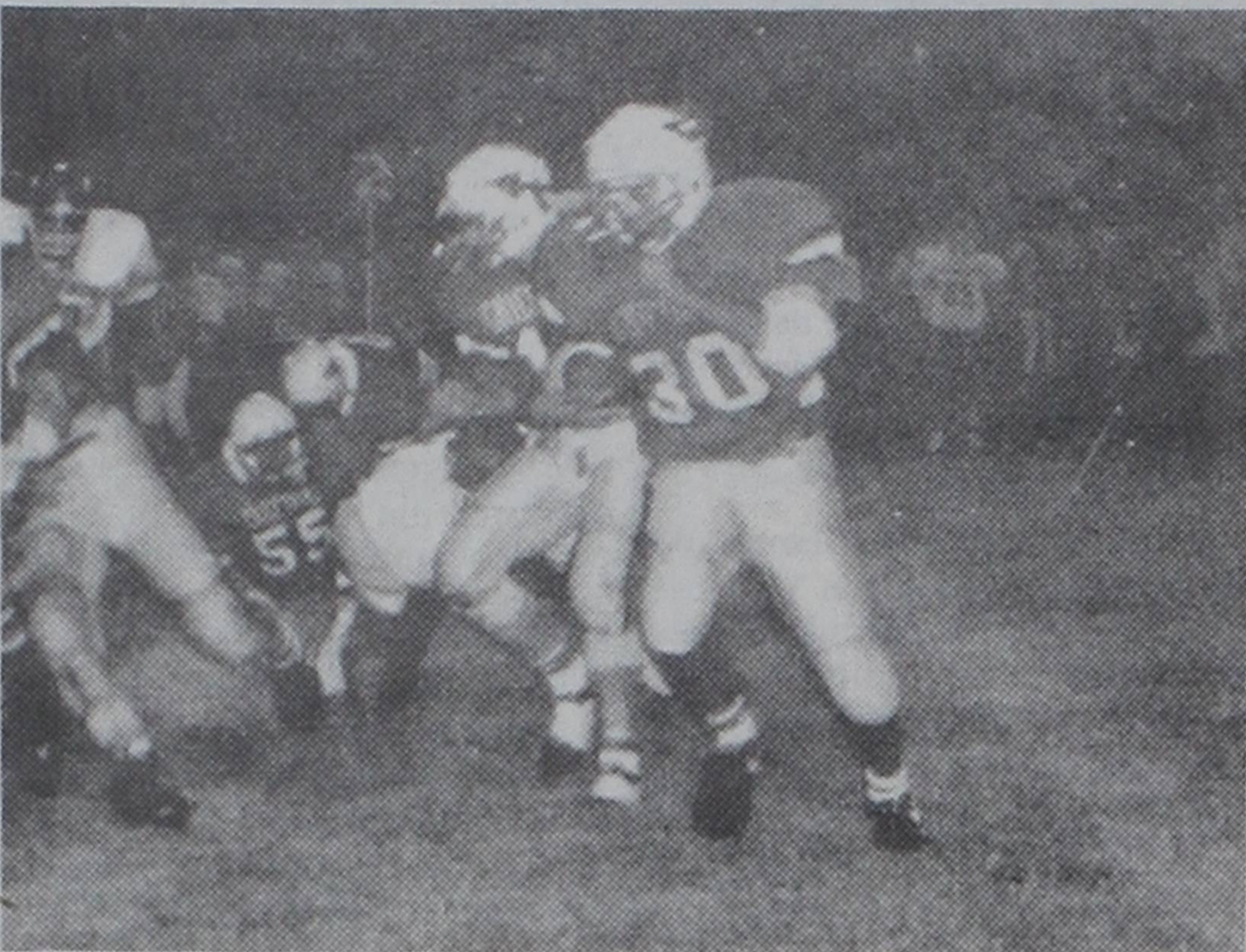
T'overs Devastate Team Vs Whirlwinds

felt the team had a chance at being in those games.

"We're playing well enough to win. It's just that you can't put yourself in such a big hole and survive," he said.

On the team's first play from scrimmage Ismael Rocha fumbled at the Friona 18-yard-line. Seven plays later, Floydada capitalized for a 7-0 lead.

The Chiefs were driving after the kickoff, as Curtis Brady ran 16 yards. Then, Scott Houston's pass was intercepted at midfield. Four plays later, the Whirlwinds found the end zone and took a 13-0 lead with 4:13 left in the quarter.

