[^0]Voss, Texas, Nov. 12th.-I ar rived here on the 30th of October and find this a very pleasant courtry. Coleman county is a fine place for stock. I had the pleasure of driving over the mag. nificant prairies yesterday and I find plenty of cotton, sorgum and an abundance of feed stuff of all kinds, except corn. Farm ers tell me that corn doesn't grow to an advantage here. The principal feed stuff is maize, sorgum and oats. Every farmer raises enough wheat for his own use. Land is worth from \$12 to $\$ 15$ per acre. I don't think that a small capitalist could do much in this country. There is yery little improved land and none for sale, and lumber is worth from $\$ 25$ to $\$ 30$ per thousand. I think a man who has a home in Houston county had better stay with it. I can promise you Houston county is not the only county that makes a failure in crops for thi likes a long ways being the garden spot of Texas. Of course this is a better cotton country than East Texas, but by the time a man buys his wood and haulshis water he will find he hasn't made any more in the long run than he would in Houston county. Wages are good here for a single man, and a married man, too, if he wants to live in a tent; a house is out of the ques tion for a renter or wage hand The last good rain here was on September 3rd until last night. I am safe in saying that if a man will stick to this country in dry weather it will stick to him in wet weather. Respectfully, Dolph Zachery.
