Norton said a group of local entertainers headed by Mrs. W. D. Bradley Jr. and Weldon (Banjo) Pierce would add interest at each stop. They will be accompanied by four boys and four girls dressed in pioneer costumes. "Brushy Bill" Roberts also will go along to revive memories of Jesse James.

The program is shaping up well, Norton said Thursday, calling attention to the traditional parade on the first day, Wednesday, Aug. 9, in which everyone is invited to place an entry. The line will form at the customary place two blocks north of City Hall, at 9:30. At 10 o'clock J. C. Barrow will deliver the address of welcome and the parade will start.

Liberal prizes are being offered in the various divisions, including: Best Decorated Float, Best Decorated Car, Cowboy Rider and Horse, Cowgirl Rider and Horse, Best Decorated Bicycle, Most Comical Entry.

Stephenville will have a float here, according to word received from the Chamber of Commerce in that city, and other towns are expected to be represented.

Performances will be given each night of the Reunion by the Hico Band, under the direction of W. D. Bradley, Jr., who is arranging a special concert for one evening.

Political speakers will be on hand, many acceptances having been received already, with invitations letters still going out. Schafer's "Just-for-Fun" Shows will furnish carnival attractions. This outfit, which has a reputation for having provided a galaxy of amusements in the past, is playing the De Leon Watermelon and Peach Festival this week, and those who have attended that affair report a number of new attractions, which will be with Schafer Shows here.

Further announcements will be contained in the big 4-page circular to be distributed on the booster trip, and in next week's issue of the paper.

MOST POLITICAL RACES DECIDED BY VOTERS IN SATURDAY'S PRIMARY

Troop Movement to Come Through Hico Sunday, August 6

The 45th Infantry Division, Oklahoma National Guard, is moving to North Fort Hood, Texas for its Summer Field Training Encampment on August 5 and 6. One of the routes being used for this movement will bring them through Hico on Sunday, August 6.

The column will consist of approximately 500 military vehicles, varying in size from one-quarter ton trucks to 4 ton wreckers. The column will not contain any tanks or tracked vehicles.

Constable B. F. Williams received notice of this troop movement, with the request that the movement be given the right of way through town. The route to be followed is south on Texas 79 to Wichita Falls, U. S. 281 to Evans and U. S. 84 to Gatesville.

The lead vehicle of the column is estimated to arrive at the city limits here at 12:54 p. m. It is planned that the route designated by the U. S. highway markers will be used.

Only One Run-Off Is Indicated In Hamilton County

Local voters came out in spirited fashion for last Saturday's Democratic first primary, but they have had their fun for the year, it seems. They voted in decisive fashion and thereby took most of the interest away from the runoff election August 26.

Withdrawal of Sheriff N. Y. Terral, who trailed Woody Young in the first primary in which Ed Frost and Bob Fulcher were eliminated as nominees, apparently leaves Young as the Democratic nominee.

Considerable interest was displayed in the race for County Judge. Hico gave 226 votes for Incumbent Eugene Tate, who was eliminated in county voting. The runoff will be between Herbert (Boss) Gordon, who received 134 votes here to lead his run-off opponent, John M. Pederson, with 92. County totals were Pederson 1341, Gordon 1085, and Tate 1086.

Surprise of the day was in the written post of precinct chairman, a post filled for the past few years through courtesy by A. A. Brown. No name appears on the ballot for this office, but through some quirk of local politics a dark-horse opponent appeared, W. R. Coats, who was not an avowed candidate but evidently had some good volunteer campaign managers, received 33 write-in votes. Other ballots counted showed: Brown 65, J. N. Russell 17, Frank Mings 1, Morgan Moon 3, Bill Norton 1, and Will Autrey 1. In strict construction this voting would indicate a run-off, since the incumbent failed to receive a majority but no official ruling or statement of intentions from the principals involved has been received by the News Review.

