(Editor's note: Congressman Larry Combest's weekly newsletter had some interesting and timely comments regarding Thanksgiving. We are giving our space this week for the congressman's thoughts.)

A DAY FOR THANKSGIVING By Congressman Larry Combest

While the fourth Thursday of November is traditionally Thanksgiving Day, its celebration has not always been observed consistently. A long time ago, people set aside various special days to give thanks for military victories or for deliverance from evil or epidemics of sickness.

The first Thanksgiving service on the shores of the New World by colonists was on August 9, 1607. Settlers in present-day Virginia gave thanks for the survival of their small company each December 4, beginning in 1619--until 1622, when Indians almost killed them off.

The first Pilgrim Thanksgiving happened just as our history school-books said it did: in Plymouth Colony in 1621--but probably in mid-October. The Pilgrims never set a regular Thanksgiving Day, but they still celebrated in the years that followed.

Only during the Revolutionary War did Americans of the 13 colonies agree on one day for celebration: but it was December 18, 1777. After the revolution, President George Washington declared that thanks for this new nation should be given on Thursday, November 26, 1789.

Thanksgiving was finally on a regular schedule after magazine columnist Sarah Josepha Hale won her 36-year argument for a national holiday of Thanksgiving with an 1863 editorial asking if it would not be "...more truly American, to become national in unity when we offer to God our tribute of joy and gratitude for the blessings of the year?"

Timing of the divisive Civil War finally worked in her favor, and that year President Abraham Lincoln declared the last Thursday--the fourth Thursday in November--as a national day of Thanksgiving. Tradition was then established with the last Thursday in November reserved for Thanksgiving.

Things went just like clockwork until the calendar showed that in two out of every seven years, there would be five Thursdays in November. That is when the confusion--and some politicking began.

Early in 1939, a university professor called President Franklin Roosevelt's attention to the fact that there would be five Thursdays in November that year. Since most of the time the fourth Thursday was the last Thursday of the month, people were used to the fourth Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day. The President not only decided to have the 1939 celebration on the fourth Thursday in November, but in the following years, to move Thanksgiving earlier--to the second Thursday in November.

However, FDR was lobbied

The board awarded the bid for new cafeteria tables at Friona High School to Hoover Brothers Co., on a bid of \$9,362.50.

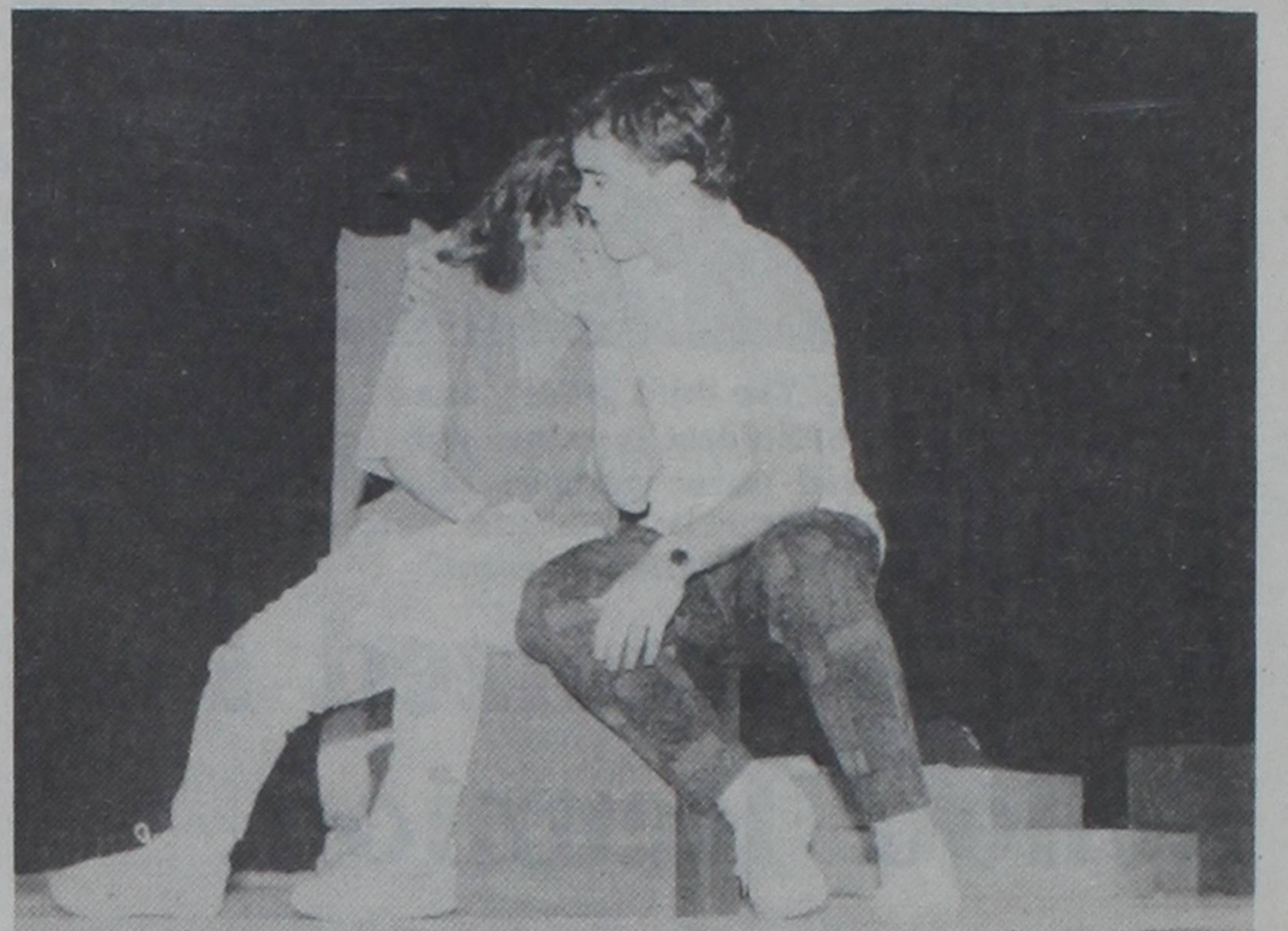
The board also passed a motion approving Travelers Insurance Co. as the group health insurance carrier from November 1, 1990 to November 1, 1991.

Surveys In Mail For Hospital Plans

The Parmer County Community Hospital Board of Directors is reminding the residents of Friona, Bovina and the surrounding areas to complete and return the survey form mailed this week.

The survey form, page 2 of a 4 page letter is requesting input from the local residents concerning funding for the local community owned facility.

Additional outside funding is needed for the facility to upgrade and replace equipment and services, recruit and retain health care professionals, and help recruit and retain physicians within the community.

The methods of obtaining needed capital is explained in the letter. While exact amounts are not known at this time, methods of raising capital are available through the formation of a hospital district which has taxing authority, a local tax, private contributions, or a combination of the above.

"Your input by responding to the survey questions will be used by the Board of Directors in making the important decisions affecting your hospital and the future of health care in Parmer County," said a spokesman for the hospital.

The survey may be returned by dropping the postage-paid self-addressed survey form into the mail.