Roman Garcia returned the kickoff to the 38, but on the first offensive play, Brady fumbled as he was tackled, and the Chiefs had experienced turnover number three.

Friona caused a turnover on Floydada's side following a pass completion, but exactly one play later Rocha bobbled the ball back to the 'Winds at Friona's ten-yard-line. The Chiefs had touched the ball eight times and turned the ball over to their opponents four times. Floydada's quick score ran the

count to 19-0 with 3:40 still to play in the quarter.

Friona finally managed to run a series and punt the ball, but when they did, their luck was about as bad as before.

Kenneth Collins fielded the Friona kick at his own 45, shook off a tackler and raced 55 yards up the sidelines for a fourth Floydada touchdown. A pass for two points was successful, and the first-quarter nightmare for Friona stood at a 27-0 deficit with still 1:34 on the clock.

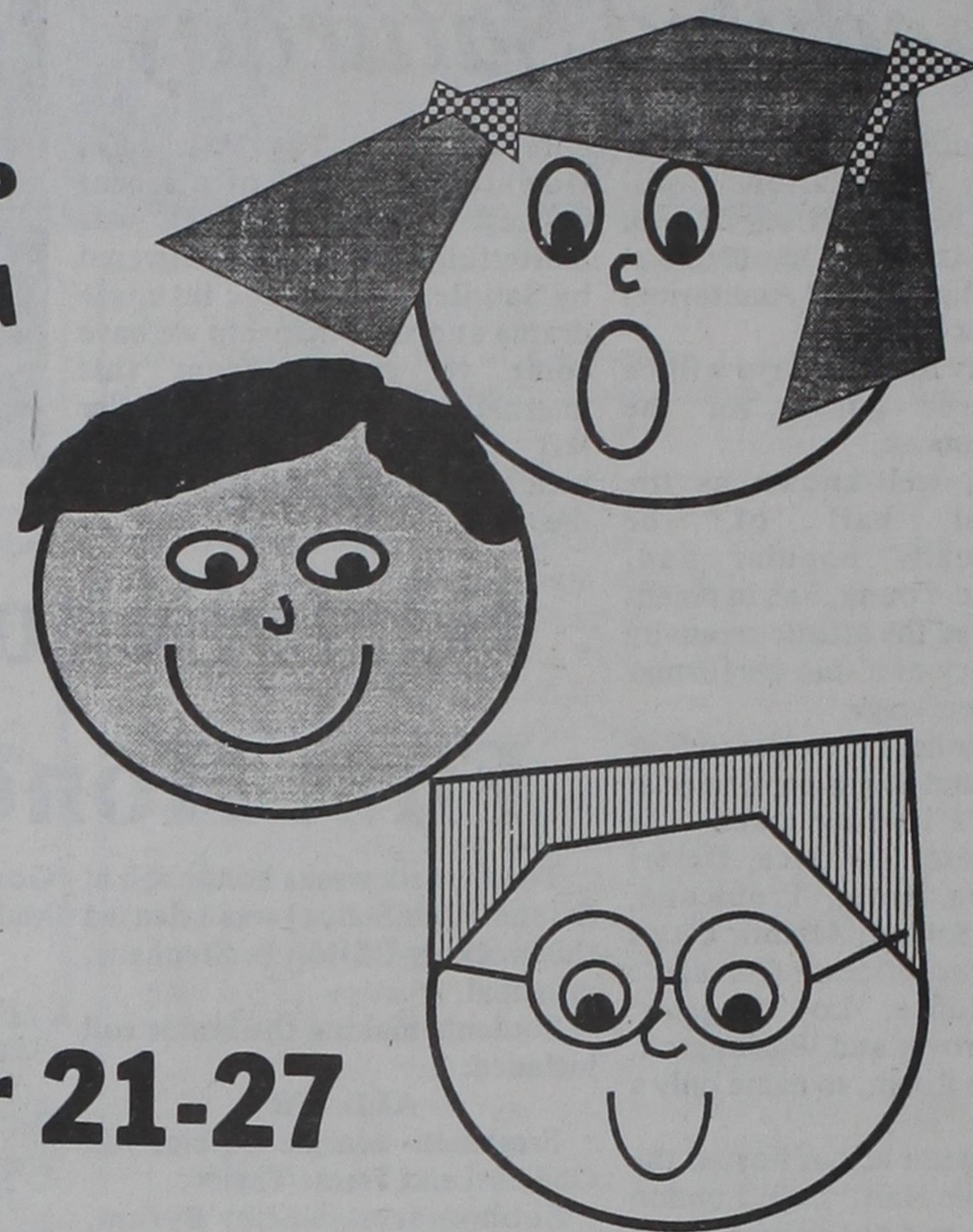

Williams said the Chiefs sustained a few nicks and bruises, but nothing major, except for their pride, which took a pretty good beating.