Commissioner Re-elected

Race-horse in the balloting was Fern Jordan, present commissioner of Precinct 3 which is composed of Hico, Carlton, Fairy and Olin. Jordan was credited with a total of 650 against two opponents: L. A. Hicks with 130, and S. L. Hubbard with 39.

C. E. Edmiston, unopposed, was re-elected District Clerk.

Forest O. Harper, unopposed, was re-elected County Superintendent.

Billy G. Wood was voted in as Tax Assessor-Collector with 1881 against 1562 for his opponent, Rhett Sargent. This office is now filled by Cecil Nix, who did not run for re-election.

Ira Moore for County Clerk, unopposed, was re-elected with 3488 of the 3571 votes cast in the county.

Truman Roberts of Hico, appointed this year as County Attorney, was unopposed and is the nominee for an elective term.

Miss Pat Seabrest received 2225 votes for County Treasurer against 978 cast for her opponent, Robert Kuklies.

New District Attorney

Howell E. Cobb of Comanche received a landslide vote for District Attorney over L. W. Brann of Hamilton, incumbent. The unofficial totals were given as 8875 to 5251 in the four counties. Cobb leading in Hamilton, Comanche and Coryell, and Brann in Bosque.

Earl Huddleston, former Representative in the Texas Legislature, won over another Coryell County candidate, T. V. Foote, 3520 to 3288. This post is now filled by Sid Gregory, who was not a candidate for re-election.

Hico Supports Harris

While following the action of voters all over the state in naming Allan Shivers as nominee for Governor, Hico departed from the beaten path in the Lieutenant Governor's race, Fred Red Harris, adopted son who has a ranch near here, got more votes than all his eleven opponents combined, although he trailed badly in the State. Kyle Vick was second, and Pierce Brooks third. The run-off will be between Brooks and Ben Ramsey. Other results in balloting for State officials are set out in a tabulation on this page furnished through courtesy of the Hamilton Herald-News.

No County Runoffs In Erath

Six candidates were unopposed and four incumbents were defeated in Erath County voting, with the only run-off indicated being that for Commissioner of Precinct 1, in which Harvey Boyd, incumbent, failed to receive a majority over two opponents, Fred Allen and A. L. Earley. Commissioners W. W. LaBaume in Precinct 2, Roy Fallin in Precinct 3, and Delmer Compton in Precinct 4 were re-elected.

Albert O. Craigwall Jr. defeated William O. Craft for Tax Assessor-Collector. G. H. Williamson defeated Elbert V. Pollan for County Attorney; Mrs. Ed Bryant defeated Miss Beulah Johnson for County Treasurer, and L. E. Fost-

