

Wildlife Conservation Education Boom Is Sighted By Officials

Austin, August 16.-The subect of conservation and its indispensability to all phases of human progress will be taught for for the first time in many Texas schools this fall.

This broadening of the vital re-source-use education program will be a direct result of workshops conducted in Texas senior colleges this summer by the Supervisor of Wildlife Conservation Education the Game, Fish and Oyster

The Supervisor, upon conclusion of the summer schedule, said more than 3,000 state teachers have participated in planning for re-sourse-use education. The extent of this routine and the rapidity of its growth since this work was begun in 1946 is shown by the fact that the summer workshop programs have increased from the first year to 24 during the past summer.
