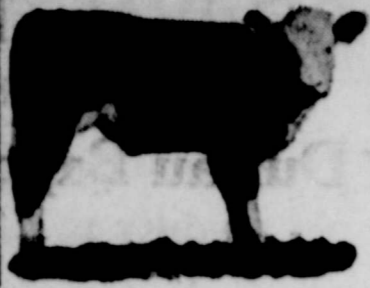

Salvation Army

Dallas, Aug. 14—The Salvation Army in Texas is alerted to the needs of the war emergency, and is organizing in every Texas city and town where it operates to provide its familiar Red Shield services for the men and women of the armed forces.

Colonel Morrison said that some thought has already been given by The Salvation Army to a national campaign to raise money for the servicemen's clubs, either through Community Chests, or as an independent campaign.

"This will not be necessary," he said, "if USO is reactivated." He pointed out that USO is still a legal corporation and can be reactivated by the President, if and when the need arises. In that event, the Salvation Army would transfer the interim services which it is now mapping into the USO of which it is an integral part.

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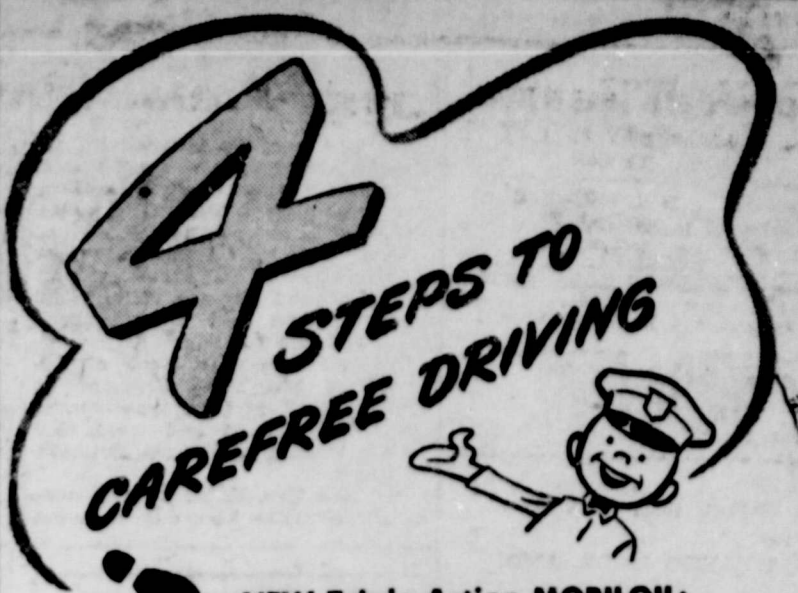