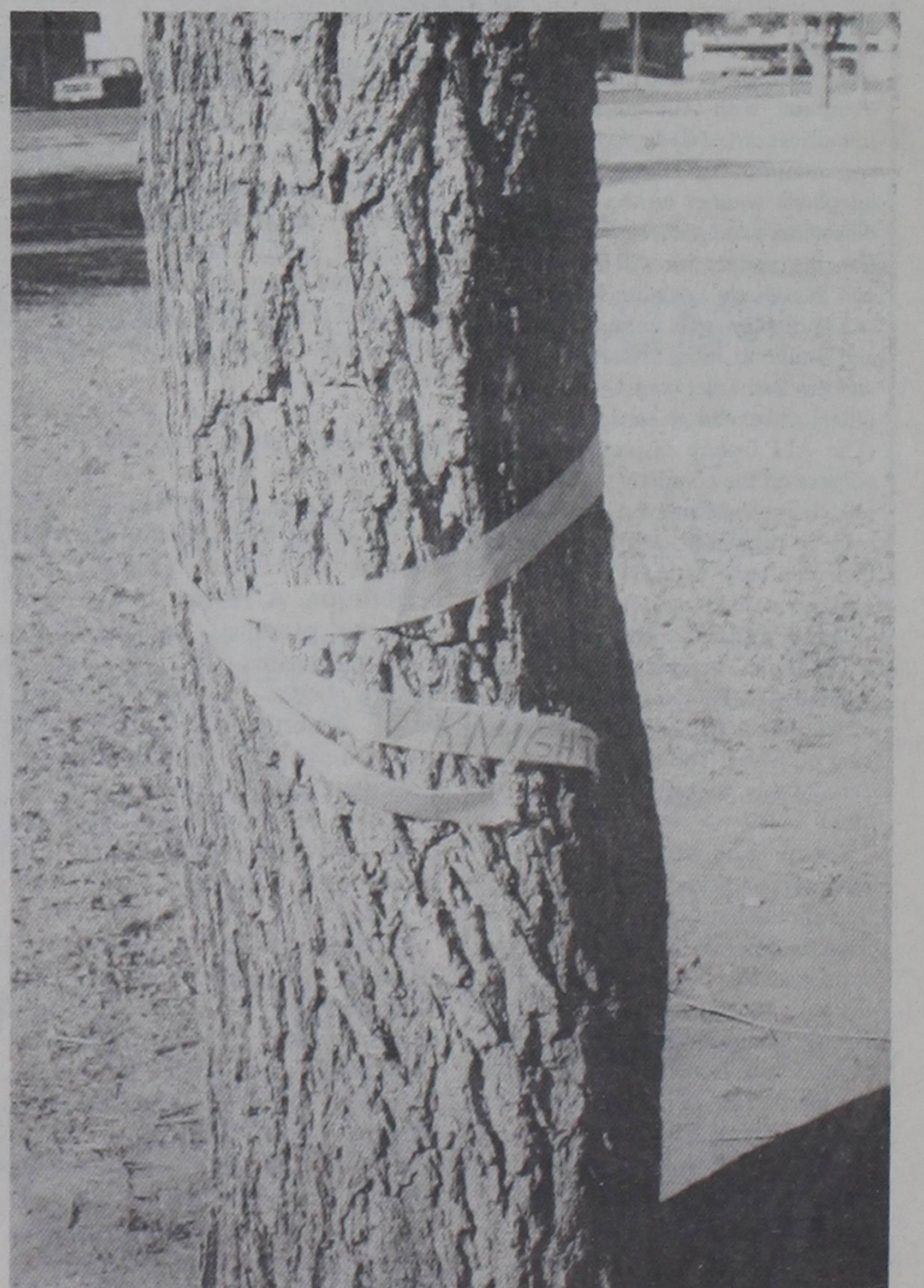
If you failed to receive your survey form, one may be picked up at the clinic front desk during regular clinic hours or by calling 247-2754 and the survey form will be mailed to you.

hard by small storekeepers who felt that the long-awaited fifth Thursday that year would signal a shorter traditional start for Christmas shopping, and shoppers crowded out of the big department stores would go to the smaller stores.

Also, the local symphonies complained that thousands of organizations forced to arrange definite dates a year in advance would suffer by FDR's unexpected change in the Thanksgiving celebration. A 10-year-old girl had a more practical consideration: "...the Pilgrims started it and if it hadn't been for the Pilgrims, North America wouldn't be here and you probably wouldn't be our President today." Then she added a more personal pitch for the fourth Thursday by writing, "...it sometimes comes on my birthday."

When President Roosevelt proclaimed November 23 as Thanksgiving Day 1939, governors in many other states declared that their states would celebrate on the 30th--the fifth Thursday of the month. FDR finally gave up in 1941 with a public law that settled the matter: the fourth Thursday in November would be the permanent national day of Thanksgiving.

No matter when we celebrate, Americans always sense when the time is right for Thanksgiving. Our thanks is never limited to just one day when we think of the many blessings we are grateful for.

Friona Flashbacks

60 YEARS AGO--NOV. 14, 1930

Friona is going to have a Boy Scout Troop and in short time we will see these lads walking along our streets in uniform. E.L. Price is responsible for the movement. He has had three years' experience as scoutmaster in Lockney, and he will likely make a success of it here. The boys meet Monday evening at the barber shop for an organization meeting and are showing much interest.

55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1935

Dr. E.B. Wills, dentist, who has been in Friona for the past few years closed his dentist office here and moved with his family to some place near Waco, where he intends to open an office.

The Friona Chiefs are to make their first trip for a football game this Friday. They are to play Claude in the afternoon. This will also be the first game they have played in the afternoon as they have been taking advantage of the floodlights.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1940

A move is now on foot to secure at an early date, several more miles of paved highways for Parmer County. The new paving as now outlined will include the paving of State Highway 86, which traverses the county east and west from Dimmitt to Castro County, to Bovina, where it intersects Highway 33-60. The other highway, which the new move proposes to pave, is the new State Highway, which connects Muleshoe, in Bailey County, with Friona, traversing the county from south to north.

40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 2, 1950

C.W. Dixon is reported still in serious condition in the hospital in Roswell, undergoing an operation Tuesday and facing another one in the near future. Mr. Dixon, father of Mrs. Ray Landrum, was injured three weeks ago when working cattle on his ranch near Roswell. Though not thrown, he was severely injured internally as the horse pitched with him.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 4, 1955

The newly-built Sixth Street Church of Christ structure is one of the latest contributions to the Friona building scene, providing another modern church in a town of outstanding churches. Completed this month, the building is beautifully designed and constructed, inside and out.

Next election, in 1956, will find Parmer County residents voting for a new county elective office, that of County Tax Assessor and Collector. In a special election this Tuesday, the new office was authorized by one of the narrowest margins in local voting records, 97 affirmative and 81 against. Friona sanctioned the division by a slim 21-19 vote, with Farwell polling the heaviest ballot 54 for, 23 against the measure. The new office calls for a four year term, same as that of the sheriff. Mr. Lovelace will hold both positions until the 1957 term begins.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 3, 1960

Two men were injured Monday afternoon in an explosion and fire at the Plains Farmers Gin on the

Bovina Highway. Jack Dickerson was treated at Parmer County Community Hospital for burns and lacerations. His father Allan Dickerson, was treated and released from the hospital. The younger man required hospitalization for his injuries, which included second and third degree burns on the arm and lacerations on the face and ear. Firemen were called to the gin following the blast, which apparently started from a butane leak in a pilot on one of the gin's cotton dryers. Damage to the gin was not believed extensive.

