Rev. J. E. Kennedy died st his home in Lovelady last Sunday night as the result of a para. ytic stroke. and was buried Mon day afternoon by the Masunic order. Rev. Kennedy was a minister of considerable note, and Baptist church here. His is deeply regretted by his is deeply regretted by his many lriends here. The Messenger extends sympathy to the bereav-
ed in this dark hour of unspeakable grief.

Wm. Cunningham was born on October 11, 1814. He professed religion at a campmeeting hel t Fairview church in Greenville district in South Carolina in the fall of 1834 and joined the Ne School Presbyterian church
He was married to Elizabeth Ann He was married to Elizabeth An Blakely on the 30th day of April 1835, and in November of the same year moved with his wif to Perry county, Ala., he and his wife joining the same church at Marion. In the fall of 1837 they
moved to Marshall county, Mis sissippi. There they attache themselyes to the Cumberland Presbyterian church. About four years later the pastor of the ist church. Their church being too small and weak to secure a pastor, they attached themsel ves privilege of attaching themselyes to their own ehurch when an opfall of 1854 they came to Texas and settied on the San Pedro in Houston county. In 1855 they were again received at San Pedro. He was elected a ruling elder in this church, which office he filled with honor and faithfulness until death.
January 13:h, 1861, his faithful consort, the wife of youth, Elizabeth Ann Cunningham, passed to her reward in the land of the uary 28,1862 , he was married to Amanda C. Brown. October 5,
1875 he was again left to mourn the luss by death of his wife, Amanda. September 27, 1877, Murchison, with whom he lived Murchison, with whom he lived his life Mey 25,1003 At tha time he was left alone, and brok en up, he lived about with his children until death released him from his afflictions and decrepi-tude-the weight and burden years. These are his words: am now liying with my children as I am not able to take care of myself on account of my age, which is 89 years and 8 months to date. I am still an elder in church. During all the years of my life I have tried to live a consistentechristian and as I am near the grave I am more determined to live nearer to God, who has been a present help in timę of need, and I do hope that all my children will imitate my life and meet me in heaven." The above notes have been faithfully drawn from his own written records of his life, which were placed in the hands of the writer of this sketch, while attending upon the funeral service of
September 4th, 1905.
September 4th, 1905 .

Besides these remniscences of his life, it is befitting to say that he served his community in divers positions of puslic trust-as postmaster at San Pedro for a number of years, as justice of the peace for 8 or 10 years and as county commissioner a term or upon him by his countrymen, the Lord prospered him in the prime years of life, so that he was once at least well to do. So he has seen prosperity and adversity, but during all the years of his lite, as I have abundant ovidence for saying, he lived a consistant christian life.
