changes we have witnessed!

We were born before television, before penicillin, before policiloshots, frozen foods, xerox, plastic, contact lenses, frisbees and the pill.

We were before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ballpoint pens. Before panty hose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes .... and before man walked on the moon.

on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. How quaint can you be? In our time, closets were for clothes, not for "coming out of." Bunnies were small rabbits, and rabbits were not Volkswagons. Designer jeans were scheming girls named Jean, and having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with our cousins. We thought fast food was what

we thought last food was what you ate during Lent, and outer space was the back of a theater. We were before house husbands, gay rights, computer dating, dual careers and commuter marriages. We were before day-care centers, group therapy and nursing homes. We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, electronic typewriters, artificial electronic typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yogurt and guys who wore earrings. For us, guys who wore earrings. For us, time-sharing meant togetherness --- not computers or condominiums. A chip was a piece of wood. Hardware meant hammers and nails from the hardware store and soft-

from the hardware store and soft-wear wasn't even a word.

Back then "Made in Japan" meant cheap junk and the term "making out" referred to how well you did on your school exam. Pizzas, McDonalds and instant coffee were unheard of. We hit the scene when there were 5 and 10 cent stores where you could buy things for five or ten cents. Ice cream cones were a nickel or a dime. For one nickel you could ride a street car, make a phone call, buy a Pepsi car, make a phone call, buy a Pepsi or enough stamps to mail one letter and two post cards. You could buy a new Chevy Coupe for \$600 but nobody could afford one. A pity A pity

# High School Vandalized

an early hour Thursday to investigate vandalism at Friona High School sometime during the night Wednesday or early

The vandal(s) had spray-painted obscene phrases on the

Many of the students' lockers were ran-sacked, with the books, notebooks, etc., strewn about on the floors of the hallways. A flour-like substance also littered the hallway floors. A large potted plant was knocked over in the process of

The school is offering a \$500 reward for anyone who can furnish name(s) of the guilty person(s), leading to their arrest and conviction of the crime.

"It took some time for them to do all of this," said high school principal Frank Belcher.

School was started at the regular time Thursday morning, with the students being made aware of the incident. By Thursday afternoon, things had returned to "semi-normal,"

according to Belcher.

"All of the teachers, as well as a number of townspeople came in and helped us clean up, and we really appreciate their hard work," Belcher said. He indicated that as of early

hard work," Belcher said. He indicated that as of early Thursday afternoon, the only items discovered missing were a television set and a VCR.

The place or method that the vandal(s) gained entry also had not been discovered. "We had thought about installing a security system in our buildings before, and I suppose now we'll definitely have to get something," said a distraught superintendent Hal Ratcliff not long after surveying the mess.

The vandalism was discovered by Terri Bails of the school's janitorial staff. Mrs. Bails gets to the school at an early hour each day to do her work. She alerted school officials about the intrusion.

"The police have some leads, and are working on the situation," Belcher concluded.





## Farmers Advised Of Compliance Rules

All farmers that are farming highly erodible cropland fields are reminded that conservation plans must continue to be followed each year in order to stay in compliance and remain eligible for any USDA farm program benefits.

Remember: keep rotating and keep the ground covered. This is the basic principle of staying in compliance, but for a more detailed example, read on.

 Cropping sequence--a high residue producing crop such as corn, wheat or sorghum must be grown on a portion (from 20-50 per cent as specified in the plan) of each field each year or on all of the field every specified year (second, third, fourth or fifth year), depending on the plan

every specified year (second, fland, fourth or fifth year), depending on the plan.

2) Crop residues must be left on the soil surface until April 1 on the required acres. The required acres is the same as above for the rotation. The amount of stubble to be left is specified in the plan (normally 1250-1500 pounds/acre). This cannot be accomplished by deep breaking or burning stalks or excessive disking. Normally on irrigated land, chiseling, sweeps, and one or two diskings is acceptable depending on the amount of stubble produced: growing wheat may be used as a cover crop provided it is not grazed out or destroyed before April 1.

3) Emergency tillage or roughening the surface by bringing up clods must be done if the land starts to blow for whatever reason.

remember concerning those "compliance plans" is:

(a) The plan goes with the land and should a change of operators take place, the new operator is required to follow the plan.

(b) Any water erosion problem must be addressed in the plan with proper treatment planned.

(c) All structural practices such as terraces, waterways, etc. and grass plantings done to control

grass plantings done to control erosion must be maintained.

(d) Breaking out new land to farm may be done if it is on non-highly erodible land, or on highly erodible land on which a conservation plan is signed which adequately controls both wind and water erosion.

adequately controls both wind and water erosion.

(e) Highly Erodible Determinations were made on a field by field basis prior to 1990 using old ASCS maps and field boundaries. These field boundaries are still the basis for your plans even though the size and shape of the current fields may have changed.