Friona High School's Band will take part in Homecoming activities Saturday at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. ENMU will take on Southwestern Oklahoma in the football contest that will highlight activities of the day. Friona's band will take part in the downtown parade at 11 a.m. and then perform at halftime.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 4, 1965

Friona's district alignment for 1966 and 1967 has been announced. Hale Center and Memphis, both of which are moving up to class AA from A,

will be in Friona's district, competing along with the six teams which were already in the district. Bovina and Morton, neither met during the last two seasons, will be played as non-conference games. Muleshoe, Dalhart and Plains, played this year, will not appear on the 1966 slate.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 5, 1970

Friona voters gave a wide margin to Governor Preston Smith in his re-election bid, gave Lloyd Bentsen an eye-lash margin, and went overwhelmingly against liquor-by-the-drink in Tuesday's election. Smith had the majority in Friona, with 523 votes to 314 for Republican Paul Eggers. Bentsen edged out Bush in the Friona box, 421-415.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 2, 1975

Ernest Osborn delivered the first bale of cotton in Friona for 1975. He brought the bale to Friona Farmers Co-op Gin on Thursday, October 30.

An official ground-breaking ceremony was held at the Friona Nursing Home site Tuesday morning. Lewellen Construction has estimated the job to take nine

months to complete, and says he might beat that estimate if the weather is favorable.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 23, 1980

A record November snowstorm surprised the area Saturday night and Sunday, with from six to eight inches of snow falling in the local area.

An open house is set Sunday, November 23 at the Parmer County Tax Appraisal Office in Bovina. The new office is located at 305 Third Street in Bovina. The new facility was completed November 1.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 17, 1985

The Friona area had a taste of winter weather on Thursday of last week, when the temperatures were in the 30s and 40s. Friday morning's low temperature was 20 degrees, which was the lowest reading of the season.

Funeral services were pending at the Star's press time for Ellis (Knotty) Tatum, 70, who died Friday morning, November 15.

Funeral services for Aubrey Rhodes, who died at his home early Wednesday morning, were conducted Thursday.

PUBLIC NOTICE

On July 19, 1990, GTE Southwest Incorporated ("GTE-SW") filed revisions to the company's tariff pertaining to the features and associated equipment for providing emergency number services (9-1-1).

In this filing, GTE-SW proposes to modify its existing 9-1-1 tariff and to add more than 200 new service offerings. The new items of service and equipment in this application have been added to meet the company's increasing 9-1-1 customer demands and to allow GTE-SW to compete more effectively in the 9-1-1 equipment market.

The product line in the new offerings consists of a mini-computer and specialized console package for larger communities, as well as a personal computer with Automatic Number Identification (ANI) display for smaller communities. (ANI displays a caller's telephone number on the emergency dispatcher's computer screen.) In addition, the product line will include ANI and Automatic Location Information (ALI) display units compatible with, and similar to, those offered by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and other local exchange carriers in Texas. (The ALI feature displays a caller's address on the computer screen.) The rate charged existing 9-1-1 customers may be revised at the expiration of their contracts with GTE-SW if the proposed tariff is approved.

This filing has been assigned Docket No 9667. The hearing on the merits is scheduled for February 25, 1991, at the offices of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The deadline to intervene in this docket is December 31, 1990.

