Weevils are working over time

To help off-set some of their damage to peas and beans which have been or shortly will be harvested on most Texas farms, Camon Siddall, Entomologist for the A and M. College Extension Ser-

First of all, the safest way to keep beans or peas which are to be used as seed is to shell or thresh them and treat them carbon disulphide, then store them in half-gallon jars, gallon syrup buckets, or 25 lb. lard cans. Carbon disulphide can be used in the following proport ions: one-fourth teaspoonful per half-gallon jar: one-half teaspoonful for a gollon syrup buccket: five teasoonfullsfor a 25 lb.

lard can: and one ounce for a

50-gallon drum. The peas or beans should be placed in a jar, bucket, or can. Then a small saucer or jar top solution should be placed on top of the peas before the lid is placed on the container. After 36 hours, the lid and the carbon disulphide should be removed and the peas spread out on a table top or on the floor until there is no trace of the fumes The peas should then be placeed back in the container and the lid placed on tight: Mr. Siddall

If the peas are not to be treated, they should be left in the hulls, since they are less subject to weevil damage than if they are shelled or threshed.

Surplus Peanuts to be Purshed The program for diverting sur plus farmers' stock peanuts to the manufacture of oil will be ontained on the 1940-crop.

The Surplus Marketing Adminstration has authorized the Southwest Peanut Grower's Asso ciation to purshase Southwestern Spanish peanuts grown in 1940 at the following prices: U S. No. 1 \$64 per ton: No. 2 \$60 per ton: No. 3 \$55 per ton, Dick Weekes, manager of the Association with headquarters at Gorman announces.

The program, similar to that for 1939, is authorized under the Agricultural Adjustment Act, and provides for payment to associations of producers for the diference between the purchase price paid producers by the Association and the price paid by the oil mills.

In 1939 the Association purchased about 10,000 tons of farmers' stock peanuts out of the total production of 70,000 tons, in the Southwest, Weekes reports Approximately 3,600 tons were sold to the shell trade, and the remained was diverted to oil and by-products under the marketing program. The prices quoted are for peanuts delivered at warehouses located atCisco and Rising Star.

With a reduction of 10 per and comprehensive coverage insurance for private passengers cars, a tremendous saving will be given September 1, 1940, when tthe new rates go into effect, to all private car owners in Texas who carry insurance on their automoblies, Mr. Shaw

Automobile dealers' fire and theft rates were reduced 25 per cent by the order, and the owners of Texas' 335,467 trucks will enjoy reductions in various types of insurance, ranging from 10 to 25 per cent. Long-haul truck mens' bodily injury and property damage rates were reduced 10 per cent in all territories in Texas by the order.

Contributing to the saving to private and commercial trucck owners which Mr. Shaw estimat at considerable in excess of \$2,000,000, will be the elimination ordered by the Commissioners of restricted tye olicies, so that trucck operators in the furure will be provided coverage any place any where in the United States and Canada at no additional cost. Also, the order makes a reduction of approximately 25 per cent in rates on trailers and semi-trailers over 25 feet in length. 
