## Crossed Eyes?

 Maybe NotBabies are not born with fully developed eye muscle control. That's why parents need
not get upset if the eyes of an infant under six months seem to cross or turn occasionally.
But if the crossing continues, or seems to increase in frequency, it's advisable to bring the baby in for an examination by the ey doctor. The optometrist has the expertise and equipment to check even the youngest eyes.

Prompt treatment is important; the sooner it starts, the better the chance of correcting the problem. The child will not outgrow crossed treatment-combined therapy with both prescription lenses and vision training-is often successful. The child can learn to use both eyes together so that they remain straight and properly aligned. Surgery is reserved as the last resort, not recommed uness al oher treat options are unsuccessful.