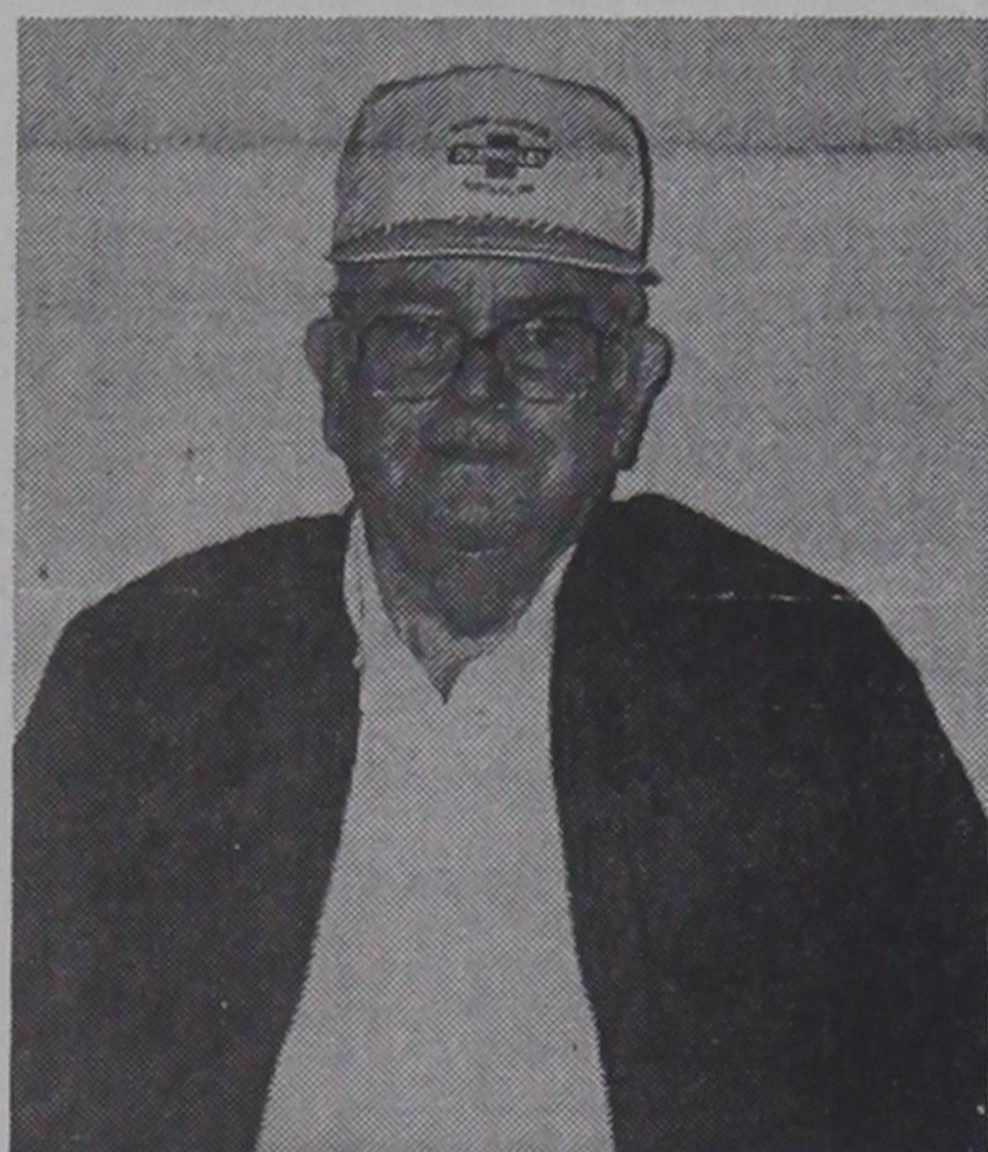

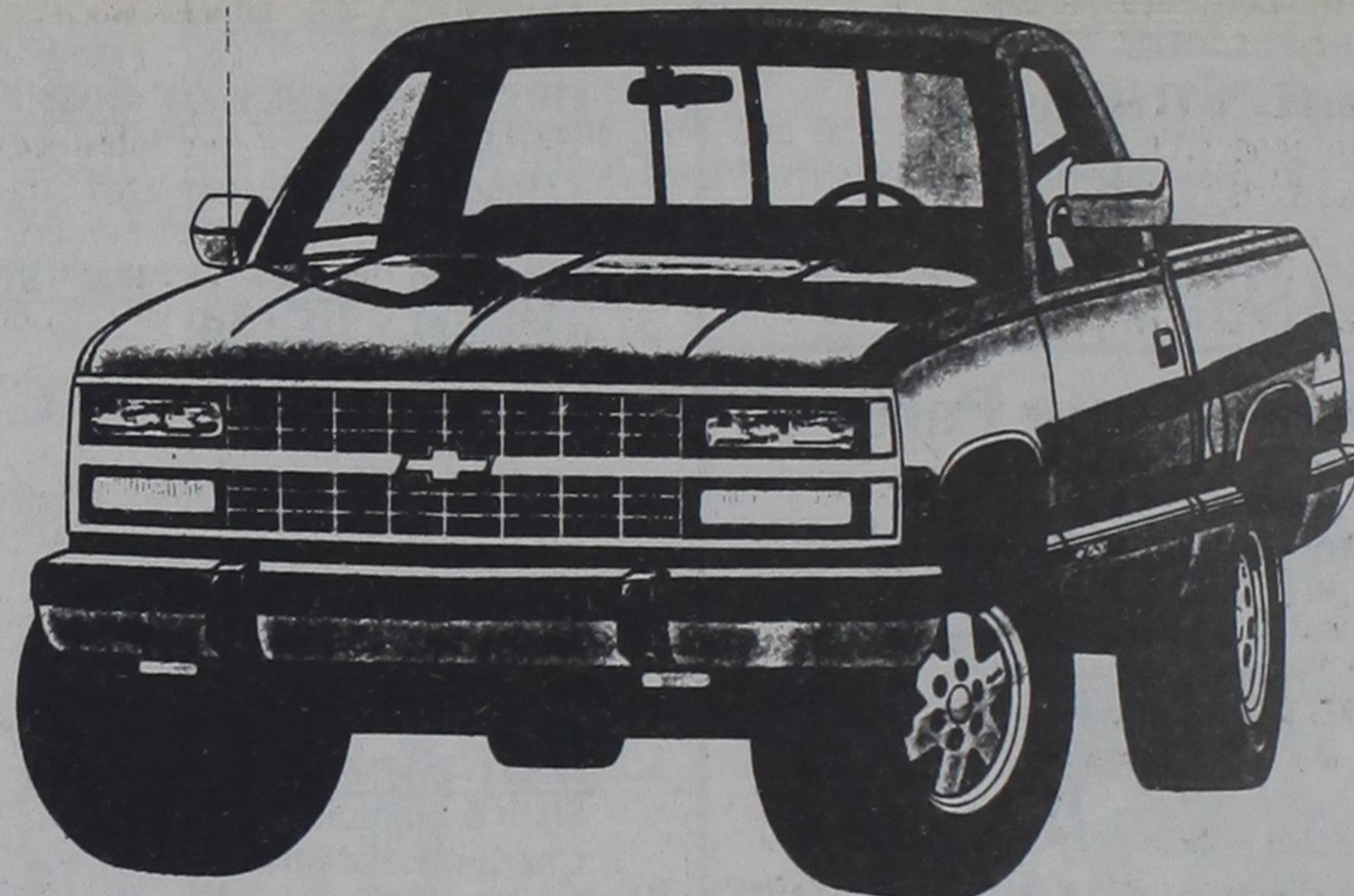

Chiefs Dial 1-MULE; Break Loss Streak

How do the Friona Chieftains spell relief? Most years it's: **M-U-L-E-S-H-O-E**. And 1990 was no exception.

Facing the prospect of tying the all-time school record for consecutive shutouts, as well as suffering their ninth straight loss of the season, the Chieftains avoided both last Friday in a 14-5 win at Muleshoe.

Fans will recall that last year the Chiefs avoided a winless season with their 34-13 win at Benny Douglass Stadium.

It has worked both ways: in 1965 the Mules beat the Chieftains, 21-0 in a game here that snapped a 14-game Muleshoe losing streak.

The win was the seventh consecutive for FHS in the series and eighth in ten years over the Mules. It allowed Friona to pull almost even (19-20-1) in the all-time Parmer-Bailey counties series, which dates all the way back to 1926.

But more importantly, according to Coach Steve Williams, it gives the Chieftains something to build on for next season.

"I was a lot prouder of that win Friday than our first of the season, because it will give us incentive going into the off-season. It gave us a big boost that we needed," Williams said.

The win was accomplished in spite of one of the worst cases of officiating local fans had seen in years, and also in spite of four Friona fumbles, as the Chieftains had some untimely turnovers.

Friona was flagged 16 times for 155 yards. Nine of the penalties were major penalties, and six of those erased nice runs by the Chieftains which would have added 57 yards to their offensive totals.

Coach Williams said a couple of times Muleshoe players flagrantly

fouled a Chieftain, who when pushing back in retaliation was flagged for 15 yards.

But in spite of the refs and fumbles, or perhaps because of them, it turned out to be a good, close game, that was in doubt until the last couple of minutes.

On Friona's fourth possession, the Chiefs took over on their own 38, and immediately were backed up to their 28 by a penalty.

Omar Saenz ripped through the line for 22 yards to midfield. Then Curtis Brady got the ball. He broke a tackle after a 10-yard gain around left end, faked his last defender at the Muleshoe 20, and raced in for a 50-yard touchdown.

The Friona fans, who hadn't seen points on the scoreboard since the game at Canyon, gave a big cheer as Mike Scott split the uprights with his PAT kick for a 7-0 Friona lead with 11:02 left in the second quarter.

The Chieftains had a pair of good defensive stands in the first half to keep Muleshoe off the scoreboard.

Friona had a run of bad luck in the third quarter. The Mules kicked off, and Harvey Martinez had trouble fielding the kick and fumbled. Muleshoe took over at the Friona 21.

The defense stiffened, and forced Muleshoe to try a field goal. The Mules' Junior Olivarez booted it through from 37 yards out at the 10:09 mark, to cut Friona's lead to 7-3.

Muleshoe kicked off, Martinez fielded the ball at the Friona 20, returned it to the 41 and again fumbled as he was hit. Muleshoe recovered, and it took another goal-line stand by Friona to preserve the lead.

Muleshoe had a first and five from the Friona eight, ran the ball down to the Friona one-foot line when the ball-carrier fumbled and Friona recovered. It was the only turnover all night for Muleshoe, but it was a big one, as the Mules were going for a 10-7 lead.

Friona drove the ball out of danger and punted.

A little later, the Chiefs took over on their own 17 and began an 83-yard scoring drive that would clinch the victory.

The drive was sparked by the running of Ismael Rocha, who had had a very unproductive district season after being named all-

district as a sophomore.

Rocha gained 45 yards in four carries, and Brady had an 18-yard gain. Rocha got the final 12 around left end for the score. Scott's kick with 9:34 left to play gave Friona a 14-3 lead.

A short Friona punt and a 24-yard run by the Mules gave Muleshoe a first and goal situation at the ten with 3:52 to play. But a Mule receiver dropped a fourth-down pass and Friona took over.

A few minutes later, facing fourth down at their own nine, the Chiefs took a safety by having Burney step out of the end zone, to possibly save a Muleshoe touchdown. Burney's free kick got the team away from its own goal-line and that was the game.

The 155 yards in penalties were the most against Friona in 12 seasons, since 160 yards versus Morton in 1979.

