

"Well, how do you like Hico by this time?" This question, as is usual with newcomers to any city, has been propounded to the News Review editor and his family time and again since we moved to this metropolis situated within a stone's-throw of three counties. We wish to state, insist and reiterate right now that we like Hico better than a New Yorker likes his Broadway—better than a native son of California likes his oranges and screen constantly better than a Kentuckian likes his race horses—in fact we are even more convinced that Hico is a good place to live than we were when making our plans to settle here.

Why shouldn't we like Hico? What is there any other place can offer that would be more ideal for living? Who could find fault with the town when it can offer so many of the niceties and conveniences of life and screen constantly growing better? Where could one find a class of citizenship that would surpass that of which Hico is made up?

If there should be those who can answer the above questions to their satisfaction, and know of a better place in which to do business and live, what is holding them? There is a city in North Texas whose newspaper carries a couple of lines on its front page article every day, "If we did not have faith in — we would make other arrangements." When the matter is studied out to the bottom, this is a very proper and timely saying. If a man or woman, boy or girl cannot take an interest in the town he or she calls home, then he or she owes it to the town and to himself or herself to move to some place where such things as may meet his own individual fancy may be found to a greater extent.

We are not trying to state or even intimate that Hico is perfect, and could fill the role of the promised land. It would be foolish to take the stand that things are all right as they are, and that there is nothing that the city lacks in conveniences or improvements. There is a great need right now for work along constructive lines, and when we get started in earnest on an improvement program there will never be a stopping place. But what is evident and what we are speaking of is that there is a basis on which to start, a desire in the heart of the leading citizens and a generally recognized need of these improvements. Before anything can be done it is necessary to have faith in the matter. Hico's progress up to this time has merely served to support this faith of those few who started the town.

Hico has reached the point where it must either progress or be consigned to the lot of a "dead town." All over the country there are small towns and large cities that offer many inducements to those desiring the best things in life. Paved streets, public buildings, playgrounds and the like can be found in abundance in Texas as well as in other States. But the thing that cannot be found is the spirit of neighborliness and friendliness that we have right here at home. No one likes to tear up plans of a lifetime and break away from the surroundings that have been home to them in the past. The only thing that could induce a person to move as a rule, is the fact that he can either find better living conditions elsewhere, or considers that he can do better in business.

Either of the above conditions is a cause worthy of consideration, and we would not blame any person should he convince himself that such a place might be found elsewhere. But what we are anxious to see done, and what we believe is going to be done, from indications we have noted since coming here, is to make Hico a place where living conditions and business life will be such that no other town or section can offer better.

This is not just a lot of useless talk to fill up space. It is the firm conviction of the News Review editor, and represents the attitude that will be taken during the present management of the paper. If we can contribute in any way to anything that will work toward making Hico a better town, we are going to put our full efforts and resources into the venture.

Hico has always been a good town. But we cannot rest on the laurels of those who have gone before. Life of the present day requires much foresight and confidence in the things we are doing. We should strive to continue faithful to the ideals of the men who have brought this town up through the swaddling-clothes state and even try to improve on their work, as is only proper with the opportunities of the age.

Think the matter over. Don't take our word or anybody's word for the statement that the above things are true. And on the other hand, don't be too quick to side in with those who say the world is going to the dogs and that things are not what they used to be. With a stand such as this nothing can stop us. Let's go.—(Feb. 7, 1930).

Gulf Introduces New Gasoline With Huge Ad Schedule

Houston, March 1, 1950.—An improved premium grade gasoline meeting the requirements of the latest high compression automobile motors is being made available at Gulf Oil outlets throughout Texas today, according to M. Farnsworth, Division General Manager.

Let's Look Back 20 Years

FILES OF 1930 REVIVE MEMORIES OF PERSONS AND EVENTS IN HICO THEN

Hico, like any other town that has survived around 70 years, has a heritage of which it can be justly proud. It has prospered steadily, and although it has not undergone any booms or periods of immediate growth, still the town has a large number of traditions. Many old-timers who started out here found it pleasant enough and profitable enough to stay and raise their families, and a few have moved away. In the last few years Hico has been graced with many newcomers who have added to the spirit of cooperation and built up the enthusiasm of our community. Some of them may not be acquainted with the town's history, and others will be interested to review the past. In the hope that these notes might prove interesting to our readers, we are reprinting some of the news stories and notes from as far back as our files go.