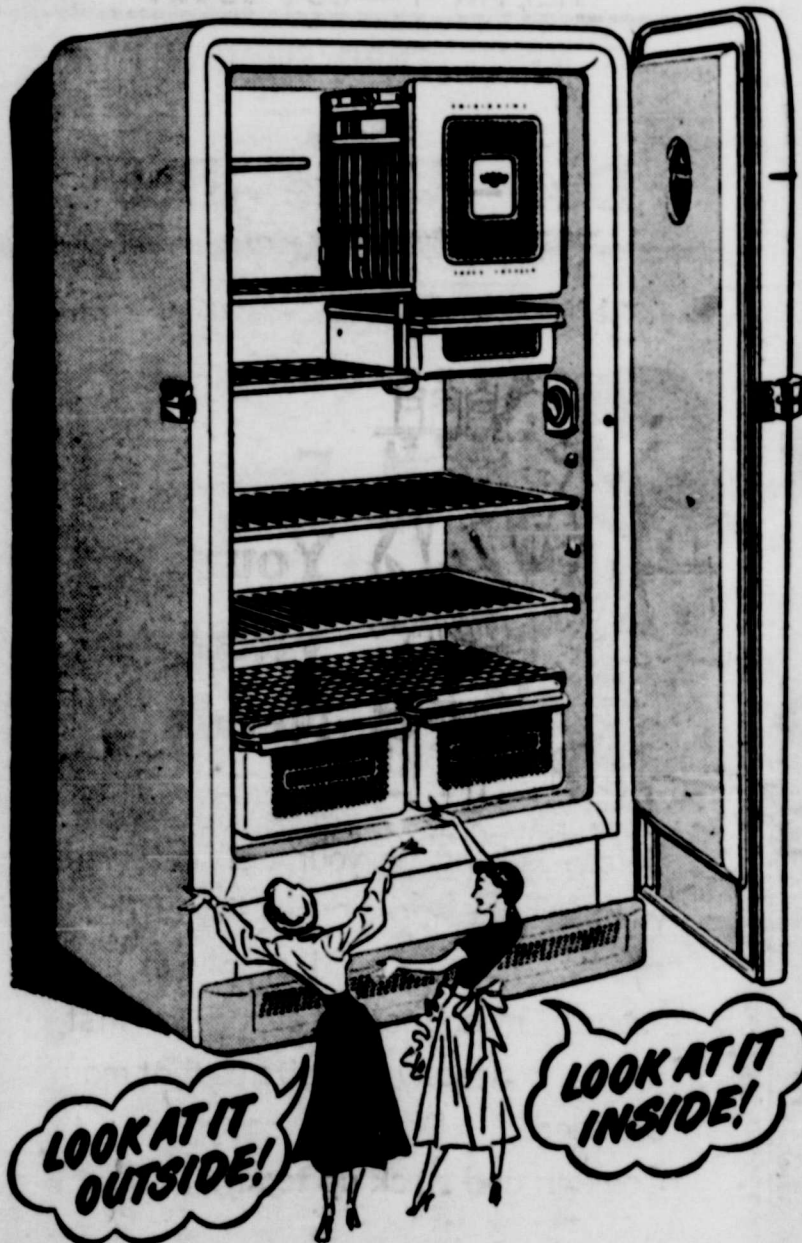

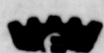

Methodist Pastor Takes Course At SMU On News Reporting

Dallas, July 24.—Rev. J. Fred Patterson, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Hico Texas, is one of 75 Texas Methodist leaders spending two days here on the campus of Southern Methodist University this week to learn from working newspapermen, church editors and public relations counselors how to improve their press relations.

"How news writing differs from sermon writing," "What makes news news," "How to cooperate with editors and reporters," "How to create news when there isn't any," are some of the subjects being discussed.

Chaired by Bishop William C. Martin of the Dallas-Fort Worth Area, this seminar on church public relations is sponsored jointly by the denomination's Commission on Public Information, Dr. Ralph Steady of New York, executive director, and the Texas Joint Board of Publications, Dr. P. E. Riley of Fort Worth, chairman. Arrangements for the sessions were made by Dr. J. Fisher Simpson of Dallas, editor of the "News of Texas" section of The Christian Advocate, official Methodist weekly.

President Humphrey Lee of S. M. U. is one of the commission of nine which administers Methodism's press relations program. Associated with him in organizing the commission ten years ago was the late Hon. Josephus Daniels, a North Carolina newspaper publisher, former ambassador and Secretary of the Navy.

Techniques of the newspaper story were explained by Charles Dameron, rewrite man on the Dallas Times Herald and Leo Allman, public relations director of the U. S. Dept. of Labor, Dallas.

Two other newsmen spoke at the dinner meeting Wednesday night. Felix McKnight, assistant managing editor of the Dallas News, and Frank H. King, general executive of the Associated Press. The Christian Advocate, Chicago, was represented by Edwin H. Maynard, editor of the Area News supplement.

No Child Is Safe From Impetigo Attack In Summer Months

Austin, July 24.—When a state health authority says there is no such thing as a natural resistance to impetigo, parents of small children know exactly what he means. Those parents know, perhaps from bitter experience, that the same individual can suffer repeated attacks from what State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox calls an "offensive, annoying skin infection."