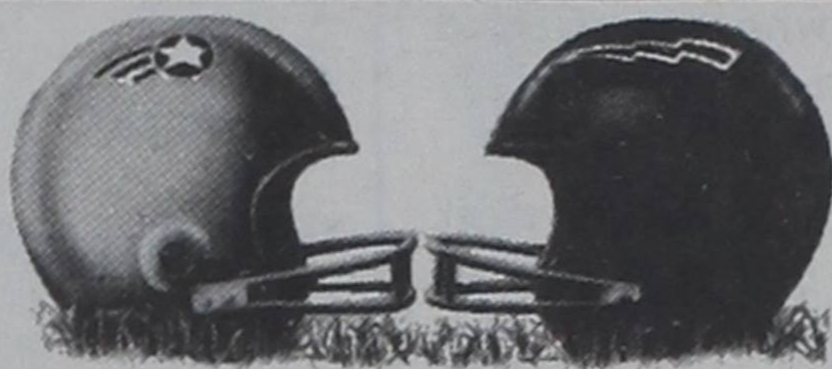

FCIC Rep Will Address Grainmen

David Gabriel, acting manager of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), will be the guest speaker at an informational meeting sponsored by the National Grain Sorghum Producers (NGSP). The meeting, to be held on November 27 from 1:30-3:30 p.m., is one of the events scheduled for the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show at the Amarillo Civic Center, Amarillo. The meeting is open to the public.

Gabriel has been with FCIC since 1986, serving as assistant manager for program administration and as acting deputy manager before being named acting manager last March.

Before coming to FCIC, Gabriel was a senior vice president of the National Farmers Union Insurance Company. From 1967 to 1980, Gabriel was vice president and manager of the crop-hail insurance department of the National Farmers Union Insurance Companies where he managed the underwriting, marketing and reinsurance functions.

In the 1960s, Gabriel managed the merger of the farm property and crop-hail divisions of Fireman's Fund and American Insurance Companies, including the implementation of new systems

and procedures. Gabriel was also president of the National Crop Insurance Association, and a member of the executive committee of the Crop-Hail Insurance Actuarial Association.

Focus of the meeting will be the future of the federal crop insurance program. Producers and agribusinessmen who are affected by the program are especially encouraged to attend the meeting.

"Producers should bring their questions and concerns about federal crop insurance to this meeting," said Jack Eberspacher, NGSP executive director. "They will find that David Gabriel is willing to listen. NGSP has strongly encouraged the continuation of the crop insurance program, and Gabriel has always taken the time to listen to our concerns, ideas and suggestions."

Although the price electives for grain sorghum were not in proper relation to other feed grains this year, said Eberspacher, we have been assured that sorghum price electives for 1991 will be in step with those of other feed grains.

Funeral services for Jane Frances George, 41, were conducted Friday, November 9 at the Church of the Good Shepherd in Frankfort, Kentucky.

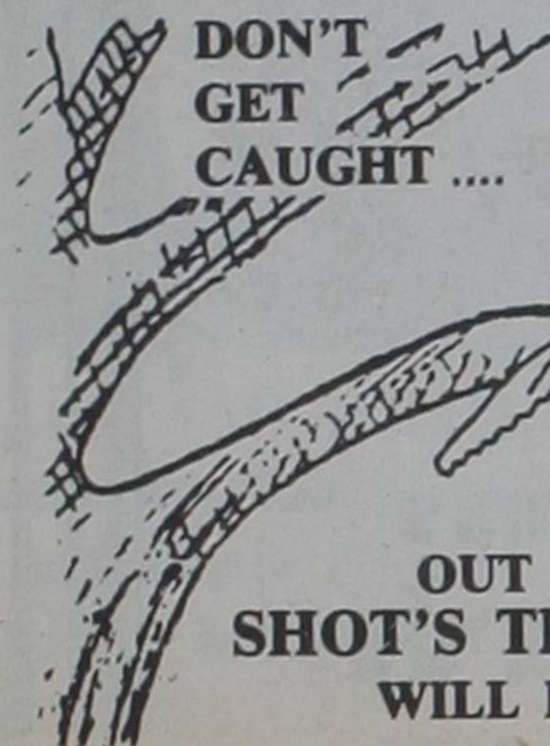
Mrs. George passed away November 6 in Frankfort.