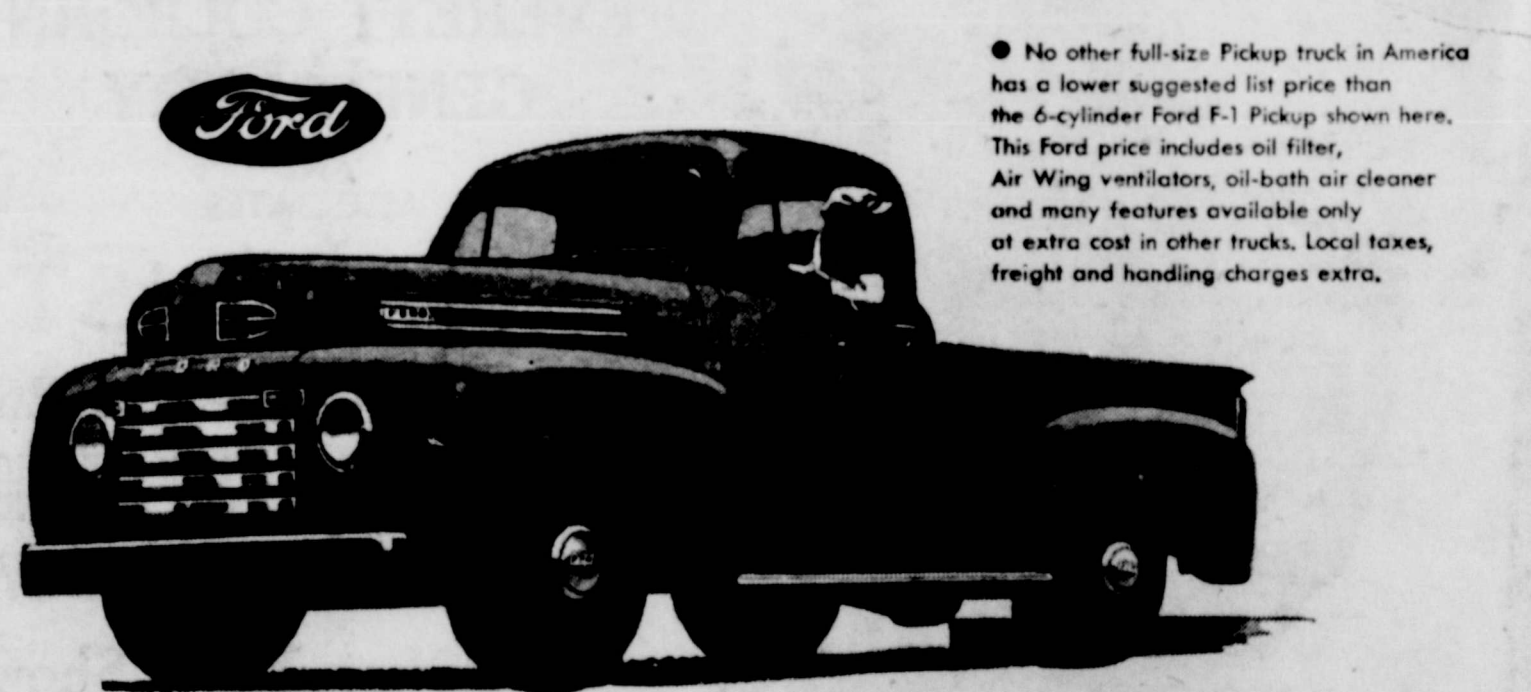

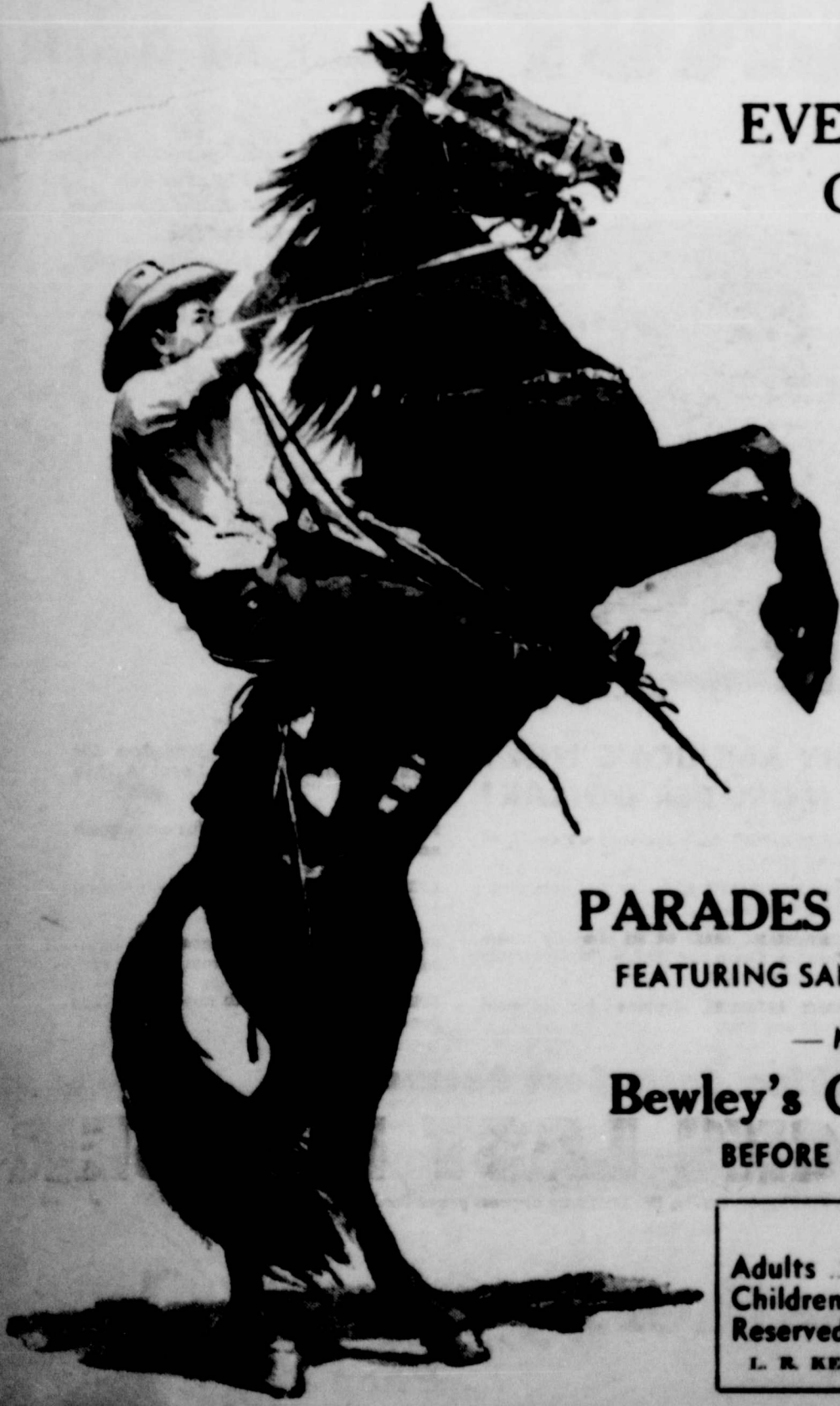

Wildlife Conservation Education Boom Is Sighted By Officials

Austin, August 18.—The subject of conservation and its indispensability to all phases of human progress will be taught for the first time in many Texas schools this fall.

This broadening of the vital resource-use education program will be a direct result of workshops conducted in Texas senior colleges this summer by the Supervisor of Wildlife Conservation Education of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission.

The Supervisor, upon conclusion of the summer schedule, said more than 3,000 state teachers have participated in planning for resource-use education. The extent of this routine and the rapidity of its growth since this work was begun in 1946 is shown by the fact that the summer workshop programs have increased from one the first year to 24 during the past summer.

Dozens of calls are received daily for literature to supply teachers for the school year ahead. Well over a thousand packets of material have been distributed within the last two months.

The Education Supervisor said the subject is taught in grades one through twelve but that emphasis is made on the grades of one through eight. The success of the statewide program has been facilitated by the cooperation of the State Education Agency. A main factor in this advancement, he said, has been through the efforts of the director of resource-use education in the State Department of Education. This official coordinates the efforts of administrators, supervisors, teachers and others interested in teaching conservation to young Texans.

FARM AND RANCH CHATTER
By LAYNE BEATY

With other organizations, including the military, now in drives for more members, we think it only fitting that the rolls of the ancient and beneficent order of PWIBTSFDOS be swelled to new bounds.

Spelled out the PWIBTSFDOS stands for "People Who Invite Beaty To Stay For Dinner Or Supper."

There are chapters in most counties of Texas though activity is sporadic. The coat of arms is a napkin, decorated with the standard composed knife, fork, chicken leg and roasting ear standing over a slice of watermelon with a combination barbecue pit and steak griddle in the upper left hand and a homemade ice cream freezer on the right.

The motto is "What Food These Morsels Be" and the official handshake consists of a firm grip with the right hand and presentation of drumstick with the left.

Applicants for membership may be mailed, telegraphed, telephoned or in person.