Although children are unusually susceptible to impetigo, it can be found in any age group, Dr. Cox said. It is most prevalent during the summer months, but has been known to occur at any month.

Impetigo, according to Dr. Cox's explanation, is a purulent skin infection. It isn't too serious, except in new born babies. An invasion of a hospital nursery ward calls for extreme attention to keep uninfected babies from getting it, for it spreads like fire in dry grass.

Impetigo is caused by a pus-forming bacteria called staphylococcus—the same sort of germ found in boils and sores where pus is present. Usually it forms an unsightly crust over wide areas of the body. The pus underneath the crust is highly infectious if allowed to get on any other skin surface.

The infection is easily transmitted when a non-infected person uses the towel of someone infected, since the towel moisture permits the germ to survive.

Children living in the most hygienic homes frequently get impetigo, although it is perhaps more common among children living in homes where personal sanitation isn't considered too important.

Dr. Cox says soldiers are often infected, because they have small chance for keeping consistently clean. It may involve a whole arm, or a side of the face and neck.

The only way to minimize the ill effects of impetigo is to keep the infection localized, that is, keeping it from spreading. This can be done only by preventing the pus or serum from exuding onto "clean" skin surfaces.

Three Future Farmers Receive Lone Star Farmer Degree Award

Wendell Clark Burden, Jackson Roline Chaney and Kenneth De'ano Johnson have been awarded the Texas Lone Star Farmer Degree Award as a result of three hard years of project work in Future Farmer work, according to J. Doyle Love, vocational agriculture teacher. These awards were announced last week at the State Future Farmer Convention in San Antonio.

The three Hico Future Farmers receiving these awards this year are the total of Lone Star Farmers here in the Hico Public Schools, under the administration of Superintendent J. E. Lincoln. To four, Dan Holladay is the only other Lone Star Farmer in the twenty year history of the Hico Agriculture Department. These three boys are to be commended for the good work they have done during the three years they studied vocational agriculture. To be Lone Star Farmers they were outstanding members of the local future farmer chapter, earned as much as \$250, two-thirds of this \$250 coming from productive projects that is a part of the agriculture program. They were active members of the local chapter, had satisfactory records of leadership and scholarship. They were familiar with parliamentary procedures and have held group discussions for 40 or more minutes. These boys were outstanding not only in the field of agriculture, but also in civic organizations and civic leadership. They have assisted in carrying on all types of business, in social meetings and social functions.

Project work is easy to do but improved supervised project work is altogether different. As it requires much more knowledge, skill, time and efforts on the part of the boy, daddy, mother, and teacher. Wendell Burden has had a variety of supervised improved projects; namely, calf for beef production, chicks for broiler production, dairy cow for milk production, pigs for pork production, and sows for pig production.

Roline Chaney has had garden for vegetable production, 3 calves for beef production, and chicks for fryer production. Kenneth Johnson had even a greater desire to broaden his field of knowledge in agriculture. He had as supervised improvement projects, hogs for pork production, chicks for pullet production, hens for egg production, poulters for beef production, turkeys for egg production, milo for feed production, cows for calf production, and chicks for fryer production.

These awards are only a little recognition that these boys get for being such outstanding students in vocational agriculture, civic leaders and for having an extremely good supervised farming program. May the light of these boys shine on other equally good future farmers that they might be enlightened and encouraged to do equally good if not better work than these three Hico Future Farmers, as we have another higher degree that about 25 out of 30,000 future farmers make. It is the American Farmer Degree.