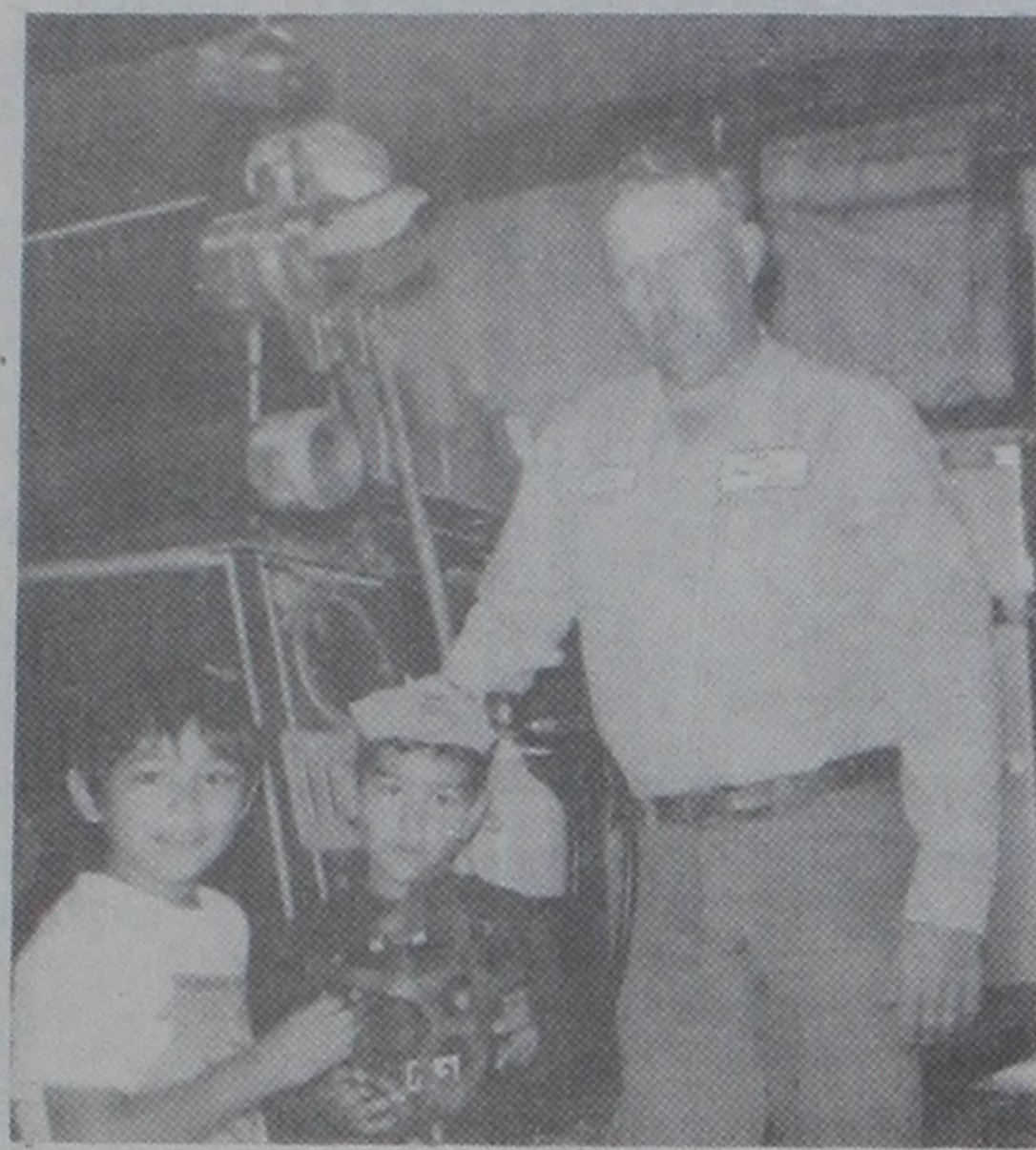

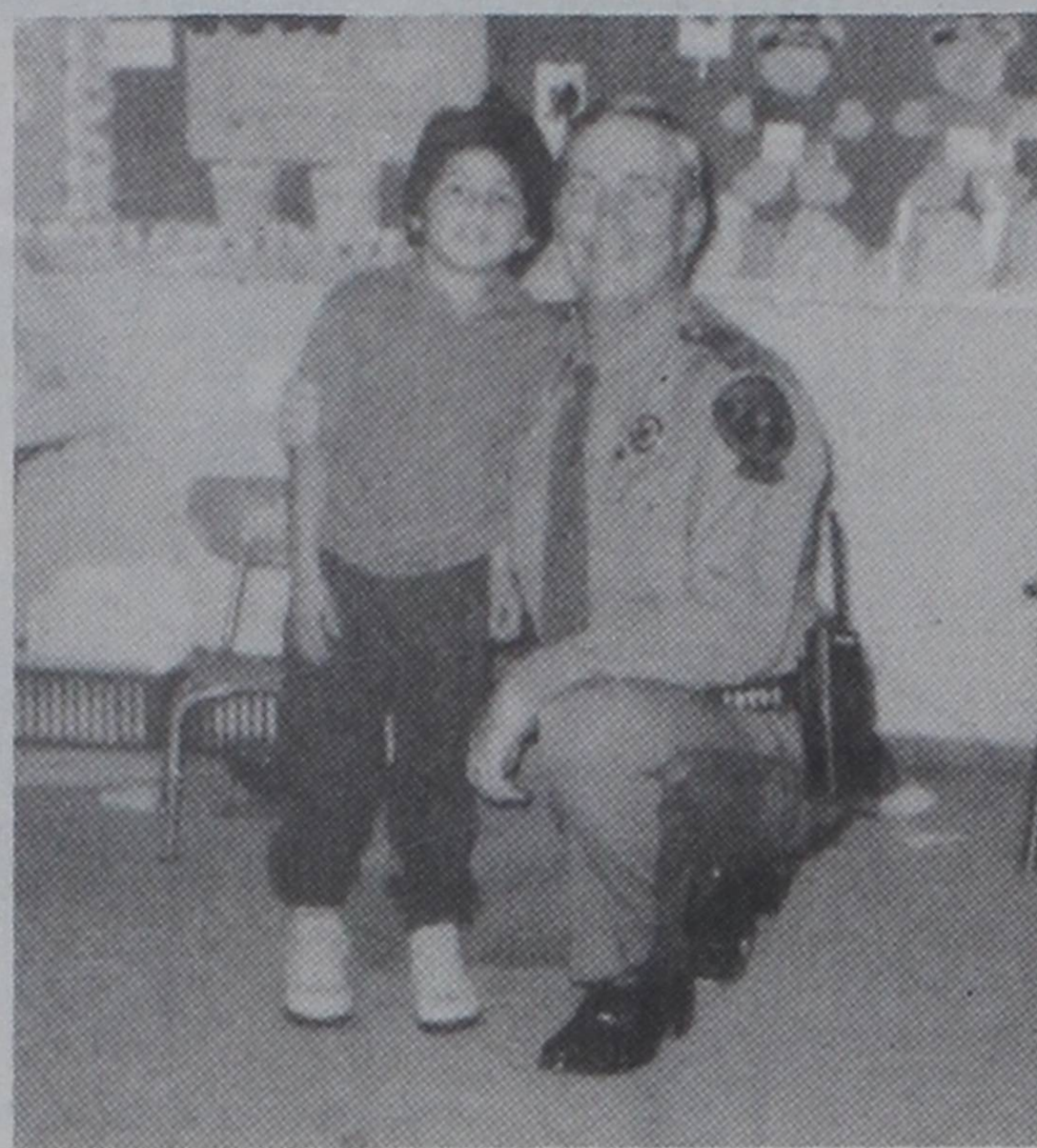

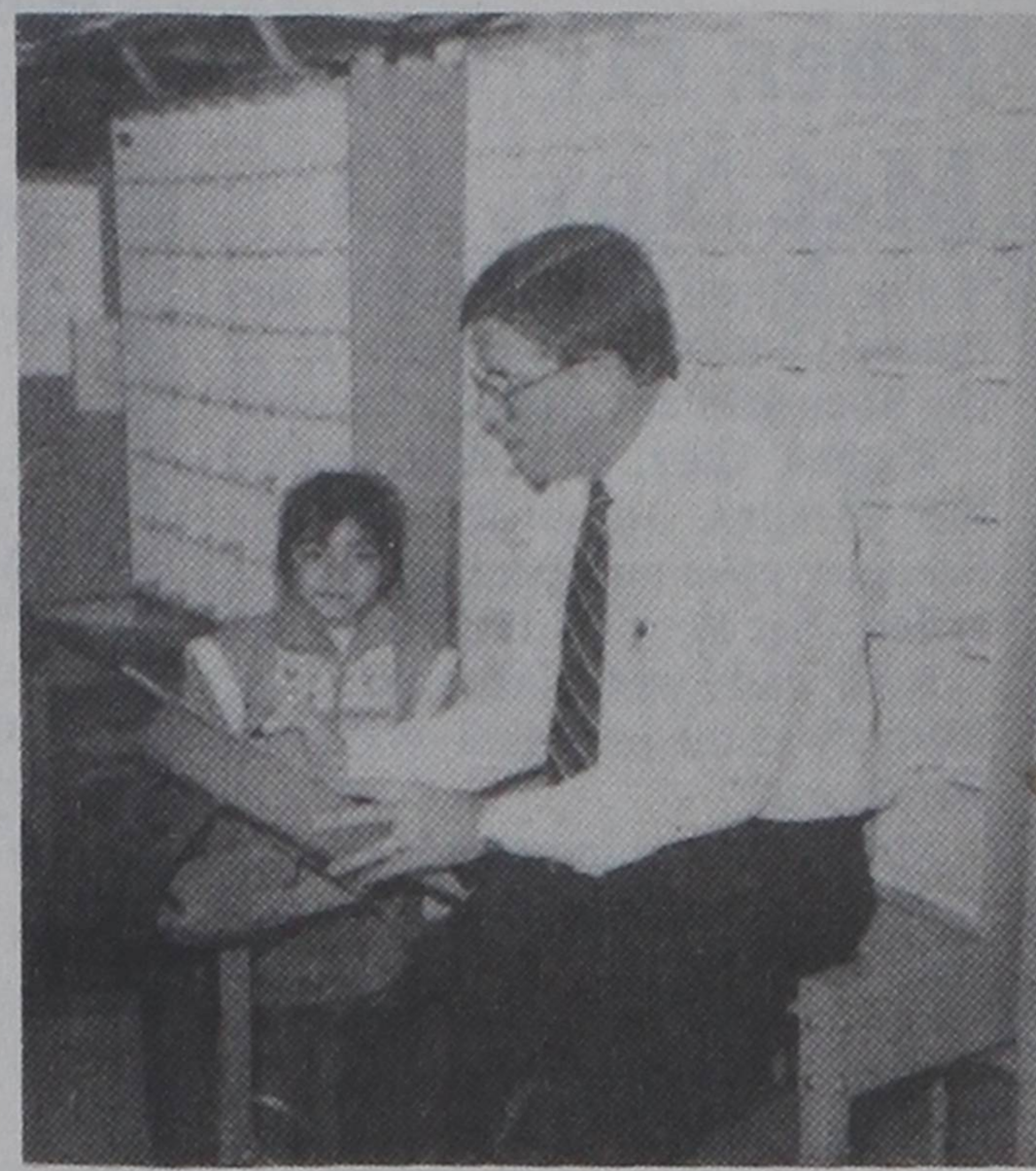

Consider Taxes In Your Financial Plan

Despite the fact that capital gains have lost their preferential treatment--both long- and short-term gains are taxed the same as ordinary income--you can still use the law to your advantage. Here are several suggestions that could save you tax dollars:

Tip Number 1: If you had reportable capital gains during 1990 you might consider taking possible losses prior to year's end. Because losses can be matched to gains, they might lessen or possibly eliminate an otherwise taxable gain.

