Hico Has Perfect Record On Entering Security Numbers

Only five of the more than 205 employers in Hamilton county who filed Social Security tax returns for the first quarter of 1949 missed out on entering the account numbers for all their employees, according to Joe H. Clepp, field re-presentative of the Waco field of-fice of the Social Security Administration. Hico had a perfect record.

"Those five employers left off the Social Security Account num-bers of 7 Hamilton county employees, and by so doing may have endangered the rights of those workers and their families to retirement or survivor insurance benefits under that program, Clepp continued.

With another tax return due during the month of July-the tax return should be mailed to the Collector of Internal Revenue in Austin and not to our Waco officewe hope that any Hamilton county employer who does not have a record of each employee will get that employee to complete an application for a number (Form SS-5 obtainable at all post offices) and of Bradford Corrigan, L. B. Mc-Glothlin, A. J. Koen, and J. S. Jor-tax return." Clepp added. "If that is done, then there is no danger that the wages will not be proper

Clepp invited any Hamilton county employee who think their Social Security wage records might be incorrect to write the field office at 206 N. 6th St., Wago, Texas, and ask for a wage state ment request card.

Giles Says Procedure For **Acquiring Land Under Vet** Program To Be Kept Simple

Paper work involving application to participate has been cut to the minimum. Each successive step has been shorn of all encumbering delays.

For example, proof of the applicant's eligibility can be established by submitting a certified copy of his honorable discharge plus substantiation that the applicant was a resident of Texas at the time he entered military service and is still a legal resident at the time of application for land program benefits. For those taking advantage of the 90 day priority offered those who have a service-connected disability sustained in combat, certification of such must accompany the application.

Each veteran will be limited to one purchase not exceeding \$7,500 cost to the Board. He will be required to pay not less than five per cent down and execute an onor-before note for 40 years at three per cent interest for the belance.

Should a purchaser desire to acquire a tract of land costing NOT more than \$10,000 he will be remaintained.