From where I sit, you could argue 'til Doomsday and never get complete agreement on a lot of things. Now, take me. I'm all for

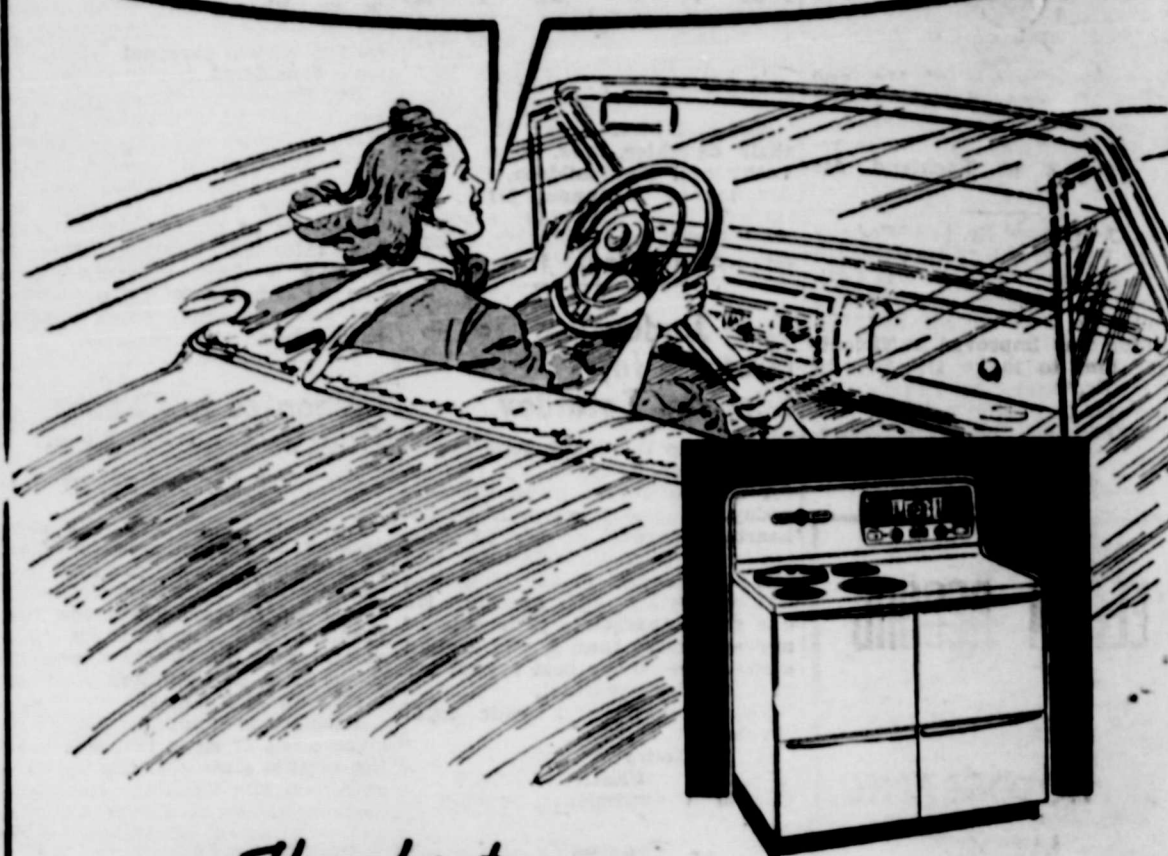
having a glass of beer or ale on occasion. Your "sociable beverage" may be a "Coke"—or buttermilk or maybe a cup of hot coffee.