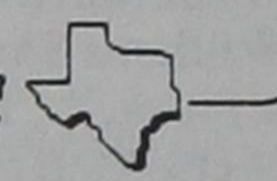

Key Terms To Understanding Bonds

Although bonds are generally considered one of the simplest ways to invest, there are still several key terms you should understand before turning over your money.

Basically, a bond is an IOU that promises to return your deposit at a specific time and pay you regular interest until then. Of course, there is a lot more to know if you expect to be happy with your bond purchase. Here are some terms that are your key to making a wise bond purchase.

The BID is the highest price a buyer will pay for a specific bond at a specific time. The ASK is the lowest price a seller will accept. The SPREAD is the difference between them. The BID-ASK is the quote given to you by a broker. You generally add his commission to that.

A CALL is the issuer's option to redeem your bond prior to maturity. Because the call deprives investors of future interest payments, the issuer generally pays a 2 percent to 3 percent premium over the face value of the bond when a bond is called.

The COUPON is the interest payment you receive. A \$10,000 bond with a 9 percent coupon, for example, would pay \$900 in interest annually.

The INDENTURE is the

contract outlining the provisions of the bond issue.

LIQUIDITY is the ability to sell a bond in the market prior to its maturity.

The FACE VALUE, or PAR VALUE, of a bond is the amount the bond will return to the holder at maturity. The face value of most corporate bonds is \$1,000; tax-exempt municipal bonds, \$5,000.

The SINKING FUND is money accumulated on a regular basis in a separate custodial account that is used to redeem the bond issue. Often the INDENTURE requires a sinking fund to assure investors greater security.

ZERO COUPON bonds are sold at deep discounts from their face value. They pay no regular interest but rather appreciate each year until maturity. At that time the entire face value of the bond is refunded.

Money invested in bonds is generally serious money put away to earn safe, reliable income. There is no reason this cannot be accomplished unless one blindly ventures into a situation without adequate knowledge. These terms will not only help explain your investment but also provides enough knowledge to enable you to ask pertinent questions about bonds before you invest.

Unless you satisfy yourself as to risk, income and holding time, you haven't given bond investing enough study.

