

About 3000 birds are on exhibition in the Poultry Department of the State Fair of Texas.

C. C. Williams, an inmate of the Dallas County jail, under indictment for murder, committed suicide Monday, using a sharp razor that had been furnished him for shaving himself.

In a runaway which occurred at the race track at Fort Worth Miss Edna Smith was thrown out of a carriage and painfully injured. Three other occupants were slightly hurt.

The sawmill of the Red Water Lumber Company at Red Water, sixteen miles south of Texarkana, was burned. entailing a loss of about \$30,000. The plant was insured for \$11,000.

Hill County Camp No. 165, U. C. V., has endorsed Mr. O. T. Stevens of Hillsboro for appointment to the position of superintendent of the Confederate soldiers' Home at Austin.

Dr. B. A. Dinwiddie sold a bale of long staple cotton for 18.10c per pound at Clarksville. Capt. J. B. Doncho sold three bales for 18.021/2c and others brought 18 cents.



Is Largest in the World-Farmhouses on It Make a Small Town-Owner Passes His Winters in

Chicago.

Odebolt, la .- When it is considered that there are such corn fields in Iowa as Adams' 15,000-acre ranch at this place, producing 525,000 bushels every eason, and employing regularly 105 men, it is little wonder that the state of lowa has a 400,000,000-bushel corn crop for 1906. Before long 200 men will start on the 15,000 acres of corn, which will all be husked from the shock. Then the stocks will be shredded for the fat cattle before spring. This corn field is the largest in the world. The full 15,000 acres was planted with tested seed and is expected to yield an average of more than 35 bushels to the acre. This is considered a small average for lowa corp this season.

Thirty-seven double stalk cutters will be used to bind the corn in the field this fall. Mules are employed almost everywhere to do the heavy draft work on the farm, and there are over 200 of these animals kept there constantly. Mr. and Mrs. Adams and family are at present at their winter home in Chicago and the farm is in the hands of its manager.

With the exception of a large num ber of feeders which are purchased every fall, no cattle are raised on the big farm except enough milk cows to keep the help supplied with milk. Last winter Mr. Adams had 6,000 sheer brought from his North Dakota ranch for leeding, and it is announced that he will do it again this winter as soon as the present yardfull of cattle has been marketed.

The affairs at the farm are conduct d with as much system as in any large business office in this city. There is a main office and headquarters where the manager of the farm has his desk. It is here that Mr. Adams himself passes a large part of his time in summer. The farm is divided into sections, and each part is under the direction of a subforeman and worked by his force of men.

All the houses of the employes are located in one place near the center of the farm, making a small town. A schoolhouse is also erected here for the children of the workers. The farm and its methods are a revelation to the visitor. Adams is an enthusiast for good roads and all through the place he has built bandsome driveways.

There is another farm in Sac county, lowa, which contains 6,000 acres. The land there is not all tilled as on the Adams ranch, and hence it is not of



WHAT WE OWE TO INSECTS.

They Are of the Greatest Benefit to Growing Flowers.

Prof. Darwin said that if it had not been for insects we should never have had any more imposing or attractive flowers than those of the elm, the hop and the nettle. Lord Avebury compares the work of the insect to that of the florist. He considers that just as the florist has by selection produced the elegant blossoms of the garden, sothe insects, by selecting the largest and brightest blossoms for fertilization, have produced the gay flowers of the field. Prof. Plateau, of Ghent, has carried out a series of remarkable experiments on the ways of insects visiting flowers. He considers that they are guided by scent rather than by color, and in the connection he is at variance with certain British naturalists. Whatever may be the attraction in flowers to insects-as yet, it appears undefined-it is certain that the latter visit freely all blossoms alike, making no distinction between the large, bright-colored ones and the less conspicuous blossoms like those of the currants, the lime, the planetree, the

KINDNESS BROUGHT A FORTUNE.

Good Samaritan Receives One Fifth of Rich Man's Estate.

A FALSE IMPRESSION CORRECTED.

In regard to the article which appeared in the Messenger several weeks ago concerning the Eastern Texas railroad, the Crockett Courier says:

"The Courier has frequently heard the statement made to the effect that Crockett let the big mill pass by because of a lack of enterprise on the part of its citizens and is glad of the opportunity to correct that impression. Crockett never had a chance at the mill, was never asked for a bonus by the Louisiana & Texas Lumber Co. or any other company seeking a location for its 000 inhabitants or not.

mill After the land and timber along the eastern border of the county had been bought by the Central Coal & Coke Co, of Kansas City, the officials of the company came to Crockett and went out by private conveyance to their holdings, returned and took the train. They also visited Lufkin and made a trip out from there. It was their intention from the first to put their mill out where their timber was, and they would not consider any proposition. They visited Luf kin and Crockett with a view of finding the most feasible route for a railroad to the mill. 



WHEN EGGS ARE SCARCE.

Ways in Which Housekeepers Can Economize in Their Uuse.

The housekeeper expects eggs to be high at holiday time, just when she wants to make extra good things, but to offset this condition the cold weather allows more sugar and fat in food, and the lack of eggs is not quite so serious as it might be. When eggs are nearly 40 cents a dozen at the beginning of September, as they were this year in the large cities, the price has a decided influence on the daily menu. The first point in which to begin economy of eggs is in serving them as a substitute for meat. Something at less cost can temporarily be taken by giving the matter a little thought, although eggs are so staple a part of the usual breakfast as to come first to mind.

When eggs are scarce it is not necessary to make ten egg sponge or angel cake; neither is it wise to scrimp too much by using baking powder to take the place of eggs. If a recipe calls for a certain number, do not take out one or two and expect to have a satisfactory result, for the proportion of materials has been changed. It is greater wisdom to select a recipe in which the number of eggs is smaller. "No egg cake" is seldom satisfactory, but there are many good cakes made with but two eggs. Raised hot breads can for a time take the place of muffins and other breakfast cakes made with eggs, yet even here it may not be wise to entirely omit them, for a pan of light, feathery muffins will all be eaten, but if made without eggs two or three of the cakes are likely to be wasted. It takes but a small per cent. of waste in this way to turn cookery that was intended to be very economical into extravagance.

SKIRT-HANGERS EASILY MADE.

Set Makes an Acceptable and Suitable Gift for Bride.

A set of clothes-hangers makes an acceptable gift for a bride, a traveler or a college girl. The set consists of waist and skirt hangers-a dozen of each. The best waist-hangers are those of coppered wire, found at any furnishing store.- They should be wound with narrow ribbon, finished with a tiny bow at each shoulder end. The skirt-hangers are easily made at home. Take an inch strip of pine wood. Cut it into eight-inch lengths. Wind these also with ribbon. Screw into the middle of the upper edge a fairly large-sized brass cup-hook, and two cup-hooks of smaller size near the ends of the lower edge to hold the loops of the skirt-band. Many closets now are provided with a small brass rod fastened across at a convenient height. The hangers are hooked on this. Closets sometimes have a shelf running across for the entire length. In that case three large cup-hooks can be screwed to the under side, to hold any sort of a rod, from brass to broomstick. It is astonishing what a num-