Miss White led the scoring with 14 points, Miss Carthel added 10, Misses Meyer and Heather Martin



several games.
Once, in San Francisco before once, in San Francisco before a 49er's game, at a very exclusive French restaurant named Ernie's, my tablemates were Clint Murchison, Tom Landry, Tex Schramm and his wife, Marty, Ernie Stautner, Verne Lundquist, and a variety of other coaches and sportswriters. sportswriters.

sportswriters.

Been there, done that.

I flew with the likes of Don
Meredith, Ralph Neely, Chuck
Howley, Jethro Pugh, Bob Lilly,
and Pete Gent.

I have been to four Super
Bowls. My personal Super Bowl
record is 1-3.

The good part is that not only.

The good part is that not only did I go to all four of those Super Bowls for free, I made money on

hem.
My travel agency put together packages, sold them to the fans, and I went along to "work".
I was there in 1970, when Don

I was there in 1970, when Don Shula's Baltimore Colts beat the Cowboys 16-13 on the disputed fumble recovery call that allowed Baltimore to win Super Bowl V. When the winning field goal went through the uprights, I can still see Bob Lilly's helmet sailing at least 50 yards down the field as he threw it in frustration. Chuck Howley was MVP, the only time in Super Bowl history a member of the losing team was MVP, and a defensive player at that.

Been there, done that.

Been there, done that

I attended Super Bowl X in 1975 against Pittsburgh, Super Bowl XII in 1977 against Denver (my only win), and Super Bowl XIII in 1978 against Pittsburgh.

My 1-3 record includes one win lew Orleans and three losses in

My proudest claim-to-fame, the one I didn't have the heart to tell my Noon Lions pals, was about the time I was asked to arrange and coordinate travel for the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders.

Believe it or not, in the early days of the Cowboys franchise, there was no budget to take the cheerleaders to out-of-town games.

Even playoff and Super Bowls.
When Dallas went to the Super
Bowl in Miami in 1975 against the
Steelers, a local Dallas radio station
that I had done travel promotions for, decided to have a promotion to take the Dallas Cowboy Cheerleaders to the game.

They asked me to handle the travel for the cheerleaders. It took

me a long time, about ten seconds,

There were thirty-two cheerleaders, plus another two or three chaperones from the Cowboys office that were scheduled to go

I went to the Cowboys office on North Central Expressway in Dallas to discuss the arrangements.

They wanted more security than is afforded the President of the U.S.

Seems that everywhere the cheerleaders went, the good old boys came catcalling and clawing at the cide.

I booked their flights, chartered buses to take them to the game, and went to Miami one day early to make sure arrangements were in order for their arrival.

The head mother of the cheerleaders said they did not want a lot of publicity and wanted to keep the travel plans as secret as possible. Right!

When I met the plane in Miami, every media person knew the schedule and were at the Miami Airport. Not only that, but in the interest of obscurity and security, the Cowboys had seen fit to have the girls wear their uniforms on the

It is very hard to hide thirty-two pretty young cheerleaders that are wearing their skimpy uniforms

are wearing their skimpy uniforms in an International Airport.

The buses were on the apron at the airport, and we hustled (no pun intended) the girls down the plane stairs directly onto their transportation to the game.

Even so, a couple of hundred male admirers made their way out to the buses and were trying to

to the buses and were trying to climb into the windows. The girls smiled, the buses left, the Cowboys lost. After the game, we guided them to the same buses, back to the same airport. They weren't smiling as much now.





Most Americans worry about how they will afford to retire, yet few actually do much about it. That was the conclusion of a recent poll commissioned by the International Association of Financial Planners.

More than 1,100 wage-earners over age 18 with annual incomes between \$35,000 and \$45,000 were between \$35,000 and \$45,000 were surveyed. Although 71 per cent of the respondents expected their incomes to rise in the future, 59 per cent were still concerned about running out of money during retirement. One reason for their concern is that 83 per cent of the people surveyed plan to retire before age 65. People retiring earlier and living longer means more dollars living longer means more dollars are needed for their retirement years. The statistics are even more

alarming for women. Women outlive men by an average of seven years, yet another study found that greater than 25 per cent of women have never consulted a financial

professional regarding retirement.

Perhaps one reason for Americans' lack of savings is the navailability of IRA deductions unavailability of IRA deductions. Before 1986, any wage-earner could contribute up to \$2,000 to an IRA each year and deduct the contribution from taxes. The Tax Reform Act of 1986, however, restricted the full education for those covered by others retirement. those covered by other retirement plans to couples earning \$40,000 or retirement--yet the incentive to do so has been greatly reduced for

legislators are beginning to understand this problem. In fact, Congress is considering several proposals regarding IRAs and expanded savings incentives:

\*The Republican' Contract

with America proposes the establishment of American Dream Savings Accounts, which are similar to IRAs but provide alternative benefits such as penaltyfree withdrawals for first-time home purchases. No up-front deduction is allowed, but tax free withdrawals

could be made after five years.

\*President Clinton has proposed expanding IRA