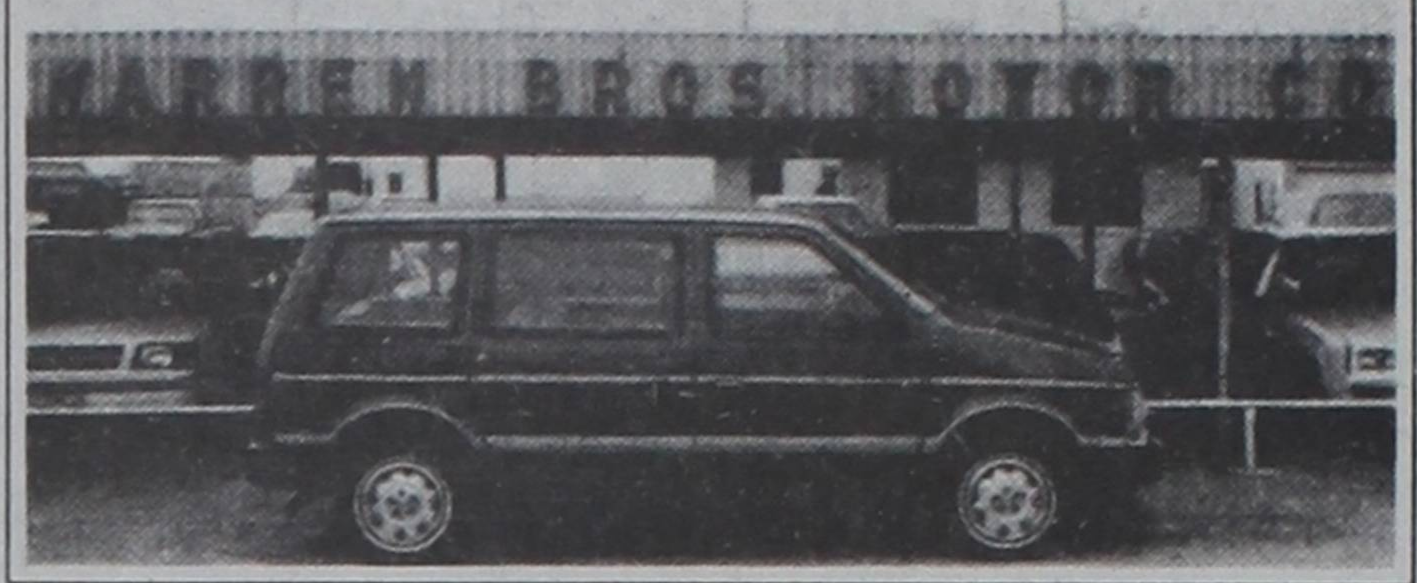

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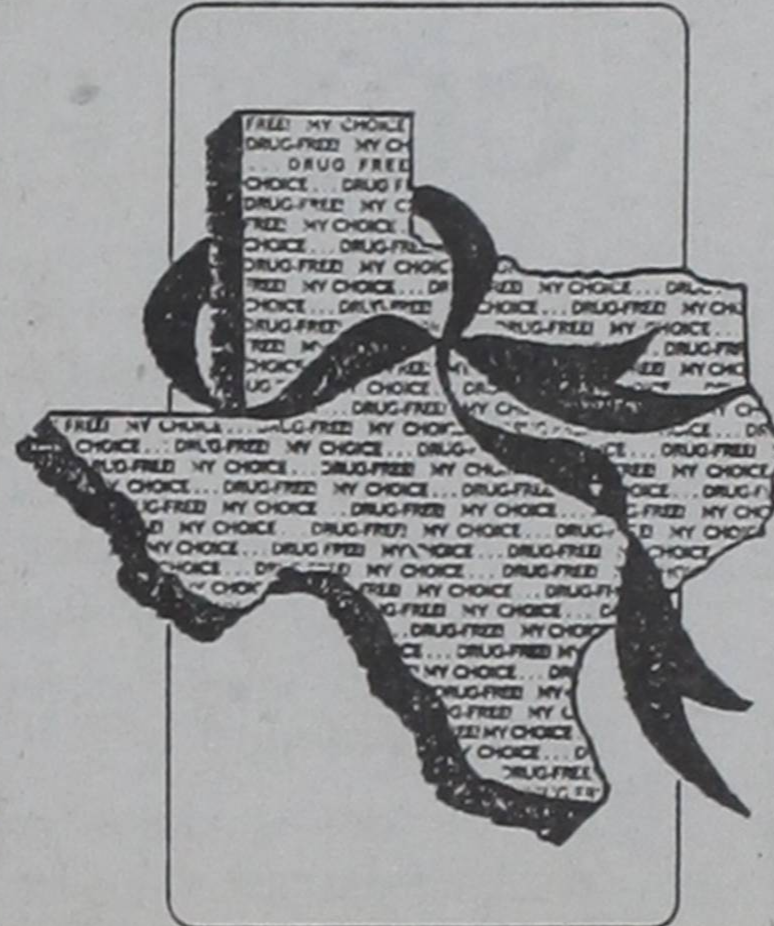

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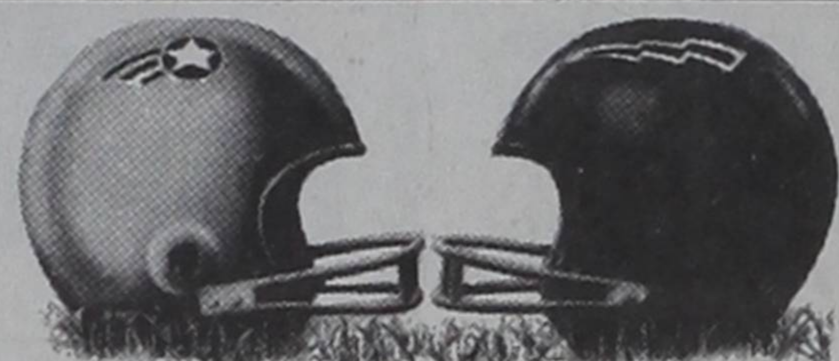
