Bond Issue Considered Vital to Efficiency and Progress of Hico Schools

Taxpayers Express Favor for Passage of Bond Issue Sept. 25

A majority of taxpayers of Hico County Line Independent School District expressing themselves on the proposed \$50,000 bond issue, seem to agree with the superintendent and board that the need is vital. Although no attempt at a comprehensive survey has been made, voluntary expressions seem to indicate that the proposal will meet with success at the polls Saturday of next week, Sept. 25.

Superintendent J. E. Lincoln and members of the board have explained that present buildings are inadequate, and that a new grammar school building is necessary to take care of the growing needs of a larger enrollment now, and an even larger number of pupils that are expected in the immediate future. All over the country there is a similar condition, and school authorities in the more progressive districts are preparing for this growth before the situation becomes acute.

"We realize this may be considered a bad time for such a proposal," Superintendent Lincoln said Thursday, "but an emergency exists and something must be done at once. Our plans are certainly not elaborate, and if patrons of our school will approve the bonds at the polls next week, we will make an honest effort to see that they get their full money's worth now and in the future."

He added that he or any member of the school board would be glad to discuss with citizens the situation that exists, or any phase of the matter.

Child Safety Month Aims At Reduction Of Traffic Accidents

Austin, September 13—Governor Beauford Jester has proclaimed September a "Child Safety Month" to focus attention on the need for protecting children from traffic accidents as they start back to school.

A statewide program reaching into every community that has an American Legion Post is being sponsored jointly by the Legion and the Texas Safety Association.

Motorists are being urged to "watch out for the kids—give them a brake." Parents are encouraged to help teach safe habits to youngsters. The kids themselves are reminded not to play in the street or road and always to look before crossing a thoroughfare.

Governor Jester in his proclamation pointed out that 218 children below the age of 14 were killed in Texas traffic accidents last year, while 1826 boys and girls were injured.

\$200,000 County Hospital Bond Proposal Unpopular Outside of County Seat

It Looked That Way A Month Ago; Voters Proved It Saturday

Hamilton County voters went to the polls last Saturday and registered a decisive dislike for a proposed \$200,000 bond issue to establish a county hospital at the county seat.

Final tabulation of the vote at the office of County Clerk Ira Moore showed 1144 taxpayers favoring the proposition, and 456 opposing. Thus the bonds lost by 262 out of a total of 2500.

In Hico the proposal received sparse support, 12 ballots being counted for and 456 against, indicating that only 2.5 per cent of the large number who voted favored the plan.

Similar opposition was encountered throughout Precinct 3, composed of most of the county's territory north of the Leon River, which turned in almost a third of the total county vote. At Carlton, Fairy and Olin there was stiff opposition, and the total of the commissioner precinct's four boxes disclosed less than 5 per cent of the people favoring the bond issue. Most boxes elsewhere out of Hamilton followed about the same pattern.

At the county seat, where the petition for the election originated and where a lot of sentiment favoring the bonds had been built up, the proposition carried more than three to one, which was rather expected, although many taxpayers there expressed disapproval of the proposal.

Editor's Note:—Coincidentally the heading of this article is worded exactly the same as one over a story that appeared in this paper a month before the election, when a survey of sentiment indicated that the bond proposal was unpopular outside of the county seat. Present outlook is that there will be no change of opinion in their favor, should the issue ever come up again.

AAA Administrative Officer Gives Some Timely Information

The AAA office is now issuing Prior Approvals for winter legumes, such as vetch—and peas. Now is the time to get your seed and be ready to plant, while the weather is favorable. These legumes must be seeded on or before November 15, 1948.

Seed must be properly inoculated, and land must be fertilized at the rate of 250 pounds of 20 per cent Super Phosphate per acre, except where phosphate has been applied to some prior crop. Seed bed must be properly prepared.

If these specifications are met and a freeze comes, and the vetch or peas get killed we will go ahead and make our payment. But if the specifications are not met, the peas and vetch must reach a stand and growth and must be grazed to an extent that there will not be a good protective cover at all times.

We cannot issue Purchase orders for Clover.

We are out of money at this time for fertilizer and terracing, but are expecting some more money for terracing and are still taking applications for terracing. Just as soon as money is available, we will issue approvals for the first come and the first served. All farmers still must have an approval before any dirt work is done if they expect help from the AAA office for terraces.

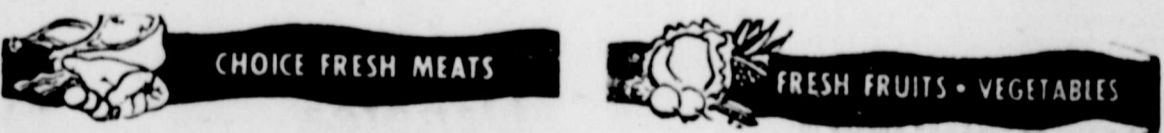

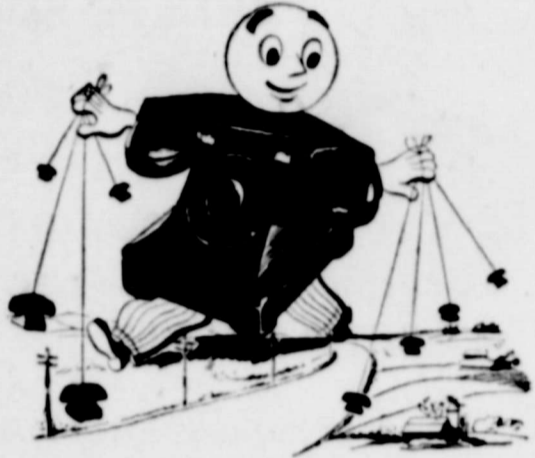
"When it comes to recreation, we have the same liking to get to-