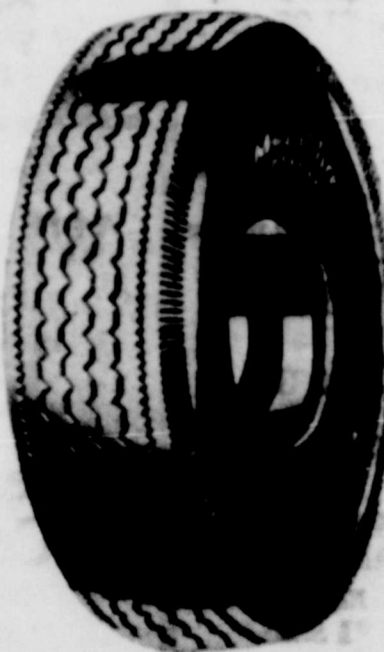

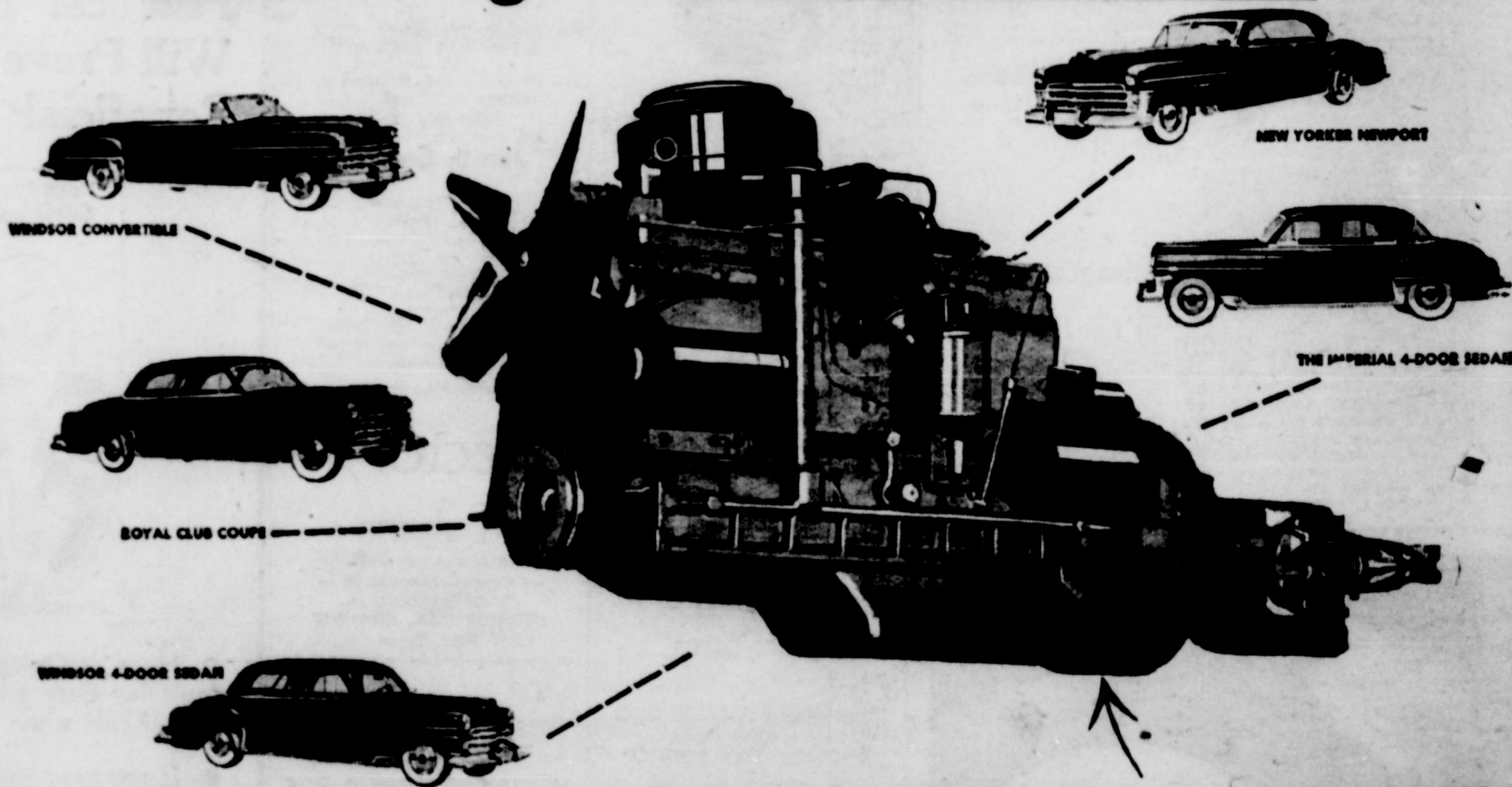