Tip Number 2: You may deduct up to \$3,000 in capital losses from ordinary income in any one year. If losses exceed that amount, carry the unused portion forward to future years.

Tip Number 3: Often a taxpayer sells a security to establish a tax loss with the intention of replacing that same security. This can be an excellent tax maneuver if you are careful not to be caught by the IRS "wash sale" rule. A "wash sale" occurs when you replace a security with the same, or nearly identical, security within 30 days before or after the loss sale.

Tip Number 4: Don't forget broker costs when calculating the total cost of your securities. Commissions and other fees paid on purchases or sales can reduce your capital gain or increase your loss.

Tip Number 5: When selling securities, be sure to identify which shares you want sold. Because shares are often purchased at different times and prices, you can cut your capital gains tax liability by selling the most expensive shares first.

Tip Number 6: Keep a record of your mutual fund direct purchases and any reinvestment of dividends and gains. This is always included on your mutual fund statement. Remember, these reinvestments are taxed in the year they are paid and added to your cost basis. Don't pay double taxes on reinvested gains and dividends when you sell.

Tip Number 7: Find a trusted professional who will take time to explain these and other tax pitfalls. Before investing consider future tax implications. Then, take full advantage of current tax laws.

These few suggestions will not make you a tax expert. They should, however, bring up enough questions to consider taxes in your financial plan.

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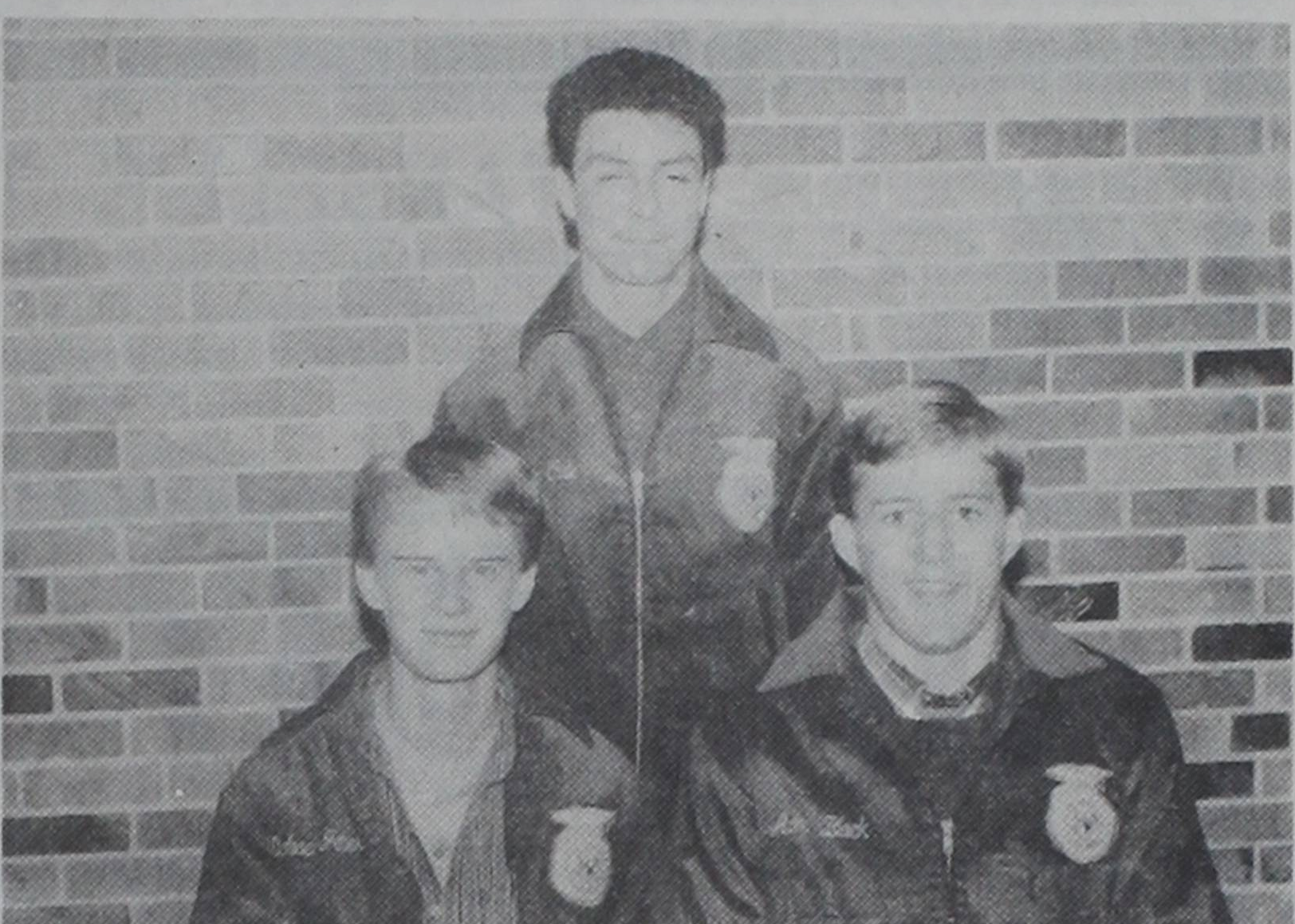

Mrs. Byars passed away November 3 at Parmer County Community Hospital after a lengthy illness.