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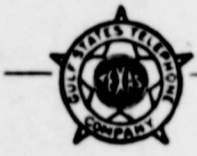


GIANT STEPS are being taken

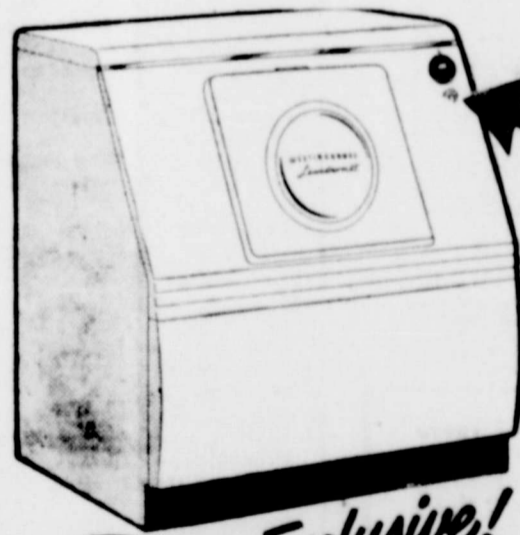

Presentation of
Honorary Degrees
Slated For T. C. U.

Fort Worth, Sept. 13—For the first time in its 75 year history, Texas Christian University will present an honorary degree "in absentia" September 20 at its 75th Anniversary Convocation, President M. E. Sadler announced today. A Doctor of Laws degree, it will be conferred upon Henry Cohen, rabbi of Temple B'nai Israel, Galveston.
A special vote of the University's board of trustees made it possible for Rabbi Cohen to become the first person ever to receive an honorary degree "in absentia" from TCU.
At 85 years of age, Rabbi Cohen is unable to travel beyond the Galveston area. Still active and the sole spiritual leader of his congregation, Rabbi Cohen recently celebrated his 60th anniversary with his congregation.
Honorary LL. D. degrees will also be presented to Dr. Charles H. Harris, eminent Fort Worth physician of Nursing; and Orest E. Scott, St. Louis real estate executive and leading layman of the Disciples of Christ.
Feature of TCU's Diamond Jubilee Convocation will be a salute to all Texas business and industrial firms which helped pioneer Texas in TCU's own early days.
Principal speaker at the Convocation will be Dr. Henry G. Harmon, president of Drake University, Des Moines, Ia., TCU's sister Christian Church school.

Continental Trailways
Takes Over Operation of
25,000-Mile System

Dallas, Tex., Sept. 14.—It's a great day for Continental and Texas, said T. S. Reece, general manager of Continental Trailways Bus System, at his headquarters in Dallas.
Tuesday, the name of Continental became the trade name for all the routes of the Transcontinental Bus System, of which Continental is a division Reece announced.
Transcontinental was formed last February by merger of Continental, Dixie and Santa Fe Trailways and their associated companies following approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission. Immediately afterwards, it bought West Coast Trailways; and pending now before the ICC are applications of Continental to buy Rio Grande and Denver-Colorado Springs-Pueblo Trailways bus systems.
Continental Trailways operates 4,000 miles of routes between Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Houston, Beaumont, Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Lamar, Colo., Shreveport, La., and Tucuman, N. Mex.
Now the distance over which the Continental name will be carried mushrooms suddenly to 25,000 miles, Reece said.
The name of the Texas bus company becomes a household word in traveling in Chicago, Seattle, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Kansas City, St. Louis, Hot Springs, and Phoenix, among others.
Headquarters of Continental are the new \$800,000 general office and maintenance plant it completed in Dallas this summer. The modernistic structure is rated as one of the finest plants of its type in the nation.
Reece is a veteran of 20 years in the bus industry. His first job was that of ticket agent, in his home town of Springfield, Mo., in 1928 at the age of 19.
He joined the Continental organization in 1943, and from 1944 to last spring served as operating manager. In April, his promotion to vice president and general manager was announced by M. E.

Moore, president of Continental Santa Fe Trailways is the largest division of Transcontinental affected by adoption of the new trade name. It operates in 14 states from Chicago to California. West Coast Trailways provide service between San Francisco, Oakland, Portland and Seattle. Dixie Trailways operate principally in the East Texas area. Over its routes the new trade name will be carried as far east as Hot Springs, Ark.
M. S. Maloney is secretary, treasurer of Continental Trailways, and L. G. Simon is traffic manager.
Transcontinental will continue to be the parent company of the newly trade-marked Continental Bus System, Reece said.