Along with price increases in most everything else, except farm products this year, there can be expected a rise in ginning rates, hauling, picking and most things a farmer must pay for. The increase in his take never comes until later, often much later. Current rises in meat prices, for instance, is not reflected in market prices of livestock.

The senate agriculture committee will get a new chairman come next January, as veteran Oklahoma Senator Elmer Thomas was defeated for his seat by Congressman Mike Monroney. Thomas has always championed administrative farm policies.

At the Greenville U. S. Cotton Experimental Station last week, when Superintendent Dalton Hooten put on four field day in a row, the best cotton yields shown were an average of 905 pounds of seed cotton to the acre over the ten

years of the test of cotton following hairy vetch in a rotation of corn, oats and cotton, in that order.

Ginners are distributing books of safety matches to cotton pickers in many places now because of fires that are believed caused in cotton bales after the "kitchen" type matches drop out of hatbands into cotton sacks, and are ignited when they come in contact with gin saws.

Such fires are usually not detected until days afterward when they finally eat through the bale. Over 700,000 such books of safety matches have been sold to Texas ginners already. They don't strike on anything except where they're supposed to.

For generations the mule was the only hybrid most of us knew anything about. Then there was hybrid corn and now chickens. And we understand some folks who are looking for a new source of vegetable are experimenting with hybrid sunflowers, for the seed, of course.

Hats off to E. S. Shoaf for his centennial edition of the Wood County Democrat last week. On the hundredth anniversary of the county, he put out a 15 section, 120 page paper that northeast Texans and historians elsewhere will read and reread and file away.

Every crop that gets prominent will have its parasites. Comes now

the corn earworm and the sorghum webworm plaguing our maize crop.

Dusting and spraying with DDT during the afternoon is recommended, after the heads open up. Do this two weeks before harvest, not later.

With a government report verifying increases in farm product prices last week, people immediately say, "look what the war in Korea did, this time," when usually farm prices are slowest to rise.

Now comes the official statement that prices of meat and other commodities would have gone up without the stimulus from Asia.