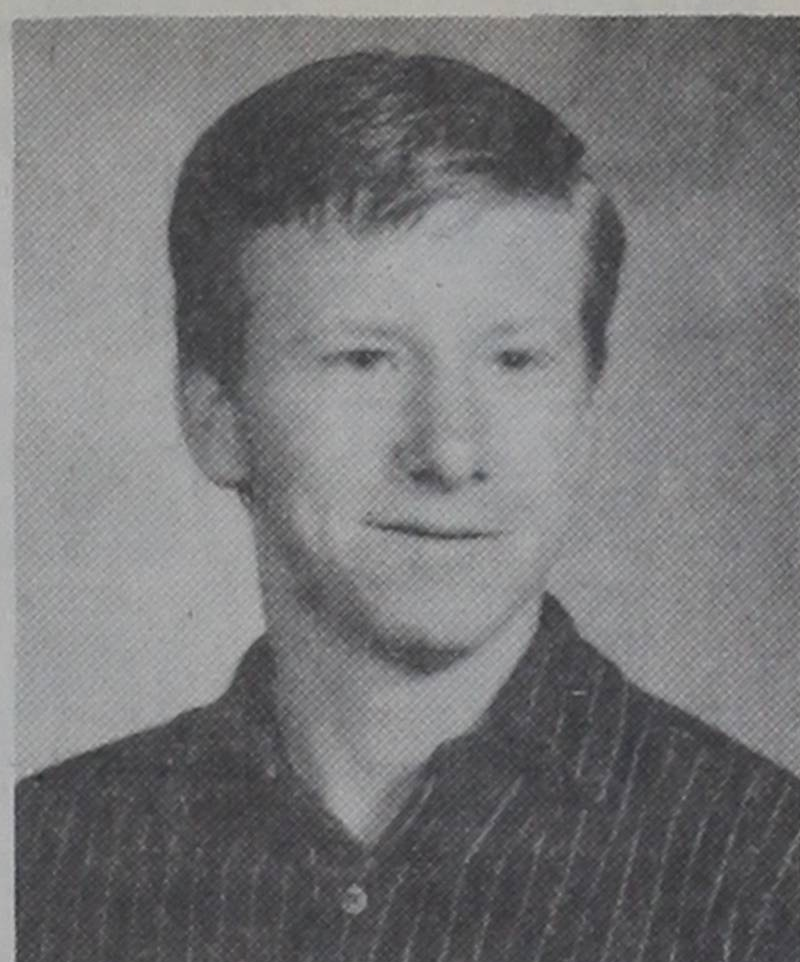

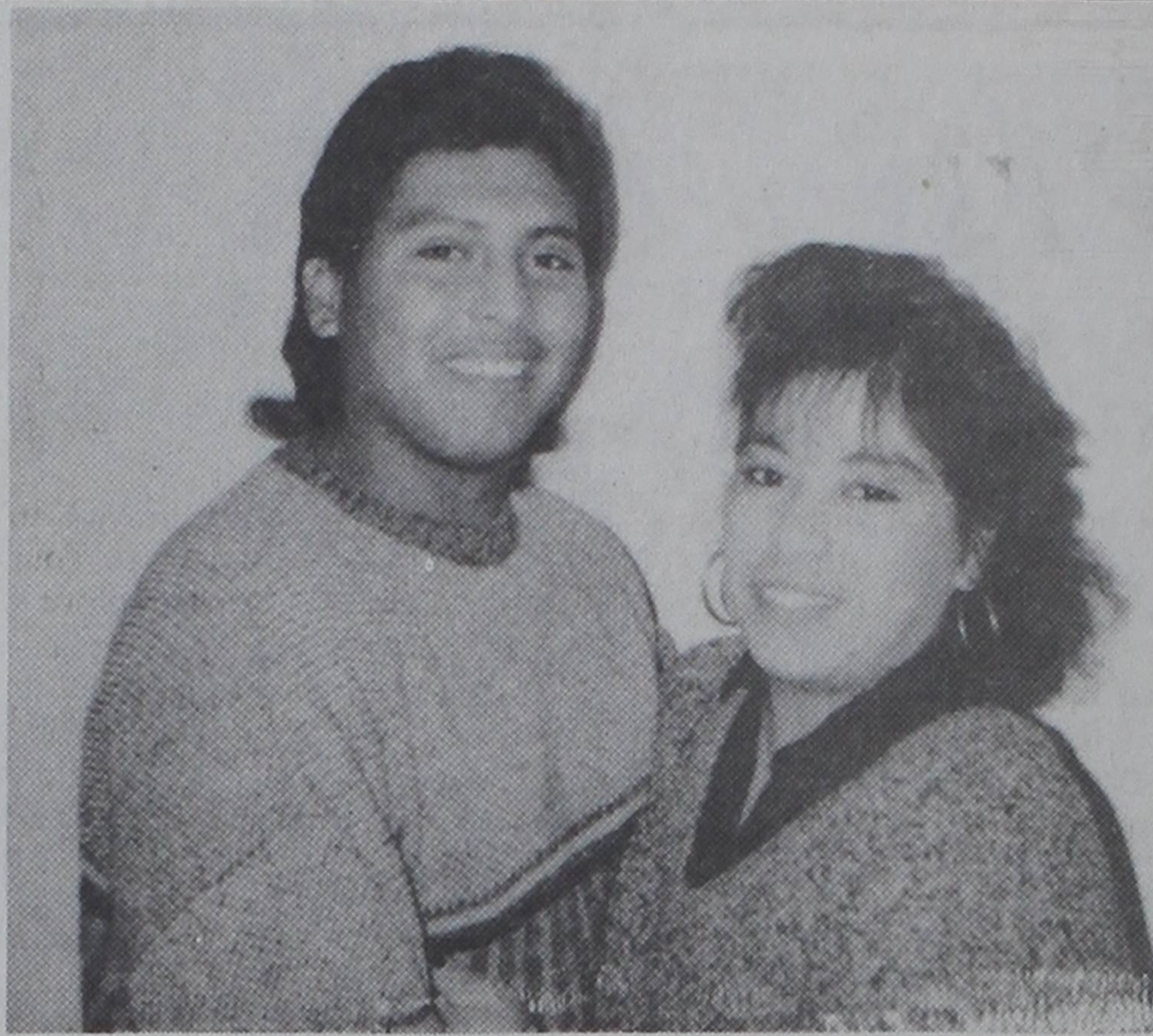
The music will be a variety of religious songs with the feature selection being "Gospel Mass" by Robert Ray.

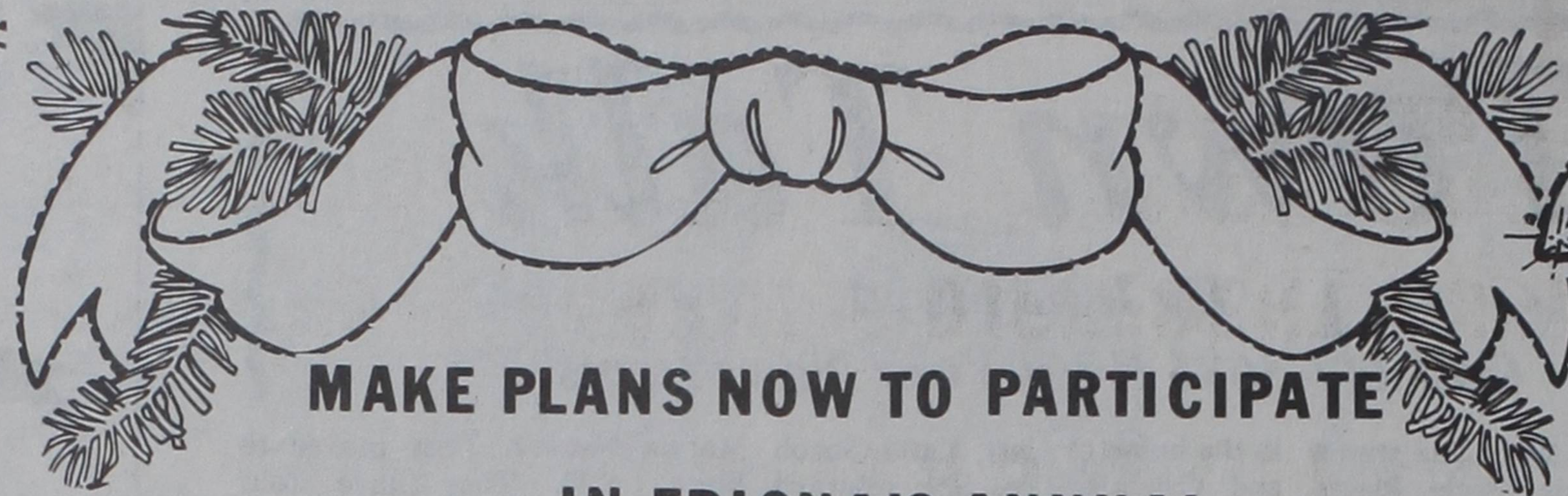
