The Attorney General expressed
... congratulations to law enforcement
... officers in this county, along with
... the hope that they would be able
... to continue such a good record in
... the future.

Due to the absence of payments
... of the \$150 per machine tax, during
... the fiscal year, as shown by the
... records of the Bureau of Internal
... Revenue, Daniel stated, "it may be
... assumed that your county is free
... of these gambling devices, since it
... is very seldom that anyone would
... display such a machine in viola-
... tion of the Federal tax statutes."

The state director said that the
... April induction call for 2,075 men
... will be filled as previously called
... for. The April call originally was
... for 4,150 men, but this was cut in

—With all-time record speed, the United States has doubled the size of its Armed Forces since the beginning of the Korean conflict, President Truman reports. The President made public a report

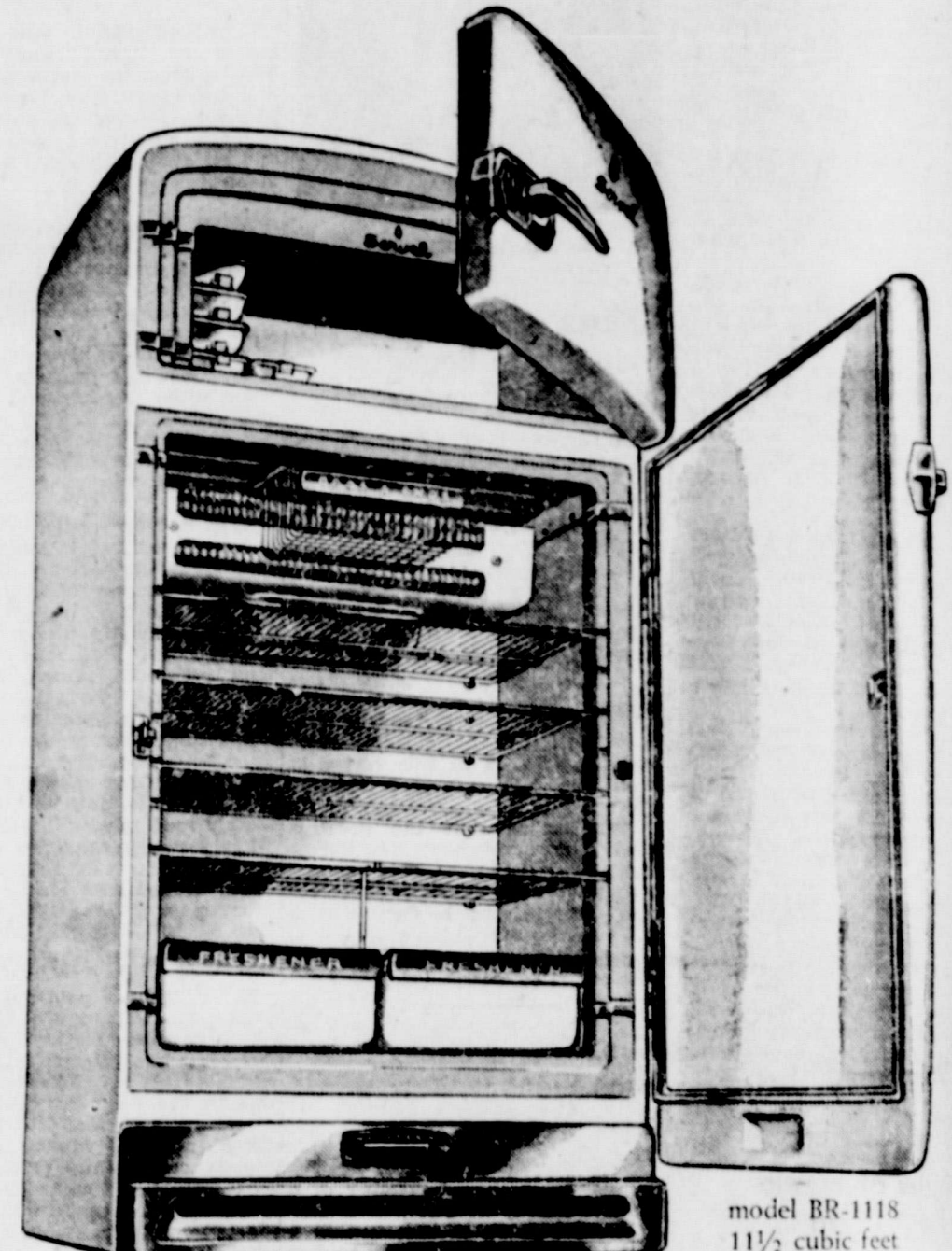

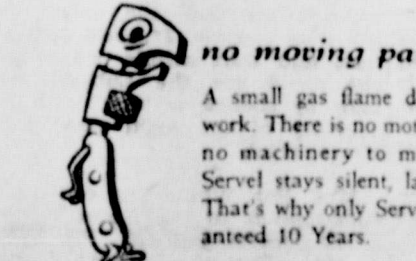

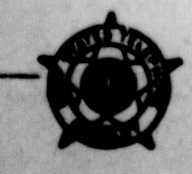

State such as schools and roads.

"Let's Talk Live Stock"

By TED GOULDY

Fort Worth, April 13.-A clear demonstration of the manner in which the business can be seen from the way livestock prices have behaved during the past week at Fort Worth. The extremely stable market, ready movement of all classes because of good demand and firm prices, remained unchanged on cattle and calves with all classes selling in line with recent high levels. Swine again fluctuated in a relatively narrow range, the ups and downs in the market being accurately reflected by the supplies offered and the movement of the pork in wholesale meat channels. Hogs were up the first of the week and lost the advances in the closing days of the week. Sheep and lambs, however, were highly erratic. The reason was the revision of wool price ceilings. In this case, the ruling was more liberal than had been expected and prices were higher, especially on Spring lambs on which pet credits were raised sharply by the new wool schedule. The Spring lambs rose for three straight days and gained \$1 to \$2.50 per hundred. The effects of government rulings on commodity and livestock prices and the unsettling factor they can be was clearly demonstrated. In this case, the producer benefited. This is not always the case.

Demand for good fat cattle and calves indicates a healthy consumer market. This week some good fed yearlings from G. A. McClung of Johnson County weighed 647 pounds and sold for \$37, same price as some of his creeped yearlings brought on several occasions over the past two or three months. Indication of a stable market. Parker Jameson, cattle feeder near Haslet, had about ten loads of steers on the market during the week at from \$34 to \$36 per hundred, prices the same as for several weeks past. A bright spot in the trade was stocker calves and yearlings as well as stocker cows, which continue in good demand despite disappointing range conditions in many sections and the uncertainty as to what Washington may do about prices. Latest rumor going the rounds is that when price ceilings are announced on meat, the top grade of beef will be little affected from current levels, but the plain and medium grade beefs and vealers will be rolled back sharply. This could widen the spread between the good, choice and prime livestock and the lower grades greatly. Some guess-timators think that prices on bulls, cows and the plain and medium calves, yearlings and steers may be considerably lower. While we are on the subject of price stabilization, here's a story that is going the rounds - no doubt inspired by some of the folks who differ with some of Price Stabilizer DeSalle. Goes like this: "Price Stabilizer Michale De Salle had this story from reporters anent the general wage-price freeze on U. S. economy.