We wish it were possible to include news of 50 years ago, but the files are not available. One score and two months ago, the present management took over operation of the News Review, but prior to that time there were no available files dating back to the establishment of the newspaper in 1886. However, to catch up from the beginning of 1930, we are going back to the first issue of that year.—C. H.

20 YEARS AGO

The new year began, as it traditionally does, with the annual banquet of the "fire boys." Toastmaster was Mayor J. C. Barrow who opened the speechmaking with tribute to the faithfulness of the fire boys and commended them for their work in behalf of the city. Judge E. H. Persons explained the advantage that had come to Hico by reason of reduction of the key rate, brought about largely by the efficient work of the fire department. Miss Fannie Wood, manager of the telephone exchange spoke . . . as well as other citizens; Rev. A. C. Haynes, pastor of the Methodist church; J. R. McMillan, former Hico fire chief, J. W. Richbourg, and Chief M. A. Smith.

Early in the year, Hico was to have a modern theatre, it was announced by E. H. Elkins, proprietor of the Palace. Mr. Elkins secured a long time lease on the building where the theatre is located, and intended to remodel the building and equip it with the latest sound devices for talking pictures, then brand new.

"Fine Jersey Cow and Male Sold for \$1 Each Cow Day Dec. 24" is the heading of an article which gives S. J. Cheek Sr. as one of the purchasers. (How does that compare with the price recently paid by Glenn McCarthy for a fine bull?)

The new Texaco Service Station located on the south end of the Barnes & McCullough lot, opened for business during the holidays. Two Hico-reared boys owned the station—C. L. Lynch Jr. and Grady Hooper. For several years Mr. Lynch had been in Cleveland with W. Pitt Barnes in a Dodge agency. Mr. Hooper, although back in Hico for some time, for a number of years was connected with automobile concerns elsewhere. Both young men were presented as being popular with a wide circle of friends, who predicted they would prosper in their new business venture, presenting Texaco products and, in addition, offering real automobile service in everything that the name implies.

CAGE TOURNAMENT FOR DISTRICT GIRLS ENDS IN CONFUSION

The past week has been a thrilling and interesting experience for local basketball players and fans, although rather disappointing in results registered. Hico boys, competing in regional play at Brownwood last Friday, lost their first game to Coahoma.

The local district tournament for girls attracted large crowds Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday night. By tying the Meridian girls Saturday night, after having lost to them the first game, the locals were thrown into a tie for winners through the rules of double-elimination play.

Scorekeepers' tallies failed to check in a heartbreaking playoff Tuesday night of this week, and the Bosque County girls went home as district champions, leaving the local scene in a state of befuddlement. The following statement explaining the present state of affairs was submitted by Coach Willie Sirman: "Meridian finished like a cyclone and by scoring 5 points in last 35 seconds defeated the Hico girls 51-49 in a thrilling ball game. This established Meridian as district champion and they will enter the girls' state tournament in Waco on March 8, 9, 10, and 11.

"I wish to thank all the Hico fans for their good behavior Tuesday night. Even though the score was confusing, you fans were good sports by not showing any disrespectful action. "The scorebook matter was discussed with our district director, Mr. Hughes, Mr. Hughes, myself, and Meridian superintendent and Coach Ericson went to Gatesville and discussed the matter with the Girls' League Director, Mr. McKemie. Mr. McKemie pointed out to us that a similar case happened last year and the advisory board was forced to accept the official score kept by official score keeper. If protests were allowed on officials' and scorekeepers' books, there would be numerous protests. As Mr. McKemie pointed out, when situations like this develop it is unfortunate, but still the League can't do anything about it. Rule book clearly states that the official rule book will determine score in case of disagreement. "The Meridian school officials are very sorry it happened, but still there is no way to prove the official score book was wrong. After talking with Meridian school officials, I feel sure that if the score could be proven wrong they would gladly volunteer to make necessary correction. "The officials' official score keeper, and the timer were all hired by the District Director so that the game would have the best officials available. "I hope the Hico fans don't blame Meridian or their fans for what happened because there was nothing they could do to solve the problem. It was a hard game to lose and our girls and I feel like the mistake, if there was one, was unintentional."
