

The News Review management has always taken pride in the readership enjoyed by the home paper. Our friends have led us believe that they really take time to scan the paper thoroughly, some even declaring that they read every line in it each week. wen the want ads."

Such a condition would be en-tirely too much for an editor to expect, of course. But to say the least, there is an encouraging disposition on the part of sub-scribers to act like they take the paper for some other reason than to have something to wrap around

their junches. Actual readership is not always reflected by circulation figures, either. Surveys have shown that each paper is read by four or five persons other than the one it is addressed to. Figured on this basis, the home paper remains the best advertising medium that has been devised thus far. The fact that it has continued publication over more than threescore years while other schemes and plans have flowered and died down proves that it has not yet been supplanted or superseded.

We always regret it when a paper misses the target and a subscriber is temporarily inconvenienced by its failure to arrive on schedule. But we are always flattered when that disappointed person calls by to get a duplicate, and don't even mind a little goodnatured scolding even though the fault be not ours.

And we have yet to witness a complaint at the post office when person fails to receive a circular or "throw-away" noticed in the hands of another patron.

Much time and thought and greater amount of expense go into the publication of each week's issue of the News Review than one might think. Just how much is sometimes regulated by the patronage accorded it. Not that a temporary let-down in advertising ever lessens the quality, but over a period of years it is only natural that the management of any paper should try to keep it on a sound business basis.

That the News Review has been able to hold its head up among its contemporaries during good times and bad has been a constant source of gratification to the present editor. It has had its ups and downs, to be sure, but when scanned on a comparative basis, it has been at least creditable enough that local people have been charitable enough not to intimate that they are ashamed of it.

Naturally, if more business men used it more often and on a larger scale for carrying their paid messages out to the people, it could grow in size and service. But the desire to serve could never be any greater than that which exists now, and the disposition to be

Many of you I have met and talked with, which to me has been a pleasure. Those of you whom I haven't met as yet, I surely intend to before the election rolls around.



#### Congressman's Study Shows Thought Trends **Of District's Voters**

Economy in Government and concern of our people that Government is leaning too heavily toward socialism predominates the thinking of the electorate of the 17th Congressional District, according to Omar Burleson, Representative of the 17th District, who revealed the results of a questionaire submitted to his constituents this week. Returns from the questionnaire were more than two and a half times that ordinarily expected from efforts of this na-ture, Burleson stated, and indicates the serious thinking of the

people. Voters of the 12 counties in the District went on record as being opposed to a tax increase, even if nocessary to balance the budget; to Federal aid to education, to both public and religious schools or to public schools only; to a system of compulsory health insurance; and to repeal of the excise or luxury taxes. They favor overwhelmingly strengthening our laws against subverse activities, laws against subverse activities, particularly by providing a place of exile for those convicted of traitorous acts or conspiring to overthrow this government by force; and extending the present draft law beyond its expiration on June 24, 1950, if it appears necessary for our National security. Comments made by the voters were most interesting and reveal-ing. Burleson said. The attitude of the people, he said, "is very encouraging and gives me stronger hope that we shall return to more common sense Governmental operation. Only when the voice of the people is heard will this be accomplished. If the voices heard are those demanding a paternalis-tic attitude from Government, then such an attitude will prevail and it will be our own fault if we surrender our precious liberty for such a price."
